Midsommar in Minneapolis: Swedish Cultural Association organizing road trip

The Winnipeg-based Swedish Cultural Association is preparing for a road trip this upcoming summer to Minneapolis, Minn., and is inviting people of Swedish or Nordic descent to come along for the ride.

The association holds field trips to communities in Manitoba where there is a Swedish cultural presence, and it's hoping to round up folks of Swedish descent from the Interlake and beyond for the trip to Minneapolis where they'll be celebrating Midsommar.

Swedish Cultural Association president Sonja Lundstrom said that over the past 10 years — apart from the years of the pandemic — they've been organizing one to two road trips a year that they call culture and heritage days. Those trips have included a visit to the Chatfield area in 2022 to pay respects to Swedish ancestors from the area and to Eriksdale in 2023.

In addition to Sweden, the cultural association has members from the Nordic countries of Iceland, Denmark, Norway and Finland. It offers a number of cultural and heritage programs including Fika night (taking a break to socialize), Svensk (Swedish) lunch, cultural education, language classes, pageants, folk dance classes, movie nights, a book club, winter

sports activities and Midsommar picnics that include the making of the maypole.

Midsommar is an ancient tradition that welcomes warm weather and marks the longest day of the year. People make wreaths from flowers, sing songs and dance around the midsommarstang or maypole.

The association was invited by the American Swedish Institute of Minneapolis to attend its Midsommar celebration on Saturday, June 15, and Lundstrom said there is "great interest" from Canadian Swedes to take part in the event.

"This is our first time to attend. We've been only to small places in Manitoba up to now and we've had such a good time. I can't imagine what will happen with so many other fellow Swedes [for Midsommar in Minneapolis]," she said. "We also hope to go to Lindstrom at Taylor Falls where many of the first Swedish immigrants settled and the movie and book by author [Vilhelm] Moberg was written. It is near Minneapolis."

The day-long celebration in Minneapolis will include crafts, a wreathbuilding station, a Fika café that will serve traditional Swedish food, an art demonstration, an official welcome to Manitoba visitors and dances around the maypole.



An advance entrance fee for Swedish Cultural Association members is \$7.50. People interested in attending the event can email the association at svenskclub17@gmail.com by April 15. The association will be hosting an

Gimli Junior Funspiel a rocking success with all-day fun and prizes for youth

The Gimli Curling Club organized a Junior Funspiel for Interlake youth on Monday that saw about 64 kids from the Gimli, Petersfield and Arborg areas hit the ice and enjoy a fun-filled competition.

Jay Boaz, who coaches curling, served on soccer boards and loves all things sports, helped organize the day-long event for youth at the Gimli Recreation Centre. The rink's five sheets were occupied from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. by 16 teams comprised of kids aged six to 16.

The main aim of the event was to provide younger kids with an opportunity to have fun, as well as to curl against a number of new teams and enjoy a low-stakes competition without undue pressure.

"There are very few bonspiel opportunities for kids age 10 and under," said Boaz. "We wanted to create an opportunity for the younger kids in the junior program to get out and enjoy a bonspiel too."

The youth came up with very creative team names such as Team Swifties, Clandegirls, Sassy Sliders, One Man Short, Sweep the House, Petersfield Boys, Petersfield Girls, Nutton But Button and Finders Sweepers, along with Gimli Vikings and teams named after team leaders.

Boaz said the kids were broken into two categories: one for kids aged 10 and under and another for kids aged 16 and under. The kids in the 10 and under category (six teams total) played a half-sheet, meaning they had to throw the rock only half the distance. There were ten teams total in the 16 and under category.

All games were four ends (a normal curling game is eight) so that the kids could play three different teams that day. The scoring was modified so that no matter how many points were scored in an end, each end was only worth one point.

"Each end is worth one point, making the Funspiel very friendly to new curlers," said Boaz. "Every game is close and the worst you can lose is 4-0!"

There were nifty prizes for the kids. A Draw to the Button Contest saw a winner in each category receive a Team Canada jersey signed by Kerri Einarson, and the winning team in each category won a four-pack of free game passes and a pizza from Gimli's Bowlers Lanes bowling alley.

