


wanted to do more this year. They donated \$250, and six members volunteered for the event.

Small acts of kindness make a world of difference at Betel Home

Gimli elves spread holiday cheer

More than 400 cards have been delivered to residents at Betel Home in Gimli.

The Gimli Christmas Elves have been hard at work this year, leaving no building or person untouched by their cheer. As they spruced up the town for the holiday season, the elves also decorated the personal care home

greens and golds in the hallways, in the communal rooms and all around the building and setting up Christmas trees around almost every corner.

The Gimli Christmas Elves also added something new to the PCH this year — a Christmas mailbox.

(PCH), hanging decorations of reds,

It sits right in front of Betel Home, seen from the multipurpose room. The elves and PCH staff and volunteers then got the word out about the new mailbox, inviting community members to send residents Christmas

"It's just a lovely idea," said Pat Nuspl, long-time volunteer with Betel Home. "We thought it was so great they came up with this."

Some classes in local schools decorated cards for Betel Home residents. Other organizations and groups got together to do so as well, and some people just made cards on their own time to send some Christmas cheer. Nuspl said a lot of residents had cards addressed directly to them after people called and asked for names to address their cards to. Not all cards were for someone specific, though — they don't have to be.

The cards started coming in mid-November, and in just a couple weeks, each of the 80 residents at Betel Home had three cards in their rooms. As of last week, more than 400 had been delivered to the PCH, with more coming in each day. The recreation co-ordinators at the home are the ones checking the Christmas mailbox and sorting through the cards, then delivering them to the residents.

"It was a really nice outpouring from the community when this opportunity came," said Nuspl.

Gimli council approves short-term rental and accommodation tax bylaws

Gimli has officially joined the ranks of the select few communities in Manitoba that have adopted bylaws to regulate short-term rentals (STRs).

After numerous complaints about STRs in the municipality, council set out to establish bylaws to protect property owners from ungoverned behaviours that disrupt the peace, as well as ensure rental properties won't endanger guests.

Council gave second and final reading to its Short Term Rental Bylaw (No. 23-0011) and its Accommodation Tax Bylaw (23-0012) during its regular council meeting on Dec. 13.

Coun. Thora Palson said there are very few communities in Manitoba - the City of Winnipeg and the Municipality of Harrison Park (near Riding Mountain) being two — that have established bylaws for STRs, and it shows Gimli's willingness to tackle pressing issues affecting the entire municipality.

"This is new territory as far as legislation goes. Winnipeg and other places in Manitoba do have regulatory bylaws for STRs, but there are very few. This characterizes Gimli as a trailblazer going forward with these types of regulations," said Palson. "I want

to thank the community for engaging with us on STRs, and I really appreciate everyone who submitted letters, participated in our STR survey and attended our open house. That feedback guided this process and made it specific and relevant to Gimli."

The Short Term Rental Bylaw requires STR operators to pay an annual licence fee of \$200 for each dwelling unit rented. Operators can receive a maximum suspension of 30 days if they fail to adhere to regulations that include placing limits on the number of guests per bedroom, having fire extinguishers, smoke and carbon monoxide detectors on each floor, maintaining quiet hours between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m., banning additional accommodations in motor vehicles, trailers or tents and posting a valid STR licence number in advertisements, among other requirements.

Between first reading of the bylaws in November and second and third reading in December, Palson said 15 people wrote to the municipality with suggested changes and the RM made some amendments. Changes were made, for example, to the wording of the STR bylaw with regard to condominiums. It formerly required a condo applicant to seek permission from his/her condo board. That was changed to having the applicant provide a copy of a condo's bylaws, which should state the position on

DJ Sigmundson, who was the strategic project co-ordinator for the establishment of the bylaws and worked with the RM's lawyer, said it will be easy for the RM to determine who's trying to operate an STR under the radar.

"The bylaw requires people advertising their STRs to put their licence number on their ad. It will be very easy for us to look at those ads and see who doesn't have one," said Sigmundson. "Generally, bylaw enforcement in Manitoba municipalities is complaint-driven, so there'll not likely be a lot of proactive effort on our part. If we become aware of illegal operations, we'll take enforcement measures."

In addition to the possibility of having one's STR licence suspended, the operator could be "fined heavily" if they disregard the suspension, he said.

The Accommodation Tax Bylaw states that people renting an STR

must pay five per cent of the purchase price (excluding the federal GST) of their accommodation, and the STR operator will then forward that on to the municipality. The taxes will support tourism and recreation.

