A Gimli High School student with a sharp eye for design will be the first to have her work displayed on a membership card that's being created by the Gimli Chamber of Commerce.

Sammie Liebrecht, who's in Grade 10, came up with a stylish tableau of ice fishing on Lake Winnipeg. It shows anglers' colourful fishing shacks, moody lighting and snowdrifts and ice fissures.

The chamber had reached out to visual arts, computers and humanities teacher Allyson Giardino to have her students come up artistic works for its membership card, and there were 12 submissions.

Giardino said the chamber's design contest was valuable as it gave added meaning to students' assignments and connection to the community.

"I'm really proud of the students for applying their graphic design skills to create images that are all unique and different but reflective of Gimli and our surrounding area," she said.

The students conceptualized, drew and painted a scene using an opensource digital illustration program called Krita that's similar to Adobe programs, she said. They have the skillset to make ads, logos and other designs and it was fun for them to undertake the chamber's challenge.

Giardino said she imagines Sammie's design was chosen to grace the membership card this year because ice shacks on Lake Winnipeg are such a defining feature of Gimli in the winter.

"And Sammie's graphic style has a lot of clean lines; it really stands out," said Giardino.

Like most young people, the students took to the computer program like ducks to water, with a little assistance at the outset from Giardino.

"They said to me, 'Here's my idea. How do I can create this in the program?' Once I showed them, they

were pretty good at using the tool. It was just more translating what was in their head into the computer," said Giardino. "Once they did that, they were good to go."

On Sunday, Feb. 19, Albesh Patel, owner of Lundar Motor Inn, walked into a devastating, ransacked scene that could have been from the movies.

The front entrance door of the building had been pried open, lifting the bottom front end of the building.

But the damage didn't stop there. When Patel walked into his building, he uncovered another substantial

loss. The ATM in the front entrance of the building had been broken into and the \$7,000 cash had been stolen. Patel owns the machine, so the cash belongs to him.

Patel said those who broke in through the front door used a crowbar and tried to pry open the ATM but were ultimately unsuccessful. The thieves left and returned 10 minutes later with a chain. They wrapped one end of the chain around the crowbar this time, and the other was attached to a truck. They ripped the ATM door open and stole the cash.

Damages to the front of the building and the hallway incurred by the break-in are estimated to cost \$10,000 to \$15,000.

Patel said he had lost the money and incurred the damages at the busi-

Gimli's Einarson wins fourth straight Scotties

Gimli's Kerri Einarson has captured her fourth consecutive Scotties Tournament of Hearts after a decisive 10-4 victory in Sunday evenings championship final over Manitoba's Jennifer Jones.

For the second straight year, Einarson (representing Team Canada), and her teammates Val Sweeting, Shannon Birchard and Briane Harris, rallied from an early loss in the playoffs to come back and win the championship with a record of 11 wins and one loss.

"To win four straight means so much," said Einarson. "I think this one was better than our first. This team never gives up, and that makes us who we are. So much great determination. We just go out there and enjoy every single minute and have fun."

In the final, Einarson broke a 2–2 tie in the fifth end when they stole two points after Jones' final draw came up light of the eight-foot. Manitoba conceded the game after Einarson had an open hit for five in the ninth end to win 10-4.

The fourth national Scotties put Einarson and her rink into elite company, along with Nova Scotia's Team Colleen Jones, who had also won four in a row from 2001 to 2004. It was also the fifth Scotties win for Shannon Birchard, as she previously won the 2018 Scotties with Jennifer Jones when she filled in for Kaitlyn Lawes, who was playing mixed doubles at the Olympics that year.

"The girls played fantastic with their backs up against the wall," said Team Einarson's coach Reid Carruthers. "It was very impressive to see them perform at the level they did in the semifinal against Northern Ontario and then in tonight's final. I'm so proud of them all."

The Jennifer Jones rink (Karlee Burgess, Mackenzie Zacharias, Lauren Lenentine, Emily Zacharias) out of the St. Vital and Altona Curling Club had a solid week representing Team

Manitoba as they compiled a 10-2 record on the week.

Also representing Manitoba at the Scotties was Team Kaitlyn Lawes of Winnipeg (Wild Card #1), who lost a tiebreaker game to Nova Scotia, which saw their event end early. East St. Paul's Meghan Walter featuring Sara Oliver, Abby Ackland and Mackenzie Elias played as Team Wild Card #3 and missed the playoffs with a 3-5 record.

Einarson, Sweeting and Birchard were all named to the First Team All-Star at the conclusion of the event, while Harris was named a Second Team All-Star.

