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Breaking the stigma of miscarriage and infant loss

Manitoba Angel Dresses in need of volunteers

For almost a decade, Manitoba Angel Dresses has supported and comforted families grieving the loss of an infant by creating "angel gowns." The delicate pieces are made from donated bride, bridesmaid and graduation gowns that the baby can wear during its final, precious moments with the family.

In 2014, Manitoba Angel Dresses, a not-for-profit organization, started its mission to help families with the grieving process by providing a variety of "angel clothing" to those that requested it, free of charge.

"It is the vision and mission of the organization to ease the stress on a grieving family by providing the family a beautiful item lovingly created to clothe their precious loved one in," said Diane Monkman, one of the directors of Manitoba Angel Dresses alongside Susan Bruce.

The Angel Dresses Movement started in the United States and quickly spread worldwide, making its way to

Canada.

The founder of Manitoba and Saskatchewan Angel Dresses, Becky Panter, experienced the loss of an infant and felt the need to bring the movement to Canada. Panter started the organization in her home province, Saskatchewan, but soon received requests from ladies in Manitoba to begin a chapter there.

The Manitoba chapter of Angel Dresses started in the Brandon area and quickly expanded throughout the province. In 2016, the organization stalled but quickly recovered in 2018 under the direction of Diane Monkman and Susan Bruce. The two ladies moved the organization forward, giving out 1,688 dresses and creating 6,984 layettes. Out of those layettes, 1,267 have been gifted to funeral homes and hospitals, and 40 have been given directly to families.

"It is estimated 98 per cent of funeral homes, hospitals and nursing stations in the province have items to distribute when the need arises," said Monkman.

The donated gowns are turned into two types of layettes: a gown layette that includes the gown, hat or bonnet; a keepsake pouch, bereavement card, bracelet and blanket; and a wrap layette that consists of a wrap and a hat/bonnet. For boys, angel dresses are fitted with a small vest and bow tie.

"We have a very active knit and crochet component that the volunteers create beautiful handmade items," said Monkman.

Photographs of the beautiful layettes and dresses that the sewists make can be found on the organization's Facebook page. Along with photos of the angel clothing, the organization posts messages thanking the donor of the gown that they transformed.

Monkman said they have enough donated gowns that need transforming and are not currently accepting



donations.

Any family can directly request an angel layette from the organization by emailing them at angelgownrequest@ manitobaangeldresses.com.

"The one thing we want members of the community to know is that we are here. What we provide is free, with no charge to families or facilities to receive the gift of a layette for their precious babe. And that the stigma of a miscarriage and infant loss be a thing of the past and families are allowed to grieve the loss of their precious angel," said Monkman.

Manitoba Angel Dresses is 100 per cent volunteer driven and run with a wide variety of options to become involved, she said.

Currently, the organization has a surplus of gowns that need extra hands to transform into beautiful, handmade items for families that need them. They are also in need of an individual to lead the creative sewists. Anyone interested in joining the team can email them at volunteer. manitobaangeldresses.com.

Film shot in Teulon area to premiere at Gimli Film Fest

Rachel Beaulieu has been in the film industry for over 10 years but just recently, she began working on her own personal project. Her first personal film, Mémère, tells the story of a grandson's experience in taking a trip down memory lane with his grandmother, who battles memory loss.

Beaulieu is an Anishinaabekwe filmmaker from Sandy Bay First Nation. She started her career as a video editor after graduating from Assiniboine Community College in 2010 with a media production diploma. She has worked on many post-production products for other individual films and has a career as a video producer.

In July of last year, Beaulieu pitched her short film idea to a jury in front of five other people as a finalist for the RBC \$10,000 Emerging Filmmaker Pitch Competition. Her film was

pitched under its original title, Marie, and she was selected as the winner of the 11th annual competition, helping her dreams of becoming a director begin to come to fruition.

Beaulieu has spent much of her career helping others' film ideas be brought to life, supporting and encouraging her fellow creatives.


"I like to support everybody in their own goals," she says.