The RM will deposit accommodation taxes into a municipal reserve fund, which was established for the "specific purpose of collecting the accommodation tax for promoting and supporting local tourism, recreation, and leisure initiatives, and developing and improving the municipal waterfront areas and expending such funds for eligible costs arising from the specific purpose."

If operators fail to forward the accommodation tax to the RM, they can be subject to on-site visits for the purpose of collecting those taxes or to an audit of their books, records and electronic files in order to determine the amount owed.

A penalty of five per cent will be charged, as well as the amount of unpaid taxes, against operators who fail to remit the accommodation taxes.

Failure to pay the outstanding owned and the penalty can result in

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Volunteers gather to help build Lundar's outdoor rink

Lundar community members got together recently to build the town's outdoor rink.

The Rural Municipality of Coldwell put out a call earlier this month asking for volunteers to help build the outdoor rink. On Sunday, Dec. 10, seven adults and two children showed up to help RM recreation director Breanna Malcolm create the annual ice rink.

The rink, which sits in the Lundar Arena parking lot, was first built during the COVID-19 pandemic when restrictions were heavy and organized sports were on pause. With a limit on the number of skaters at a time, the outdoor rink was built and used daily by many community members.

Malcolm said the point of the rink

initially was to give locals a way to stay active, healthy and safe; that goal remains today.

"As the recreation director, I like to see people active," she said. "Activity doesn't always have to be organized."

Using wooden boards from a local, the volunteers first had to sand them and lay a poly material down before they could stand them up. Once the boards were up, the rink had a shape, and the volunteers could start flooding the space with help from the local fire department.

Lundar's foreman helps set up the rink, maintains it throughout the winter and helps with takedown in the spring. Malcolm said his work makes the outdoor rink possible.

Even thought the volunteers did get

the job done last weekend, Malcolm hoped for more support. She said she'd like to see more children who utilize the outdoor rink to help set it up, and she hopes to see more of them volunteering next year. The process took just two and a half hours, having everyone home before 1 p.m.

Each year, Malcolm asks the community if they want the outdoor rink again, and each year they do. She gauges the success of the outdoor rink by the number of people utilizing it.

"I like driving by and seeing people having fun and being active together," she said.

The outdoor rink will be in the Lundar arena parking lot all winter. The ice is still too soft to skate on, but Malcolm is hopeful it will be ready for skaters by the Christmas break. To keep up to date on its opening, follow the RM of Coldwell Recreation on Facebook as Malcolm will post updates there.

a fine of up to \$1,000 (for individual operators) and/or imprisonment not exceeding six months. The fine for corporations operating an STR and failing to pay the tax is \$5,000.

"[Jail time] is pretty standard language; all the regulatory bylaws have a fine or jail," said Sigmundson.

As far as estimates regarding revenues from STR regulation, Sigmundson said "it's a tough number to give" as the RM hasn't registered STRs before. If there are 200 STRs operating in the RM, licence revenue would be \$40,000. How much the RM will make under the tax bylaw depends on how often an STR gets rented out.

The tax bylaw requires approval from Manitoba's lieutenant-governor, and Sigmundson said he's not sure when that will be granted. The shortterm bylaw will come into effect on Jan. 1, 2024.

"We won't be enforcing anything, though, in January because we're allowing a transition or phase-in period of three months for people to address any deficiencies they might have under Manitoba's Building Code. If your dwelling is not up to code right now, you might have to make upgrades before you apply for a licence," he said. "We'll start enforcing the STR bylaw on April 1."

Other council news:

- The RM posted its consolidated financial statements for the year ending Dec. 31, 2022, under the December meeting agenda.
- The RM also posted under its agenda an emergency response plan for 2024 that was prepared by Napier **Emergency Consulting.**

The plan provides information on how to handle a major emergency or disaster, as well as establishes best practices in emergency management. The plan identifies the roles and responsibilities of municipal mayors/ reeves, chief administrative officers, RM staff, first responders and municipal emergency co-ordinators, and covers topics such as mutual aid, response timelines, threat assessments, public alerts, evacuations for communities such as Willow Island, shelterin-place preparations and damage assessments.

- Council approved the designation of the Hollenberg Cottage as a building of architectural or historic value after a public hearing. The cottage is located at 24 North Lake St. in Loni Beach
- Council granted Caliana Developments a second extension after the developer asked for more time to begin construction of duplexes on Wedgewood Place near Sigurbjorg Stefansson Early School.