Einarson was also awarded the Sandra Schmirler Award for the fourthconsecutive year for being the most valuable player in the playoffs. After receiving the award, Einarson then gave the MVP honour to her teammate and lead Harris, who competed at the Scotties while five months pregnant with her first child.

The Einarson team will now represent Canada at the 2023 World Women's Curling Championship at the Göransson Arena in Sandviken, Sweden, from March 18 to 26.

"I'm so looking forward to wearing the Maple Leaf in Sweden," said Einarson.

Local family shares cautionary tale about Lyme disease

A Marguette family cautions others in the area to be vigilant about ticks after their young daughter contracted Lyme disease.

It all started in September when Krysta and Keith Prevost noticed their four-year-old daughter Leighton started getting large red rashes and complaining about sore legs.

"For about an eight-day stretch, she had these rashes all over her body. They were red rings with a clear centre and her knees hurt so bad that she could barely walk," Krysta said.

"We took her to three doctors and they all diagnosed it as a virus that just had to run its course."

However, over the next month or so, she continued to experience on-and-off pain in her knees, along with flare-ups of the rash.

"She also pulled or pinched a nerve in her neck and jarred her hip, which both lasted for about five days of being in pain. We took her back to the doctor and explained what has been going on and she agreed that it wasn't normal," Krysta said.

"She then ordered blood tests, and that's when it was discovered that she had inflammation in her body. She was referred to a rheumatologist at the Children's Hospital and another set of blood tests were ordered, including the Lyme disease test."

At the end of January, the Lyme disease test came back positive.

"Now she is on a heavy dose of antibiotics for four weeks and is expected to be symptom-free afterwards," Krysta told the *Express* in mid-February.

"Since starting the antibiotics, she hasn't had any symptoms of the disease."

Although they don't know for certain where Leighton contracted Lyme disease, the Prevosts think a tick likely bit her in September in the Marquette area where they live.

'We don't recall taking one off of her, but she could have scratched or taken it off herself. Some Google searching on the symptoms she was experiencing was what convinced us it may be Lyme disease. We also have an influx of deer ticks in our area in the fall, with dogs that carry them in," Krysta said.

"I think that because she didn't have the classic bull's-eye rash that people associate Lyme disease, it wasn't seen as a possibility that it could be it. She was referred to numerous doctors before they figured out what it was."

Krysta suggests that everyone become familiar with symptoms of Lyme disease, such as expanding rashes, headache, fatigue, chills, fever, muscle aches, joint pain, stiff neck or swollen lymph nodes.

"If you check off multiple symptoms on the list, ask to be tested for it," she said.

"If you live in an area with a high tick population, let your doctor know that whatever may be going on with you or your kids could be Lyme disease." Now that Leighton is being treated for Lyme disease, she is on the road to recovery.

"She's doing great, back to her typical four-yearold self," Krysta said.

"She is on antibiotics for four weeks and has been symptom-free since starting it."

What is on the policy wish list for Manitoba's hog farmers? Right at the top is the need for recognition of the pork sector's role in driving the provincial economy and developing communities in every part of Manitoba. Rural communities like Neepawa, Roblin, Killarney, Steinbach and Notre Dame de Lourdes are socially thriving and becoming more diverse because of investments in hog farming and pork processing. Our large urban centers like Brandon and Winnipeg

are adding jobs and seeing economic growth because of the pork sector. Also, 14,000 Manitobans from across the province depend on the hog sector for a well-paying, high-quality job. We want to see the party platforms take pride in these developments and commit to policies supporting this ongoing growth and development.

Economically and environmentally sustainable agriculture growth depends upon science-based policies and regulations. This sounds straightforward and uncomplicated, but often political discourse can be influenced by misinformation on modern agriculture that is spread through social media and even picked up by mainstream broadcasting and print publications. How do we prevent misinformation from becoming a party's policy and eventually legislation and regulation? The most important way is to have every party commit to effective and meaningful consultations with farmers and their associations before implementing a change in policy direction. Commitment to sciencebased policies and promises of effective consultation are key elements we all need to see in election platforms.

Every party will have policies related to greenhouse gas reductions and sustainability. Most Manitobans expect this, and candidates will need to address these issues if they expect to be elected. Like all of Manitoba's agricultural producers, hog farmers need to see environmental and animal care policies which acknowledge the fact that modern agriculture provides the roadmap for achieving society's sustainability objectives. Reverting back to the farm practices of Ol' Mc-Donald is not an ecological solution but an unsustainable path that will lead to reduced efficiency, increasing

environmental footprint, and the rural poverty of days gone by. Building upon modern agriculture's research and technological advances will ensure the sector is economically and environmentally sustainable for generations to come.

