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"Terrible blow" to Lake Winnipeg commercial fishery salvaged by Liberals

Some Lake Winnipeg commercial fishers are breathing a sigh of relief after provincial Liberal Party Leader Dougald Lamont (St. Boniface MLA) worked on their behalf to get Manitoba's inland fishery included in a federal emergency food program that was originally introduced in May.

The department of Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada announced June 15 that the \$50-million Surplus Food Rescue Program will now include fish and seafood in addition to items such as meat.

The federal government is buying up perishable food stocks to help producers cope with market impairments caused by COVID-19, and distributing them to food banks and vulnerable Canadians.

Lake Winnipeg fishers suffered a major setback after COVID wiped out their restaurant and hospitality markets and high value pickerel market in America. The virus wreaked havoc just as freezers at the Freshwater Fish Marketing Corporation – which buys and sells most of Manitoba's fish – filled to capacity at the tail end of the winter fishing season.

With nowhere to sell, FFMC had to drastically curtail buying. That in turn effectively shut down the spring fishing season. Only a handful of fish-

ers went out to catch species such as whitefish, which is sold primarily to retail stores.

Realizing fishers had no one fighting their corner, Lamont said he met with FFMC to gauge the situation then asked the federal government for assistance.

"We told the feds this is an extremely urgent issue and, basically, the federal government expanded its program," Lamont told the *Express* last week. "I think the federal government has done a good job of being flexible and recognizing there are gaps that need to be filled."

There are about 2,000 fishery jobs at stake plus all the jobs at FFMC's

The fishery provides "good jobs" to rural people and that in turn helps drive the provincial economy.

"When we talk about jobs and economic development, we want to make sure we're helping people grow economies locally, whether that's in Gimli or elsewhere in the Interlake," said Lamont. "We can't take it for granted that some foreign corporation is going to come in and be helpful. This entire crisis has shown the importance of self-reliance and that's something we really want to build on."

Lamont said he's optimistic FFMC's backlog will be cleared in time for the fall fishing season. The details of what the assistance will look like are expected in the next few weeks.

As for assistance from the provincial Conservative government, Lamont said it"just wouldn't" help despite his party having written letters suggesting it buy some of the frozen fish and distribute it to Manitobans who are food insecure.

Lamont, along with his daughter Freya, learned first-hand how hard fishers work when Lake Winnipeg commercial fishers Robert and Chris Kristjanson took him on the lake to pull up nets a few weeks ago.

And anybody that can figure out a way to "keep our fishery going during this pandemic" is welcome aboard his skiff to learn how commercial fishers work, said Chris Kristjanson, who fishes off Hecla and has been in the business for over 40 years.

Calling COVID a "terrible blow" to his industry, he said hardly anyone fished the spring season because there was nowhere to sell their fish.

"Dougald knocked on my door, saying 'Chris, what can we do to help?' Nobody else came to my door during this crisis," said Kristjanson.

The pandemic came on the heels of turbulent changes made over the past three years by the provincial Conser-

vatives, said Kristjanson. The party axed the province's contract with FFMC, allowing private fish buyers to set up shop, mandated two mesh size changes for a fishery that demands "flexibility on mesh" in order to meet changing population and species movement, and bought quota to reduce the number of fishers on the lake.

Coupled with the loss of pickerel markets and a frozen-fish backlog, the stress on the industry is enormous, he added. The fishers are fighting for their industry during a worldwide health crisis and their own province is trying to get them off the lake.

"I'm worried we're losing our industry. If we don't have a place to sell our fish, then why would anybody go out and catch fish?" said Kristjanson."And if nobody's going to catch fish, what's going to happen to our industry?"

Kristjanson said he took Lamont on a "three-minute" car tour of Gimli's Industrial Park to show him "failed" private fish-buying operations. Donald Salkeld, who Lake Manitoba and northern fishers say scampered off with \$1 million worth of their fish, has an empty lot on which nothing was ever built, and the Arctic Blue facility across the road hasn't opened.

The province was tasked by the federal government in the 1930s with managing the commercial fishery, and Kristjanson said he wants to know where it is as fishers "sit on shore" unsure of their future.

"Where in the hell is the management on this lake? It's a bad enough thing when you're on your knees then you get kicked in the head," he said. "Right now, we have a really big issue. The lake is absolutely teeming with fish and the freezers are full at the marketing board. Does this sound like sustainability?"

