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
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Derek Johnson (PC) re-elected in Interlake-Gimli riding; NDP form majority government

To no one's surprise — after the polls predicted that the NDP would form government — Manitobans sent the NDP to the legislature with a majority government on Oct. 3.

With a focus on restoring health-care cuts made by the previous Progressive Conservative government and supporting Manitobans through the ongoing cost-of-living crisis, the NDP won 34 seats in the legislative assembly. The Progressive Conservatives picked up 22 seats and the Liberal Party got one seat.

There are 57 seats in the legislative assembly. Twenty-nine seats are required to form a majority govern-

In the Interlake-Gimli riding, Progressive Conservative MLA incumbent Derek Johnson received 5,126 votes while NDP candidate Sarah Pinsent-Bardarson was a close contender with 4,444 seats. Larry Brandt of the Keystone Party received 391 votes and Sean James of the Liberal Party received 367, according to Elections Manitoba's unofficial results as of Oct. 8.

In addition to serving as MLA for

the riding and as agriculture minister under the former government, Johnson said he feels humbled by the support of voters in the Interlake-Gimli riding and attributes his win to his and his government's past support for the riding.

"I think they've probably seen how I represented the Interlake-Gimli riding in the legislature and I think they're happy that I'm available and accessible at various community events and that I support community endeavours, whether that's through grants under the green team, building

sustainable communities and sport, culture and heritage. I think they realize how much of an investment our government has made in Interlake-

Gimli," said Johnson last Friday before he headed out to Arborg's annual

Culturama celebration.

Over the next four years, Johnson said his priorities will be to "hold feet to the fire" on issues such as the North End Water Pollution Control Centre upgrades to reduce phosphorus loading to Lake Winnipeg as that's "important to Interlakers and all Manitobans," continue to "chip away at drainage, roads and infrastructure" projects that need attention and continue to support initiatives that will help re-build the rural health-care

"We need to continue supporting communities like Arborg, which has a nurse training program and is about to graduate their 40th nurse," said Johnson. "It's important to train people with rural roots than to try to attract people to rural Manitoba to work in our health-care system."

As far as working with the new NDP government, Johnson said the Conservatives already had a working relationship with the party when it served as the official opposition, and he's sure "they'll continue that relationship now that we're in opposition."

Former PC premier Heather Stefanson announced that she'll be serving as interim Progressive Conservative leader until a new leader is found, likely in 2024.

Johnson said he's not, at the moment, thinking of running for party leader as he's seen how hard his colleagues worked and how much time it took away from their personal and family lives.

"I will wait and see who throws their hat in the ring," said Johnson. "I'm sure there are lots of good contenders out there."

In the run-up to the election, NDP leader Wab Kinew promised to reduce wait times at emergency rooms by re-opening three Winnipeg ERs (Seven Oaks, Concordia and Victoria hospitals) that the PCs had converted into urgent care centres, and promised to add more than 130 beds over the next four years once the staffing is available.

Kinew also committed to adding 60 beds at the Health Sciences Centre, Manitoba's largest hospital that serves patients from across the province, 30 beds at St. Boniface hospital, 34 beds at Grace hospital and 10 beds at the Brandon Regional Health Centre, according to a news release issued a day before the election.

The NDP also promised to build a new ER in Eriksdale to serve residents along Highway 6 and beyond, create more personal care home beds,

including in Arborg, and hire more paramedics. Sarah Pinsent-Bardarson, who was down 682 votes to Johnson (as of Oct. 8), spent the past four years meeting with residents, municipal

councils and school divisions to hear their concerns. She said she's pleased that she and her team garnered significant support from Interlakers.

"For the past four years, our Interlake-Gimli team of volunteers and I have worked tirelessly to spread the message of hope, positivity and unity to our voters here and we succeeded. We significantly increased our number of votes, and that's a result of meeting thousands of folks who were eager and encouraging of change and supported my leadership," she said. "I'm very proud of our campaign and that every step of the way we demonstrated our sincerity, integrity and accountability to the voters here. Manitobans voted for better health care, lower costs and a government that would bring us together, not tear us apart."