She has worked professionally in various styles, including promotion, narrative, documentary, broadcast and educational film.


When Beaulieu heard of this grandmother who lived in a care home, she wondered more and more why our elders are so often treat-

Three separate occurrences of drug smuggling at Stony Mountain Institution

Stonewall RCMP responded to three separate incidents of alleged drug smuggling into Stony Mountain Institution from May 22 to 30.

On May 22 at approximately 8:30 p.m., Stonewall RCMP responded to a report of a suspicious person throwing items over the fence at Stony Mountain Institution.

Patrols were made and an officer located a vehicle and noticed a male outside near the fence surrounding Stony Mountain Institution. The male was arrested and several packages containing drugs were located on his person. When the officer attempted to place him in the rear of the police vehicle, he fled from police. With the assistance of an off-duty correctional officer, the male was safely placed in

The packages contained over 300 prescription pills, 60 grams of methamphetamine, 85 grams of cannabis resin, also known as shatter, and can-

Christopher Sinclair, 32, of Fairford has been charged with possession of a schedule I substance for the purpose of trafficking, trafficking a Schedule I substance, resisting arrest and escape lawful custody. He was remanded into custody.

On May 25 at approximately 10:50 p.m., Stonewall RCMP responded to a report of a drone flying outside Stony Mountain Institution.

The Correctional Service of Canada (CSC) located the drone, which had a package attached to it. RCMP attended and seized the items.

The package contained over 100 grams of cannabis, 230 grams of methamphetamine, 400 grams of shatter and 50 tablets of prescription medication.

No suspects have been arrested at this time and the investigation is on-

Three males were located and it was determined that they had thrown several packages over the fence into Stony Mountain Institution. The packages contained 150 grams of methamphetamine, 30 grams of fentanyl and 90 grams of shatter.

Terrance Goetz, 39, from the RM of St. Clements has been charged with possession for the purpose of trafficking a Schedule I substance, trafficking a Schedule I substance, obstruction and identity fraud.

Drew Lloyd, 37, of Selkirk has been charged with possession for the purpose of trafficking a Schedule I substance and trafficking a Schedule I substance.

Brendin Swanson, 36, of Oakbank has been charged with possession for the purpose of trafficking a Schedule I substance, trafficking a Schedule I substance, obstruction and identity fraud.

Westshore Community Foundation and Sogo Productions are proud to present the showing of the documentary film *Aboard the Namao* at the Lady of the Lake Theatre in the New Iceland Heritage Museum in Gimli at 1 p.m. on Canada Day, July 1, 2023. Admission is free.

For the last 20-plus years, most Manitobans have heard about the massive algae blooms plaguing Lake Winnipeg. Residents of Gimli, who are very familiar with the environmental issues on the lake, also know about the important research work conducted by the Lake Winnipeg Research Consortium (LWRC) aboard the Namao. Yet, few have gone aboard and seen it personally or even seen the north basin for themselves.

Winnipeg filmmaker Cam Patterson can't stand on the beach and worry about the state of Lake Winnipeg any longer. The media is calling the lake a lost cause. The only way to see for himself and to show the world the massive algae blooms he's only heard about is to board the Namao, taking us with him.

Cam takes the audience aboard the Lake Winnipeg research vessel, the Namao, for a unique documentary experience that shows the lake's north basin and the massive algae blooms. Cam will introduce the film and take questions following the showing.

"I didn't know what to expect," Patterson admits. "I actually thought I'd get a few days on the boat. But when Al Kristofferson and Karen Scott of

the LWRC offered me the opportunity to go aboard for a full 11-day trip, I couldn't believe it."

The solo experience gave Patterson the chance to shoot the trip from his point of view, making his experience of getting to know the crew and the science performed on the ship the story while they sailed into the north basin to find the massive algae blooms.

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

Selkirk RCMP investigating fatal two-vehicle collision

On June 15, at 11:40 a.m., Selkirk RCMP responded to a report of a two-vehicle collision on Highway 8, located approximately half a kilometre south of the intersection of Provincial Road 230 in the RM of St. Andrews.