The fishery has thrived for over 130 years, is worth \$100 million and enables rural families to make a living,

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MP Bezan advocates for local military hero for \$5 bill

An Interlake politician has put a name forward to the redesign of the \$5 bill in Canada.

James Bezan, Shadow Minister for National Defence and Member of Parliament for Selkirk-Interlake-Eastman, is calling for local military hero Sergeant Tommy Prince to be the next face on Canada's \$5 bill.

"I am proud to advocate with the Manitoba Conservative caucus to have Sergeant Tommy Prince as the next face on Canada's \$5 bill," said Bezan, noting he is working alongside fellow Conservative MP Marty Morantz (Charleswood—St. James—Assiniboia—Headingley).

Morantz formerly served as a councillor for the City of Winnipeg (Charleswood-Tuxedo-Whyte Ridge).

"Sergeant Prince, who grew up on the Brokenhead Ojibway Nation, is Canada's most decorated Indigenous veteran.

"He was a founding member of the 1st Canadian Parachute Battalion and the Devil's Brigade during the Second World War. He went on to contribute to the stalwart defence of Hill 677 in the Battle of Kapyong during the Korean War," he said, adding Prince has 11 war medals to his name.

Prince was a direct descendent of Chief Peguis, for which the Peguis First Nation is named after. Chief Peguis led his band of 200 Ojibwa from the Sault Ste. Marie region to the Red River in the 1790s, according to the Department of National Defence (DND), and the Library and Archives of Canada. Prince is also a direct descendent of Chief William Prince, who headed the Ojibwa-Manitoba team of Nile Voyageurs, according to Canadian Archives.

One of the more well-known stories about Prince while he was a part of the Devil's Brigade in World War Two, according to the DND, was on Feb. 8, 1944, near Littoria, Italy.

Reconnaissance Sergeant Prince was spying on German forces. An abandoned farmhouse 200-metres from the enemy was his observation post, and 1,400-metres of telephone wire connected him to the allied force. DND, as well as archives, show he had a clear view of the enemy's artillery emplacements and was reporting them to the allied force.

During what would become a 24hour solo watch, the Germans severed Prince's communication line by shelling, according to DND.



DND called Prince "unfazed", as the sergeant donned civilian clothing, grabbed a hoe and—in full view of German soldiers-acted like a farmer weeding his crops. He slowly inched his way along the communication line until he found the damage, and then, pretending to tie his shoelaces, rejoined the wires, according to DND.

His reporting continued along with the damage to enemy artillery posts.

But, according to Bezan, the end of Prince's story is not a happy one.

"Sergeant Prince was proud to serve and sacrifice for Canada, but as an Indigenous veteran, he was discriminated against by the federal government who failed to provide him the same post-war support as other veterans.

"Tragically, Sergeant Prince died alone and homeless at a Salvation Army shelter in 1977," said Bezan.

"In the spirit of reconciliation, putting Sergeant Tommy Prince on Canada's \$5 bill in place of Sir Wilfred Laurier would be deserved retribution.

In 1907, Prime Minister Laurier forced the illegal surrender of St. Peter's Reserve north of East Selkirk and marched the community 100 miles north to the new reserve of Peguis First Nation. St. Peter's Reserve is the mother reserve to Sergeant Prince's Brokenhead Ojibway Nation, and, Tommy Prince is a direct descendant of Chief Peguis," he said.

Bezan encouraged all Canadians to visit www.honourtommyprince.ca to show gratitude for Prince's service and sacrifice, by recommending him as the next face of the \$5 bill.



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

Flood memories not so fleeting

The Assiniboine River near Brandon is up 10 feet, and could get as high as 13 feet above normal levels by July 8, according to media reports.

The heightened levels have prompted city officials to ask residents to stay away from the river and off the dike, and officials have gone on record with media saying the city has done all it can do to prepare for flooding. No Brandon residents have been asked to evacuate just yet.

But recent heavy rains have sounded flash flood alarms elsewhere, with communities in southwest Manitoba-Minnedosa, Rapid City and Rivers (Little Saskatchewan River starts in Riding Mountain National Park at Lady Audy and runs 105 kilometres south through Minnedosa, Rapid City, and Rivers, and intersects with the Assiniboine River, west of Brandon)—evacuating as a precautionary measure.

