Boomer's Funny Farm hosting first of many spay and neuter clinics

A local petting farm is hosting its first spay and neuter clinic in October. Boomer's Funny Farm is bringing Fixing Feral Felines to its Fraserwood property to spay and neuter local cats and dogs. Fixing Feral Felines is a group of six people from the Oakbank area who fix animals. Though the services is not free, it is much cheaper.

Janet Thordarson is one half of Boomer's Funny Farm. She relocated to Fraserwood from Gimli with her husband, where they now have 160 acres. The move came after their farm kept growing out of love for animals.

Before it was Boomer's Funny Farm, there was just Boomer — the first donkey the couple brought in. After they fell in love with Boomer, they got it a friend.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, Thordarson had a lot of people stopping in and asking to see their animals. The requests became a frequent occurrence, so Boomer's Funny Farm turned into a petting farm.

Soon after, the funny farm also became a rescue. The funds generated from the petting farm go toward the rescue and pay for vet bills, food and anything else the animals need.

Because Thordarson sees how many animals need homes, she understands how significant the overpopulation of

cats and dogs is. This summer, she took three cats to get spayed at a cost of \$400 per animal.

Fixing Feral Felines can do 20 animals in a one-day clinic. When Thordarson announced the group was visiting her farm, she was flooded with hundreds of messages from people who had animals to bring. Though she'd love to get every one of them fixed, she had to choose animals that needed the service most, including barn cats and stray dogs — already the spots are fully booked.

Boomer's Funny Farm also just took two Great Pyrenees dogs into its care, one of which was pregnant, so it's getting spayed at the clinic. Fixing Feral Felines offers its services for around \$120 per animal.

The date for the upcoming clinic has not yet been set, but it will happen

sometime in October.






Disability Vote Matters rally takes over Gimli

Arborg raises over \$24,000 for Terry Fox Foundation

Arborg and surrounding communities rallied to the cancer cause this month, helping the Arborg Terry Fox Committee and Arborg Early Middle School raise over \$24,000 for the Terry Fox Foundation.

Donna Gislason, chair of the Arborg & District Terry Fox Committee, said there's a generous community spirit in the area and support for those with cancer. Although the committee didn't hold a run this year, it organised a fundraising barbecue, took donations, held a raffle and sold T-shirts on two weekends earlier this month.

"Our fundraiser went very well. We raised over \$12,500 for the Terry Fox Foundation through the raffle we held, T-shirt sales and the barbecue," said Gislason. "I can't believe how generous our community has been. It's not only people in the town of Arborg, but also people in the surrounding areas."

The committee collected funds for the Terry Fox Foundation outside the Interlake Co-op grocery store on Sept. 15 and also accepted donations at the Interlake Outdoors Show on Sept. 9. It raffled off two Adirondack chairs that Gislason and her husband made.

Last year Arborg and surrounding communities raised over \$9,600 for cancer research.

The committee got quite a boost in fundraising support this year from the town's early middle school students and staff.

Arborg Early Middle teacher Cheryl Chwaliboga said that when she heard there'd be no formal run this year, she asked school staff if the students could undertake a run and collect pledges rather than offering a "Toonie or Loonie for Terry" as they usually would. All staff were on board as was principal Brad Harding.

"I also asked Mr. Harding, our principal, if he would be willing to shave his head if we raised \$5,000 and he said that was not enough! It was agreed upon that \$7,000 would have to be raised in order for him to shave

his head," said Chwaliboga.

To kick of the fundraising initiative, the school held an assembly a week before the run. One of the staff members, Mrs. Lorna Plett, spoke with staff and students about her personal journey with cancer, said Chwaliboga.

"She shared a very touching story of her experiences and the importance of raising money for cancer research," she said. "We also announced the challenge of raising \$7,000 to have Mr. Harding's head shaved. The kids were pumped!"

On the day of the run, students had already met their fundraising goal and the principal was destined for a close shave.

"Our final total ended up being just under \$12,000," said Chwaliboga. "Staff members who have been personally affected by cancer were invited to come and do the honour of shaving their principal's head. This included Lorna Plett, Tracy Froese, Iris Stansell and Tanya Harding."

The school is "so proud" of its students and their hard work to get pledges. And it appreciates the community's support to reach their goal, she added.

