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

Inspiring Manitobans to learn about Louis Riel

Gimli Red River Métis honour provincial founder and honorary first premier

Members of the Gimli Red River Métis Local were among the hundreds of people who gathered at Louis Riel's gravesite at St. Boniface Cathedral on Louis Riel Day (Feb. 19) to witness the ceremonial presentation of the Louis Riel Act and pay tribute to the man who founded Manitoba and fought for Indigenous rights.

The Manitoba government passed legislation in 2023 to give Riel (1844-1885) the honorary title of first premier of Manitoba. On Feb. 19 the government updated the Métis leader's portrait in the legislature to reflect his

Austfjord said the highlight of the day for her was the acknowledgement of Riel as first premier.

"The Louis Riel Act is the culmination of more than 30 years of advocacy for the Métis people of Manitoba, recognizing Louis Riel as the first

premier of Manitoba. Standing there while history is corrected before my eyes is something that will be read in history books for generations after me," said Austfjord. "I can say I was there while it happened and followed [Manitoba Métis Federation] president David Chartrand for many years as he fought for this day. It was a proud day for all Red River Métis."

Riel defended the rights of Métis people. He was born in the Red River settlement, educated in St. Boniface and Montreal and elected three times to the House of Commons, which expelled him for his participation in the

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City of Winnipeg's 15-day raw sewage discharge 'shocking and horrific'

Winnipeg's notoriety as a polluter of fresh water amped up this month after a raw sewage spill of nearly 230 million litres was discharged from the City of Winnipeg into the Red River over the course of at least 15 days.

Between Feb. 7 and Feb. 21, an outfall at 3100 Abinojii Mikanah (formerly called Bishop Grandin) discharged an estimated 228.39 million litres (or megalitres) of untreated human waste and other hazardous substances into the river, which flows into Lake Win-

A planned leakage test carried out by the city on Nov. 29, 2023, discovered that the integrity of two sewer pipes, installed across the river in

1970, were compromised. One pipe had a "significant leak," resulting in an "unknown" amount of raw sewage entering the Red River for an "unknown" period of time. City workers "plugged the pipe," according to incident details the city posts on its untreated sewage report webpage. The second pipe — into which sewage had been diverted — was believed to have "defects." The city indicated it would "gather information to help us determine how to best move forward with the repair or replacement of these pipes." Work on the pipes started this month.

Communities and commercial fishers along Lake Winnipeg are outraged and bracing for environmental

fallout, a potential hit to their economies and disruption to their tourism sector, which includes angling.

Town of Winnipeg Beach Mayor Pam Jackson called the sewage spill "shocking and horrific" and will likely lead to long-term consequences for the community and the lake.

"It's horrible news for our town, our residents and for our lake. Of course, this will contribute to what I expect will be significant, possibly toxic, algal blooms this year, which will affect the lake itself and everyone who enjoys Lake Winnipeg," said Jackson.

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Hope for Spring: Icelandic violinist holding free concert in Gimli this Sunday

An Icelandic violinist will be performing in Gimli this Sunday as part of his visit to Manitoba, and there's no charge to the community to see him.

Sibbi Bernhardsson, who is professor of violin at Oberlin Conservatory in Ohio, was invited by the University of Manitoba's Desautels Faculty of Music to teach a master class, which features a highly proficient artist/teacher who works with students or ensembles.


Tristin Tergesen, who is manager of the Gimli Waterfront Centre and Betel Home Foundation, said the University of Manitoba reached out to her to ask whether it would be possible to bring Bernhardsson to town.

"The person at the university — who's connected to our Îcelandic community — saw an opportunity to bring Bernhardsson to Gimli, and contacted me and asked if I'd be willing to help facilitate that," said Tergesen.

The concert will feature compositions of Icelandic and Icelandic-Canadian composers, one of whom is Kenley Kristofferson, who grew up in Gimli. The other composers are Icelanders Anna Thorvaldsdottir and Thorkell Sigurbjörnsson, and Icelandic-Canadian Fjola Evans.

Two masters of music candidates, Miguel Stamato (viola) and Breno Barone (cello), will be performing Johannes Brahms' String Sextet No. 2 in G. Major, Opus 36.

The cost to bring Bernhardsson to Gimli is cov-



ered.

"The nice part for us is that all the costs were covered already through the university and the Government of Iceland around bringing this artist to Canada to do the master class," said Tergesen. "And this is really a nice opportunity for people in our community to hear the performance."

The concert is also being co-sponsored by Gimli

Icelandic Canadian Society and the Icelandic National League of North America.

