IERHA, Shared Health provides update to Arborg, Bifrost-Riverton on health services

Health-care leaders from the Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority and the province's Shared Health organization met with residents from Arborg and the Municipality of Bifrost-Riverton last Thursday evening to update them on the current status of health services in the area.

Organized and MCed by Arborg Mayor Peter Dueck, the public forum attracted about 90 people.

IERHA chief executive officer Marion Ellis, who spoke with the *Express* by phone a day after the forum, said it was "very important" to hear from the community and address their concerns about health-care services in the area.

Arborg hospital's emergency room has been on diversion (i.e., ambulances take Arborg-Bifrost area patients to Gimli or to another community's ER) as the health authority continues to work on recruiting an adequate number of physicians to staff it. But the hospital itself is providing in-patient and laboratory services. The health clinic attached to the hospital is providing primary care to residents in the area.

At this point, the health authority doesn't know what will happen with the ER, said Ellis. At least six doctors are required to work in the area in order to have the ER staffed on a 24-7

basis.

In addition to the ER, residents raised concerns about difficulties getting access to a doctor and whether the shortage of doctors would "justify moving services" from the area, she said. They also asked for an update on the status of their proposed new personal care home (the province is currently reviewing the budget) and ambulance response times.

Ellis said Arborg has three doctors — one with a private practice and the other two at IERHA's Icelandic River Health Clinic — plus a nurse practitioner out of Riverton who works one day a week in Arborg.

Two of the doctors have decided not to work at the ER, she said. The health authority doesn't want to burn out their physicians by having them work in their clinics then take on long shifts in the ER.

"People asked Dr. Penner how many doctors we should have in Arborg, and he said he'd like to have four or five because we very much want to focus on primary care," said Ellis. "There's a doctor scheduled to come in September 2024 and Dr. Penner is also trying to recruit a physician assistant."

The health authority is also looking at providing three hours of clinic service on Saturday with lab services to back that up.

As to the future of the Arborg hospital, Ellis said the response from Dr. Penner affirmed that "every bed in the region" is needed. And with advancements in medical technology and specialized care, patients with serious illnesses such as heart attacks and strokes — no matter where they live in the province — are sent to St. Boniface Hospital and the Health Sciences Centre, respectively. Even if the Arborg ER was open, patients suffering those conditions would be sent straight to Winnipeg.


Patients are still being admitted to the Arborg hospital for conditions that are "suitable" for that level of hospital care.

The focus on providing primary care can help reduce the volume of people

using emergency rooms to obtain health-care services they'd ordinarily obtain from a family physician. Over the past few weeks, media reports showed packed waiting rooms and excessively long wait times for service at some Winnipeg ERs.

"We know a lot of media across the country are reporting on congestion in emergency rooms. And ER doctors from coast to coast are saying this is because we don't have enough family doctors. Dr. Loudon said primary care is vital for screening patients for chronic diseases and managing those diseases," said Ellis. "If you have good primary care — whether that's provided by a physician, physician assistant or nurse practitioner —

you're less likely to need emergency care. Our real focus is to provide that primary care."

There are registered nurse vacancies at the hospital and the PCH at the moment, said Ellis, but there are no vacancies for licensed practical nurses (LPNs) and health-care aides in acute care.

In acute care (hospital), the nursing vacancy is 22 per cent while the health-care aide vacancy is zero. In long-term care, the nursing vacancy is 53 per cent while the health-care aide vacancy is nine per cent (but these vacancies will be filled by three health-care aides from the Philippines). In home care, the nursing vacancy is 33 per cent while the health-care aide vacancy is five per cent.

Arborg has seen success in training local and

Interlake residents as LPNs and health-care aides.

"We want to give Arborg credit because the town has been very successful in working with Fieldstone Ventures and Assiniboine Community College to offer health-care aide courses and two LPN courses."

There was a question raised about QDoc.ca, regarding whether the IERHA has a contract with the service, which provides online access to physicians. Ellis said the IERHA doesn't have a contract, but people in the region can still use it for medical advice on minor illnesses.