Rivers Provincial Park is closed through July 9 as a result, and so too

was Kiche Manitou Campground at Spruce Woods Provincial Park.

The Red River also continues to rise, with experts saying the river shouldn't exceed its banks, but the province has issued a high-water advisory anyway. RMs of Riverdale and Whitehead

also evacuated close to 100 people as a precautionary measure.

The flooding in other locations should remind us of the not so fleeting memories of summer 2011.

It was reported at the time that over 700 properties were damaged in the RM of St. Laurent after the 2011 flood, with residents displaced for over half a year in some cases. Some residents shut down local businesses, and at one point even the golf course had been put up for sale.

In the same year, media reported the RM of Woodlands issued mandatory evacuation orders for 68 of its properties.

While some ratepayers may question why the RMs of Armstrong, Bifrost-Riverton, Coldwell, Fisher.

Gimli, Grahamdale, St. Laurent, West Interlake, Woodlands, and even the Town of Winnipeg Beach would spend upwards of \$150,000, respectively, on flood preparedness equipment, the rationale should be clear.

Of note, the funding for each RM has come from the Provincial 2020 Flood Preparedness Program.

In addition to the proactive flood preparedness spending, many RMs have placed emphasis in 2019 on training staff for emergency response situations.

While rain in the Interlake can be spotty, reading the current headlines brings us back to difficult times. We live in a fragile ecosystem, a place where we can so quickly be at mother nature's mercv.

The Interlake region's leaders deserve immense amounts of credit for getting ahead of flood-related issues, natural and man-made disasters, and preparing for the worst.

As the current headlines remind us, it's better to prepared for the worst and hope for the best, than it is to not be prepared at all and be in the midst of mother nature's wrath.

Winnipeg Beach councillor resigns, citing concerns with respect and fiscal management

Winnipeg Beach councillor Frank Masi resigned a few weeks ago, citing concerns with the overall leadership of the small Lake Winnipeg resort town.

The first-time councillor told the Express on June 26 that he gave a lot of thought to the matter before he came to his decision.

"After many attempts to express my displeasure with council's inability to govern the town with fairness and equality for all people, I just felt I had to resign," said Masi. "I feel the absence of leadership and lack of respect for the common good of the town and its future have resulted in a

divided township."

Masi added that he also has concerns over the handling of revenues, but did not go into detail.

"I feel they've not been fiscally responsible," he said. "There have been a number of poor decisions that I've lost sleep over."

There were many people in town that had"high hopes" for this new council, which was elected in 2018, said Masi, but the past two years didn't go the way people were hoping it would.

Masi and Coun. Larry Banks were newcomers in 2018. Tony Pimentel was acclaimed mayor when no one ran against him, and Pat Green and Darryl Carry were re-elected.

Masi is a long-time seasonal resident of Winnipeg Beach and said he has lots of love for his town, making his decision to step down that much harder.

"This year marks 50 years we've been residents in Winnipeg Beach. It's a milestone. My parents purchased our cottage in 1970," he said. "There's a lot of history and nostalgia and a lot of great memories here. That's where my love of the town came from."

Although the decision to resign was difficult, Masi said he felt he had no other option in keeping with his personal values. And there's much more

and I won't name names - but you were a fun group to be with."


Superintendent Roza Gray offered grads a few words of encouragement on how they might want to look back on the pandemic.





Principal Leona Groot inspired the grads to celebrate the good things in life.




read, the more things you will know. The more that you learn, the more places you'll go," she said, encouraging the grads to adopt life-long learning habits.



After the ceremony, the grads were



On July 1, Interlake swept the St. Boniface Legionaires in a doubleheader, winning both games by 12-4 scores.

"To go in there at St. Boniface and put up 24 runs and only give up eight was a real good day for us," Kirk said.

Interlake has scored the most runs so far this season in the eight-team league with 56. That's the good news.

The bad news shows the Blue Jays are allowing just under seven runs a contest. That number has to come down if Interlake has any thoughts of winning a league championship this season.

"It is an offensive league, don't get me wrong," Kirk said. "Anybody who gives up five or less probably has some of the best pitching and defence in the league. We can clean it up, though. If we clean up the defence and pitch a little better (we'll do well)."

he said he wish he could say, but can't. "I'm very disappointed I couldn't fulfill my obligation to people of the town. But I just cannot and will not support this council's ideology nor [accept] being alienated for having a voice. I was shut down on many occasions," said Masi. "I wish council all good things and I sincerely thank the townspeople for all their support during the election and over the past two years. I look forward to 2022."