"Our school's parent advisory council donated all of the profits to this

month's hot dog day to our fundraising. As well, the Watering Whole donated water for our water station and the Co-op Gas Bar donated cups for us to use," said Chwaliboga. "We are also thankful to the fire department

Arborg Mayor Peter Dueck said he's was proud of the students' efforts to raise money for the cancer cause and demonstrate good citizenship.

"Congratulations to the school for exceeding their fundraising goal," said Dueck. "I was told they raised well over their goal of \$7,000."





Interlake seamstress creates versatile, long-lasting children's clothes

Wheat and Wildflower Handmade clothing designed to span three sizes for kids

What started as a pandemic pastime has turned into a business for Janine Duguid. Now, the Arnes mom is changing the way children wear

Duguid, who lost her job during the COVID-19 pandemic, struggled to find another that would allow her to work from home. Unwilling to commute to Winnipeg each day with her three children at home and husband farming, she decided to work for herself and Wheat and Wildflower Handmade was born.

The custom children's clothing brand offers high-quality fabrics designed to fit young ones for up to three sizes. Duguid pre-shrinks the material and uses relaxed and roomier designs to accommodate for growth.

Duguid's sweaters and pants have longer cuffs on the arms and legs that can fold up, and her dresses have added length so they start below the knee — allowing kids to grow into them.

"A lot of kids' clothing is poorly made," Duguid said. "Once you wash it, it shrinks, the arms and legs twist in the dryer. By the time it's been worn for a few months, it has holes and is garbage."

All the fabric she works with is natural, plant-based and has no synthetics. Most of what she uses is cotton-based, but she also uses bamboo fabric and Tencel fabric. No matter the base, all her fabrics come with spandex in them, which increases clothing lon-

"We live rurally so to have the ability to not shop as often is really appealing," Duguid said. "I've seen how many clothes come in and out. A lot of that clothing is just turned over so quickly and it's expensive. I just like to be able to see it last that little bit longer."

Duguid tries to source her materials from local, family-owned businesses, including a shop in Morden which creates printed fabrics, allowing her to make some fun pieces.

Another way she stays sustainable is by recycling fabric scraps. When she started sewing more often, she noticed she generated so many scraps

that she didn't want to waste. So, she donates all her scraps to the Gimli Humane Society for pet bed filling.

Duguid hopes that when children outgrow her clothes, each piece will be used again as a hand-me-down.

Wheat and Wildflower Handmade clothing may have a higher price tag

than most retail stores but costs less in the long-term because of its longevity, she said.

COVID outbreaks in IERHA health facilities, illness reporting to cease

As COVID transmission increases in Manitoba, a number of health facilities in the Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority are experiencing COVID outbreaks.

A screen-grab on Sept. 22 of the IER-HA's outbreak webpage shows four facilities experiencing with COVID outbreaks:

The Arborg Personal Care Home COVID outbreak was declared on Sept. 15. The Eriksdale Personal Care Home outbreak was declared on Sept. 19. The Eriksdale E.M. Crowe Hospital outbreak was declared on Sept. 20. And Teulon's Goodwin Lodge Personal Care Home outbreak was declared on Sept. 27 (this date may be a typo).

The Express reached out to the IER-HA for information on the numbers of patients and staff infected, whether there have been any deaths associated with the outbreaks and clarification on the date of the outbreak at Goodwin Lodge.

The IERHA is no longer implementing pandemic protocols and sharing details of illnesses in its health facilities. It will also be discontinuing public reporting on its website as the pandemic "has concluded," said a spokesperson for the health authority.

"The fall respiratory virus season is upon us. Now that the pandemic has concluded, we are no longer implementing pandemic protocols. Unless specified in provincial protocols, we

are no longer publicly reporting specific details on illness circulating in facilities as this is not a requirement of current protocols," said the spokesperson. "As a further reflection of our departure from pandemic protocols, will be moving to discontinue reporting illness in facilities on our website. We will continue to communicate directly with patients, residents and family members regarding circulating illness."

The Manitoba government's latest respiratory surveillance report for the period Sept. 10-16 (Week 37) states there were 114 new COVID infections detected that week, and that the num-

ber of COVID-associated hospital admissions "have increased compared with the previous week."






The program started out by sponsoring an education project in the Philippines, and over the years, it has grown alongside the pumpkin crop.

Operator, could you help me place this call?

A retired Manitoba Telephone System operator who lives in Selkirk was honoured by the Town of Churchill for her dedication to keeping people in the north connected to each other and for wanting to make her own connection to the town.