Jeff's Plumbing, Marvelous Meadows Golf & Grill, the Marvelous Curling Week-end, Access Credit Union, Red Apple and Asham Curling Supplies supported the event and donated additional prizes. Each participant went home with a prize and were entered in a draw to win a free broom that was donated by Lynn Hoplock.

dressing the concerns of the public." The RM of West Interlake is made up of the former RM of Eriksdale and the former RM of Siglunes. The province mandated an amalgamation in 2015 based on low population numbers.

Lundale said he would like to bring greater attention to politics in general,

policies such as taxation and tax burdens, and how those factors can affect residents, businesses and the economy of the municipality.

"Politics matter. The decisions that council makes affects residents and their ability to live in communities such as ours," said Lundale. "What is a council doing to make their community a really good place to live? Are they providing enough recreation

and services that the people who are living there — or the people who want to move there — want? You've got to be progressive because people have choices as to where they can live in the Interlake."

Lundale, who is currently president of the Eriksdale Chamber of Commerce, will serve from March 2024 to October 2026.

Carbon tax hike felt across every Manitoba industry and household

This week, Manitobans will wake up to a 23 per cent federal carbon tax hike, with support from Premier Wab Kinew and his Manitoba NDP government. From farm to truck to dinner table, the effects of the NDP-Trudeau carbon tax hike on April 1

will be felt by every household and industry in Manitoba.

Let's start with our pork industry, which contributes more than \$2.3 billion a year to the provincial economy and employs more than 22,000 Manitobans.

Manitoba is the largest supplier of hogs in Canada, with 624 farms exporting to over 30 countries. Hog barns are heated by natural gas or propane, and hogs are usually fed

soybean meal and corn.

From buying their feed to keeping on the heat, pork producers will be impacted by the 23 per cent carbon tax hike in their barns and at the farm where they grow the crops, as will the companies that dry the grain using natural gas or propane. A soybean crusher paying \$150,000 per year in carbon tax today will pay \$185,000 starting April 1, which

increases the cost of raising a hog in Manitoba.

Can customers of Manitoba pork stomach a 23 per cent increase in prices so that Manitoba producers can break even on the carbon tax? Or will they just find another supplier who doesn't have to pay the carbon tax instead?

Either way, the carbon tax hike will cost Manitoba a lot of bacon, and the same equation can be applied to beef, poultry and just about any products from Manitoba's agriculture industry.

But it's not just producers who will be hit by the hike.

Manitoba truckers, who bring most of our goods from the farms and factories to our tables, will bear the burden of the carbon tax hike. Local companies not only haul in Manitoba but across North America. How can they possibly sustain themselves without passing cost hikes on to customers?

In short, they can't. And just like farmers and industry, all Manitobans will be hit with

increased food prices, increased fuel costs and increased heating costs as a result of the carbon tax hike.

When will it end? The carbon tax is set to keep rising until 2030, costing every Manitoban and Canadian more money to live, year by year.

Meanwhile, Wab Kinew has yet to

join seven other premiers across party lines in openly calling on Trudeau to scrap his outrageous carbon tax hike on the backs of hardworking Manitoba families. Kinew instead deflects the topic by evoking the temporary gas tax "holiday." However, the fact is that the 23 per cent hike will bring the carbon tax to \$0.17/litre at the pump. Not only does the carbon tax cost more than the provincial gas tax but, unlike the NDP's temporary stunt, the carbon tax is here to stay.

These fuel costs have an impact on food prices. Kinew promised that the fuel tax pause would drive prices down, but the stats show otherwise as Manitoba food prices are set to rise another 4.5 per cent this year. Despite the NDP premier threatening action in November against grocery chains if savings aren't passed to consumers, Manitobans haven't heard a peep about the topic since December.

Manitobans need to know what this premier is doing for long-term affordability because so far Kinew has proven to be more of a showman making idle promises than a statesman who has plans to take action.

From industry to household, the 23 per cent carbon tax increase is no April Fool's joke. Manitoba's premier must stand up to Ottawa and ensure real solutions and real relief for Manitobans.

New art club hosting larger art shows for local artists

A new art group has emerged, and its purpose is to give local artists an outlet for selling their creations.

Artists of the Lake was started by a few members of the Gimli Art Club, including Sharon Cory and WAVE. Last weekend, the new group held its first art show at Minerva Hall, with pieces on display following the theme of "Birds of a Different Feather."