Investigators have determined that a vehicle, being driven by a 73-year-old male from Stonewall,

was driving southbound in the northbound lane when it collided head-on with a northbound vehicle, being driven by a 66-year-old male from the RM of Gimli.

Both drivers, who were sole occupants in the vehicles, were pronounced deceased on scene.

Selkirk RCMP, along with a forensic collision reconstructionist, continue to investigate.

Minerva Hall making accessibility upgrades; fundraising drive underway

Minerva Ladies Aid has plans in the works to make Minerva Hall more convenient for people who use wheel-chairs and walkers.

The organization, which takes care of the hall, is overseeing an expansion that will see five new washrooms added onto it.

Ladies Aid president Christine Dann said the upgrade will entail four "regular" washrooms and one large fully accessible washroom that can accommodate those who use wheelchairs and walkers. The current washrooms aren't big enough for assistive devices

"We want to put this addition on the south side of the hall," said Dann. "It will contain five individual washrooms, each with its own toilet and sink. The fifth washroom will be big enough that it can accommodate a wheelchair or walker, and there will be a change table for babies as well."

The new washrooms will be unisex, meaning anyone can use them. The old washrooms will be converted into storage space.

Minerva Hall has been a community meeting place since 1916.

The popular hall hosts an array of community events such as meetings, birthday parties, anniversaries, wedding, showers, baby showers and funerals.

The hall and the Ladies Aid have a long, storied history. The original hall was built in circa 1916 by the Young People's Society of Minerva. When the structure began to deteriorate, a new hall was built in 1972. The Ladies Aid organization was formed on May 9, 1920, as the United Farm Women of Gimli with a mandate to provide community programs, education and support for youth, among other activities. The organization changed its name to Minerva Ladies Aid in 1939.

Dann said they've obtained a ball-park figure of between \$90,000 and \$100,000 for the accessibility upgrade and that will include plumbing and electrical. In addition to that cost, the Ladies Aid will have to pay for blue-prints, building permits and other potential fees. They've already applied for government grants and they're holding fundraising events.


'We've had a couple of big donations for the new washrooms and we've held fundraisers such as our Paint Dates," said Dann. "We've also had some private donations from Friends of Minerva Hall. We're up to the \$20,000 mark now. We're hoping to have the washrooms completed by next year."

The Rural Municipality of Gimli and the Westshore Community Foundation have generously provided grants for the project, she added.

The Ladies Aid is holding a fundraising event next month at the hall that will include a lunch and chances to win prizes.

"We do have a community event coming up on July 16 (Sunday) where we'll have a luncheon, silent auction and 50/50 tickets to help raise money for the addition.

Gimli council defers proposal for fairground, appoints fire chief

A proposal for an agricultural fairground near the Gimli Industrial Park has been temporarily put on hold by Gimli council.

Council held a public hearing June 14 to review Boomer's Funny Farm Inc.'s request for a second conditional use to permit a fairground on their owned and rented property off Gimli Park Road. The business already has a conditional use for a home occupation.

As defined in the zoning bylaw, an agricultural fairground is an open outdoor area where a fair, circus or other exhibition is temporarily set up and can include areas where visitors can see animals, purchase handmade items, baked goods and produce and where food vendors can set up.

Boomer's Funny Farm owners Janet and Jon Thordarson wrote in their submission to council that their business grew in popularity and they're headed into their third summer. The farm rescues farm animals in need, tries to find new homes for them and allows visitors to interact with them.

In addition to their two-acre property, the Thordarsons are renting a 15-acre property to the north of their farm and want to expand their existing home occupation to operate an agricultural fairground on both properties, they said. They don't plan to have large carnival rides or a circus but may have local vendors selling baked goods and handmade items.

"We have many dreams for our farm, and on this property we wish to grow a corn maze, sunflowers, and a pumpkin patch," they wrote in their submission. "We may make a small animal pen out there eventually in the future. During the winter months, we wish to build a skating rink, snow maze, and other fun winter activities for kids to get out and have fun, and bring tourism to our town throughout the winter months."