Lorna Nohlgren, who will be turning 93, received a certificate of appreciation from Churchill Mayor Michael Spence when she travelled by train up to Churchill in August 2020 to fulfil one of the wishes on her bucket list.

Having grown up in the north and visited many parts of the region, Nohlgren said she had always wanted to see Churchill. She had no idea the town had been tipped off about her trip and was planning to honour her.

"I was totally surprised when I received the certificate. I wasn't expecting that," said Nohlgren, who has lived in Selkirk for 60 years, has been volunteering with the Gordon Howard Centre for older adults since 2005 and is an accomplished self-taught painter.

The three-day trip to Churchill was a Christmas gift from Nohlgren's son, Bruce.

"Mom told me that while she's still on this earth, she'd like to see Churchill. So that's what I gave her for Christmas in 2019," he said. "I knew the executive director of the Town of Churchill and told him about Churchill being on my mom's bucket list and he said he would like to arrange a ceremony to honour her telecommunications service and interest in wanting to come to the community at 90 years old. It was arranged that the mayor would be there. Mom thought we were going for a walk around Churchill and wondered why I was taking her to the town office."

Nohlgren's 30-year telecommunications journey with MTS started in 1947 in The Pas, where she grew up. Her career then took her to Flin Flon farther north and concluded in Selkirk, where she moved with her husband in 1963. She began as a switchboard operator, connecting people in the region and beyond with one another, and was the first operator in The Pas who got paid for two weeks' training.

Teenage boys were, historically, the first telephone operators. But they proved unruly at times, and women, who were naturally more polite, were pressed into service.

Switchboards connected different parts of a telephone system. Operators, who worked 24-7, would pull wires attached to a jack from one location on the switchboard and plug them into another location to connect calls.

People with landline telephones (there were no cell phones back then) would call the switchboard and the operator would ask what number they wanted to ring.

"We connected mostly local calls but we had long distance calls also. We handled some personal calls, but a lot of residents couldn't afford phones, so it was mostly businesses using the telephone," said Nohlgren. "At that time (late '40s), there wasn't even a direct circuit to Winnipeg; you had to go through Swan River and Dauphin to get to Winnipeg. And there was only one line to Flin Flon, Cranberry Portage, Wanless, Sherridon, Cold Lake, all on what was called the 31 Circuit. It was 1948 when MTS put a direct line into Flin Flon."

There was also no MTS service to Churchill at that time, and operators had to use what was called the "iron line," which was the telegraph service used by the Canadian National Railway.


After the Second World War, Churchill had a substantial miliary presence in town. In 1949 Nohlgren was told of one man was terribly homesick and she agreed to patch through a call from him to his parents in Quebec. That could have spelled the end of her career with MTS.

"He was really homesick. One of the Hudson's Bay train engineers got talking to this fellow over the iron line and the engineer then phoned me at the switchboard and said, 'Lorna, do you think you can do something for this fellow?' I said, 'What? The engineer says, 'He's so homesick, he's young, his parents are in Montreal.' I told him I'd patch the fellow through, but he was not to mention where he was calling from. I put him through as if he was calling from a hotel pay station in The Pas. And, of course, I said to the fellow, 'As long as you call collect,' which he did," she said. "I would probably have lost my job. I don't think they'd cut my pension now if they find out."

Operators were not supposed to engage in idle chitchat with people calling in. Some people were "lonely" and wanted someone to talk to, she said. But one situation demanded she put workplace

rules aside to help a young girl in distress.

"A young girl called in and told me she was going to commit suicide. I kept her talking on the line then I called my supervisor and she talked to the girl. I called the police and we kept this young girl on the line until the police got to her," said Nohlgren, who had no formal training in emergency situations. "You were timed on your calls; you had to keep working steadily and not talk to people while you were on the switchboard other than to put them through."

She said the police arrived at the scene, but she never found out what later happened to the girl.

It was in 1948 in Flin Flon where Nohlgren met her future husband, Gordon, who also worked for MTS and was installing a direct telephone line into the town. Chatting with operators was standard procedure.

"The first thing they'd do is get acquainted with the operators," she said. "On Thursday afternoons the stores were closed and it was really quiet on the switchboard. Our boss gave us a job of cleaning the venetian blinds. I went out the back and asked the [MTS] guys if there was a strong guy here who can take the blinds downs. A couple of them clamoured to get in. One of them was Gordon."

