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Motorcycles roar across Manitoba to complete six challenges

A local initiative offers patches to encourage Manitobans to travel within the province by motorcycle this summer.

Myles O'Reilly started Manitoba by Motorcycle in 2016 to challenge riders to visit town statues and provincial parks across the province. He thought of the idea after he and his wife April completed a similar route in North Dakota a year earlier.

"We looked around to see if there

was anything locally, and there was nothing that I could find in Manitoba or kind of anywhere else in Canada," said O'Reilly.

He wanted to find a way to explore his "own backyard" and reward riders with patches for making the trek. To earn a patch, a rider must submit a photo of themselves in front of specific landmarks. Each region

has around 20 locations for motor-cyclists to visit, and O'Reilly sends a patch after each completed challenge.

There were over 100 people who submitted photos last season, said

"Because of [COVID-19] people aren't really travelling, so they're focusing more on local tourism, which is good for me," he said with a laugh. "What I really want is local tourism."

O'Reilly has curated six patches for six challenges this season with the help of local tourism boards.

"I was speaking to Central Manitoba Tourism, and they had the idea of being more kind of hyper-local, finding places within each region," said

O'Reilly.

The new challenges feature motorcycle routes in the Interlake, East and Central Manitoba.

"I love finding new places to go and to have new things to look at and visit," said O'Reilly. "I do my best to visit every single location."

Andrew Gagnon is one of the first people to earn a patch this season. Gagnon has travelled Manitoba by Motorcycle

routes for three years.

"The last two years I tried the same routes," said Gagnon. "It just never worked out, but this year I was able to do them all."



Gagnon completed the town statues route in early May, visiting 10 statues in one day.

Manitoba by Motorcycle is also available on the Interlake Tourism app called Driftscape. The app highlights different attractions, businesses and eateries for people to visit, said Melissa Van Soelen, Interlake Tourism manager.

"It's basically like our travel guide, but we've digitized it," said Van Soelen.

O'Reilly will continue to update the routes and add more locations across Manitoba for motorcyclists to explore.



Summer science club offers virtual programming for kids

Students interested in STEM can register for WISE Kid-netic Energy

The University of Manitoba is inviting students between grades three to eight to participate in virtual science summer clubs hosted by Women in Science and Engineering (WISE) Kid-Netic Energy this summer.

The week-long summer clubs feature various experiments and activities that teach kids about ecology, engineering, medical science, chemistry, and coding.

"(The summer clubs) provide an opportunity for any kid to step out of their comfort zone and learn about the concepts in a very fun, hands-on way," said WISE Summer Logistics Lead Alora Anis.

The university developed WISE to get kids excited about careers in science, technology, engineering, and medicine (STEM). The outreach program began focusses on reaching youth with social, economic, and geographic barriers to STEM education.

In a typical year, WISE instructors provide in-person workshops to students across the province—even travelling to Thompson and other more remote communities.

This year, the program is transitioning to a digital format, and kids will attend the STEM-themed summer clubs online.

"The year has been very strange, but we are hoping that this will provide our students and undergrads students an opportunity to learn," Anis said

The student will spend an hour-and-a-half each day in a virtual classroom playing games, watching science demos, and interacting with their peers. Then, WISE instructors will leave them with a task or experiment to complete on their own.

Some of the projects are completely independent, while others are collaborative, said WISE instructor Calleigh Gingras.

In the Codemakers club, students use tiny, pocketsized computers called Micro:bits to learn how to code.

A Micro:bit is an exposed computer chip roughly the size of a credit card with two buttons, speakers, and a cluster of tiny lights on its face. Students program the lights to flash in sequence to form letters and shapes, create music, or play simple games like Pong.

"By far, in everything we've done, it's always coding that kids really, really like," Gingras said.

In addition to the assorted STEM-themed clubs, WISE is also offering a Space Farm club. Kids who register for the space farm will learn how technology and agriculture work together in space.

Participating in the summer clubs is an opportunity to expose kids to science terminology and concepts they are likely to encounter later in their academic careers, Gingras said.

"I've had emails from parents thanking me, saying their children had kind of lost interest in STEM subjects at school, but seeing more real-life applications and doing these experiments really kind of brought them back to having an interest again," Gingras said.

WISE is offering the clubs every week beginning July 1 and ending Aug. 20. Registration costs

Preliminary data on whether it's safe to administer different types of two-shot COVID-19 vaccines show participants experiencing more side effects than those receiving two jabs of the same vaccine.

Those findings were characterized as "short-term disadvantages" to mixing vaccine as no serious concerns were flagged.

The University of Oxford, England, study titled "Heterologous prime-boost COVID-19 vaccination: initial reactogenicity data," which is also referred to as the Com-COV study, was published online May 12 as correspondence in the medical journal The Lancet.

It's the first study to look at the "initial" reactogenicity [adverse reactions or side effects], safety and immunogenicity [immune response]. Data on immune response was not presented in the study but is expected to be released in June.

In February, the researchers recruited 830 participants, all of whom were 50 years of age and older. Participants included male and female subjects from different ethnic groups.

Researchers paired AstraZeneca's COVID vaccine with Pfizer-BioNTech's vaccine as well as the same vaccines in four groups: (1) AstraZeneca (first dose) and Pfizer (second dose), (2) Pfizer (first) and AstraZeneca (second), (3) Pfizer (first) and Pfizer (second), and (4) AstraZeneca

(first) and AstraZeneca (second). They randomly assigned participants to one of the four groups and looked at outcomes at 28-day and 84-day intervals

The study found that using two doses of different vaccines resulted in participants' self-reporting more adverse effects compared to those getting two doses of the same vaccine.

"Both heterologous [different] vaccine schedules induced greater systemic reactogenicity following the boost dose than their homologous [same] counterparts," state the authors of the study.