By that time, municipal councils should have passed a bylaw adopting a new provincial law, introduced in 2018, making it mandatory for all councillors to undergo training in respectful conduct. Bill 2, the Municipal Amendment Act (Strengthening Codes of Conduct for Council Members) will come into force Nov. 1, 2020.

The legislation intends to promote respectful workplaces after a number of municipal councillors across the province cited misconduct issues and some were forced out or had their duties scaled back. The legislation will also standardize the complaints process, introduces an appeals process and provide sanctions to address conduct violations.

Masi said he feels the townspeople have a right to know why he's resigned as "I was elected by them, they put me here." And that's why he said he addressed his resignation letter to the citizens of Winnipeg Beach as well as to council.

At council's regular meeting on June 24, council acknowledged Masi's resignation and passed a resolution to hold a by-election.

Mayor Tony Pimentel, Deputy Mayor Pat Green and Coun. Darryl Carry voted in favour of the resolution (Coun. Larry Banks was absent).

Resident Darlene Shkawritko asked council how citizens would "get to read" Masi's letter.

"We'll look into it and see what kind of information we can put out," said Pimentel. "We've accepted his letter of resignation. If we need to put it out, we will put it out."

Resident Jean Gendron asked if council had to pass a resolution to ac-

cept Masi's resignation.

Chief Administrative Officer Doreen Steg said she believed no resolution is necessary under the Municipal Act to accept a councillor's resignation.

"His resignation would be effective the day it's handed in to the CAO under the Act," she said.

Steg said she'd contact the Senior Election Official, the person appointed by the municipality to oversee an election, to start the by-election process. That could likely happen in three to four months.

"I have to take this to the SEO and he makes the decision," said Steg. "He'll let us know."

he said. The most important thing is to ensure FFMC's survival. "If the marketing board fails, what do we do this fall?" How do you tell a young Indigenous fisher in the north basin, a guy who has nothing but fishing, that he's not going fishing because he has nowhere to sell his fish?" said Kristjanson.

Fisher Bill Buckels said he appreciates Lamont's efforts and the federal government's willingness to meet the specific needs of their fishery, and he's concerned by "inaccurate" and "divisive" comments about the feds' fishery assistance programs

that recently made their way to some media outlets.

The federal government is providing \$469 for fish harvesters and \$62 million for processors. The latter will help fishers who process and sell their own fish in addition to harvesting it, said Buckels, and it's being delivered through Western Diversification.

"This is a virus. There's nobody to blame. The important thing is that we all work together. We're not looking for handouts but we do need help from all levels of government. If there's money available and it will help us recover and mitigate whatever losses we suffer, that's good, but fishers in the north and south have to work together or we won't have a fishery," he said.

With escalating COVID infections in the U.S., and how that continues to affect "pickerel alley," their markets in the Midwest and northern U.S., Buckels said he's not sure what will happen to the upcoming fall season.

"They're saying the States hasn't finished its first wave and that's not very promising," he said. "Canada may recover, but our pickerel market may not."

He said he was told FFMC is actively looking at alternative market options, including a pilot project with a large American food chain to utilize portion control by turning larger fillets into consumer-desired smaller fillets.

If the worst-case scenario should occur,

Buckels said he hopes the federal government will continue to let their fish flow through the surplus rescue program and fishers will be able to recover the costs of fishing.

Department of Fisheries and Oceans spokesperson Carole Saindon said by email a few weeks ago that the two fishery-specific assistance programs (Fish Harvester Benefit and Fish Harvester Grant) will help fishers, Indigenous fishers and crew members (who share revenue) access benefits they may not be eligible for under the Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy and the Canada Emergency Business Account.

The maximum benefit under FHB would be equivalent to that provided under CEWS, she said, which is \$847 per week per individual, to a maximum of 12 weeks.

"The Government of Canada also recognizes that harvesters' earnings in 2020 may still not be enough to establish a valid claim for Employment Insurance (EI) Fishing Benefits for the coming year," said Saindon.

"To address this gap, the prime minister recently announced the government will introduce changes that would allow self-employed fish harvesters and sharepersons to establish a claim for EI Fishing Benefits based on their insurable earnings in previous years (winter and summer claims)."