Operators would also receive emergency calls for situations such as fires. In Flin Flon, for instance, they could activate a siren from the switchboard that would ring in town to alert the emergency services. Nohlgren found out the hard way one day at work what the siren switch did. She opened a door to the control because she was "curious" as to what it was.

"When I slammed the door shut, it started to ring. It rang and rang and rang. I had to call in and say, 'Oh, it was an

Winnipeg Beach's own Carlo's Cucina voted the best burger in Canada.

After two weeks of serving up The Magnifico, Carlo's Cucina won Le Burger Week. It isn't the first time the local restaurant has won the competition, either, having taken home the same title in 2021.

This year, Carlo Guzzi, owner of Carlo's Cucina, created the first burger of its kind. An Italian-inspired burger, The Magnifico had Guzzi's own caponata, an Italian relish-like sauce with eggplant, roasted peppers, garlic, white onion and chili flakes, in a focaccia hamburger bun. The burger was complete with a five-ounce certified angus beef patty, five slices of soppressata (a dry Italian salami), Bothwell mozzarella cheese, arugula tossed in olive oil, Himalayan salt, black pepper and a roasted garlic parmesan aioli.

The first-time creation won Carlo's Cucina more than 2,500 votes, clinching them the win. Guzzi said this year's Le Burger Week was their best yet, votes and all.

"Winning this year was the icing on the cake for us," he said. "I wanted to showcased the Interlake and put it back on the map. We deserve to be here.

Guzzi noted that being in a rural community like Winnipeg Beach makes it more difficult for them to get the exposure restaurants in Winnipeg get. To try Carlo's Cucina's burger, most people had to drive for over an hour, so the win is that much sweeter.

"Le Burger Week said they've never seen someone get so much exposure in such a little town," said Guzzi. "They said the amount of 'wows' we got was the most in Canada."

He noted as well that they know they have a lot of readers in this region of southern Manitoba.


"We know from feedback that we have many hundreds and hundreds of our family in the Winkler and Morden area. They know that we have a lot more than weather."



The public back then were a nicer lot to operators, very respectful and quite generous at Christmas, loading them down with chocolate and fruitcake.

"One outfit gave us a crisp dollar bill — and that was a lot of money then," said Nohlgren.

After moving to Selkirk in the early '60s, Nohlgren said she took a parttime operator job and also trained to be a radio operator to connect people across the region who didn't have MTS service.

"We had a few consoles of radio connection to all the places that didn't have phones like Berens River and George Island, where a guy would call in the weather every four hours and we'd patch him through to Winnipeg to the weather station. All those places — which now have phones were on the northern radio service," said Nohlgren. "I was the first female voice on the radio that they connected to Norway House just so they could see how a female voice carried."

Growing up in The Pas was like growing up in other rural Manitoba towns. Nohlgren said as a girl she joined Brownies and Girl Guides,

skated, curled and joined the junior and senior choir at church. Her parents also took them on trips.

"Our parents took us out to Clearwater Lake about 25 miles away," she said. "They would rent a cottage and take us out there for a month in the summer."

She travelled as far as the Nelson River near Gillam when she around 12 years old. Her uncle worked for the railway at the time and she and her family were able to "borrow" a pump car to travel from Gillam to the mouth of the Nelson River, have lunch and come back. Pump cars were called handcars. They had a small platform

The Express Weekly News Thursday, September 28, 2023 **15** that could accommodate three or four people and are powered by the passengers themselves, who work an arm in seesaw fashion, pulling up and pushing down to propel the car along the rails.

> Nohlgren's train trip to Churchill a few years ago was much more comfortable than travelling by handcar. True to her pioneering spirit, and knowing the vast distances between communities in the north, Nohlgren said she bagged up sandwiches and made six dozen cookies to speed them along to a destination she had once connected over the wires.

Arborg Seniors Housing Corporation hosts community meeting on PCH

The Arborg Seniors Housing Corporation (ASHC) hosted a community meeting on Sept. 19 at which it expressed its gratitude for the provincial government's previous commitment to provide funding for the preconstruction phase (i.e., planning and design) of a new PCH in Arborg.

The government had issued a news release on July 7 stating it had authorized \$15 million "to advance the plan-

ning and design phase" of six PCHs — Arborg, Stonewall, Oakbank, Lac du Bonnet, Bridgwater (in Winnipeg) and Portage Avenue (in Winnipeg).

The government's approval of and funding for the construction of a new PCH in Arborg has yet to be announced.