What can individual farmers do to advance these policy objectives? The answer is simple but requires a time commitment to carry out. We need farmer engagement if we are going to see political platforms that reflect the needs of our sector. Most candidates for the upcoming election have been nominated. The agriculture community needs to get out and meet with them. I would like to see every pork producer adopt two candidates, one in rural Manitoba and one in a major urban centre. Ask to meet with candidates with differing political perspectives (you don't need to convince someone who agrees with you). Dis-

Will agriculture policies be based on the science that supports modern agriculture or be influenced by some of the misinformation floating about on social media? The answers to these questions largely depend on farmers

cuss with them the key request from the sector and do this before they are committed to a particular policy platform.

We also need to listen to candidates. Listening is just as critical as delivering a set of requests. Listen to any concerns they may have about agriculture and commit to getting responses back to them. Provide this feedback to your farm organizations like Manitoba Pork and Keystone Agricultural Producers. Getting answers back to candidates is one way in which farm organizations like Manitoba Pork will help deliver common messages to all parties and candidates.

Political activists often say that "public policy is set by those who show up." What does this mean? It means that if we don't engage politicians, our voices will not be heard and our needs will not be reflected in party platforms. Now is the best time for individual producers to influence policy. Now is the time for farmers to actively participate in the political process.

Funding announced to support quality, inclusive and sustainable child care

Manitoba early learning and childcare providers will be able to make targeted investments in infrastructure, diversity and inclusion, and in workforce recruitment and retention strategies to better position facilities for the future, federal Minister of Northern Affairs Dan Vandal, minister responsible for the Canadian Northern Economic Development Agency and the Prairies Economic Development Agency of Canada, on behalf of federal Minister of Families, Children and Social Development Karina Gould, and Manitoba Education and Early Childhood Learning Minister Wayne Ewasko announced last Thursday.

"Today's funding announcement means increased support to Manitoba's early learning and child-care providers, children and families," said Vandal. "Our government will continue to make progress with partners toward a better, more inclusive and affordable early learning and childcare system for families in Manitoba and across Canada."

The governments of Canada and Manitoba are providing \$45.9 million in one-time funding under the Canada-Manitoba Canada-Wide Early Learning and Child-Care Agreement to support the implementation of quality enhancement grants to fund programming for children under the age of seven. The Manitoba government is contributing an additional \$14 million to ensure equitable support is available for school-aged programming within the sector that serves children ages seven to 12.

"Our government is committed to making quality child-care more accessible for Manitoba families," said Ewasko. "These grants will help early learning and child-care providers make immediate investments into facilities and staff to support highquality learning for children across the province and a stronger, more responsive early learning and childcare system for Manitoba families." There are three streams of grant funding:

Quality Early Learning and Environments Grant: \$33.8 million to help improve aging infrastructure, equipment and materials;

Enhancing Diversity and Inclusion Grant: \$18.7 million to ensure children of all backgrounds and abilities feel a sense of belonging and have the ability to participate in programming through enriched curricula, space adaptations and staff-development opportunities; and

Innovative Recruitment and Retention Grant: \$7.4 million to implement creative and innovative strategies to recruit, retain and support a highquality workforce and meet the demands of a rapidly growing sector. This includes a Registered Retirement Savings Plan (RRSP) top-up of \$500 per child-care space to provide recognition for the dedication of homebased providers to the child-care sector.

Funding is available to all licensed

non-profit child-care centres (including infant, pre-school, nursery, and school-aged programs) and homebased providers, that must opt-in to the grant program before March 13. Quality enhancement grants support the principles of quality, inclusive and accessible child care and fund eligible expenses from April 1, 2022, to March 31, 2024.

With the exception of the Retirement Enhancement and Retention Benefit, eligible facilities will be required to accept or decline each funding stream through their weekly reporting update in Manitoba Child Care Search between Feb. 27 and March 13. The RRSP contribution is topped up automatically for any provider that contributes to RRSPs.

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GoFundMe page set up to save Eriksdale community space

The Eriksdale Memorial Community Centre has been the hub or place where the community could come together for the past 100 years.

With over a century of memories and history, the community centre may only be around for a bit longer.

Last month, the Rural Municipality of West Interlake announced that they purchased the land next to the Interlake Co-op grocery store where the Eriksdale Community Centre is located. Therefore, the centre needs to be moved, or it may be demolished.

Due to the sale, the Eriksdale Community Centre board was left with two options: provide the funds to move the building or have the council decide whether the building will be demolished.

The estimated cost to move the building to a new location is over \$100,000.

Unfortunately, with the board's small size, they don't have the financial means to move and set up the building in another location.