Adverse reactions included feeling feverishness, experiencing chills, fatigue, headache, joint pain, malaise, muscle aches, nausea and diarrhoea, most arising after 48 hours. There were no hospitalizations reported, nor were there any incidents of rare blood clots occurring. The use of paracetamol (called acetaminophen in Canada) could tamp down those side effects.

Based on the study's "limited haematology and biochemistry data available," the researchers said "there were no concerns" with regard to the safety of mixing vaccines.

Potential harms can be difficult to determine depending on sample size. In terms of generalization to the wider population, large sample

Small businesses affected by further COVID-19 restrictions

With personal services closing due to pandemic restrictions following case number spikes earlier this month, Manitobans will once again have to wait for a haircut.

"This is the third time now, I'm hoping with more people getting vaccinated that they won't be doing this again," said Darlene Gallichon, owner of Willow Hair Design in Arborg.

Willow Hair Design is still offering curbside pickup for product but will not be able to provide any of their usual services under the current provincial health restrictions.

"I'm happy to be shut down because with numbers so high, it makes me really nervous. I'm nervous for people coming in my shop that if they go out sick, so it is stressful on everybody," she said.

Gallichon said that while it isn't great for her business to be shut down, she would rather everyone stay safe and alive, than be cutting their hair.

"Some of my clients are so furious but I don't know. I just feel like it's what they (the provincial government) think they need to do. And that's a

good thing. You know, it's three weeks it's not a year," she said.

The provincial government announced further financial aid to businesses last week in a press conference.

This includes another bridge grant of \$5,000, an additional \$2,000 for restaurants to cover costs of food waste, wages, and insurance, and extra financial support to restaurants wanting to implement takeout or delivery services.

"It's not anywhere near enough. You know I think the reality for most of these businesses that have been operating at less than 50 per cent over the course of, you know the past 14 months, \$20,000 is not going to be anywhere near enough" said Chuck Davidson, president of the Manitoba Chamber of Commerce.

As of Sunday May 9, restaurants, patios, and bars are no longer allowed to have in-person dining and can only provide takeout and delivery services if they choose to stay open.

"There's really no amount of dollars you could provide those businesses right now that's going to sort of allow them to bounce back. I think the reality is I mean they just need the opportunity to be open," said Davidson.

Public places such as gyms, fitness centres, casinos and VLT's, museums, galleries and libraries are to close, along with salons, barbers, tanning salons, estheticians, tattoo shops and all other personal services.

"I mean, there's no question it's retail, hospitality, tourism industry, those have been the ones that have been most impacted any kind of businesses where that they're reliant on someone actually coming into the door has been impacted significantly over the course of this past year," said Davidson.

He added that he thinks a regional approach to public health measures could have helped avoid closures of public spaces not having COVID-19 exposures.

Retail stores, garden nurseries, and markets had their capacity dropped down to 10 per cent or a maximum of 100 people, whichever is smaller.

Indoor sports, including after school programs are closed, as well as outdoor sports are limited to five people maximum. Organized team sport is

now prohibited.

Kid's day camps closed along with all dance, theatre, and music schools.

Outdoor gatherings are limited to a five people maximum, with multiple households allowed. Households may not have anyone else other than its residents inside or outdoors on their property.

Indoor gatherings are now prohibited, this includes community, cultural and religious gatherings.

"Right now, case numbers are far too high and the strain on our health system is rapidly increasing," said Dr. Brent Roussin. "I urge all Manitobans to do everything they can to reduce transmission of the virus - follow the orders, stay home as much as possible, reduce the number of contacts you have and wear masks when you are around others from outside your household."

Eriksdale community cooks up a fundraiser to keep rec centre open

The Eriksdale Rec Centre hosted one of their first events in a year on May 9 and celebrated Mother's Day with a take-home meal.

Province introduces paid leave for COVID-19 vaccination

The provincial government is making changes to the Employment Standards Code to ensure Manitoba workers are able to take the time they need to get their COVID-19 vaccine shots.

Finance Minister Scott Fielding announced last week that the proposed amendments will make it mandatory for employers to allow staff up to three hours of paid leave each time they require a dose of vaccine.

"We're obviously at a very critical point in Manitoba's third wave in the fight against COVID-19," Fielding said at a press conference in Winnipeg May 11. "Immunization is crucial to protect ourselves, protect our neighbours, and those around us. We want to encourage all Manitobans to get their COVID-19 vaccine as soon as

"We want Manitobans to be confi-

dent to book COVID-19 vaccinations during work hours without worrying that they're going to lose out on regular wages. That's really important to make sure that all Manitobans are vaccinated."

The wage rate would be fixed at an employee's regular wage rate, or the average wage for employees whose wage varies, such as those paid on

Employers would be able to require employees to provide them with reasonable verification of the necessity of the leave as soon as possible, but could not require a physician's note or medical certificate.

"We don't want to add additional burden to medical officials and doctors while we're dealing with COV-ID-19," Fielding said.

Employees who need more time to travel to vaccination appointments or

who suffer from vaccine side effects would be allowed to take a longer unpaid leave.

Fielding noted many Manitoba employers were already offering staff paid time to get vaccinated, but the government feels it's important to put this into legislation in light of the need for a second dose of the vaccine and potentially booster shots in the

"For the most part employers are giving employees time off to do this, but we wanted to make sure this is in legislation to make sure it is the law," he said.

"We all have a role to play in protecting ourselves and our communities," Fielding said. "The faster we can get vaccinated the sooner we'll be able to loosen ... restrictions to get our lives back."

Gimli vaccination super site to open May 29

The province will be opening a new COVID-19 vaccination super site in Gimli near the end of May as Manitoba's third wave continues to produce alarming new infection numbers and hospitals look at ways to create more capacity.