She said the residents have been thrilled to receive the Christmas cards. With recent respiratory illness outbreaks, the PCH hasn't been able to have gatherings, so receiving the cards is a safe way for them to connect with the community.

"It's very important for the community and the residents to connect," said Nuspl. "Stuff like this actually makes it more enjoyable because [staff] can sit down with [the residents] and show them the cards when there aren't the same activities there usually is for them."

The mailbox at Betel Home will be up until the end of the holiday season. Everyone is welcome to create, sign and send cards to the residents. All they have to do is drop it off in the mailbox in front of the building.

This outpouring from the community has brought immeasurable delight not only to the residents but also to the dedicated staff and volunteers at Betel Home.







Be grateful that we have such an outstanding medical facility

Dear Editor:

I recently visited the Gimli Health Centre (GHC) emergency room after suffering from three days of unexplained severe and worsening abdominal pain and swelling. I am sharing my experience with residents of the Gimli area because my first overnight stay in the GHC revealed to me the great services and facilities available to residents.

After waiting nine hours on Saturday to get a response from the Manitoba funded "Q-Doc" website, my wife drove me to the GHC ER at 9 a.m. Sunday morning. Fortunately, the ER was not yet overly busy, and I was admitted promptly, examined

and sent for a blood test and abdominal X-rays, both of which were done in the GHC. From the results of these tests, the physician assistant on staff identified my pancreas as the likely cause of my problems. He immediately arranged for a CT scan in the Selkirk hospital. My wife was asked to drive me there as there is a continuing shortage of EMT ambulance staff. By 3 p.m. the results of the CT scan had been sent back to the GHC and I was on my way back to Gimli.

By 5 p.m. I was on a hospital bed of a private room hooked up to IVs giving me two different types of antibiotics, a room that became my unexpected home for eight more days while I slowly recovered from a severely inflamed pancreas. During this time, I received compassionate, competent care and could only admire how well the medical, nursing and housekeeping staff worked so co-operatively together to monitor and treat my condition and make me as comfortable as possible.

On the eighth day, my condition had improved enough that I was discharged with prescriptions for another seven days of oral antibiotics. Ten days later my doctor, Jonah Fulmore, examined me and agreed I was continuing to progress well and may well have no lasting health effects from my pancreatitis attack.

This hospital experience — my first serious illness in my 77 years — has been a life-changing experience for me because I was in such a weakened state during the first few days, I really questioned whether I would recover. My experience in the GHC compels me to offer this advice to other Gimli residents: live a healthy lifestyle, follow your doctor's advice and when you really need to use the GHC emergency room services, be grateful that we have such an outstanding medical facility staffed by caring and very competent medical staff dedicated to helping us.

On a regular basis, I make a point of being kind to my friends, family and people I interact with. It has made a real difference in my life. I am a happy person. I don't experience disappointment about other people's behaviours. Feeling in control of my emotions is paramount. Life is good.

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


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Betel Home hosting raffle fundraiser to raise money for programming

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Matlock Christmas lights tour returns for a second year

Last year marked the first time Matlock organized a Christmas lights tour for the town. Thanks to a Matlock Recreation Club volunteer, the idea to create a map of all the lit-up streets came to fruition, and the community response was nothing but positive. For the holiday season, people could grab a map and embark on the Matlock Christmas Lights Tour, complete with 10 streets of twinkling lights and displays.

Recreation co-ordinator Crystal Thordarson said after last year's tour, lots of people told them just how much they enjoyed it, with local businesses even making it into a company Christmas outing.

"We had such positive feedback from last year's tour that we decided to offer it again for our community," she said.

This year's Christmas Lights Tour includes seven streets of houses with lights of all colours, blowup displays

and festive decorations. Each street on the tour is added when a member of that street contacts the recreation club.

"There are no lights or decorations too small for the tour," said Thordarson. "This is just something fun we wanted to do for our community, and any house that has any lights or decorations is more than welcome to call and have their street name added to the map."

As of last Wednesday, the map is complete and copies can be picked up at the recreation club or at Matlock Village Junction, which is open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. seven days a week. Everyone is welcome and encouraged to grab a map for free and take the tour at their own leisure.

People can tour however they want — on foot, by sled or in a vehicle. Next year, Matlock Recreation Club is hoping to offer hayrides with the Christmas Lights Tour. acute stroke and neuroscience unit.







Manitoba's 123rd Christmas Bird Count is underway around the province

Instead of counting the number of holiday parties you're going to, what if you counted birds instead? From Dec. 14 to Jan. 5, the Christmas Bird Count, North America's longestrunning citizen science project, takes place and anyone interested can participate.