Pinsent-Bardarson said people in the riding will benefit under the leadership of Premier Wab Kinew and the NDP.

"We are a thriving NDP team in Interlake-Gimli and I encourage everyone to join our team of volunteers and keep the NDP momentum building for coming years," said Pinsent-

No experience necessary

Think your home assessment is fair and done by qualified people? Think

Here's our story: For 22 years my wife and I have lived in the country. In all that time, we've met in-person with an assessment officer on our property only once. Our house was totally finished by 2002.

Our assessment doubled in those first two years and continued to increase gradually over the next six — the laws of economics dictate that everything goes up in price, so no problems. However, the next time we were assessed, we saw an increase of 45 per cent in a two-year period. I called and asked for an explanation.

The officer said, "Well, your house is this many square feet, double attached garage with a full basement."

The problem was, we had no basement.

He didn't believe me, so without contacting us and arranging a meeting, he simply went to our house. We knew he was there because my wife was going home after work and

saw him leaving our driveway. The next day he called and said he would change our assessment because he had seen I wasn't lying. He increased it a reasonable amount. So, that's two officers who were at our house since it was built.

When we got our 2024 notice, I again thought the increase was steep, considering we'd just seen a rise in 2023.

So, now a third officer sets up a meeting at our house to explain the increase. I asked what percentage was the overall increase in our municipality. She said she didn't know and that her husband would have that information. She walked around our house and called the next day, explaining the increase was due to our sunroom addition. I told her that the sunroom has been up for 20 years.

My question is, how do multiple assessment officers not notice that we have no basement and that there is a sunroom attached to the house? My next question is, how did the third officer get her position? I have her card and it says she has a bachelor of science in agriculture, which gives her

the qualifications to tell me what type of chemical to spray on diddle weed to get rid of it, not to assess our home and property. Oh, yes, her husband would have the information I requested. I think I just answered my questions.

We went to our RM council meeting to discuss the increase with her there. This assessment officer was so nervous she could barely read what was on the papers right in front of her. That tells me how much knowledge and experience she has at her position.

Council is a joke (unless you're related to them). They are taking her side every time because it means more tax dollars for the municipality. So, then we got the option to go in front of another board in the city, which will cost us \$50 to state our case in front of people that are most likely the same as the three officers that showed up at our house.

Notworth the effort, folks. I think I'm simply going to apply for a job there. Obviously, no experience necessary.

The foundation also granted close to \$60,000 to community organizations to help them improve the quality of life for residents.

Nineteen students from communities along the west shore of Lake Winnipeg were celebrated and presented with scholarships during the foundation's annual donor appreciation and scholarship awards evening at the Lakeview Resort in Gimli last Friday.

The scholarships will support students as they pursue their academic dreams and help them become the leaders of tomorrow.

Award recipient Sinead Gibbs thanked Westshore for its funding support of students from the rural area.

"There are a few extra hurdles and barriers we have to overcome as postsecondary students coming from a rural area," said Gibbs. "I just moved into my own place out here and I'm driving to the University of Manitoba four days a week, which is a lot. I'm starting a master's program this year, which is taking more of my time. With a full-time practicum coming this summer, I'm not able to commit to work right now. Scholarships such as this one really gives me the possibility of continuing to go to university full time and reach my academic goals. It will certainly help me put a

Congratulations, now let's cut taxes

The Canadian Taxpayers Federation is calling on Manitoba Premier-Designate Wab Kinew to follow through on his promises to provide tax relief after winning the Manitoba Election.

"Kinew needs to immediately follow through on his promised tax relief," said Gage Haubrich, prairie director of the CTF. "Manitobans can't afford to wait any longer, so tax relief needs to be Kinew's Day 1 priority."

During the election campaign, Kinew promised he would cut provincial gas taxes for at least six months.

The provincial government currently charges drivers 14 cents per litre every time they fuel up. The average family filling up a sedan once a week would save about \$215 over the six months of promised tax relief.

Kinew also promised to remove the provincial sales tax from new rental

housing construction.