The May 10 super site announcement was followed by days of high case numbers, including 560 new infections last Thursday, which broke Manitoba's record. On Sunday 535 new infections were reported. Numbers also continue to rise in the Interlake-Eastern health region.

The Gimli super site is slated to open on May 29. Those eligible for vaccination can start booking an appointment.

The Gimli Recreation Centre is located at 45 Centennial Road in the west end of town. Centennial is accessible from Highway 9.

The provincial government has made a number of super sites - which offer the Pfizer-BioNTech mRNA CO-VID-19 vaccine – available across the province.

In addition to Gimli, eligible people can opt to have their vaccination done in Selkirk, Dauphin, Steinbach, Morden, Brandon, Thompson, and in Winnipeg at the RBC Convention Centre downtown or at the sports complex building located across from the Canadian Tire store at the Garden City Shopping Centre.

Changing minds with understanding, empathy

Eric Yaverbaum speaks from both his professional and personal experience when he addresses one of the key challenges being faced now with the continuing COVID-19 crisis.

The 40-year public relations veteran, communications expert, and bestselling author of seven books has survived the virus twice, so that augments his perspective, particularly in addressing the issue of vaccine skepticism.

A regular TV pundit, Yaverbaum has been reaching out across North America to start a discussion about the need to communicate effectively with skeptics, how to change minds, and why empathy is vital in public health communications.

"I'm not a doctor, and I'm not a scientist, but I'm a guy who has COVID twice and gotten vaccinated ... I've learned an enormous amount," said Yaverbaum, who is the CEO of Ericho Communications and author of Public Relations for Dummies and Leadership Secrets of the World's Most Successful CEOs.

"I'm in the communications field, and I don't think we have done a great job of communicating, one, just what the stakes are and, two, just how safe it is," he said in a phone interview last week. "And we do need to have some empathy for people ... if we show a little empathy and understand what the reservations are, I think it will go a long way."

In the U.S. at least, Yaverbaum observed, vaccine supply has begun to outpace demand, so the questions that need to asked is what is causing vaccine slowdown and how can it be addressed to reach herd immunity?

Even before the pandemic, vaccine skepticism was on the rise. It's led to the resurgence of diseases like measles, so it's clear that winning over skeptics is a critical public health issue.

That skepticism remains despite the fact all five COVID-19 vaccines with public results have eliminated deaths and drastically reduced hospitalizations, Yaverbaum noted.

"To each his own, but if we all want to get out of this, we need to take a hard look at the facts and figures and make decisions accordingly ... it's been a really long year," he said.

"I listen to people's fears and concerns, and I'm not downplaying them," he continued.

"I think there are some communities that haven't had positive experiences with medical professionals ... they have reasons for being skeptical, so I think a little empathy and understanding of their fears and concerns is pretty important," Yaverbaum said. "I think work has to be done to earn their trust.

Yaverbaum touched on how he sees there has been some failures or shortcomings in getting the right messaging out to people.

"The concerns are easily answered," he stressed, citing for example that "it's just a very small percentage of people who are vaccinated who are still going to get COVID-19.


"I think it's important to appeal to the emotions of people. What's important to them; what are they missing out on by not getting vaccinated," he said. "Have a real focus on the positive ... [that] you don't have to worry about infecting loved ones or friends.

"The vaccine is actually the way that life could return to normal, whatever normal is going to be," Yaverbaum said. "I think people need to hear optimism and hope also, the promise of the future we can all have because of the vaccines."

As for his own experience with COVID-19, Yaverbaum has been active on social media through his journey and offered encouraging messages to others.

"While they've always said that happiness was an inside job ... now you're inside in a different way. It's a great time to practice changing the way you look at things ... and I promise you that if you do, the things you look at will change," he said in one of his Facebook posts.

"Here's all I'll have to say to this nasty and highly contagious virus and unwelcomed visitor ... is that the best you got? Life is a lot like the ocean I love so

much. The waves will try to knock you down and push you back to where you started. Not me. Not this time."

"My anti-bodies are off the charts, which is very comforting to me,"Yaverbaum noted in conclusion. "I'd like to give a few of them to other people if I could."

sizes in clinical research provide a higher degree of what is called statistical power, that is, a higher probability that a link exists between a drug, an intervention or other phenomenon and a particular outcome

With COVID vaccines, that has been borne out in the real world, in which millions of people of different ages, sex and ethnicity have received a vaccine. Both the AstraZeneca vaccine and the Johnson & Johnson vaccine have been linked the development of serious and/or fatal blood clots called vaccine-induced thrombotic thrombocytopenia (VITT) after significant numbers of people were immunized. The condition wasn't noted in clinical trials using relatively fewer test subjects.

The English researchers cautioned that because their data were obtained from those 50 years and older "reactogenicity might be higher in younger age groups."

In addition to assessing safety, the study was undertaken as a way to help mitigate worldwide vaccine supply shortages and to address concerns over AstraZeneca's link to VITT.

Several European countries, including Norway,

Sweden, Germany, France and Denmark, are advocating the mixing of vaccines because of VITT cases that arose after people received AstraZeneca.

The English researchers wrote that "several countries are now advising that individuals previously primed with ... [AstraZeneca] should now receive an alternative vaccine [an mRNA vaccine] as their second dose," such as Pfizer-BioNTech's vaccine.

Last Thursday, Canada reported an additional 28 cases of VITT developing after AstraZeneca jabs. The blood clots and low platelet levels that characterize the syndrome can appear four to 28 days after immunization.

Earlier this month Canada's National Advisory Committee on Immunization (NACI) said the mRNA vaccines [Pfizer-BioNTech, Moderna] are "preferred" over the adenovirus vaccines (which use traditional vaccine technology) developed by AstraZeneca and Johnson & Johnson. AstraZeneca's vaccine delivers protection against COVID using a genetically modified chimpanzee cold virus. NACI said if people can wait for an mRNA

vaccine, they should.