In October 2021, the RM first approached the Eriksdale Community Centre board. They were asked to attend an in-camera meeting. In that meeting, the committee first heard that the RM had been approached to buy the land the community centre sits on, said Cheryl Watson Law, treasurer for the community centre board.

Law said the RM wanted to let them know what was happening and get their feedback on the situation and whether they would be open to moving the centre if they could make the arrangements.

"We said yes if the centre could be moved and set up somewhere else," said Law.

It was the best they could make out of the situation at the time.

"As far as we are concerned, we run the building, but it's a community building. We felt that the community should have input on the whole situation, but the meeting was in-camera, so we weren't allowed to tell anyone about it," said Law.

Since that meeting, the board hadn't heard anything until another meeting in January and was brought up to speed on the situation and told that the centre would be tendered.

On Feb. 13, the RM posted an invitation to tender for the removal/demolition of the building.

RM of West Interlake CAO Courtney Roehl said if there are no tenders by the deadline, the council will have the final say on what the next course of action is for the community centre. The RM will entertain any ideas to get the building off that lot.

"Primary care teams in our region may include clinicians such as primary care and chronic disease nurses, dietitians and mental health workers to assist in providing comprehensive health care."

Primary care providers conduct physical exams including regular screening and provide patients with immunizations, prescriptions and renewals as needed. They provide care for most common illnesses and injuries, such as cold and flu symptoms, stomach aches, mild or chronic headaches, chronic back pain, and minor cuts and burns.

"Data shows that half, if not more, of our emergency department visits are for things that are non-urgent and could be seen in a primary care setting," Nixon added.

"By setting up an appointment with your primary care provider, it can help the emergency department focus on those patients that are seeking life-sustaining care. It also can help to save a lot of your time waiting."

Anyone who has a medical emergency that can't wait should call 911 or visit their closest emergency room. Examples of situations that require a visit to the emergency department include sudden or new chest pain, numbness, loss of vision, slurring of speech or an object in the eye or ear. Other emergency situations include loss of consciousness, severe injury, severe back pain, pregnancy complications or suicidal thoughts.

"Since your primary care provider knows the most about your history," Nixon said, "it is of benefit to use them for this continuous ongoing care so that they can help you navigate your health needs and make decisions with you that best work for you since each client is individual."

COVID hospitalizations remain elevated; provincial government releases seniors' strategy

Manitoba hospitalizations for CO-VID remained fairly elevated in mid-February, according to the provincial government's respiratory surveillance report for Feb. 12- 18 (reporting Week 7).

There were 44 new hospitalizations for COVID with two people requiring intervention in the intensive care unit, according to differences in severe outcomes between weeks 6 and 7. There were 61 new hospitalizations with eight ICU admissions reported the previous week.

Four people died from COVID in Week 7, compared to the 17 deaths reported the week before.

Manitoba's COVID death toll was 2,456 as of Feb. 11, according to the federal government's COVID webpage, and Canada's death toll now stands at 51,061.

There were 94 new COVID cases detected by PCR testing in Week 7, a slight decrease from the 108 reported the previous week.

Provincial COVID data are an undercount of the true number of cases as the government restricts PCR testing and rapid antigen tests aren't tracked. The provincial government also no longer provides in its surveillance reports the names of personal care homes and hospitals experiencing COVID outbreaks.

Wastewater surveillance data for Winnipeg and Brandon up to Feb. 14 once again showed sustained activity of the virus.

The Week 7 report shows one new case of influenza A and one new case of influenza B. There were no new hospitalizations and deaths reported.

New respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) cases continue to hold strong. There were 61 new RSV cases reported in Week 7, down 3 cases from the 64 reported the previous week. The week before that saw 75 cases.

Other health news:

The Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority's webpage shows no outbreaks of COVID or other respiratory viruses in long-term care facilities (viewed Feb. 26).

- Over the space of 28 days, from Jan. 23 to Feb. 19, there were nearly 5.3 million new COVID cases reported worldwide and over 48,000 new deaths, according to the World Health Organization's epidemiological report published on Feb. 22.

At the country level, the highest numbers of new 28-day COVID infections were reported from the United States (1,113,288 new cases), Japan (1,095,815 new cases), China (635,433 new cases), the Republic of Korea (430,042 new cases) and Germany (329,229 new cases).

The highest numbers of new 28-day COVID deaths were reported from the U.S. (13,517 new deaths), China (9,945 new deaths), Japan (6,536 new deaths), Australia (2,179 new deaths) and the United Kingdom (2,063 new deaths).