Johnson Hall in the Waterfront Centre has seating for 150 people. The Hope for Spring concert will take place at 2 p.m. on Sunday, March 3.

13th Annual Gimli Ice Festival gearing up to beat the winter blahs

The Gimli Ice Festival will be rolling out its 13th annual winter festival this weekend with two full days of activities to entertain the crowds.

GIF co-chair Susan Holfeuer, who's been busy preparing for the festival and meeting with volunteers, said the festival was nominated by Manitoba Travel for a rural community festival award and is currently one of the finalists.

"We're just thrilled to be in the Top 3. That's already a win for us and it helps put Gimli on the map," said Holfeuer. The festival is offering a number of new activities

"The hockey skills competition is new this year and we've got Hidden Treasures Studio offering an art class where people can make a polar bear suncatcher," said Holfeuer. "We're also bringing back Cooley's (festival mascot) indoor playground, which we haven't offered since before the COVID pandemic."

The hockey skills competition has three different skills events for U7 to U18+ (females and males) with a chance to win medals and bragging rights. The event will take place at the Gimli Recreation Centre on Saturday from 1 to 4 p.m. Despite the relatively balmy temperatures that hit Manitoba near the end of January, the Fire on Ice Car Racing (on Saturday and Sunday) and the Ice Man Motorcycle Ice Racing (on Sunday) is scheduled to go ahead on Lake Winnipeg as there is sufficient ice to accommodate

"The car racing and the motorcycle racing will be a go for sure," said Holfeuer. "We've got over 30 drivers already registered for the motorcycle racing."

The New Iceland Heritage Museum will be playing host to a Winter Photo Expression Exhibition and a beading workshop on both days of the festival, she said. And the Lakeview Resort will be playing host to a Manitoba Métis Federation artisan craft show.

Those who like a good outdoor run can register to run in A Viking's Challenge, Battle of the Bay, which is a fundraiser for the Save Your Skin Foundation.

There will be plenty of grub for festival-goers at local restaurants and on the festival site itself. The Gimli Kiwanis Club will be serving up a pancake breakfast on Sunday morning at the harbour, and people can enjoy bannock and tea and maple syrup taffy on a stick near the Lake Winnipeg Visitor Centre.

The festival wouldn't be complete without the Vikings sharpening their spears and doing battle at Gimli Harbour. The re-enactments are performed by The Hands of Lugh. And festival favourites such as the frozen fish toss and the frozen T-shirt contest will be offered.

On Saturday, fireworks will light up the night at Gimli Harbour starting at 7 p.m. followed by entertainment at the Lakeview Resort.

The festival kicks off on Friday, March 1 with the Gimli Ice Festispiel doubles curling bonspiel at the Gimli Recreation Centre followed by two days of icy fun. Festival passes are \$5 and are required to get into some venues. Please refer to the festival schedule on the Gimli Ice Festival's website as some event offerings are subject to change.





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Lake Manitoba commercial fishery closes early, first time since '90s

The provincial government closed the Lake Manitoba commercial fishery season early as the maximum quota for walleye (pickerel) and sauger was reached.

A spokesperson for the department of economic development, investment, trade and natural resources said this is the first year since the early 1990s that the fishery has had to close before the end of March.

"The department is closing the Lake Manitoba winter commercial net fishery for walleye and sauger on Feb. 24 as a result of the annual allowable quota being reached. This is the first year since 1991 that the Lake Manitoba quota (907,000 kilograms of walleye and sauger combined) has been reached and the fishery closed before the normal seasonal end date of March 31," said the spokesperson. "Working in collaboration with the Lake Manitoba Commercial Fishers Association, it was agreed that based on weekly production figures, the season would close on Feb. 24 to avoid exceeding the quota."

Fishers were given 10 days' notice before the closure.

All fishing nets had to be pulled and fish deliveries completed by the end of the day on Feb. 24, according to a notice from the fisheries section manager.

The department issued 285 commercial fishing licenses to Lake Manitoba fishers this year, the spokesperson said, and there are 12 fish sheds that operate around the lake to purchase fish from commercial fishers.

The early closure affects only commercial harvesters. Anglers and those

with a carp licence can continue fish-

"The commercial quota is regulated separately from the recreational harvest. Only the commercial fishery will be closing on Feb. 24 and other fishers are not affected," said the spokesperson. "In addition, Lake Manitoba fishers using a carp licence can continue to harvest carp for the remainder of the season."

The Lake Manitoba fishery is managed separately from Lake Winnipeg, and its harvest data was not accidentally combined with data from Lake Winnipeg.