Several provinces are no longer offering Astra-Zeneca as a first dose but may offer it as a second dose to those who already received it and who cannot physically tolerate an mRNA vaccine.

Last week the Ontario government bumped up the chances of developing VITT from AstraZeneca to 1 in 60,000. Although the Manitoba government announced it is no longer offering AstraZeneca for a first dose, it said the vaccine can still be offered as a first dose at pharmacies and doctor's offices when people can't access other vaccines. The Canadian government is currently deciding what it should do with the 665,000 AstraZeneca doses it has in reserve and which will expire in August.

Studies involving the combination of Moderna's mRNA COVID vaccine with other vaccines are ongoing, said the English researchers. Studies on mixing vaccines are "crucial to informing the appropriateness of mixed COVID-19 vaccine schedules."

Community comes together for family who lost everything

A Poplarfield family who lost everything in a fire is starting over with the help of their community.

The Roschuck's house caught aflame in the morning on May 5 while Kazmir Roschuck slept inside and his sons Brendan and Ryan were out.

A passing ambulance saw the smoke coming from the house and stopped to check in on the family, said 18-yearold Brendan.

The paramedic woke Roschuck senior, who was unaware of the fire. Fortunately, the two made it out of the house safely and waited for the fire department to arrive.

Brendan saw the smoke while driving home from Arborg and got a phone call soon after informing him his house had caught

The fire destroyed the house, leaving few belongings in the ashy rubble.

"They lost everything," said family friend Andrea Dueck.

Dueck said she saw the back of Roschuck's yard on fire as she was driving and received a text message soon after that the house was gone.

Roschuck senior, who celebrated his 83rd birthday two days after the fire, has lived in the community of Poplarfield his whole life.

Everyone in the community knows how humble and kind the Roschucks are, said Dueck.

"He is just a nice person, and he will give you the clothes off his own back," said Dueck.

The Roschucks' kindness pushed Dueck and the community to rally together and collect clothes for the family, and the fundraiser quickly grew.

Dueck posted on Facebook on May 6 asking for donations for the family and guided people towards an account set up at Noventis Credit Union for monetary donations. The post has been shared over 140 times.

"It has taken on a lot more than what I thought my little post was going to do," said Dueck.

People from across the Interlake have contributed bags of clothes, bedsheets and food.

"From Teulon, Eriksdale people have been coming by and dropping stuff off," said Dueck.

With overflowing donations, the community opened the Poplarfield community hall to continue

collecting items. Piled across several folding tables in the hall are clothing, linen, pillows, toiletries and even a kitchen table and set of chairs.

"We're just hoping that they're going to get enough stuff to start over," said Dueck.

The family is safe and staying in town with hopes to be moving to a temporary home soon.

"I can't even describe how overwhelmed and happy we are that everyone's coming together for us like this," said Brendan.

Tips for wildfire readiness from the Canadian Red Cross

With dry conditions across the province, the Canadian Red Cross has some tips for keeping your home safe and your loved ones prepared for wildfires:

- Know the risks in your community as conditions can change quickly. The Government of Canada has a fire management information system that monitors fire danger conditions across the country at Canadian Wildland Fire Information System.
- Take steps to keep your house and surrounding area clear. Regularly clean roofs and gutters, and remove

dried out branches, leaves, and debris. It is good practice to maintain a 1.5 metre non-combustible zone around the home by raking down to soil, rock, or concrete.

- In case of wildfires, keep a small household item like a rake or shovel handy to tamp down small fires before emergency responders arrive. Ensure that driveway entrances and house numbers are clearly visible for identification ease for firefighters.
- Keep an emergency kit on hand in case of evacuation. A basic kit should include supplies for 72 hours after an evacuation and include non-perish-

able food, cash, a first aid kit, keys, medication, a change of clothes, water, and important documents, such as home insurance information.

Update your kit regularly to discard expired medication and food. Include items to avoid the spread of COV-ID-19 including masks, hand sanitizer, sanitizer wipes, and gloves.

Go to redcross.ca/ready to learn more about assembling an emergency preparedness kit.

• If an evacuation is imminent, back your car into the driveway with the windows closed and valuables packed. If you have pets, keep them close and

under control. Close all windows and doors in the house to reduce smoke and debris from entering your home. Move all combustibles away from the house, including barbecues, firewood, and lawn furniture.

• Be certain to listen closely for updates on TV and radio including road closures and evacuation routes. Follow instructions from emergency officials and stay safe.

Wildfires are unpredictable and evacuations are never easy, but with some preparation you can give yourself a little peace of mind.

Expansion of rural firefighting services secured with Riverton's new fire station

The Municipality of Bifrost-Riverton will be building a new fire station in Riverton that will enhance the department's firefighting capacity and house all of its equipment under one roof.

The station will be built on Reggie Leach Drive, on land beside the Riverton Community Hall and attached curling rink. It's expected to be completed in 2022.

The 7,760-square-foot facility will have seven truck bays, six of which will allow vehicles to enter and exit through doors at opposite ends of the building, a locker room with washing and drying equipment for turnout gear, a board room and lounge for critical incident stress debriefing, an office and washrooms.

Riverton's fire chief Jason Comeau said all personnel, their gear and equipment will be able to be housed under one roof, which is not the case at the station from which the department currently operates.

"The new fire hall will give us the ability to update and expand our current apparatus and equipment, which will allow us to provide a more effective fire department for the entire municipality," said Comeau by email.

The current station is 2,650 square feet. The ATV and trailer the department uses to fight wildfires have to be stored at another location because there's not enough room. And that means extra time is needed to retrieve and hook up that equipment, he said. The department is also in the process of acquiring a tandem axle water truck – funded though the province's fire prevention grant – and that means it'll have to store its 4x4 pickup, which is used for wildfires, off site until the new station is built.