Their operating hours will not be changing from the present five-day operation, they wrote. They can accommodate parking in their large driveway and on the rented property, and plan to continue to require reservations so that there are no high traffic flows

Coun. Thora Palson said council deferred its decision on Boomer's request until its July meeting pending more information.

The Express requested from RM administration a copy of the resolution and letters from the public in response to the proposal but did not hear back. Other council news:

- Council appointed Michael Chudd as the new Gimli fire chief (effective July 1) under Bylaw 23-0004. The bylaw allows the fire chief to designate the position of deputy fire chief.

- Council passed a resolution with respect to Sundance Construction's proposal to build a subdivision in Sandy Hook.

Resolution 2023 423 states that a development agreement with Sundance be approved subject to the following conditions: "attachment of the final registerable bare land condominium plan as Schedule A; and the addition of a clause requiring the developer to provide proof of liability coverage satisfactory to the municipality having the municipality as named insured."

- The municipality's emergency measures co-ordinator Don Emes wrote in his May report to council that there is "a substantial amount " of shoreline erosion and damage to infrastructure as a result of 2022 flooding.

"Surveys/site inspections are in process to quantify the extent of damage and prepare a submission for supplementary DFA claims," he wrote.

- Valley Fiber applied for a variation to create a proposed lot of 0.04 acres on Trevino Trail, south of PR 519, on which it intends to build a telecommunication shed that will be used for internet distribution.

- Council heard a request from Zinide Pereira for a conditional use to set up a home occupation at 97 Old Arnes Place in Arnes. Pereira said the Zinide Hair Salon will operate on a year-round basis, providing haircuts, colours and other services. Traffic flow will be four cars per day and there will be no noise, fumes or dust generated from the business.

- Council heard a request for a conditional use to establish a home daycare at 18080 Spruce Bay Rd. In her proposal, Kimberly Kukoraitis said she wants to operate a year-round home daycare called Kimberly's Home Daycare. She will have a maximum of eight children a day, including two of her own children.

She said there's a need in the RM for more daycare spaces after searching for a daycare in the Gimli area and finding waiting lists to be "extremely long."

"I am in the process of obtaining a license, all necessary paperwork submitted and I have been assigned a coordinator with the Early Learning and Childcare Division - Manitoba Education and Early Childhood Learning," wrote Kukoraitis in her proposal.

- The RM's Municipal Heritage Advisory Committee (MHAC) reported in its May 2 minutes that with respect to the Greenberg House, which is a municipally owned building, it "cannot endorse the destruction of a heri-



courage the preservation of heritage buildings in Gimli.

The Greenberg House, built in circa 1918, is on Second Avenue next to the Gimli Fire Hall. The RM purchased the property several years ago and began renting it out.

Greenberg House is a municipally designated heritage building but does not have a provincial heritage designation, said Coun. Palson. Council is currently exploring all options for the best use of the building and had

Bunge, Viterra announce merger plans

Bunge Ltd. and Viterra Ltd. are teaming up.

The two companies announced last week that they will be merging to create an "innovative global agribusiness company well positioned to meet the demands of increasingly complex markets and better serve farmers and end-customers."

The agreement, which was unanimously approved by both boards of directors, will see Viterra shareholders receive approximately 65.6 milaround US\$6.2 billion) and approximately \$2 billion in cash.

Bunge will assume \$9.8 billion of Viterra debt.

Viterra shareholders will own 30 per cent of the combined company when the transaction is complete and about 33 per cent after the completion of a \$2-billion repurchase plan by Bunge slated to take no more than 18 months.

"The combination of Bunge and Viterra significantly accelerates Bunge's strategy, building on our fundamen-

lion shares of Bunge stock (valued at tal purpose to connect farmers to consumers to deliver essential food, feed and fuel to the world," Bunge CEO Greg Heckman said in a statement. "Our highly complementary asset footprints will create a network that connects the world's largest production regions to areas of fastest growing consumption, enhancing the geographical balance and adaptability of our global value chains and benefitting farmers and end-customers."