Since at least 2015, the ASHC has been working diligently in conjunction with the Town of Arborg and the Municipality of Bifrost-Riverton on a plan to build a new PCH in downtown Arborg and have it connected to the

munity centre on Ingolfs Street. Several submissions over the years had been made to the provincial government. The town currently has a 40-bed PCH in the west end of town, next to the hospital.

ASHC manager Maureen Sigurgeirson said the corporation developed a detailed business case to confirm the need for an aging-in-place facility and outlined the community's ability to support it.

"Working

with municipal governments of the Town of Arborg and the Rural Municipality of Bifrost-Riverton, as well as developing a partnership with the IERHA, the ASHC is pleased to be granted approval from Manitoba Health to complete the pre-construction phase of the aging-in-place campus, which will include a new 60-bed personal care home," said Sigurgeirson in

ect aligns with Manitoba's Provincial Seniors Strategy, which will achieve a safe, inclusive, accessible community for seniors in the region and will ensure on-foot interior access for senior residents of varying abilities through a full continuum of housing and services."

Once approved, the PCH is projected to cost \$50.3 million. It would be managed by Penn Co. Construction and designed by ft3 Architecture Landscape Interior Design. It would provide a "small home environment for PCH residents transitioning away from the more institutional model now in use," says the ASHC in its statement.

As the government is in a blackout period in the lead-up to the Oct. 3 election, an announcement approving the construction of the facility would not come until after the election.

Town of Arborg Mayor Peter Dueck, who also chairs the ASHC board, said if the cost of the project is in line with provincial budgeting, the construction would be approved.

"If the ASHC falls within the allotted budget for this project, we will get the go-ahead for the construction of the PCH," said Dueck by phone.

A new PCH would be a "god-send for the entire region," he said in ASHC's statement, as it will enable seniors to receive care and remain in their home community, as well as provide more well paying jobs.

"We will not have to fear that seniors will be transported to a PCH two or three hours away from home. For married couples, this project allows for different levels of care and for the partners to be able to visit each other without having to go outside," said Dueck. "It's an absolute gamechanger for our pioneers who deserve to age in their home community. I am so pleased that our provincial government has recognized the hard work and competencies of the ASHC."

Gimli RCMP recover large amount of stolen property

Gimli RCMP, Selkirk RCMP and the Manitoba East District Criminal Response Enforcement Support Team executed a search warrant on a rural property in the RM of Gimli as part of an ongoing investigation on Sept. 20.

During the search, officers recovered tens of thousands of dollars worth of stolen property, including motor vehicles, generators and commercial tools. Officers also seized a carbinestyle firearm with several rounds of ammunition and a small amount of methamphetamine. It was determined the stolen items were from various locations across southern Manitoba, some from as far away as Steinbach.

Two males, aged 27 and 63, and a female, 42, were located on scene and were placed under arrest. They face numerous criminal charges, including several charges of possession of

stolen property, possession of a controlled substance x2 and numerous firearms-related charges.

The investigation continues.

"The Manitoba RCMP understands that property crime effects all communities and continues to take steps to combat these types of criminal offences in rural Manitoba," said Supt. John Duff, RCMP East District com-

The RCMP is working on getting the property returned to the rightful owners.

ASHC board, said this is a milestone for the municipality and surrounding communities as the corporation has worked on an ageing-in-place campus for years.

"Our seniors have made a tremendous contribution to this community and we owe them facilities that will enhance their needs," said Johnson in the ASHC statement.

About 175 people attended the public meeting. ASHC board members, Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority CEO Marion Ellis and Interlake-Gimli MLA candidates Derek Johnson (Progressive Conservative), Sarah Pinsent-Bardarson (NDP) and Larry Brandt (Keystone Party) also attended.

A new small craft harbour officially opens at the Hollow Water First Nation in Manitoba

Coastal communities across the nation — including inland Canada are supported by small craft harbours that make fishing safer and more effective.

On Sept. 21, Hollow Water First Nation members celebrated the official opening of a new and much needed small craft harbour for their community on eastern Lake Winnipeg.

Chief Larry Barker spoke of the importance of this new infrastructure, which improves access to the community's fish processing plant and provides safer docking for vessels.

"Canada is working shoulder to shoulder with First Nations communities to invest in building and upgrading infrastructure crucial to the well-being of residents on reserves," Diane Lebouthillier, Minister of Fisheries, Oceans and the Canadian Coast Guard, said in a statement.