"First and foremost, the building is designed to be effective for current and future firefighting apparatus and equipment," said Comeau. "Secondly, my vision has been to have a building that looks modern and something that the community and municipality can be proud of."

The station will be designed as an

emergency incident command centre for different agencies and a postdisaster facility. It will be equipped with a generator that will allow it to operate should the area experience a major power outage.

The new fire station has been in the works since 2019 when it first tried to acquire land, according to the municipality. It was given a line in the RM's five-year capital plan for 2021 and a fire hall committee was struck to complete preliminary steps, such as design, technical and engineering specifications.

In January the committee, made up of Comeau, RM councillors Gordon Klym, Colin Bjarnason and Frode Anderson and citizen representative Peggy Vigfusson, recommended that council proceed with financing so that it could seek proposals for design and construction.

Jordan Willner, Bifrost-Riverton's chief administrative officer, said a public hearing was held Feb. 11 to introduce a borrowing by-law (No. 1-2021) for the station. Second and third readings of the bylaw, which authorize the RM to borrow up to \$1 million for the station, were given during council's regular meeting May 13.

The Manitoba Municipal Board, a quasi-judicial tribunal body that reviews municipal borrowing among a number of functions, had approved the bylaw under Order No. E-21-050, allowing council to borrow funds to cover costs.

Municipal ratepayers will be paying for the new station for about 14 years through a special mill rate.

"With an anticipated completion date in 2022, the municipality will temporarily borrow the funds and then upon completion of final costs pull a debenture from the province for the total project costs," said Willner by email. "The borrowing will appear on all Municipality of Bifrost-Riverton property-tax bills for 2022-2036."

The estimated interest rate will be five per cent per year with an annual loan repayment of \$96,342.29, he said. That amounts to 0.452 mills a year.





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Favours for friends, forgetting First Nations mark debate on selling provincial Crown lands (Bill 12)

The provincial government is proposing to let politicians sell provincial Crown lands through its Crown Land Dispositions Act (Bill 12) that was introduced last year by Brandon West MLA and central services minister Reg Helwer.

The bill, which will amend other pieces of legislation, has sparked great concern from a number of Manitobans, including those from the Interlake, who say it opens the door to ministers to do favours for friends and party supporters, as had occurred in the past, and also ignores federal and provincial obligations towards Indigenous people.

The purpose of the bill is to reduce red tape, said Helwer during a Social and Economic Development Committee hearing held on April 21. In 2018 the Treasury Board Secretariat had reviewed the system of Crown land sales and found it to be "inefficient and ineffective." It made recommendations for the creation of a new governance model and new "delegated authorities" to be set out by the Conservative government's newly created Real Estate Services Division. A new model would help "free up cabinet business."

The bill states that a minister (i.e., an elected politician) can sell, exchange or transfer Crown land, and also determine the sale price and the terms and conditions of each sale, exchange or transfer of Crown land. Under the previous NDP government, a group of deputy ministers (senior civil servants) were responsible for Crown land sales.

The committee heard testimony from a number of presenters, including farmers and former politicians, the National Farmers Union (Manitoba) and a policymaker who once worked for the provincial government.

Bill Uruski, who farms between Arborg and Poplarfield, said Bill 12 vests a great deal of "political clout and influence" in a minister's hands and with little transparency. Sales of Crown land, whether agriculture or parks or other types of Crown land, would be at the whim of the minister.

"If you're going to sell Crown land, there ought to be a public tendering system, that these lands are available and that the public be notified well in advance that these lands are being sold, and those amendments should be put into this act," said Uruski, who served as NDP Interlake MLA and held ministerial positions in the Manitoba government. "Otherwise, whether it's park land or any other land, deals can be made. The minister has sole discretion as to set the terms and conditions of each sale so

that there is really no transparency or no oversight that's included in these amendments."

Uruski said the previous Conservative government [under Gary Filmon] sold Crown lands "under the table to a friend" without going to tender.

There are a number of cases in which Crown lands were sold through what one would constitute or at least allege very great favouritism, and that happened to be Crown lands within our park system," said Uruski, referring to the Hecla Island scandal in the mid-1990s.

He rebuffed assurances from Helwer that sales of Crown land will be advertised and that anyone can bid on them. Without those specific clauses put in Bill 12, assurances are meaningless.

"You can assure me all you want; it's not in the act. The sole discretion is with the minister," said Uruski.

Tom Nevakshonoff, who served as Interlake MLA and as a minister in the former NDP government and is now an RM of Fisher councillor, said he has similar concerns about the potential for political favouritism.

Nevakshonoff said he was appearing as a farmer and private citizen, not as a representative of the RM of Fisher.

He said there has to an intermediary (civil servants) between politicians and the public "who are always pressuring them for political concessions." Without a buffer, the democratic system would be weakened.

When he was in provincial office, Nevakshonoff said the NDP had tightened up the process by which Crown lands were sold by creating a Crown Lands Property Agency (now replaced with the Real Estate Services Division by the present government). A number of civil servants - deputy ministers from conservation, transportation, municipal affairs, agriculture, mines – sat on the CLPA, providing a check, as it were, on the exercise of power.

Bill 12 will essentially flip that power back into the hands of politicians.

"All of those ministers vetted any potential sale through their department. Any one of them could veto a sale. And the end result was that decisions were made professionally, not politically," said Nevakshonoff. "Politicians that step on this slippery slope, that are going to enter into the business of selling Crown land, will be subject to all kinds of influence-seekers, party supporters that think that they should be rewarded in terms of getting possession of their Crown lands."

He questioned the value of privatizing Crown land, which provides "ecological goods and services." Most of the "good" Crown land has already been privatized and what's left is "marginal" land; there may be little value in selling it.