A Manitoba family making about \$75,000 a year pays \$6,925 in provincial taxes. That's \$2,802 more than they would pay in Saskatchewan, \$4,322 more than in Alberta and \$3,907 more than in British Columbia.

"Manitobans pay too much tax and it makes life unaffordable," Haubrich said. "Kinew needs to get to work and help keep more money in Manitobans' wallets."

Gimli Chamber of Commerce's destination brand committee up for tourism awards

The destination brand committee of the Gimli Chamber of Commerce has earned three tourism industry award nominations this year for the visually spectacular winter wonderland it created last year on Lake Winnipeg.

The committee created an Is Porp (Icelandic for ice village) that linked anglers' fishing shacks outside Gimli Harbour to an icy fun zone inside the harbour that included a meandering skating rink, spectacular snow sculptures, lighting for nighttime skating or romancing under the stars, and a light tunnel installation.

Committee chair Cheryl Buhler said she and her committee colleagues, Kim Giesbrecht and Julianna Roberts, are thrilled to have been recognized for their work on the ice village and the success they had in drawing more visitors to Gimli in what's typically a less busy winter season.

"We're very happy that Gimli is being recognized for the efforts made year after year to bring tourists and visitors to our beautiful community, particularly in our shoulder season, which runs from October to April. That's what we've been working on for years," said Buhler.

Travel Manitoba nominated the destination brand committee for a Business Event Award from the Tourism Industry Association of Canada (TIAC). The TIAC award recognizes an event that has "enhanced the profile/awareness and appeal of the destination they are held in, as well as created economic impact, increased visitation, and community involvement."

Travel Manitoba also nominated the destination

brand committee for an Event of the Year Award, its own award that's presented to organizations that host an event, festival or gala that make a "substantial economic impact within the local community and creates an outstanding experience for attend-

In addition to Gimli's ice village, Holiday Alley in Selkirk and the Morden Corn & Apple Festival were nominated for the award.

The Interlake Tourism Association, a non-profit organization that showcases sites across the Interlake and helps with promotion and marketing and networking opportunities, nominated the destination brand committee for an Interlake Tourism Marketing Campaign of the Year Award.

To further enhance the ice village this year, the Westshore Community Foundation, which provides grants to local and area organizations for a range of projects, provided the destination brand committee with a grant of \$7,000.

Buhler spoke about the enhancements the committee will make this year to the ice village during Westshore's donor appreciation and bursary award evening on Oct. 6, and thanked the foundation and its donors for their support.

"This year with the assistance of the Westshore Community Foundation, we have partnered with the Grade 11 and 12 woodworking class [at Gimli High School] to add a community warming hut and 10 benches for visitors to rest or stop and take in the beauty of winter all around them," she said. "We'll also be adding more lights to the lake."

Award winners will be announced on Oct. 19 at the Canadian Museum for Human Rights (Travel

Manitoba) and on Oct. 28 at Larters Golf & Country Club (Interlake Tourism Association).

Lundar's annual craft market returns Nov. 25

There is no cost to get into the craft sale. Sweetland encourages everyone to come out and support the ag society and local makers.



RCMP search leads to recovery of stolen property

On Sept. 29, as a result of an ongoing investigation, officers with the Manitoba East District Crime Reduction Enforcement Support Team (CREST) unit, along with assistance from the Gimli RCMP detachment, RCMP emergency response team and police dog services, executed a search warrant at a property located in the RM of Gimli.

The search of the resulted in the seizure of a snowmobile, multiple trailers, construction equipment, a camper, firearms, cash, cocaine and other controlled substances. Some of the recovered property had been reported stolen from multiple locations across southern Manitoba.

Officers arrested 48-year-old Michel Verrier from the RM of Gimli and remanded him into custody on charges including possession of stolen prop-




erty, possession for the purpose of trafficking and numerous firearmsrelated offences.

The first of many seasonal workshops will be with Marilyn Folson, a long-time Gimli Art Club member. Folson is a painter specializing in magic realism, which she describes as a "stream of consciousness," rather than painting landscapes and scenes.