"In combining our highly complementary origination, processing and distribution networks, we are better positioned to meet the increasing demand for the food, feed and fuel products we offer," echoed Viterra CEO David Mattiske.

"Together, we will play a leading role in the future of the agriculture industry, developing fully traceable, sustainable supply chains and moving towards carbon-neutral operations, while creating a strong growth platform for our combined business."

Ensuring that adults with disabilities can live independently

Celebrating inclusive living housing

Riverdale Place Homes Inc. hosted an open house and ribbon-cutting ceremony last Friday to celebrate their newly purchased apartment block at 437 Crosstown Ave. in Arborg. The occasion marked a significant milestone for the community, since inclusivity and accessibility are at the forefront of their values.

"This was a very exciting moment in our history," said Riverdale Place Homes chairperson Linda Oddleifson.

"What we have developed is a truly inclusive living situation, and our board of directors couldn't be more pleased."

The apartment block has six suites, three of which are currently occupied by Riverdale Place Homes people, two as group homes and one as a supported independent living apartment. The other three units are rented to existing tenants.

Interlake-Gimli MLA Derek Johnson brought greetings from the province and congratulated the board, staff and direct support works on their unwavering dedication and commitment to ensuring adults with disabilities can live independently.

"This group home is not just a physical space but a community of individuals who share a common goal, to help each other grow and flourish," said Johnson.

Johnson said the future looks bright for all those involved with disabled people.

"I am proud to have our government invest historic amounts, \$104 million, to support disability services and wages of staff that deliver them. This increases funding to \$640 million in budget 2023."

Riverdale Place Homes Inc. has been supporting adults with an intellectual disability since 1976. Their first group home residence on Highway 68 was opened a short time after the establishment of the Riverdale Place workshop across the road.

Both organizations were spearheaded by local families who saw the need for their adult children to have meaningful work and a home of their own. At that time, there was a strong grassroots movement among families in Manitoba who were determined to provide a quality life for their family members.

What began as one group home soon expanded to two, with the Welcome Home Initiative undertaken by the Department of Health & Community Services in the '80s and '90s. This initiative sought to bring individuals out of an institutional setting and back into the community. At that time, many agencies like ours, were formed or expanded to accommodate people being relocated to community group homes from The Manitoba Developmental Centre (MDC) in Portage la Prairie.

"It's hard to imagine just how enormous this change was for individuals who had, in effect, been incarcerated at MDC, some since birth," said Oddleifson.

The institution was named "Manitoba Home for Incurables" in 1890 with limited understanding, the thinking at that time being that people with disabilities should be hidden away. When they left

and moved into community group homes, suddenly they had freedom of movement and could make choices in their own lives.

Over the years, Riverdale Place Homes Inc. expanded and today provides staffing at four group homes and two independent living apartments in Arborg, serving a total of 14 people while employing 43 direct support workers and three administrative staff.

"We are proud of the vital contribution we make to our community, both socially and financially, as a care provider, employer and consumer," said Oddleifson.

Last year, on May 5, 2022, the original residence on Highway 68 was flooded and the home and yard were badly damaged, with three feet of water standing inside. The board of directors decided to take an insurance settlement and sold the property.

Fortunately, the four individuals living in the home were all relocated. Two moved to Oli's Gestahus Residence on Second Avenue and two to an apartment that was made available to next door by Crackle Apartments. Another suite at the apartment block had been occupied by Riverdale Place Homes since being built in 1995.

The building was well suited to the residents and the volunteer board of directors including vice-chairman Reg Perry, secretary Jennifer Spencer, members Greg Lupal, Ross Fridfinnson, Brian Wallace and Kathy Timchishen and Linda Oddleifson, made the decision to purchase the building.

Oddleifson thanked everyone for coming out to celebrate the inclusive community housing milestone. Following the speeches was a ribbon-cutting ceremony at the apartment block, which has been renamed Riverdale Estates.