Other presenters raised concern about the disposal of Crown lands and infrastructure in the hands of Hydro, a lack of transparency as to whether there will be rules governing how sold Crown land can be used, further losses to biodiversity, resource extraction that could destroy the ecosystem, the pitting of farmers who've leased Crown land for decades against large corporations, and farmers and ranchers and/or their descendants losing their livelihoods should they be unable to access Crown land.

Chief Glenn Hudson of Peguis First Nation, Manitoba's largest First Nation, said Bill 12 is "unconstitutional," affecting their constitutional and treaty rights and their treaty land entitlement (TLE) agreements.

Provincial and federal governments have a legal duty to consult on matters that affect Indigenous people under federal law. Hudson said the province did not consult with them on Bill 12.

Crown lands are vital to First Nations' access to natural resources, and those include wildlife management areas, shooting grounds, Crown agricultural leases, provincial parks and vacant Crown lands.

Under the Natural Resource Transfer Act of 1930, Hudson said the province is obligated to set aside unoccupied Crown lands for Indigenous people. A provincial treaty land entitlement agreement with Peguis, signed in 2008, covers the Crown lands that could now be at stake should Bill 12

"By alienating Crown lands or dispossessing them, it takes away the rights of First Nations by treaty or by section 35 ... constitutional rights. And it takes away the opportunity to select and acquire Crown lands, whether they're occupied or not," said Hudson."The doctrine of priority rests with First Nations and the ability of First Nations to select and acquire these Crown lands, which must be paramount."

He went on to say the provincial government will also contravene "the hunting, trapping and gathering rights" of First Nations through Bill 12.

He wants the bill withdrawn and consultation with First Nations with regard to their rights "because they are protected in the Canadian constitution, which supersedes the Province of Manitoba."

Helwer assured Hudson the government will live up to its TLE obligations.

"I want to assure you that TLE obligations are in no way altered by the proposed amendments. They only speak to the sale of surplus land and any land that is for sale goes through that TLE lens first to see if or when, how we would make it available under TLE," said Helwer. "So we don't make any changes in that regard."

No amendments were made to the bill at the report stage, according to the province's bill status page. Bill 12 has yet to receive third reading and royal assent.

Lakeshore School Division continues their low COVID-19 cases streak as school year comes to

Assistant superintendent Don Nikkel said the school division is pleased with their lack of class interruptions and thinks consistent in-person classes have helped students learn.

"It's a really dynamic and complex kind of interaction," said Nikkel. "When a teacher is in person with a student, you get the little smile of encouragement or the nod of, 'hey yes, you know, I agree with that.""

Children learn how to interact with other people, resolve conflict and work hard when they can be in class.

"We've gotten better and better at it, and we can certainly incorporate parts of that almost in-person experience in an online environment, but we still can't duplicate it entirely," said Nik-

Nikkel attributes their handle on COVID-19 transmission to following provincial guidelines, encouraging staff and students to stay home if they feel sick and having lots of space.

"For years we've had very large buildings and a relatively small student population," said Nikkel. "One of the things we were able to do right from the start in September is we were able to actually space out students two metres apart in all of the classrooms."

Jennifer Cardinal said she knows her children learn better in-class.

"My kids would prefer to go to school," said Cardinal. "My 13-year-old has excelled in class like you wouldn't believe."

Cardinal's children go to Eriksdale School and Lundar School, and she said she always feels informed about any changes or potential CO-VID-19 cases at the schools.

"We're always in contact with the teachers, the principal, you name it, on a regular basis," said Cardinal. "If I communicate any concerns or anything, they're very quick to help me."

On May 8, public health identified one positive COVID-19 case at Eriksdale School. The school worked with public health to find any potential contacts with the case and the school was able to remain open the following week.

As a precaution because of her underlying health issues, Cardinal decided to keep her son home from school and the Eriksdale staff were understanding and accommodating, said Cardinal.

"They were right on top of it, they're working with me to get all of his stuff on the Teams app so that he can continue to work at the same pace as he was working in class," said Cardinal.

Kristen Stocki, a Fisher Branch parent, said she feels grateful for the work teachers and staff have done to make school a safe place.

"It's a great place for the kids to go in this chaotic kind of state that we're in because they know they can go to school and it's going to be their normal," said Stocki whose seven-year-old daughter goes to Fisher Branch Early Years.

LSD temporarily switched to remote learning in March 2020, and for two weeks after the Christmas break when the provincial government mandated all schools to close, but the division has not closed since.

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RM Bifrost-Riverton budget 2021 highlights

The municipality of Bifrost-Riverton will be providing increased financial support to recreation facilities, fire services and community groups in its 2021 budget.

Chief administrative officer Jordan Willner prepared the RM's financial plan, which was presented during a public hearing May 13.

Municipal revenues in 2021 are expected to be \$5,649,111 while expenditures are expected to be \$6,885,593, a difference of over \$1.2 million. In 2020 municipal revenues were \$5,693,871 and (unaudited) expenditures were \$5,657,220.

"The 2021 Financial plan was prepared with the directive to continue protecting our residents and their services through this second year of the COVID-19 pandemic," said Willner in his slide presentation. "Sub-entities throughout the municipality are reporting a significant loss of revenue and were not prepared to handle last year's push against their financial capacity. The council acknowledges this hardship within this financial plan and are assisting these groups providing valuable municipal services financially."

The RM will increase financial support to recreation facilities (over nine per cent increase to their operating



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




Drainage projects proposed in 2021 for the east side of the RM.

budget), fire departments (over 13 per cent increase to their operating budget), the Riverton & District Handivan, the Riverton Seniors Resource, the Riverton Development Group, the Arborg & District Heritage Village, the Arborg Flying Club, the Town of Arborg's training facility, Arborg Seniors Resource, Riverdale Place Workshop, the Geysir Community Hall, Interlake Women's Resource Centre, and waste management and garbage collection.