"IERHA does not have a contract with QDoc. And people were asking what that meant. Dr. Penner explained that you can [use the service] and you don't have to go to emergency or if you can't make an appointment with your own doctor because they're busy. This service has been

great for those who have some mild illnesses." Through a free app, QDoc.ca offers select Canadians [Manitoba, Ontario, Alberta, Nova Scotia, British Columbia] consultations with a general physician, e-prescriptions, lab requisitions, COVID screening, audio and video consultations and medication reminders, according to its website. Common medical issues include respiratory conditions, irritable bowels, allergies, diabetes, skin conditions, urinary tract infections and sexually transmitted infections.



We need Manitoba's leadership to reform the tobacco industry

It's National Non-Smoking Week, and Manitoba has a historic opportunity to reduce health-care costs and reform the tobacco industry.

Over many decades, Big Tobacco has engaged in deception and targeted marketing that has addicted

youth and resulted in immense suffering, disease and premature death for so many people. The devastating impacts of tobacco use in Manitoba is extensive and undeniable — 130,000 Manitobans or 12 per cent still smoke tobacco, with 1,500 tobacco-related deaths and \$189 million in health-care costs every year.

All 10 provinces have filed lawsuits against the tobacco industry, collectively seeking more than \$500 billion in damages, and right now the Manitoba government is negotiating a settlement with Big Tobacco.

To prevent disease and save lives, it's vital that the settlement implement strict new controls on the tobacco industry and establish substantial long-term funding for tobacco control through an independent fund. We must protect future generations. As such, the Canadian Cancer Society urges Premier Wab Kinew to use this monumental opportunity to hold Big Tobacco accountable and prevent future harm to Manitobans.

Who decides is MAID is right or wrong?

Ms. Wilson:

After reading what you wrote for last week's *Express Weekly News*, I feel that I must comment on the subject of MAID for mental illness, which you vehemently oppose. I favour it.

Who are you to say whether people's reasons for choosing to go with MAID are wrong? How do you judge who qualifies as "mentally ill enough or not"?

Did you not consider that many people who have what could be called mental illness could also have unbearable physical pain from medical issues? No, apparently not. Until you walk a mile in someone else's shoes, you and other "do-gooders" cannot possibly know what is going on with them.

I myself applied for MAID because of intractable physical pain and suffering of medical origin, but I also happen to suffer from major depres-

sive disorder; there is no cure for any of my conditions. Just palliative care and chemical "happy" pills in the form of antidepressants. I don't hallucinate. I have not lost contact with reality like so many people suffering from mental issues do, nor have I ever been an alcoholic or drug addict either. Yet depression is considered a form of mental illness. I am of sound enough mind (even my two psychiatrists have said this) and too well steeped in reality to know what is happening to me and my body, and why I want to go with MAID. You don't have the right to take this away from me nor anyone else in similar situations. In fact, I think you have incredible gall for attempting to do so.

I had made my wishes for MAID known to people around me, and a year ago a former friend doxed me in to the city police as "imminent suicide." At first, the police came to my door to ask me if I needed help. I refused and told them to go away and leave me alone. It is a personal decision that I and I alone make. The

police in that town came back moments later, broke down my door, shackled me like an animal and abducted me against my will, taking me to the local hospital. They beat me as well for resisting them. They said "You don't die unless we say you can!" Of course not, because police can decide to shoot someone at will and they can decide for you or anyone else. It should be noted that I had hematomas all over me from being "taken care of by the police" (our beloved public servants). And don't get any ideas of me going to a police review board. It is a joke, just like everything else here in this province and country. Government bureaucracy in getting medical care and treatments doesn't lighten my problems or make me feel any better physically or mentally; in fact, they both add to the problems. Can you fix all my problems? No, you can't. Can you make me well again? No, you cannot. Had you been there at the time, I am sure you would have smirked over it and praised the police.

While on the unit for a whole week (which was a real waste of taxpayers money), none of the staff saw me as demented, insane, "touched in the head," "loonie toon" or losing contact with reality whatsoever and supported my decision. They knew about my medical conditions as well. Not one of them agreed that I needed to be in the hospital for psychiatric care.

Then you come along and high-handedly encourage people to stop MAID programs to assist people, mentally ill or otherwise. Are you a psychiatrist to decide these things? I am sorry for what your son is going through and for what you as a parent must bear. However, you are interfering with my choice over my life.

Are you going to also tell me and others like me that we have no right to want to end our lives to end our suffering? You never experienced anything like what I have. I, myself, am hoping my wish for MAID comes soon.