"She's an outstanding artist," fellow club member Sharon Cory said. "She's so well trained and has such a clear vision for what she wants her art

For the last 15 or 20 years, the club has maintained a presence on the bustling streets of Gimli. Members share their love for the arts, while also volunteering their time at the gallery. The art space has a pottery studio in the rear and a gallery in the front. The pottery space operates year-round but the gallery only runs during the busy summer months.

Cory said this past summer, the club saw more than 15,000 people walk through its doors. Of the club's 70 members, 52 were selling their pieces, and they saw business like never before.

"The traffic was incredible," Cory said. "Our sales were incredible."

Though the workshop would typically be hosted within the gallery, current renovations have closed the space until the end of October. The

"It's the idea that artists will just sit around in a group and talk and laugh and have an experience that isn't normal to us," Cory said, noting artists are used to working alone, but this workshop is more of a sharing experience.

The power of early detection



Do you know the risk factors associated with breast cancer?

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month across Canada. Even though this disease has many causes, several factors can increase the risk of contracting it. Here's an overview of some of those risk factors.

- **1. Previous conditions.** You're more vulnerable to developing breast cancer if abnormal cells have been detected in your breasts in the past or if you've had previous abnormalities.
- 2. Age. More than 80 per cent of cases in Canada occur in women over the age of 50.
- 3. Alcohol. According to the World Health Organization (WHO), drinking one beer or one glass of wine per day is enough to increase your risk significantly.
- 4. Menstrual cycle. Early menstruation and late menopause are linked to the possibility of developing the disease.

- **5. Family history.** Your risk of getting the disease is higher if your mother, sister or daughter has been diagnosed with breast cancer, especially if it was before menopause.
- 6. Pregnancy complications. Your risk increases if you've never carried a pregnancy to full term or if you've been pregnant after the age of 30.
- 7. Body weight. People who are obese have a higher statistical likelihood of getting breast cancer.
- 8. Taking hormones. Undergoing hormone replacement therapy for more than five years is associated with the onset of this type of cancer.
- 9. Physical inactivity. A sedentary lifestyle increases the likelihood of a breast cancer diagnosis.

Arnes was 'living in a sewer' as algal bloom moved in, turned Drunken River green

As a severe algal bloom on Lake Winnipeg made a mess of Winnipeg Beach and Gimli a few weeks ago, a further mass of foul-smelling algae moved in to communities farther north, blanketing the shoreline around Arnes, inundating the Silver Harbour Marina and turning the Drunken River into a bright green slurry.

Arnes resident and Gimli councillor Andy Damm said the bloom started the weekend of Sept. 23-24 and only started dissipating last Wednesday. He and area residents thought they were "living in a sewer" with the noxious smell coming off the lake.

"The algal blooms just started to get progressively worse and didn't dissipate," said Damm. "It back-flowed all the way up the Drunken River [which drains farmland from the west] probably because the lake was quite high — and also entered the Silver Harbour Marina," said Damm. "At the same time the bloom was happening up here, it started in Gimli as well because I was in touch with people down there."

Phosphorus and nitrogen loading to the lake exacerbate the growth of algae, and the with the fall a little warmer than normal, water temperatures were higher, causing the blooms to "more or less explode in this area," he said.

The algal bloom problem isn't new and it's time for governments to take action to reduce phosphorus (the primary pollutant contributing to algae growth) loading to the 10th largest freshwater lake in the world, as well as address a "multitude" of other pollutants that get piped into the lake, which communities rely on for commercial fishing, drinking water and tourist-related activities, said Damm. Governments are very good at studying issues to death, but they're way past the point of action.