The municipal at-large mill rate was set at 17.373 for the second consecutive year, said Willner. A decrease in

mill rates from the Evergreen and the Lakeshore school divisions (.16 and .12 respectively) will result in a total net education levy increase of \$3,476.48. The RM is in year five of its deficit recovery plan (from 2014 audited statements). The amount to be recovered in 2021 is \$58,435, which will appear as individual lines on tax bills.

Municipal taxes and grants in lieu of taxes will increase from \$3,908,305 in 2020 to \$3,961,757 in 2021.

When asked how 2021 municipal taxes in the rural area (Bifrost) and municipal taxes in the urban (Riverton area) would affect a dwelling worth \$200,000, Willner did not say.

"The municipal mill rate was held at the same rate as last year. The only difference is this year there will be a line on the tax bill in the amount of 0.582 mills to pay for the graders bought last year (for both rural/urban) and will be there for five years to pay for the debenture," said Willner by email. "Riverton properties on natural gas are no longer subject to a 0.729 mill to pay for the project."

The RM will reduce transfers to its reserve funds this budget year to \$30,000 from \$70,650 in 2020 (unaudited), and will spend more reserve money this year: transfers from reserves will increase by \$323,899 to \$781,500.

Initiatives/projects for the urban area (Riverton) in 2021 include financial support for the proposed Riverton Transportation & Heritage Centre expansion, sidewalk renewal, playground replacement (conditional on grants) and lakeside residential lot subdivision and development.

Drainage projects in 2021 are planned for both the east and west sides of the municipality with completion depending on factors such as obtaining water rights licenses from the province, getting landowners' permission to allow equipment and the depositing of material on their property, weather conditions, location of utilities and budget constraints.

Among the RM's proposed 2021 capital expenditures are a pumper truck for the Arborg-Bifrost fire station (\$240,000 funded by borrowing), landfill expansion (\$550,000 funded by borrowing and reserves), the Arborg-Bifrost Parks and Recreation Commission letters of comfort (\$176,408.50 from the general fund), lagoon repair (\$120,000 from the general fund), Hnausa lot development (\$100,000 from reserves) and road rehabilitation projects (\$250,000 from reserves).

"We have previously gone into Betel Home to visit and interact with the residents but with Covid that is on hold," she said. "We are hopeful this will return one day."

For now, keeping the centre viable and functional is a priority.



Make your yard a paradise for pollinators

Habitat loss is one of the main causes of decline in the population of bumblebees and other pollinators. If you want to help protect these vital species, consider growing nectar plants in your yard. This will provide a food source for the insects and birds that pollinate your community's gardens, orchards and fields. CHOOS-ING PLANTS There are many kinds of flowering species that can beautify your yard while also creating an inviting space for pollinators. Sunflowers, anemones, goldenrods, echinacea and hydrangeas are all great picks. Pollinators are attracted to a number of annuals as well, including borage, centaury and cosmos. If you prefer to grow food in your garden, consider

planting aromatic herbs like oregano, sage and thyme. Fruit trees and plants, such as apple, blueberry and strawberry are a good source of nectar in spring. ADDITIONAL ADVICE If you want to attract pollinators to your yard, be sure to:

• Grow nectar plants in areas that are sheltered from the wind • Include white flowers in your garden to attract nocturnal pollinators • Provide a source of water such as a small fountain or birdbath • Avoid weeding dandelions, clovers and ivy; they're rich in nectar • Plant species with varied bloom times so you have flowers from spring to fall By following these tips, you're sure to create a welcoming environment for all kinds of pollinators.



Five strategies to ward off squirrels

Squirrels are agile creatures that like to snack on seeds and dig up flower bulbs. This can make them quite a nuisance for gardeners. If you want to keep the squirrels in your area at bay, here are five tricks to try. 1. Plant bulbs at least 15 centimetres deep, and opt for species that squirrels tend to avoid such as daffodils, hyacinths and fritillaries. 2.Cover your flower beds with chicken wire. This metal mesh will keep unwanted critters at bay without disrupting the germination of your seeds. 3. After planting, cover the soil with blood meal or chicken manure fertilizer. The odour repels squirrels and helps mask the smell of bulbs. 4. Grow aromatic plants that repel squirrels such as onion, garlic and herbs. Scented geraniums (pelargoniums) and certain other fragrant flowers will also do the trick. 5.If you have a cat or dog, let it roam near your garden. Your pet's presence, as well as the fur and scent it leaves behind, will serve as a deterrent. Good luck!





Incredible Creatures: Brood X Periodical Cicadas: What a trill

It's happening. The massive emergence of Brood X, a type of periodical cicada in the eastern United States. The August 2016 Incredible Creatures article on cicadas concluded with "take note, the great eastern brood, the largest of all 17-year periodical broods, next emerges in 2021 in the eastern United States. Mark this into your bucket list". This month's Incredible Creatures will explore what are periodical cicadas, broods, and what makes brood X so special.

Living life underground

There are 170 species of cicadas in Canada and the United States, although just 4 species in Manitoba. None of the species in Manitoba are periodical cicadas. The common one in Manitoba that can be found, and more often heard than seen, is the dog-day cicada.

In eastern North America there are seven species of cicadas, in the genus Magicicada, known as periodical cicadas. Three of these can live for 17 years, and four species can live for 13 years. The 17-year cicadas are generally more northern, and the 13-year cicadas more southern. Periodical cicadas occur only in North America. They are called periodical cicadas because even though they live under-

ground as juveniles for almost all of their 13 or 17 years, the development is synchronized so all individuals of a species within a region emerge as adults all at once in the same year. Sometimes tremendous numbers will emerge. Cicadas of all other species are not synchronized, and some emerge each summer. Many refer to these nonperiodical species as annual cicadas since some are seen every summer.