# RM of Gimli and Treaty One Nations hold flag-raising ceremony

The RM of Gimli held a historic flag-raising ceremony last Friday at the municipal office to further truth and reconciliation efforts with Indigenous Manitobans who are part of Treaty 1 territory.

Gimli Mayor Kevin Chudd, who spoke on behalf of council, said the ceremony represented a significant moment in the RM's history and a commitment to co-operation and shared responsibility to build a better future for everyone.

"This ceremony is not just a symbolic gesture: it's a call to action. It's a reminder that we must work together to create a society that is inclusive, equitable and just. We must strive to build strong relationships based on trust, understanding and respect," said Chudd. "Let us commit ourselves to the process of reconciliation, to learning from the past and to building a future where all people can thrive."

Gimli is on Treaty 1 territory, which comprises the traditional lands of the Anishinaabeg, including the Cree, Oji-Cree, Dakota and Dene Peoples, as well as the homeland of the Métis Nation.

Treaty One Nation represents seven First Nations: Brokenhead Ojibway Nation, Long Plain First Nation, Peguis First Nation, Roseau River Anishinaabe First Nation, Sagkeeng First Nation, Sandy Bay Ojibway First Nation and Swan Lake First Nation.

Representatives from Peguis and Brokenhead, the Assembly of Manitoba Chiefs, the Treaty Relations Commission of Manitoba, as well as Manitoba MLAs, were invited to speak at the ceremony, which included the raising of the Treaty One flag, a flag-smudging ceremony, drum ceremony and flag song performed by the Walking Wolf Singers.

Gimli resident Jocelyn Barlow attended the ceremony and said she felt the event brought everyone closer together.

"The power represented by a flag is one concept that really resonated with me during today's Treaty One flag-raising ceremony," she said. "The speakers' remarks were all so eloquent and thought-provoking. Surely a day like today signals that real, meaningful progress has been made in erasing any lines that may have divided people in Gimli."

was adopted in May 2020 and incorporates the original spirit and intent of the treaties, which were to last "as long as the sun shines, the grass grows and the rivers flow." The green represents the grass; the blue, the water; and the yellow, the sun. The red represents the circle of life and the people who inhabit the land, while the seven points around the sun represent the seven First Nations who signed Treaty No. 1 in 1871 at Lower Fort Garry.

The flag-raising was followed by a feast at the Gimli Recreation Centre.

# Gimli Rotary Club recognizes member for outstanding service

The Gimli Rotary Club presented one of its members with a significant award to recognize his service to the club and the community.

Club members presented Anders Kuusselka with a Paul Harris Fellow Award from Rotary International.

The award recognizes Kuusselka's "tangible and significant assistance" to the club, which contributes to the betterment of the local community.

Kuusselka is a retired Gimli High School teacher who still subs from time to time, continues to work with youth in the community and sits on the board of the Gimli Youth Hub, which plans to build a youth centre near the Gimli Recreation Centre.

He said he was excited when he learned he would be receiving the award.

"I'm so pleased the Rotary Club went out of their way to nominate me. This was a total surprise," said Kuusselka, who founded the Wave Youth Club (middle school kids) and oversees the Interact Youth Club (high school kids), which falls under the aegis of the Rotary club. "I'm hoping this will help promote all the work that's being done in Gimli for our youth and how the Rotary Club contributes to that. Our club is small but we do a lot in the community."

The Rotary Club, which has 26 members, has been active in Gimli for over 50 years. Some of the recent Rotary projects include Operation Red Nose and planting trees in Gimli Park.

Kuusselka started the Wave Youth Club a number of years ago to provide activities for middle years students and to teach them leadership

and community service skills. The Interact kids help Kuusselka and his team with the Wave kids, organizing and supervising activities such as basketball and volleyball games, bowling, field trips and music.

"I'm so proud of our high school kids; they are the backbone of the Interact club. They are so good at working with the younger kids, serving as leaders and role models," said Kuusselka. "And I think the younger kids really appreciate having someone who's a few years older than them. They look up to them and really pay attention."

There are about 20 students from the high school who help out with Wave programs. And some of the students, such as Vira, Liuba, Logan, Nate and Gage, have been very "faithful," never having missed a day of volunteering with the younger kids, he said.