"Scientists and governments have been studying this out here since 1980. That gives you an idea as to how slowly our province is acting," said Damm. "There's a multitude of



Local patient stories of how their dentures fit so differently

Today we are highlighting the denture stories of two patients, Ron and Sara, who happily shared their denture experiences with us at their most recent appointments last week. Both Ron and Sara have something in common that makes their dentures fit differently, so let's dive into their stories togeth-

Ron came to see us for a consultation earlier this year knowing he had to have his remaining 26 teeth removed. When he came in for the consultation with the Denturist Brock to discuss his teeth replacement options, he found out that his dentures could fit tighter with dental implants and the procedure would be done simultaneously with extractions. Right after Ron had the teeth extracted and dental implants placed, he was smiling with the same dentures you see in his picture. The only difference now is that his full lower denture clicks

into 4 dental implants, which was able to happen about 3 months after moving around, it didn't stay in the dental implants were placed. We asked Ron what it's like having the lower denture with the dental implants and he said, "it's almost as good as my regular teeth. I've had no issues with them at all. They are very comfortable. I am very pleased with the bottom teeth. I've can chew steak, fish, potatoes, chicken, pizza, lasagna...no issues at all eating with the bottoms. The best thing I could have done for me, was getting the clip-in denture. The procedure, including the teeth extractions, and Brock doing his thing, it all worked out well for me. If you're thinking about it, then it's the way to go!"

Now, there is two differences between Ron and Sara. For Sara, she had two lower dental implants placed instead of 4, like Ron and she didn't need any teeth extracted since she was already wearing full dentures for many years prior. When we asked Sara about the procedure to have the dental implants placed,

she said, "My lower denture kept place, so that's why I wanted to get the dental implants. Having the dental implants put in wasn't scary. In fact, I felt really good after. I could feel the drilling pressure into the bone, but it didn't hurt after, I went home and it felt good. On a scale from 1-10 for soreness afterwards I would say it was a 1, no problem, really. I just kept rinsing with warm water. Now having the denture clicked in feels right; it's not moving. For someone thinking about the dental implants for their denture, I would say, if it'll work for you, then why not, eh?"

Isn't it wonderful to hear real stories of people in your neighbourhood who have made the decision for dental implants? reasons [algae] happens, but I think the biggest one is the treated and raw sewage coming out of the treatment plants in Winnipeg that go right in the Red and Assiniboine rivers and north into the lake's south basin."

It's well known that Winnipeg's North End Water Pollution Control Centre is not in compliance with phosphorus levels set by the provincial government and that the government has given the city a pass. In addition to treated wastewater that contains phosphorus and other pollutants that aren't removed by the treatment process, the city's combined sewers send raw sewage directly into rivers. That makes the problem worse as they release additional phosphorus plus bacteria and debris that eventually flow into Lake Winnipeg.

According the City of Winnipeg's untreated sewage webpage, the latest combined sewer overflow (CSO) sent about 0.03 megalitres of raw sewage into the Assiniboine River starting on Sept. 18 and lasting for approximately six days and eight hours. On Sept. 1, another 0.03 megalitres poured into

the Assiniboine for about three hours and 50 minutes. And on Aug. 15, a further 0.17 megalitres spilled into the Assiniboine.

About a third of Winnipeg has CSOs, which were designed to prevent the flooding of city basements. There are about 22 combined sewer spills a year on average — at each outfall. The city has 76 outfalls.

In 2017 the provincial Conservative government gave the City of Winnipeg 27 years (until 2045) to reduce its CSOs by 85 per cent.

Damm said he and council have broached water quality issues with Selkirk-Interlake-Eastman MP James Bezan, showing him photos of algae and hoping "we can get some assistance from the federal government going forward."

Canada and the U.S. have worked together on cleaning up Lake Erie, he said, yet residents along Lake Winnipeg are "pushing against our own backyard (Winnipeg)" and against the phosphorus and other pollutants coming up from the U.S. via the Red River.

"On top of that, our own agriculture industry adds to this problem. But the

low-hanging fruit is the sewer discharge out of Winnipeg," said Damm. "Every time a toilet is flushed down there, we end up with it in our front yards. I'd love to take my garbage and dump it on city hall in Winnipeg every time this happens and see how they appreciate that."

Damm said council would like to send a delegation to Winnipeg council to ask them why they're "sitting on this" when they have money for other infrastructure projects.

"If they had to drink a glass of this water or go swimming or send their grandkids in the lake, I doubt they'd do it," he said.