"The closure of the Lake Manitoba commercial net fishery does not have impact on commercial fishing activities on Lake Winnipeg, as the Lake Winnipeg commercial fishery is managed separately," said the spokesper-

The Express was unable to reach the fishery association and fish sheds for comment.

"The amount of nitrogen and phosphorous this is releasing into Lake Winnipeg is appalling and will have significant long-term negative consequences. This will have a deleterious effect on our aquatic life, our fishers who make a living on the lake, the ecosystem and the overall health of our lake."

As stewards of Lake Winnipeg, Jackson said we're "failing miserably" on a lake under strain for years.

"This situation really speaks to the need for all politicians to have to courage and foresight to think of the longterm good of their communities, and make decisions based on what will be good for their community over decades and not just over four years," said Jackson. "That means maintaining and keeping in good repair all infrastructure, before it becomes so aged that we have these types of catastrophic events."

Gimli Mayor Kevin Chudd called the spill "shameful" and "disgusting" and said his community is concerned about the damaging effects the raw sewage will have on the environment, the commercial fishing industry and on tourism, which helps support the economic livelihood of the rural municipality.

"This is an environmental catastrophe," said Chudd. And given the sewage spill continued unabated for a reported 15 days, he wonders how the situation "would have been handled if the flows were going south" rather than north.

Apart from understandable feelings of revulsion to the spill, Chudd said this is no time to be "adversarial." Gimli would like to work collaboratively with Winnipeg to help it in any way possible to prevent raw sewage spills, which occur dozens of times every year. He'd also like to see the provincial and federal governments

"It's clearly evident the priority for us — and for a lot of people — is safeguarding one of the most precious natural resources we have — fresh water," said the mayor. "This isn't the first time there's been a major spill. Unfortunately, it won't be the last time. But we need to collaborate with all parties."

Chudd said the RM hadn't been informed by the city about the spill and council wants to see communication improved with municipalities downstream of Winnipeg.

Gimli Coun. Andy Damm said he reached out to Winnipeg Coun. Brian Mayes and discussed the incident with him and one of the city's engineers. He asked that communication with the RM be "stepped up" as well as with First Nations communities on the lake.

"In the future, water is going to be such a vital resource. I can see the potential for wars being fought over fresh water," said Damm. "And here we are using Lake Winnipeg as a dumping ground. We can't stand for this.

The RM plans to hold a summit on the issue with First Nations communities, the Manitoba Métis Federation, other towns on the lake, the province and the city "if [the city] wishes to show up to something like this," said Damm.

Commercial fisher Robert T. Kristjanson, who for decades has been calling attention to algal blooms on the lake, said he was left with a profound sense of shame after learning of the spill.

"We here along the shores of Lake Winnipeg will have to live with this monster of a spill," said Kristjanson. "It's so hypocritical of the City of Winnipeg to think that the people who live north of the city are unimportant. I'm so ashamed of Winnipeg and how they're failing to address what they're doing to our environment."

Kristjanson added that he wonders why environmental laws don't seem to apply to the city.

"I didn't know we we're in a country [i.e., region] separate from the rest of Canada in terms of laws," he said. "Does the City of Winnipeg have special dispensation from the federal and provincial governments to pollute our waterways? My God, the city should be ashamed of themselves for what they've done to the rest of Manitoba."

Lake Winnipeg commercial fisher and systems analyst Bill Buckels, who's faced outright denial in the past when he's reported to the province large volumes of fecal matter swirling off the coast of the Hecla-Grindstone region, said the city's 15day, non-stop raw sewage discharge is "absolutely outrageous.'

He's questioning where the city's contingency plan was when the spill was detected last November. And if there's no contingency plan for something so critical as protecting the environment and human health from hazardous waste, why isn't there one?

"To begin with, this is not some corporate entity called the city that should have had a contingency plan. Clearly, the accountable person, the mayor of Winnipeg Scott Gillingham, as well as all the people who work for him, should have had the sense to know in November their system was damaged and that any contingency such as further overloading it would fail. This spill may have lasted 15 days, but the knowledge that the pipe had failed was evident in November," said Buckels.

"There should have been a way at that time to redirect sewage to a hold-

ing area of some kind like a lagoon or pond while they replaced the damaged pipes. Any system, whether it's a computer system or a process of some sort — such as infection control in a tattoo parlour or a dishwasher to sterilize tableware in a restaurant must have proper risk analyses and failovers."

Buckels said there's apparently no way of "turning off raw sewage" from going into the Red or Assiniboine rivers, and municipal, provincial and federal politicians have failed over the years to rectify that, preferring instead to run in "reactive mode."