Among the Interact and Wave's adult volunteers are David and Sharon, DeeDee, Debra, Rhonda, Rick and Diane, Edwin, Autumn, Kelly, Danielle, and Rudi and Elida — all of them stalwart supporters of the clubs, helping supervise the kids and run the music program.

Music rehearsals are held in Kuusselka's garage, which he converted into a rehearsal studio for the high school students. The middle years students rehearse at the Bayview Church. Both music groups are supervised by adults.

Gimli High School and Dr. George Johnson Middle School provides space for both the Wave and the Interact clubs while the youth hub committee works on getting the youth centre built.

"The Rotary Club appreciates the schools for letting us have space in their buildings. In the high school, the Interact Club can use the sewing room. And in the middle school the Wave has use of the gymnasium and another space to do arts and crafts and play games," said Kuusselka.

In addition to the schools helping the clubs, Kuusselka said the local

Sobey's and Co-op food stores donate snacks. And Beach Boy Restaurant helps them in the summer with the Snack Shack on Gimli Beach, which is staffed by Wave kids and volunteers with food handling certificates. Any supplies the Wave can't buy locally is purchased for them by Beach Boy.



searching for and joining "Coldwell March Madness." The tournament runs for the entire month of March, and the RM has prizes for fishers each week of the derby.

The tournament is catch-and-release only to protect the fish species in the area. Upon catching a fish, people will take the proper measurements of it, take photos and submit them through the FishDonkey app. On the app, fishers have to include a video of them safely releasing the fish back into the water.

The tournament has several prize categories, including the grand prize for the largest overall walleye catch, with the prize typically being an \$800 electric ice auger. There are also prizes for participation, the smallest catch and hard luck prizes for those who don't catch anything.

New this year is an early bird prize of a \$200 Cabela's gift card on behalf of the families of Carey Rae and Darlene Law, avid ice fishers in the community.

"They may not have won any prizes but they registered, fished and had fun doing so," said Malcolm.

The early bird prize is available to all who register for the tournament on or before Feb. 23. All

who register before then will automatically be entered into the draw.

"We know Darlene and Carey would much rather be down here fishing with us during the tournament," said Malcolm. "But we know they're both fishing in heaven this year."

As the RM continues to prepare for the tournament, they're looking for sponsorships from local businesses. # Fisher Branch's Chaika dancers celebrate 54 years at Malanka

The Fisher Branch Chaika Ukrainian Dance Club marked 54 years of high-spirited dance performances at its Malanka on Jan. 13 at the community hall.

Club secretary Amanda Bouchard said the COVID-19 pandemic cancelled their 50th anniversary celebration in 2020, but they continued to practise and fundraise to keep the club going.

"Our club right now has 50 dancers from 30 families. Our youngest group of dancers are four years old and we have 14 dancers in grades 9 to 12 at Fisher Branch Collegiate," said Bouchard. "We have a creative movement class this year."

Attendees enjoyed a traditional Ukrainian supper, which was followed by the club's performances of 10 different folk dances including the hopak, poltava, volyn, bukovina, hut-sul and polissia, as well as a character dance called the barnyard dance that was performed by the beginners. The evening ended with the kolomeyka, a free-form dance that lets dancers show off their skills.

"Our kolomeyka was about 20 minutes long and we had probably close to 20 former dancers join in at the end," said Bouchard. "And just before midnight we formed a Malanka unity circle for a local family, Cameron and Shailynn and their baby Anthony, who was our Malanka baby. We had two dancers and a baba go around the circle. The baba gives everyone a handful of wheat. It represents going out with the old and coming in with the new. Then we did a countdown and everyone threw the wheat into the air."

Chaika dancers have been "blessed" with many local community sponsors and families, said Bouchard, helping fund costumes and other expenses and supporting their fundraisers. The club puts on a silent auction at Malanka and at spring recitals and

does a Grey Cup tickets fundraiser and a perogy and sausage fundraiser every fall. It also donated proceeds from a raffle to a non-profit group in Ukraine that delivers humanitarian aid to communities devastated by the Russian invasion.