Gimli and other communities along the lake — including Indigenous communities — rely on commercial fishing, and Damm said he would not like to see a decline in that industry, in the recreational industry and a further decline in wildlife species because the "province can't put laws in to protect this lake and enforce them."

When asked last week if anyone from the provincial department of environment and climate would be testing the water in the Arnes/Silver Harbour area to see if human health

could be at risk, a spokesperson for the department said no algae were found.

"Staff from the Department of Environment and Climate have investigated reports of an algal bloom on the west side of Lake Winnipeg. However, no algae have been present to be sampled. This is not unusual as algal blooms can form and then disperse quickly, especially with windy conditions and cooler temperatures," said the spokesperson.

"When algal blooms appear during the recreational water quality season, samples are tested and results are compared to water quality objectives as part of the Clean Beaches Program. The program, which is managed by Environment and Climate in conjunction with Manitoba Health, provides information on how to protect beaches and reduce recreational health risks."

When asked what the newly elected NDP government plans to do regarding algal blooms on Lake Winnipeg, the spokesperson referred the *Express* to a party spokesperson as no cabinet had yet been chosen. There was no response by deadline.

While the SARAH Crisis Program is accessible for survivors 24/7 throughout the Interlake and Eastern region,

The Rockwood Quarry Producers sponsored the youth division -Glacier Stone, Heidelberg, LaFarge, Maple Leaf Construction, Standard Limestone Quarries. They named the division after local Angele Deprez, who's spent a lot of time in her life working with and for the goose shoot.

Deprez is 96 years old. She's dedicated much of her time and land to the goose shoot over the years.

Teams Gushue and Einarson to represent Canada at the 2023 Pan Continental Championships

The 2023 Pan Continental Curling Championships commence later this month and some familiar teams will once again represent Canada at the event.

Reigning 2023 Brier and Scotties champions, Team Brad Gushue of St. John's, N.L., and Team Kerri Einarson of Gimli, will wear the Maple Leaf at the second edition of the Pan Continentals, hosted at the Kelowna Curling Club in British Columbia from Oct. 29 to Nov. 4.

The Pan Continental Curling Championships will decide which nations from the Americas, Asia and Pacific regions will compete at the upcoming 2024 world women's and men's curling championships this season. The top five finishers will secure their World Championship berths, although in the case of countries hosting a world championship, their berths are already secure.

That is the case for the Canadian women's team because the 2024 BKT Tires World Women's Curling Cham-

pionship will be in Sydney, N.S. However, Team Einarson (skip Einarson, vice-skip Val Sweeting, second Shannon Birchard, lead Briane Harris and coach Reid Carruthers) must maintain its standing within the A Division of the event to provide Canada with a chance to earn its berth in the 2025 World Women's Championship held outside of Canada.

"It means so much to wear the red and white on home soil, especially in beautiful Kelowna. We're looking forward to competing at this event again and it's always an honour to represent Canada," Einarson said.

Team Gushue (skip Gushue, viceskip Mark Nichols, second E.J. Harnden, lead Geoff Walker and coach Caleb Flaxey), on the other hand, must finish in the top five to qualify Canada for the 2024 World Men's Curling Championship in Schaffhausen, Swit-

"Yeah, that's a cool event. We're excited to play there, and we have Jim Cotter (of nearby Vernon) coming with us as our fifth man, which is going to be nice," said Gushue. "It'll be in Ottawa. Team Einarson captured fun to spend a week with him. Kelowna is a beautiful city, and I would imagine the ice is going to be pretty good."

The Kelowna Curling Club will surely provide some nostalgia for Gushue and Nichols. The duo represented Newfoundland and Labrador during the 1999 Canadian Juniors in that venue. The eventual Olympic gold medallists earned bronze at that event, losing to Ontario's John Morris in the semifinal.

Teams Gushue and Einarson achieved their goals last season at the inaugural Pan Continental Curling Championships in Calgary. Team Gushue earned Canada an historic gold medal, while Team Einarson took home the bronze medal at the event and qualified Canada for the world women's event.

Both teams won their respective Canadian championships and went on to represent the nation at the 2023 world championships. Team Gushue earned silver in front of a home-nation crowd

bronze overseas in Sandviken, Sweden, at the world women's event.