After almost 13 or 17 years as juveniles underground, adults of periodical cicadas are active for about 4 to 6 weeks. Male periodical cicadas typically form large aggregations

that sing in chorus to attract females. Within two months of them starting to emerge, the lifecycle is complete, eggs have been laid, and the adult cicadas are gone for another 13 or 17 years.

Adult periodical cicadas are mostly black with reddish-orange eyes and wing veins. In contrast, annual cicadas have greenish wing veins, and emerge from July through September instead of late May through early June. Emergence of annual cicadas is scattered over this time, and they rarely emerge in noticeable numbers.

Broods a plenty

Different groups of periodical cicadas called "broods" emerge somewhere in the eastern United States almost every spring. Emergence is often tightly synchronized to within a few nights. Massive brood emergence is believed to overwhelm predators, ensuring that enough survivors will be left behind to reproduce.

Each yearly emergence is referred to as a "brood" and is designated by a Roman numeral. The numerals I through XVII (1–17) are assigned to the 17-year broods, and XVIII through XXX (18–30) to the 13-year broods. The numbering of the 17-year broods began with the 1893 brood, which was designated as Brood I. In 1909, Brood XVII appeared, and in 1910, Brood I appeared again. Because the broods are designated by Roman numerals, they are properly spoken as numbers. For example, Brood X is "Brood Ten" and not "Brood Ex".

The Spectacular Brood X

Brood X, known as the "great eastern brood," is a large brood that emerges across 15 states. That is what is getting all the attention and media coverage this year.

The sounds of our dog-day cicadas are something to look forward to later in the summer. For now, enjoy the coverage you are likely to see of one of natures amazing events as Brood X perioical cicadas emerge this spring.

Caution advised in relying on protection from one dose of Pfizer

Researchers have determined that the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine is only partially effective against COVID-19 after one dose, according to the results of an observational study carried out in Israel.

The authors of the study – some of whom hold stock and stock options in Pfizer – advised caution with regard to relying on one dose for protection against COVID and its variants as people will have lower levels of antibodies against the disease.

The study titled, "Impact and effectiveness of mRNA BNT162b2 vaccine against SARS-CoV-2 infections and COVID-19 cases, hospitalizations, and deaths following a nationwide vaccination campaign in Israel: an observational study using national surveillance data," was carried out from Jan. 24 to April 3, 2021, and published online May 5 in the medical journal The Lancet.

It shows "moderate effectiveness" against COVID after one dose. But it is "highly effective" after two doses.

The vaccine's effectiveness against death was estimated to be 77 per cent two-three weeks after the first dose in contrast to 98.1 per cent two weeks or longer after the second dose was administered.

The authors wrote that "relying on protection against COVID-19 from a single dose might not be prudent; BNT162b2 [the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine] was developed and evaluated in the RCT as

a two-dose schedule, and substantially lower levels of neutralising antibodies were observed after one dose compared with after two doses."


They go on to say that little is known about how long one dose will protect an individual.

"It is possible that one dose will provide a shorter duration of protection than two doses, particularly in an environment where new SARS-CoV-2 variants continue to emerge."

Israel, which has universal healthcare, is leaps and bounds ahead of other countries in terms of the numbers of fully vaccinated individuals. By the beginning of April, 72 per cent of its population aged 16 years and older had received two doses of the Pfizer vaccine.

Pfizer-BioNTech recommends that it's two-shot vaccine be given three weeks apart. But Canada's immunization advisory group, NACI, has recommended a four-month delay between first and second doses because of vaccine shortages. That delay also applies to other two-shot vaccines approved in Canada: Moderna and AstraZeneca.

As Canadians are expected to experience a longer than advised delay between their first and second shots of vaccine, medical experts recommend vaccinated people continue to follow public health fundamentals such as wearing masks, avoiding gatherings, physical distancing and frequently washing their hands.

Province, Xplornet teaming up to improve broadband, cell service

The Manitoba government is teaming up with Xplornet Communications Inc. to connect Manitobans in northern and rural communities with reliable, high-speed internet.

Premier Brian Pallister last Thursday announced the signing of a memorandum of understanding with the company.

The agreement will provide broadband services to nearly 30 First Nations and approximately 270 rural and northern communities. It will also provide 350 communities with cellphone access.

The pandemic has made it clear that

access to reliable internet isn't a luxury but a necessity in today's world.

"We've met virtually, we've shopped virtually, we've exercised virtually, we've marked the holidays virtually," Pallister said. "You name it, we've gone virtual.

"Being connected and living virtually are no longer choices. They're necessities. They're a way of life in 2021."

But not all Manitobans have equal access to that way of life. It's time, the premier stressed, to change that.

"Too many Manitobans, more than in any other part of the country, are deprived of the opportunity of reliable internet and cell service," he said. "We'll advance as a province only when we advance our knowledge infrastructure that allows everyone to join in that progress."

Through Manitoba Hydro, the province owns thousands of kilometres of fibre-optic cable across Manitoba, however much of the network is surplus, unused capacity. The network was created to communicate with northern hydroelectric facilities and transmit data.

Xplornet will make use of this surplus capacity to connect more than 125,000 unserved or underserved Manitobans to its broadband and cell phone services as early as this fall.

"Xplornet looks forward to collaborating with the government of Manitoba and accelerating our facilitiesbased network investment plans to deliver improved speeds and unlimited data plans at affordable prices to rural Manitoban homes and businesses," said company president and CEO Allison Lenehan.

Communities across the Pembina Valley are on the list to receive increased broadband and/or cellular service under this project.

The Manitoba government, Manitoba Hydro and Manitoba Hydro Telecom are collaborating to finalize the contract in the coming weeks.




with friends and family with Olga. Joe was always willing to lend a helping hand to friends and family or anyone in need.