The Christmas Bird Count was created in 1900 by conservationists to encourage the public to count birds instead of hunting them. According to the official rules, each count is done in

a circle with a 24-kilometre diameter. Each circle has a compiler who selects a count day, co-ordinates with the

volunteers and divides everyone up to cover the circle depending on how many people are participating and if they are solo or going out in groups. A Season for Remembering

this year.

Volunteer birders receive checklists, signs that say "Christmas Bird Count In Progress" (if they are driving) and maps outlining their allocated area. They then travel by foot, ski, snowshoe or vehicle to look, listen and record the number and types of birds they see. Volunteers can also watch their feeders and count from indoors or use a combination of methods to count the birds in their area. Often, at the end of the count day, everyone gathers to enjoy refreshments and discuss what they saw.

"I like the comradeship," said Bonnie Chartier, the organizer for the Gimli count. "It's a small community, and it's fun to catch up with people."

In addition to organizing the Gimli count on Dec. 19, she helps count in other circles since she's an experienced birder. However, you don't need to be an experienced birder to participate in the Christmas Bird Count.

"With new people, you make sure to put them with someone who's an experienced birder so they can learn

the differences between a northern hawk owl and a great grey owl, for example," says Chartier.

The information volunteers document through the Christmas Bird Count is important for assessing longterm trends in the bird populations of North America. Gerald Machnee, the organizer for the Selkirk count, says some birds are not observed every year, while a few have been observed only a few times in 30 years.

"There have been a few birds that should not be here for the Christmas Bird Count, especially the yellowrumped warbler that was counted in 2015," says Machnee. "They will not survive once the temperature goes below about -20 C."

Manitoba's collective Christmas Bird Count data results from hundreds of hours of observation and thousands of kilometres covered by volunteers. Last year, the house sparrow counted the most (21,213 times) followed by the common redpoll (6,546 times), then snow buntings (5,824 times).

James Duncan is the creator of Discover Owls, a retired conservation zoologist, and the organizer for the Balmoral Christmas Bird Count for almost 30 years. Duncan says that doing and publishing scientific research plays an essential role. Still, unless you get the public invested and involved by making nature a part of their lives, the research alone lacks the "conservation punch" needed to drive change.

"It's reasonably easy for the general public to participate in, and it provides people with an opportunity to have fun with family and friends while having these experiences counting birds ... [and] making valuable contributions to our knowledge of bird pop-

ulations," said "Most Duncan. importantly, they become stronadvocates against things that may impact birds ... because they've been getting up close and personal count-

ing them."

Chartier has been birding for almost 30 years. She remembers wondering what made birding so interesting until she saw a common redpoll through binoculars for the first time.

"I've been birding since I was a young person in Churchill. It started because I was just curious what all these ladies in goofy hats were looking at. I spotted a small brown bird with a red cap and a red chest. After that, I wanted to see what they all look like up close. When you see them through binoculars, it's so different."



It hurts so good at Gimli's River Rock Massage Therapy Clinic

People can say goodbye to tension and pain at Gimli's River Rock Massage Therapy Clinic and say hello to a spanking new renovated clinic and additional services.

Clinic owner and registered massage therapist Jennifer Krulicki and her staff threw a grand opening celebration on Dec. 15 at the clinic's new location at the corner of Seventh Avenue (Highway 9) and North Fifth Avenue (at PR 231). The newly renovated building used to house the Gimli Junction store. The celebration included door prizes, wine and cheese and guests including Gimli council members and Interlake-Gimli MLA Derek Johnson.

River Rock continues to offer therapies that get down to the root of pain and provide a good dose of relaxation to clients in Gimli and surrounding communities such as Arborg, Riverton and Winnipeg Beach.

"For the most part people come in for rehabilitation services and for their overall health and well-being," said Krulicki. "We do get clients coming in with injuries. We'll do a lot of assessment and provide a treatment plan to get to the root cause of the pain. Clientele typically come once a month as it hurts so good."

The River Rock Massage Therapy Clinic opened in Gimli in April 2013, becoming the first clinic specializing in remedial massage therapy. Remedial MT employs a wide variety of skilled massage techniques including deep strokes, wringing, skin rolling and compression to relieve aches and

pain and help treat injuries and repetitive movements or positions that can put stress on muscles and ligaments.

In addition to different types of massages, the clinic is offering a number of expanded services.