The WHO continues to monitor seven omicron subvariants: BF.7, BQ.1, BA.2.75, CH.1.1, XBB, XBB.1.5 and XBF.

"These variants are included due to their observed transmission advantage relative to other circulating variants and additional amino acid changes that are known or suspected to confer fitness advantage," states the report.

- Canada's National Advisory Committee on Immunization (NACI) released recommendations in January in response to requests from provinces and territories for additional guidance on COVID vaccine booster doses in 2023.

NACI recommends COVID vaccinations continue with a bivalent omicron-containing mRNA vaccine for people aged five years old and older.

COVID is expected to continue to evolve and is showing no evidence of a seasonal pattern, whereby it increases in the fall and winter and drops off in spring and summer. The virus continues to infect and kill people in all four seasons.

NACI says COVID hospitalizations, ICU admissions and deaths "continue to occur at a higher baseline frequency since the appearance of Omicron in late 2021 compared to the pre-Omicron period," and with more immune-evasive sublineages increasing.

As far as the duration of vaccine protection, there is a decline against infection but some lasting protection against severe disease. However, the duration of protection conferred by new vaccine formulations against new COVID variants is still unknown.

"Thus far, vaccine protection has been shown to wane over time, with protection against severe outcomes persisting longer than protection against symptomatic disease. For BA.1 and BA.2 sublineages of Omicron, the duration of protection against severe disease such as hospitalization has remained high, with most estimates above 70% out to 26 weeks following receipt of an original (non-bivalent) COVID-19 vaccine booster dose," states NACI's report. vere disease for more recent variants and new vaccine formulations is not known at this time and continues to be monitored."

- The Manitoba Conservative government announced on Feb. 22 the release of a seniors' strategy titled "Manitoba, A Great Place to Age: Provincial Seniors Strategy," which contains initiatives to support seniors at home and in the community.

"Our government's plan is based on the vision that older Manitobans are valued and empowered to live healthy and productive lives in our communities, making Manitoba an ideal place to age," said seniors and long-term care minister Scott Johnston in a Feb. 22 news release. "This new seniors strategy maps out a plan to support older Manitobans through filling gaps in services, making it easier to navigate services and supports, finding affordable options, supporting unpaid caregivers, and reducing ageism and ableism."

Among the initiatives announced are funding for a self- and familymanaged care program, whereby people can arrange their own home care service, the provision of \$1.3 million in 2023-2024 for palliative care starting in the Southern health region, and the provision of \$200,000 in 2023-2024 for the Rainbow Resource Centre to serve seniors 55 years and older who identify as 2SLGBTQ+.

The opposition NDP's health critic Uzoma Asagwara said the PC government's track record on seniors includes the disposal of affordable housing for seniors, privatized home care services and the loss of long-term beds.

"The PCs promised a strategy for seniors years ago, and in that time they have sold off affordable housing for seniors, cut and privatized home care services, transferred seniors hundreds of miles away from their families for hospital care and actually cut longterm care beds," said Asagwara in a statement. "They have also refused to create an independent Seniors' Advocate, which we believe is critical to giving seniors the dignity and respect they deserve."

Asagwara went on to say that as of August 2022, there were 193 fewer personal care home beds in Manitoba; former premier Brian Pallister had promised in 2016 to build 1,200 new PCH beds. The PCs also raised fees for seniors living in personal care homes by up to \$1,600 a year.

In addition, the PCs showed little recognition of COVID's ability to kill seniors in personal care homes.

"A former PC Health Minister said deaths of seniors in personal care homes during the pandemic was 'unavoidable' and he 'questioned the motives' of health care professionals who spoke up," said Asagwara in their statement.

Gimli has never had any trouble attracting thousands of visitors to its beaches, festivals and events in the summer, but winter has traditionally proceeded at a much slower pace.

But that's starting to change now that a number of organizations have teamed up to showcase Gimli's winter attributes and proclaim that fun doesn't stop just because things get icy.

To share the story of how various organizations worked together to increase winter tourism, Chervl Buhler, Julianna Roberts and Kim Giesbrecht who make up the Gimli Chamber of Commerce's Destination Brand Committee - presented an upbeat session titled Migrating Fishing Villages at the Winter Cities Shake-Up Conference on Feb. 16 at the Fort Garry Hotel in Winnipeg.

The annual conference brings together a diverse group of winter enthusiasts such as business owners, artists, cultural and community organizers, urban planners and people who enjoy the cold and its unique opportunities for recreation and expression. It was hosted this year by Travel Manitoba and Tourism Winnipeg.

"Winter Cities is a concept for communities in northern latitudes that encourages them to plan their transportation systems, buildings and recreation projects around the idea of using their infrastructure during all four seasons, rather than two seasons (summer and fall)," states the conference website.