"Fish harvesting is a central part of life in many Indigenous communities, which is why I am so pleased to see this new small craft harbour officially opened."

The harbour has been operational since May 2023 and is the newest harbour in service in the Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO) national system of small craft harbours.

The Hollow Water small craft harbour features a crib wharf, two floating docks with gangways and a precast concrete launch ramp.

Following a competitive process

under the Government of Canada's procurement strategy for Indigenous business, Zhemaak Inc. of Berens River was the successful bidder on the \$1.3-million project.

The new harbour in Hollow Water represents DFO's commitment to reconciliation and support of the Indigenous commercial fishing industry, the organization said.

DFO owns 973 small craft harbours across Canada, with more than 5,000 volunteers serving on harbour au-

Their efforts average 200,000 hours per year, which exceeds 100 full-time positions. Harbour authorities generate approximately \$30 million in revenue annually, which is reinvested in the harbours or the communities.

Harbour authorities are incorporated, not-for-profit organizations with boards of directors and members who represent their communities.

Each harbour authority is a unique and independent legal identity and is responsible for managing, operating and maintaining one or more public fishing harbours through a lease agreement.

Five volunteers have been elected by the commercial fishing community to manage the day-to-day operations of the Hollow Water harbour.

The volunteers will serve as board members of the local harbour authority and will be integral to the success of the harbour.

But they got hit again last week.

Ask The Money Lady

Dear Money Lady, I'm wondering if you can provide advice on RESPs. We have 2 kids currently aged 14 and 16. We opened a family RESP account approximately 12 years ago contributing monthly. We have no idea how to plan for future expenses beyond the basic tuition. I've read online that a car purchase could be deemed eligible for a student, but I'm not certain. Do I need to get a financial advisor to help? Carol

Dear Carol, I've always recommend having a Family RESP plan versus individual plans because it has so much more flexibility - so you were really smart to do it this way, good job!

There are a few key components of a RESP that you must be aware of. The limit on lifetime contributions for any one beneficiary is \$50,000 and any over contributions are subject to a penalty of 1% per month. You can make contributions to the plan for up to 31 years and it can remain open for up to 36 years. If the beneficiary is disabled, you can contribute to 35 years, and it will remain open for 40 years.

There is a basic CESG, (Canada Education Savings Grant) for beneficiaries of the plan under the age of 18, (special rules apply for children over 16). The Canadian government will add 20% annually to the first \$2,500 contributed, a \$500 bonus every year. The maximum CESG over the life of the plan is \$7,200 per beneficiary. The benefit to a family plan is that when you are planning to allocate the funds among the beneficiaries, you will not be restricted on withdrawals and can direct more to a child whose education expenses may be higher.

Almost all Canadian universities and colleges qualify for a RESP including some outside of Canada, (CRA will be able to provide a complete qualifying list). A part-time student can access up to \$2,500 for

each 13-week semester and a fulltime student can access up to \$5,000 during the first 13 weeks of initial enrolment, with no limit thereafter, (so if you wanted funds for a vehicle - I guess you could take it). The funds withdrawn are taxable upon the beneficiary, resulting in little to no tax payable because they are a student.

If you have any leftover funds after each child has completed their education, you can transfer up to \$50,000 of the plan's earnings to your RRSP provided you have the contribution room (you can check on the Canadian government website at: www. cra-arc.gc.ca/tx/ndvdls/tpcs/respreee/menue-eng.html.)

I think you are fine to use the financial institution where the RESP is held and it will not make any difference going to an independent advisor since the rules are explicit on how it can be used, withdrawn, and administered among each beneficiary. I hope that helps.

Nonstick cooking spray

11/3 cups liquid egg whites

1 can (15 1/2 ounces) no-salt-added black beans, rinsed and drained

4 whole-wheat tortillas (6 inches, lowest sodium available)

2 medium avocados, sliced

1/4 cup hot sauce or salsa (lowest sodium available, optional)

Lightly spray large skillet with nonstick cooking spray. Heat over medium heat.

In skillet, stir egg whites constantly with rubber spatula to scramble.

Cook until eggs are almost set. Add beans, stirring until combined and heated through.

Microwave tortillas on high 45 seconds. Transfer to work surface.

Spread egg mixture in center of each tortilla. Top with the avocado and hot sauce, if desired.

For each burrito, fold two sides of tortilla toward center. Starting from closest unfolded side, roll burrito toward remaining unfolded side to enclose filling. Transfer with seam side down to plates.