"Last year we did a raffle and donated all the proceeds to Principle of Consciousness, a group in Ukraine that are on the front lines supporting soldiers and bringing food and water to communities that are cut

off from everything," said Bouchard. "The Fisher Branch community has been amazing at supporting our club. For all our fundraisers, we get so much support and that's why this club has been successful for as long as it has."

She expressed gratitude to instructors Deneika Gard and Cody Vandersteen, who have been with the club as dancers.

"Jessica Truthwaite has also been helping our club this year, and it is

so awesome having her back to instruct," said Bouchard. "We are also very blessed to have two senior dancers volunteering with our younger groups, Carli Nahuliak and Brandt Cochrane. Our club greatly appreciates these positive role models who are giving their time back to our club and inspiring the younger generations of dancers. And we would like to thank our incredible, hard working Chaika board of directors: Laura Grzenda, Larissa Nahuliak our vice-president, Kristen Stocki our treasurer, Amanda Bouchard, Dwight Nahuliak, Sara Uruski and Chad Rindall. There is a ton of work done behind the scenes in this club and our group is so very fortunate to have such a dedicated board."

The club's spring tea is scheduled for Sunday, April 14 in the Fisher Branch Collegiate gymnasium. It will also be competing at the Kalyna Dance Festival in Yorkton, Sask., at the end of April.



# Gimli's assisted living building expected to open this summer

A much-needed assisted living facility on First Avenue in Gimli is well underway and expected to open this summer.

The Betel Heritage Foundation, which owns the Waterfront Centre, is constructing the facility on the lot beside the Waterfront. One side of the building will have views of Gimli Harbour.

Waterfront Centre general manager Tristin Tergesen, who reports to the heritage foundation board, said the project will enable residents who need some assistance to remain in the community surrounded by their friends and family, as well as help them pay reasonable rent for that accommodation.

"Part of the vision was to provide housing and care for seniors so that they can stay in our community," said Tergesen. "There's been research showing that people at a certain point are having to leave the community to obtain assisted living accommodation. That was one of the motivations for moving this project forward."

When completed, the building will

have 40 units. Most will be one-bedroom suites but there are also two-bedroom and studio-sized units available. The top level of the building (seventh floor) will have a kitchen and dining room, which can offer meal services to residents, as well as a multi-purpose room. On-site parking will be provided.

Tergesen said people are eager to learn more about obtaining a suite in building but the eligibility criteria have yet to be determined.

"I have people calling me every day. The interest level is high," she said. "I will be providing information to people as it becomes available."

## Nurses helping nurses: Mentorship Program

Nurses not only share a passion for their profession, they also share their knowledge with their up-and-coming counterparts.

Manitoba's Nursing Mentorship Program supports new nurses who are launching their careers by matching them with a nurse mentor who can offer guidance and advice.

Tanya Cheetham, chief nursing officer, said formal mentorship relation-

ships typically span about six months.

"The mentee works independently as a nurse, as does the mentor. They don't always work the same shifts, but the mentor is there for the mentee to support them through any situations they may encounter and to be a support," she said.

"This fosters growth of new nurses in the system, which will help in recruitment and retention of nurses and keep them in the system with the right supportive environment."

Breanne Galaluk has been a nurse for nine years. She currently works at the Gimli Health Centre, where she also served as a mentor to recent nursing graduate Madalin Rusak-Chambers.

"I agreed to go into the mentorship program because I remember how hard it was as a new grad to navigate all the aspects of nursing as a career, particularly if you don't have anyone else in your life who works in the field to help you understand how things work," Galaluk said.

"The best part about being in the mentorship program is seeing the new nurses grow and feel comfortable in their career choice. I wish this program had been around when I started."

For Rusak-Chambers, her interest in nursing sparked when she was a teen.

"I decided to go into nursing because I had the opportunity to shadow nurses at the Gimli hospital when I was in high school," she said.

"I admired the critical thinking and compassion the nurses had and decided I wanted to do the same."

Like Galaluk, she clearly sees the advantages of the nursing mentorship program.

"Being a new grad can be overwhelming. The program gave me the opportunity to have a trusted co-worker available to me when I needed support," Rusak-Chambers said.

"The best part was getting to have a co-worker who understood that I am still learning the world of nursing — and being able to ask questions judgment-free."



In lieu of flowers, donations can be made to the Riverton & District Friendship Centre Foodbank in Don's memory.