The most popular piece of infrastructure in Gimli is Lake Winnipeg, and the destination committee and its partners are putting it to good use in the winter.

Like other beachside communities, Gimli would see its population bloom

in the summer with the return of cottagers and an influx of tourists, said Buhler. But in the fall, the cottagers would pack up and the town would lose some of its residents to temperate climes when Manitoba's deep freeze set in.

"We wanted to stop that loss and bring our numbers up in the winter," said Buhler.

To that end the chamber's destination committee, the Gimli Community Development Corporation (CDC), the Rural Municipality of Gimli's tourism and recreation department, local businesses, and organizations such as the Gimli Ice Festival and Interlake Snow Trackers started working together to enhance the town for icy pursuits. The destination committee also tapped into Travel Manitoba's marketing know-how to get people pointed in Gimli's direction.

The Gimli CDC started off by building a road on the lake so that anglers could easily access the ice. The road was expanded during the pandemic to include lots of branching streets and bays so that anglers could move around to find the fish.

The destination committee then got a winter sports and recreation park (called the Gimli Harbour Trail) built inside the harbour walls that includes a one-kilometre-long skating trail, rinks, a warm-up hut, snow sculptures and decorative lighting.

"The satisfaction of seeing local residents enjoying winter in our community was awesome. On Saturday I was at the skating trail and I thought, 'This is so amazing.' I was feeling emotional because so many families were out enjoying themselves on the trail, and that's a huge reward," said Buhler, who owns the Gimli Robin's Donuts. "And seeing the influx of guests coming to our community to explore Gim-

li — that's the reason why we did this in the first place."

questions correct.

The COVID pandemic gave rise to a pent-up demand for outdoor leisure pursuits, said Julianna Roberts, who's the executive director of the New Iceland Heritage Museum, a year-round museum showcasing Icelandic history and culture. It has been a "struggle" in the winter to attract visitors even though Gimli is only about an hour from Winnipeg and is a perfect day-trip location.

But that's changing. Angler numbers grew from 100,000 pre-pandemic to over 160,000, she said. About five to seven years ago, you'd see the odd shack on the lake outside Gimli, accessible to those who could drive there on a snowmobile, then after the CDC took the concept of an ice road and further developed it, more anglers arrived.

The fishing village is spread out along Lake Winnipeg in front of the town of Gimli. It has a main road

(called Greenback Road) that leads onto the ice near the Gimli Library and then branches out, creating little fishing neighbourhoods on streets with name such as Burbot and Sturgeon.

"We've had ice villages over the years, a shack here or there, but now they've started to congregate," said Roberts. "They'll move with the fish. They're always chasing the fish."

For people who like to eat fish, Gimli is the place to get it — whether straight out of the lake (with a fishing licence, of course) or at one of the local restaurants.

When she was growing up, Roberts said ice fishing shacks were "old, rundown buildings." Anglers still use shacks — some sumptuously decorated with curtains and a stove or propane heater — but many use retrofitted campers, pop-up tents or just sit out on the ice on a lawn chair.

Arborg and municipal partners update emergency preparedness plan

The Town of Arborg updated its emergency response plan to deal with weather-related disasters and other emergency events.

Council passed a resolution at a special meeting held Jan. 25 to establish a preparedness program for the town.

Chief administrative officer Cindy Stansell said the town, the Municipality of Bifrost-Riverton and the Rural Municipality of Fisher share an emergency measures board and an emergency co-ordinator, Warren Toderan, and the updating of the plan also came with training.

"We engaged the services of Napier Consulting to update our emergency plan and program," said Stansell. "Because we just had an election in October, we held an elected officials training session and also included some of our staff. We wanted to make sure new members were trained as well as update long-time members on our plan and response."

Municipal councils have the power to appoint qualified people to the position of emergency co-ordinator and to an emergency response group, as well as community members to an emergency preparedness advisory committee. During emergencies, municipalities oversee the restoration of critical services, acquire and distribute necessary resources to deal with an emergency, co-ordinate with other levels of government and agencies and provide authority — including financial authority — to carry out duties.

The updated emergency preparedness plan will be submitted to the province's Emergency Measures Organization for approval.

The town and parts of Bifrost-Riverton battled flood water in the spring of 2022. They had to quickly sandbag or pump water away from some properties and place tiger dams around the hospital and personal care home. Local and area residents supplied tractors that were hooked up with pumps to help mitigate overland flooding south of Highway 68. They pumped water over the highway into the Icelandic River.