While Teams Gushue and Einarson are competing to earn Canada's spot at the world events and maintain their standing in the A Division, they are not guaranteed to compete at the upcoming world championships. That honour must be earned by winning the 2024 Scotties Tournament of Hearts in Calgary and the 2024 Montana's Brier in Regina, where both teams are representing Canada as the reigning champions.

In Kelowna, men's teams from Australia, Chinese Taipei, Guyana, Japan, New Zealand, South Korea and the United States are competing. The women's event features Australia, Chinese Taipei, Japan, Mexico, New Zealand, South Korea and the United

Local horse crowned grand champion at national show

Theresa Barylski and her star horse, Gator (Only Shy Rad), were recently crowned the Grand Champion at the Canadian National Quarter Horse Show in Red Deer, Alta.

Barylski grew up on a horse ranch near Eriksdale. She moved to Carman in 2010 and has been in town ever since. Her parents, Kelly and Ruby Stuart, own and operate K & R Stuart Quarter Horses.

"Our farm specializes in purebred registered American Quarter Horses or AQHA (American Quarter Horse Association) horses," said Barylski. "This is the horse breed you see on most farms, in the movies and on shows like *Yellowstone*. AQHA head-quarters is based out of Amarillo, Texas. My parents have been on the AQHA leading breeders list of Performance and Halter horses five times and have been the AQHA high point Canadian Breeder three times."

Gator "Only Shy Rad" is a six-yearold horse that shows and competes at AQHA-sanctioned shows. This means the breed sanctions the judges,

and the achievements or points earned at these shows go on Gator's permanent pedigree or registration record.

Gator is his stable name, and Only Shy Rad is his registered name. If anyone wanted to look up his pedigree or show record, they would have to use Only Shy Rad.

"The name is chosen from his bloodline," said Barylski. "We try and use names of ac-

complished bloodlines in his name."

Barylski is considered an amateur or non-pro as she doesn't train outside horses. She rides her own horses that come from her parent's operation.

Barylski has both a coach and trainer that help her and Gator perform at the highest level. Until this show season, the pair were under the guidance of Dale Barkman of Alidale Farms in Steinbach. Currently, they are under the guidance of Deserie Rieu Bitz of Bentley, Alta.

At the end of August, Barylski and Gator recently competed at the Canadian National Quarter Horse Show in Red Deer, Alta. It was a five-day show with five judges from the United States.

Gator was entered in the Open (pro)

performance event, and he was the unanimous first-place choice from all five judges. He was then brought back for the Grand and Reserve event, and again, he was the unanimous Grand Champion under all five judges.

When it was all said and done, Gator won Grand Champion of the show under all five judges.

But it wasn't over yet. At the show's end, they called her back into the ring because any horse that went Grand Champion under any of the judges, can compete for the Canadian National Quarter Horse Superior Halter champion.

Gator "Only Shy Rad" was eventually crowned

the champion of the entire show.

"I still cry when I think about it, as it was an amazing moment," said Barylski. "It's a moment you dream of. What was even better was my parents drove to Red Deer for the day, and they were there to see it all. I was so happy for them. They work hard, and I'm so proud of them, so I'm unbelievably happy to have shared that day with them."

Gator was also named the Canadian National Show High Point Canadian Bred Horse.

"It's a testament to my parents' equine program. It was an unbelievable five days. Gator won every class he entered that day. I don't know if that happens very often at the national show, but I know I'll never forget it"

Barylski and Gator have travelled all over Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta for shows this season. Gator has also qualified for the World AQHA Show in November, which is to be held in Oklahoma City, Okla.

The 2024 show season will start in March, with the first show in Scott-sdale, Ariz., called the Sun Circuit. After that, they will participate in the Level 1 Championship in Las Vegas,

Nev., in May.

Barylski is proud to represent and bring attention to the AQHA industry within Manitoba and nationally.

"We have great horses in Canada. You don't have to go far to find them," said Barylski. "It really takes a village to get a horse to this level. And I couldn't have done any of this without my support group and loved ones."

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