A contest was held between staff and individuals to decide the name. A cake celebration and beverages, donated by Arborg Co-op, were enjoyed by all.

A number of organizations had information tables set up, including Larry Speiss, representing the Icelandic River Foundation, and Kira Bedard, Riverdale Place Homes recreational worker.

There were a number of door prizes made at the Riverdale Place Workshop: four beautiful sets of wiener-roasting sticks to give away, complete with a bag of jumbo marshmallows.

Willard Lea, the famous Arborg artist behind the model "bombardiers," was taking orders.

Local woman receives Platinum Jubilee Medal for contributions to Métis community

A Stonewall woman is earning accolades for her contributions to the well-being of the Red River Métis community.

Mona Buors received a Queen Elizabeth II Platinum Jubilee Medal on June 4, the final day of the Red River Métis Extraordinary General Assembly.

The Manitoba platinum jubilee process focuses on community-mindedness, service and reconcili-

Manitoba Métis Federation president David Chartrand nominated Buors for the honour.

Born and raised in St. Laurent, Buors is a Red River Métis citizen. She's been married to Jerry Buors for 47 years and was an educator in both official languages for 35 years, both in the Interlake and in British Columbia. She taught various subjects from kindergarten to Grade 12, and she also served as a high school counsellor to help students make career choices for post-secondary education. For the last 20 years of her career, she focused on Métis culture being integrated into as many subjects as possible.

Nine years ago, she retired from teaching and ran in the Manitoba Métis Federation provincial election. She was acclaimed to represent the Red River Métis as a regional executive in the Interlake region.

"I represented the Interlake on the provincial management board for numerous years. When first elected to the cabinet, I was associate minister of health and associate minster of culture, heritage, sports and youth portfolio," she said.

"I was heavily involved in the 2017 Canada Games. MMF was co-host of the games and I was the lead organizing it. I was elected to my first term in 2014, and organizing the Canada Games to reflect our Métis culture and heritage was my first big challenge."

Buors is now serving her third term in office.

"For my second term and third term, I was assigned the portfolio minister of Métis child and family services. I consider it a great honour to be assigned that portfolio," she said.

"I'm also proud to serve all Métis citizens from the Interlake region as an executive officer for the region."

In addition, Buors has spent countless hours on volunteer boards, including for Pemmican Publications. She has translated many books, particularly for Métis authors, and she is also a Métis language facilitator for the Indigenous Language Development Institute.

Although Buors now lives in Stonewall, she maintains strong ties to the St. Laurent community and the lifelong lessons she learned there.

"I graduated from St. Laurent Collegiate from a class of 42 students. My mom and most of my family and friends are still living in St. Laurent. My parents, Frankie and Marcelline Bruce, taught us many important values, one of them being to always respect my elders," she said.

"For example, give up your seat if they need one.

Make sure they are served before you serve yourself. These are just a few important values that have been instilled in me. I have passed on these traditions and values to my children and grandchildren. Never forget where you've been and where you come from. Be humble and proud."

Buors is one of 41 Red River Métis citizens who received the Platinum Jubilee Award. MMF president David Chartrand nominated 40 of the recipients. Chartrand was also honoured at the request of Premier Heather Stefanson.

Other Interlake recipients include Bev Webb, Barbara Lavallee, Jack Park, Alfred Anderson and Morgan Ginther. They were recognized for their various contributions to the Red River Métis community.

The Express reached out to the RCMP for more information about the detachment but did not hear back. It could not verify the cost of the new building.





Kiwanis Terrific Kids Club at SSES deliver warmth and inspiration

Sigurbjorg Stefansson Early School students just wrapped up a project that will bring warmth and comfort to people living in trying circumstances.

Students who are members of the Kiwanis Club of Gimli & District's Terrific Kids Club collected 150 blankets for their Blankets of Hope project and delivered them to social services organizations.