"We had an amazing group that came together and worked well together to protect our communities," said Stansell.

The town will be holding some open houses to find members of the public willing to help in some capacity during an emergency or disaster.

"We are looking for volunteers and we will be holding some sessions in the near future to reach out to the general public to find volunteers for emergency response," said Stansell.

To warm up conference attendees on a what was a bitterly cold day, Roberts incorporated into the presentation some fun fish- and lake-themed

Questions included mariah's alternative name (burbot), the most abundant fish in Lake Winnipeg (pickerel), the minimum ice thickness to support vehicles (14 inches) and anglers' daily catch limit (six fish).

"When I was growing up, my dad was a fisherman and mariah would never have graced our table, so we're kind of shocked that people eat it," said Roberts. "I've never tried it."

She had people scratching their heads when she asked what hard fish is.

"Hard fish is an Icelandic delicacy. In Iceland they use cod, which are very smelly, but in Manitoba we use pickerel and we hang it to dry in the fall or spring because that's when the least amount of flies are on it," said Roberts, prompting much laughter from the audience. "It's delicious!"

Luckily, RM of Gimli councillors

Thora Palson and Richard Petrowski were attending the conference and supplied some of the answers to the trivia questions. Hard fish is dehydrated fish or fish jerky and people shouldn't turn their noses up at mariah because it tastes like lobster.

Kim Giesbrecht, who owns Right Choice Realty and the Inn on Centre in Gimli, said there's lots to do in town in the winter besides ice fishing. That includes using the free harbour skating trail and hockey and crokicurl rinks.

The destination committee is looking at bringing new winter events to Gimli, as well as expanding services, which could include having a food truck set up on the ice at the fishing village.

"We would like to see even more active participation opportunities. Some of the ideas we have in mind are a toboggan hill, a snowshoe course, the creation of itineraries for people coming to the community; these can be winter sport-related or shopping," said Giesbrecht. "We'd also like to encourage community groups or sports organizations to host weekend events. Maybe every couple of weekends we can host something that will bring tourists into the community. Perhaps a hockey tournament on real ice, a snow-carting competition or our local Interlake Snow Trackers providing short rides for people who've never experienced sledding before."

The destination committee would also like to enhance its harbour trail. It added a large light tunnel this year that really dazzles at night, but it could perhaps add trees and benches along the trail. And lengthening the trails might attract outdoor runners, racers or adventurers.

"I went to the Forks yesterday and got to use a kick-sled," said Giesbrecht. "I would be so thrilled if we could increase the number of visitors to Gimli on a regular basis so that there was an opportunity for an entrepreneur to start a business and rent things such as fat bikes, ice bikes, kicks-sleds or snowshoes. There are so many options for us to consider."

Councillors Palson and Petrowski said they were pleased that so many different groups in Gimli have come together to encourage more visitors to enjoy winter along the shore of Lake Winnipeg.

"I soaked it in through the lens of an outsider and was in awe of all the collaborative efforts that come together to make the Gimli winter experience a unique Manitoba destination for all of us to enjoy," said Palson.

Petrowski said Julianna, Cheryl and Kim "did an excellent job showcasing Gimli in the winter."

A proposed development plan for Gimli's waterfront is ready for review and the general public is invited to stop by the Waterfront Centre on Sunday to share their feedback.

Scatliff + Miller + Murray, an urban design and landscape development firm hired last year by the RM of Gimli to come up with a plan, will be on hand to provide the public with information and discuss ideas.

The RM's Waterfront Advisory Committee, which was formed in February 2022 and made up of seven people with knowledge of Gimli and a vested interest in the municipality, has been helping inform and guide the planning and design process.

Advisory committee member and Gimli resident Erik Arnason said the landscape design firm has "really driven the bus" in terms of developing the proposals set out in the initial draft. The firm is ready to share that draft and everyone is welcome to of-

fer any ideas on how the waterfront can be enhanced.

"The firm has come forward with what I'd say is a relatively complete, long-term concept with a series of actionable recommendations, and this initial draft is going to be reviewed," said Arnason. "I believe this will be the first time the public will be able to see the results of the multi-step process they've been working towards."

Both permanent and seasonal Gimli residents have been calling for the enhancement of the waterfront, he said because "Gimli has a magic to it" and its waterfront is such a draw to residents and tourists alike.

"There has been a growing voice that recognizes there's so much potential at the waterfront that's not being tapped into. It's a beautifully functioning waterfront and well used, but it can be so much more," said Arnason. "It's at the point where we're asking what it actually takes to make some changes. Talking about it is one thing, but what are the first steps to take to start realizing what we can call the dreams of residents in town?"