"Let's be clear about what politicians care about: politicians care about perception because, to them, perception is reality. They will not do any more than they have to in order to get people's votes. At this point they'd rather put money into planting trees along a pretty river walk on the Red River, which — let's face it — is just a big sewer for city waste to flow out to the lagoon they call Lake Winnipeg," said Buckels. "Who designs a sewer system that has no requirement to safely turn off or redirect the shit? It's obviously dysfunctional."

David Driedger, the City of Winnipeg's manager of corporate communications, said the two pipes that run under the river at the Fort Garry Bridge direct sewage from southwest Winnipeg to the South End Sewage Treatment Plant. In November the leaking 700-mm pipe was "immediately" taken out of service.

"The remaining pipe, an 800-mm pipe, was found to be in poor condition, but could still handle the flow across the river. Planning for a bypass system began at that time," said Driedger. "The bypass system, made up of temporary new pipes, would allow us to continue directing sewage to the treatment plant. We could then take the existing pipes out of service until [they] could be permanently replaced."

Work on the bypass system — sewage pipes laid across the Fort Garry Bridge — to restore sewage collection capacity started on Feb. 5, he said. On Feb. 7, two days after the work started, the second pipe (800 mm) failed.

"Due to this second failure, the work to assemble the bypass system over the bridge was accelerated," said Driedger. "Provincial and federal agencies were notified of this environmental issue."

Crews will be continuously monitoring the bypass system, making adjustments as necessary to ensure it's reliable, he said.

"It's expected the bypass system will be in place until the river-crossing pipes that failed can be replaced. Work to replace the pipes will begin right away, with construction continuing in 2025," said Driedger. "Under normal circumstances, the work involved in building a bypass system

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

Manitoba government funds wheelchair repair jobs

Last Friday, the Manitoba government, represented by Families Minister Nahanni Fontaine and Health, Seniors and Long-Term Care Minister Uzoma Asagwara, announced initiatives to address the freeze on funding for Manitoba Possible's wheelchair repair program. These include allocating over \$288,000 to hire additional repair technicians.

According to Fontaine, the government has taken note that the correct wheelchair can greatly impact the lives of individuals with disabilities in Manitoba. It is unacceptable to make people wait for weeks for essential tools they require on a daily basis. This funding will decrease wait times and enhance accessibility to wheelchair services, ensuring that all Manitobans receive prompt and secure repairs and modifications.

Through Manitoba Possible, over 14,000 residents can access various forms of mobility support such as

long-term loans for both manual and motorized wheelchairs. This program also offers maintenance and modification services to cater to individual mobility requirements. With this recent investment, Manitoba Possible will expand its repair team by hiring one more in-house technician and one new field technician who will be able to provide repair services directly to clients at their homes, workplaces or schools.

"Our government is committed to making Manitoba more accessible for everyone, no matter where you live," said Asagwara. "This funding will ensure Manitoba Possible can continue to expand their essential work to the many Manitobans who count on them including working towards restoring better service for our rural and northern neighbours."

"As a powerchair user from rural Manitoba, this will bring some ease

Red River Resistance of 1869-1870. He led a provisional government that negotiated Manitoba's entry into Confederation in 1870. Later fearing lynching, Riel fled to the United States. Asked to negotiate for Saskatchewan Métis, Riel returned and in 1885 the Canadian government charged him with high treason and hanged him. He is buried at the St. Boniface Cathedral.

In 1992 Riel was declared founder of Manitoba, and in 2016 he was officially recognized as the first leader of Manitoba.

the Red River Métis fought for their place and the history of Manitoba.

"This event will change the story and what we teach in the history books. Louis Riel was hanged for treason based on an obscure British law, and this law carried the death penalty whereas Canada's treason law did not," she said. "I hope the story of Louis Riel and the Red River Métis will inspire many Manitobans and Canadians to dig into the real story and acknowledge the wrongdoing of John A. McDonald. First Indigenous premier Wab Kinew spoke very proudly of having the ability to assist MMF president Chartrand in righting a longtime wrong to Louis Riel, a man who had a great influence on this province, which is what we see now."

After the ceremony, Austfjord said she celebrated with all Red River Métis ministers, delegates and citizens at Elsie Bear's Kitchen at 150 Henry Ave. and enjoyed bannock and stew and fiddling and jigging.

"It is always a wonderful time when you meet someone and at the next gathering you are family," said Austfiord.

Manitoba premier Wab Kinew said in a Feb. 19 joint statement with MMF president David Chartrand that the government is continuing to honour the legacy of Louis Riel by ensuring Manitoba's school curricula include Riel's contributions and acknowledgement of his honorary title.