Kiwanis club's Terrific Kids advisor Frances Petrowski said the students penned a letter to parents, asking them for a small monetary donation so that they could purchase blankets for people in need. They were overwhelmed by the generous response.

"When we asked for a \$2 donation, some parents wrote letters to us, saying this was such a good program and they sent along a brand new blanket," said Petrowski. "It was so wonderful."

The kids ended up raising \$500 to purchase the blankets.

Kiwanis' Terrific Kids Club is a character-building program that motivates youngsters to be their best by allowing them to define what terrific means then developing specific goals they can work towards to achieve that. The program has guide books to help students and teachers. Each club has a Kiwanis advisor, who provides support and guidance, and a teacher advisor who oversees activities with the kids.

The Terrific Kids Club at SSES has around 45 members in grades 3 and 4. Teacher Stephanie Mills is the advisor for the club.

periencing homelessness. As a personal touch, some of the Terrific Kids wheeled over the blankets to the resource centre.

Terrific Kids has had a very busy school year, said Petrowski. In addition to Blankets of Hope, they took

part in other activities that benefitted the community and at the same time helped them develop citizenship and leadership skills.

For Earth Day, for example, Terrific Kids cleaned up around Sigurbjorg Stefansson and planted milkweed to provide vital habitat for monarch butterflies. Monarch butterflies are one of Canada's species at risk and an important pollinator of crops and flowers. They lay their eggs on milkweed, and their larvae and caterpillars feed on it

Concordia Hospital to provide more joint replacement capacity

The Manitoba government has officially opened the state-of-the-art operating room at Concordia Hospital in Winnipeg that will increase capacity by up to 1,000 inpatient and same-day hip and knee replacement procedures per year as part of its ongoing commitment to expand care options for Manitobans who need hip and knee surgeries, Health Minister Audrey Gordon announced Monday.

"We are healing health care and improving the quality of life for Manitobans this year and for years to come," Gordon said. "Our government invested more than \$5.9 million to increase capacity and further reduce backlogs and waitlists by ensuring more timely access at Manitoba's leading site for joint replacement sur-

The minister added that in addition to renovating the operating room, this expansion includes an additional orthopedic surgeon, investment in anesthesia staff, four new inpatient beds, and additional nursing and allied health staff.

"With the opening of our new operating room at Concordia Hospital, we are taking a significant step towards addressing the growing demand for joint replacement surgeries in our community," said Carrie Fruehm, president and COO Concordia Hospital. "This expansion not only increases our capacity but also allows us to reduce wait times and provide our patients with timely access to the care they need. We are grateful to the Manitoba government and the Concordia Foundation for their partnership in making this expansion a reality. By working together, we can continue to deliver exceptional care, advance medical innovation, and improve the quality of life for our patients."

The Concordia Foundation led the fundraising efforts supporting the renovation of operating room No. 5 to increase the hospital's joint replacement surgery capacity with the help of over 200 donors who contributed \$350,000 toward the capital costs of the project.

"By collaborating in this initiative, the Concordia Foundation demonstrated our mission and vision to further enable Concordia Hospital to be a leader in exemplary care, innovation and academic excellence," said Roger Gripp, president and board chair of Concordia Foundation. "The foundation is pleased to have partnered with the Diagnostic and Surgical Recovery Task Force and the Manitoba government on this urgently needed increase to joint replacement surgery capacity at Concordia Hospital."

The minister noted that the Diagnostic and Surgical Recovery Task Force continues to make ongoing short- and long-term investments in the province's orthopedic surgery program. In 2022-23, 6,000 hip and knee procedures were completed across Manitoba, 600 of which were funded through the task force. Over the same time frame, Concordia Hospital completed 1,974 hip and knee procedures and 78 were funded by the task force. From

February to March 2023, pandemic backlogs for hip and knee procedures were reduced by 55 per cent.

"My quality of life? I couldn't ask for anything better. No more pain," said Roxann Goudy, a recent knee surgery patient. "I arrived at Concordia Hospital at 6 a.m. and left the next day just after lunch. It was simply amazing. I couldn't have asked for better staff. They were super helpful, checking in on me and making sure I was comfortable. It just seemed to flow well."