One of the aspects of the plan is to find easier ways of moving pedestrians through the harbour. Because it is

a working harbour, entering and exiting from certain areas may be confusing to visitors.

There's a lot going on in the harbour area, said Arnason, with vested stakeholders such as the federal, provincial and municipal governments (all of which own portions of land there), commercial fishers, recreational boaters and businesses, as well as tourists who have a "presence" there. The design firm incorporated those different voices into its draft plan to see how they aligned on the subject of waterfront development.

The original area targeted for enhancement was slightly smaller from what is now envisaged.

"At initial meetings a key strip of the waterfront involved the harbour and the beach and how that area was connecting to the town. But throughout conversations between us, and the process of public engagement, the borders slowly expanded," said

St. Andrews family's Polish heritage inspires vodka infusions

St. Andrews business Baltic Brothers pays homage to Bernard Pacak's Polish culture and family roots while also winning awards and giving back.

"It's a beautiful culture to be a part of, and we want to showcase it to the world," 38-year-old Bernard said.

In 2018, Bernard, along with his brother Martin Pacak and friend David Moskiewicz, founded Baltic Brothers, which creates infused vodkas, known as "nalewki" in Polish.

Bernard's parents and brother moved from Poland to Canada in 1981, leaving through the Baltic Sea, which is the inspiration behind the name Baltic Brothers. The family first lived in Winnipeg and within a couple years moved out to St. Andrews.

The family would celebrate their Polish heritage in many ways, including through folk dance, food and traditions.

"Slavic culture is pretty amazing. It's more than just pierogies and kielbasa," Bernard says. "It's folklore. It's colour. It's everything — the embroidery, the stitchwork on the clothing. Everything has a meaning and purpose, and it's a beautiful thing."

Bernard's and Martin's dad has always made nalewka (singular for nalewki) for Christmas, birthdays and other holidays.

In 2017, their dad served the drink to family at Christmas. A cousin who married into the family was so impressed with the taste, saying it was unlike anything he had ever tried.

This got Bernard and his family thinking about how more people could get a taste, leading to the launch of Baltic Brothers.

Before selling their own infused alcohol produced at Winnipeg's Capital K Distillery, Baltic Brothers first released dry infusion pouches that people could use to flavour their alcohol.

Each pouch is named after something important to their family or to Manitoba. For example, Bernard's uncle immigrated to Pine Falls from Poland in the 1950s, inspiring the name of the Pine Falls Gin.

Baltic Brothers follows Bernard and Martin's great-grandfather's handwritten recipes, the same recipe that their dad uses.

"It's four generations of family flavours," Bernard said.

The original recipes use measurements like "scoops" and "handfuls," which the Baltic Brothers adapted to more standard units, even measuring the exact amount of their dad's handful of ingredients. This allowed them to consistently replicate the recipe on a bigger scale.

Bernard said his dad comes by for quality checks, making sure the recipes are on the right track.

"We're just the caretakers of the recipe. My dad is the one that kept it alive," Bernard says.

"That's why my mom and my dad's signatures are on the bottle because we wouldn't have Baltic Brothers, or the recipes, or the idea or anything without them."

Baltic Brothers have a range of infused vodka flavours, including the Manitoba Mule and Baltic Bison. The brand offers cocktail recipe suggestions on its website and social media.

The Bomba series of Baltic Brothers nalewki are the more "easygoing, sipping vodkas," Bernard said. His late mother would use the word bomba to describe the explosion of flavours you get from this style of drink.

When launching the Blueberry Lavender Lemonade Bomba, Baltic Brothers released a special Ukraineinspired label. Through proceeds from this bottle, as well as a scarf featuring iconography representing Ukraine and Canada, Baltic Brothers raised more than \$10,000 that supported newly arrived Ukrainians in Manitoba.

"Not too long ago, what's happening in Ukraine happened to Poland," Bernard said. "It's an extreme stress to go through anything like that, and to be able to support a fellow country or somebody so close to your roots is just the thing you have to do."

A couple flavours from the Bomba series have won notable awards. The Honeyberry (haskip) Bomba recently won best in class at the 2022 Canadian Artisan Spirit awards. The Sour Cherry Bomba, or wiśniówka (sour cherry vodka in Polish), won gold at the San Fransico World Spirits Competition in 2022.

"Wiśniówka to Poland is like as tra-

ditional and cultural as it can get," Bernard said. "Every family has their own version, their own recipe, their own nuance to it. So this is ours."

From following family recipes to incorporating Polish culture into the design of labels, Bernard said Baltic

Brothers is ultimately a way to celebrate his family's past and share about the diversity of Slavic culture.