Those include infrared sauna, which uses infrared light waves to penetrate the skin; osteopathy, which focuses on the manipulation of soft tissues and bones; reflexology, which uses pressure points to relieve tension; acupuncture for pain relief and improved bodily functioning; and holistic nutrition, a philosophy that considers a person's physical, chemical, mental, emotional and spiritual well-being.

Other services include addressing TMJ dysfunction (the temporomandibular joint can cause pain in the jaw) and craniosacral therapy to relieve tension from headaches and neck pain.

Clients and members of the public can also purchase a number of products from the clinic's boutique to help them unwind after a stressful day or pamper their loved ones. Products include health supplements, teas, Japanese mint oil, Epsom salts, Bonnie's handmade soaps, Hartmont candles, towels, massage ball rollers, foot rollers, foam rollers, scalp massagers and silicone ice face massagers. Gift certificates are also available.

Krulicki has a suggestion box in which people can let her know what kinds of services they'd like to see offered.

"I'd like to know what they're interested in seeing here so that I can bring in other modalities," she said. "I want

care spaces in St. Laurent and employ up to 25 people at any given time.

- Collagen: This structural protein is available in a powdered supplement form that can easily be added to juice or a smoothie, which is convenient and crucial to top up as we age. Our natural production of collagen decreases gradually over time, so trying new items, like bone broth, ensure your system has a good source consistently. Getting more protein from egg whites and meat has help, too, since these foods offer proline and glycine, amino acids that are used for collagen synthesis.
- Vitamin C: Another key element in collagen production is Vitamin C, readily available in peppers, citrus fruits, and strawberries.

- Omega-3 Fatty Acids: Inflammation is often the root cause of discomfort, so addressing this issue through food selection is worth the effort. Seafoods and nuts, particularly mackerel and walnuts, are superpowers for their anti-inflammatory properties. It's been shown that individuals with arthritis benefits from adding salmon to their diet.

The most simple way to reduce joint friction is by keeping them lubricated with high water consumption. Drink about eight cups daily, or be conscious to sip often, to avoid dehydra-

Finally, move that body! Excessive weight puts strain on your joints, so keep a healthy body composition along with proper nutrition.

To prepare cookies: In large bowl, beat butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Add vanilla and egg; beat until well combined. Scrape sides of bowl as needed. Add flour and salt; beat until just combined.

Dump mixture onto lightly floured surface and divide in half. Shape each half into disks and wrap with plastic wrap. Refrigerate 30 minutes.

Preheat oven to 350 F. Line two baking sheets with parchment paper.

Working on lightly floured surface, roll dough to 1/2-inch thick. Cut cookies using ornament-shaped cookie cutter. Place cookies on prepared pans and bake 18-20 minutes, or until golden brown. Remove from oven and cool at room temperature.

To make royal icing: In large mixing bowl, combine powdered sugar, meringue powder and 1/3 cup water. Beat on low speed until combined. Increase speed to medium-high and beat 8-10 minutes, adding 2-3 tablespoons warm water, as necessary. Icing should be stiff enough to hold peak when tested.

Color royal icing with food coloring and decorate cookies.

Short Term Rental Regulations Approved by Gimli Council December 14, 2023

The Rural Municipality of Gimli has passed by-laws to regulate short term rentals within the municipality.

The by-law was developed following an unprecedented public consultation for a regulatory by-law, which included a survey with over 1000 participants and a well-attended open house. The by-law was introduced on November 15, 2023, and the public was invited to provide comments prior to 2nd and 3rd readings of the by-law. In total, 15 submissions were received from individuals who took the time to offer suggestions for improving the by-law or offer supportive comments. As a result, the by-law was modified to reflect the concerns regarding the requirements for condominium corporations.

The by-law will come into effect on January 1, 2024. Operators of short-term rental accommodations may need some time to comply with the new regulations; therefore, enforcement of the by-law will be deferred until April 1, 2024. Owners of STRs should view the requirements contained within the by-law and frequently asked questions at http://www.gimli.ca and assess if their property conforms to the regulations or if action is required to be compliant. Application forms will be available as of December 22, 2023.

The Accommodation Tax By-law requires provincial approval before it is implemented. Once approved, revenues will be collected and placed in a fund to promote and support local tourism, recreation, and leisure initiatives and develop and improve the municipal waterfront areas. "This is an exciting step forward for our community," says Mayor Kevin Chudd. "Accommodation taxes have been common in Manitoba for many years; one difference is this tax is typically applied only to hotels, whereas Gimli will be applying it to short-term accommodation as well. This is a first in Manitoba."