"Our government was proud to make the first legislation we introduced a bill to recognize Louis Riel as Manitoba's first premier. We have also taken steps to ensure all Manitoba students learn about Riel and his provisional government including the List of Rights they drafted that would eventually become the basis of the Manitoba Act of 1870," said Kinew. "Today we celebrate Riel's legacy and the accomplishments of the Red River Métis people in Manitoba."

MMF president David Chartrand called the day historic and momentous and a time to reflect on the true history of Louis Riel and the Métis of the Red River.

"Our history has been one of hardship, marginalization, racism and discrimination — a continued struggle for recognition of our identity as the Red River Métis people. We have been 153 years in waiting and advocating to correct this part of our history, and today we see the true title of Louis Riel further acknowledged," said Chartrand in the joint statement. "The stain on Canada remains for portraying him as traitor and a madman, instead of telling his true history as the first premier and the founder of Manitoba. We hope what we do here today will be a catalyst for real change, so that all know the truth and honour premier Riel's legacy and the legacy of our people."

The Red River Métis has a proud entrepreneurial spirit and love for its culture, said Austfjord, and takes pride in showing its beading work, furs and music. The Gimli Red River Métis Local welcomes everyone to join its meetings and community events. People interested in joining the local can call Donna at 204-641-

of this type is very challenging and would take upwards of five weeks. It's incredibly difficult work when you can't turn things off to troubleshoot issues."

The city has been posting information about the spill on its website to keep the public informed. And during open water season, the city samples river water quality and posts the results online.

A spokesperson for the provincial government, which regulates industry, said the situation is being monitored and an investigation has been launched, the details of which cannot he shared

"Manitoba Environment and Climate Change is actively monitoring the situation. The pipe that is leaking is part of the City of Winnipeg's South End Pollution Control Centre Environment Act Licence. The environmental compliance and enforcement branch has launched an investigation and details cannot be provided during an active investigation," said the spokesperson. "The department is also monitoring upstream and downstream water quality to help assess environmental impacts. Manitoba has a strong regulatory framework in place to address water pollution, and these requirements are also incorporated into our Environment Act licensing process."


Cecelia Parsons, spokesperson for the federal department of Environment and Climate Change Canada, said a file on the sewage spill has been opened and that the ECCC takes pollution incidents and threats to the environment seriously.

"ECCC has a mandate to enforce federal environmental legislation aimed at preventing pollution and protecting wildlife and biodiversity in Canada. ECCC enforcement officers are responsible for administering and enforcing the pollution prevention provisions of the Fisheries Act, which prohibits the deposit of deleterious, or harmful, substances into water frequented by fish," said

from future breaches.

Parsons. "ECCC enforcement officers have responded to the incident and a file has been opened. If there is sufficient evidence of an alleged violation, enforcement officers may take appropriate action in accordance with the compliance and enforcement policy for habitat and pollution provisions of the Fisheries Act."

Selkirk-Interlake-Eastman MP James Bezan issued a press release Feb. 22 in which he said he was "disgusted" by the raw sewage breach that ran "unimpeded" since Feb. 7 into the Red River and Lake Winnipeg, and that the federal Liberals "must take an active role" to support Manitoba and Winnipeg and protect its waterways

McDonald, Hayward capture U21 provincial curling title



budding junior curlers. It was around that time that Kadriana was scrambling for a player to join her team in a bonspiel.

"Like every younger person does, I put it on Facebook," she said. "And then Colton messages me saying he wants to play and I was ecstatic because he's known so well. So he ended up playing with us and that's how we got to know each other.

"It was nice becoming a friend with a good curler in our hometowns and it kind of blossomed from there."

The pair grew closer and took their on-ice relationship to another level a few years later when the Winnipeg Beach Curling Club began hosting a mixed-doubles recreation league.

As fate would have it, they were a pretty good pair. In 2018, the Lotts entered the provincial mixed-doubles championship on a whim and won it all, a run they continued to a runnerup finish at nationals.

"Looking back at it now and seeing how it all unravelled, yeah, it's the coolest thing ever. From something that you wouldn't have expected to being, in my mind, one of the top mixed doubles teams in the country, Colton said.

Added Kadriana: "And you think, it's taken us all around the world. We've been to Sweden. We've been to China. We've been to numerous places in Canada for it. We make trips out of it, so it kind of gives us time together, as well. It's not just curling but it's also off the ice and being able to travel and do stuff together, which is awesome."

The Riverton restaurant is open seven days a week from 11 a.m. to 10 p.m. Monday to Saturday and noon to 8 p.m. on Sundays.

"We are expanding our food options in 2024 and changing locations and how we operate."

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

Cremation has taken place and a private celebration of life will follow at a later date.