The Manitoba government established the DSRTF in late 2021 to address waitlists for diagnostic and surgical procedures and other related services affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. Supported by experts from across Canada, the team of respected local health-care professionals identify and implement short- and longterm solutions to improve surgical and diagnostic waitlists and make overall lasting improvements to Manitoba's health-care system.

COVID-19 personal care home shelters being re-purposed

The Manitoba government is donating all of the external visitation shelters installed at personal care homes during the COVID-19 pandemic to First Nations, not-for-profit and co-operative organizations, and municipalities throughout the province to be repurposed to benefit communities, Consumer Protection and Government Services Minister James Teitsma announced Friday.

"We commissioned these visitation shelters during the pandemic so personal care home residents could spend quality time visiting with their families in secure, accessible spaces," said Teitsma. "Now that they are no longer required for this purpose, we are donating them for a range of other wonderful uses for the continued benefit of Manitobans."

The minister noted that 27 proponents have been selected through an open expression of interest to receive the 104 shelters. Specifically, the Department of Consumer Protection and Government Services will donate 43 shelters to First Nations communities, 55 shelters to not-for-profit and community support organizations and six shelters to municipalities.

The shelters will be repurposed for housing and accommodations, recreation and sports, animal care, vegetation, farming and other uses.

The proponents selected by the department for shelters include Assiniboine Park Conservancy, Bear Clan Patrol, Bloodvein

Cook pasta in salted boiling water until just tender. Drain and toss gently with olive oil, to taste, then set aside.

In food processor, pulse parsley leaves, almonds, shredded Parmesan, 2 teaspoons kosher salt, lemon juice and cracked pepper. Once pulsed, turn processor on high and drizzle in 1/3 cup olive oil until well incorporated.

Toss pasta with fresh pesto until well coated. Fold in peas, apples and chives. Using peeler, shave thin slices off Parmesan block over pasta for garnish.

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inspired | Learning to say "No"

"You have to decide what your highest priorities are and have the courage -- pleasantly, smilingly, non-apologetically -- to say "no" to other things. And the way you do that is by having a bigger "yes" burning inside."

- Stephen Covey

These days everyone seems to be stretched for time. Even with multitasking, it seems there is never time to do all we need or want to do. For some, this problem is exacerbated because they have a hard time saying "no" to the requests, demands or expectations of others.

This is a very common problem clients have brought to me over the years. There are many reasons a person struggles with having to say "no" to requests. Some are self-described people pleasers. They care what others think and never want to risk disappointing anyone. Some assume if they refuse a request the asker will be mad. Still others say that they feel guilty if they do not want to do what was asked of them.

While it is well and good to be the one others can depend on, and to be counted on to lend a helping hand, this can quickly get out of control. If you find yourself running just to keep up, or if your family is complaining that they never see you, it is time to re-assess what you are do-

If you are always available every time someone calls on you, then

they will assume they can expect you will always be there when they need you. They will not respect your time, or the fact that you too have a life, with plenty of your own things to do.

A good rule of thumb might be that unless it is an emergency, if you already have plans, you do not drop what you are doing to go and do something for another. If you want to help, then discuss a time that would work for you.

If it is social obligations that keep you hopping, look realistically at your life commitments and demands, and decide just how much time you want to devote to these.

It is perfectly okay to turn down some invitations because you have other plans, even if that plan is simply to take some alone time soaking in the tub, or spending time with your children.

Think of time as if it were money. Would you give money to everyone who asks?

Billionaires could do this as they have an endless supply of money. However even they say "no" a lot.

None of us has an endless supply of time. It is not selfish to prioritize it. Just saying, "My plate is full. I cannot take on anything else at this time" is all that need be said. You do not have to explain why.

If the demands of others are causing you stress, remember that you are the one in control of scheduling your time. Stress is not good for health or relationships, so once in a while we just have to slow it all

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
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

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