"Birds have always been a source of inspiration for artists, and this show celebrates that," said Cory.

The club's first show featured around 25 artists, including one who showcased nine paintings under the theme. Some artists at the show had just a few pieces on display, while others had upwards of 20. Those showing more than three had to pay a fee to display, and artists were welcome to show as many pieces as they wanted.

Cory hopes Artists of the Lake will only reinforce the idea that Gimli and the surrounding area are an "artist's colony" full of talent. She plans to hold five shows like the recent one each year, and she already has the next one planned for Minerva Hall again on Mother's Day.

"It's for people who don't have a place to exhibit their whole range of work," she said. "I do very big paintings, and without going into the gallery system, I've never had a place

to show these big pieces of work except online. I think some artists have things shoved under the bed and in closets. The work piles up if it doesn't sell."

One of the shows Cory is planning for this year will be titled "Water World." Whether it's a lake, river, boat, beach or Caribbean cruise, any and all pieces related to water will be on display there.

"This narrows it down and allows artists to work under a theme," said Cory. "And I think that's better for the viewer. Where they get a chance to see an artist's impression on birds but another artist has a totally different idea on birds."

Cory said selling their pieces is how artists make a living and progress in their field.

"When you get a piece of work out, you have to move on," she said. "It prevents us from getting stagnant or hitting a brick wall. I think we should always be in a kind of progression doing new work, doing fresh work and challenging our brains to come up with new ways to express ourselves."

Each show Artists of the Lake will put on has free admission for visitors.

RCMP recover drugs, firearms and cash in multiple searches

As a result of an ongoing investigation, RCMP officers from NWEST (National Weapons Enforcement Support Team) and Manitoba East District CREST — along with assistance from multiple RCMP support units including the D Division Emergency Response Team (ERT), F Division ERT, Remote Piloted Aircraft Systems (RPAS) and the RCMP Manitoba Organized Crime Unit (MOCU) — executed search warrants at five separate residences in Fairford on March 22.

As a result of these searches, officers seized over 2.5 kgs of cocaine, numerous firearms and over \$25,000 in cash.

RCMP have arrested and charged three individuals with possession for the purpose of trafficking and multiple firearm-related offenses.

The accused include Kyle Woodford, a 32-year-old from the RM of Woodlands, 40-year-old Kyle Canada from Winnipeg and Desnee Woodford, a 31-year-old from Fairford.

All three were remanded into custody.

RCMP continue to investigate.



Get rolling in riches with the Manitoba Coin Club

The Manitoba Coin Club could have you rolling in riches during its one-day Coin, Stamp & Collectibles show in Steinbach in a few weeks' time.

People who have a cache of coins stuffed in a sock that's been tucked away in the back of their bureau or paper notes taking up space in a box under their bed can haul them out and bring them to the show where coin club experts will gladly tell them whether they've been hoarding treasure.

The coin club's numismatists — those are the folks that study and appraise coins and other currency such as paper notes and tokens — can put a price on Canadian and foreign coins and notes and teach you some of the fascinating social, economic or political history that lies behind currency. They can also tell you how to spot counterfeit currency and what steps you can take before purchasing currency online or from an auction house.

In addition to educating people about their own treasure, club members will have some of their collectibles on display at the show so that the public can see what collecting is all about. There will also be other experts on hand for people who collect items from stamps, comic books and cards to sports memorabilia, model cars and medallions.

Numismatist and coin club member Larry Dalman, who has about 50 years' experience valuing currency, said the club's experts can help people understand that money may be worth more than its face value and even hold great historical significance.

"The Manitoba Coin Club realizes that our province is huge and that there are a large number of people in other areas collecting commemorative coins or other money that could be valuable. Or their parents or grand-parents were collecting coin sets or paper bills or bank tokens, and people are now wondering how they can find out the value of what they've got in those collections and what they can do with it," said Dalman. "Our coin club offers people information and advice and can value their money. People are very welcome to join our club, too."

Founded in 1954, the Manitoba Coin Club is celebrating its 70th anniversary this year. The club provides numismatic education, hobby and fellowship. Its members collect mostly Canadian and foreign currency, banking memorabilia and exonumia (tokens, which are forms of coinage, souvenir medallions, encased coins and so forth). Members hold regular meetings in person or via Zoom.

This is the second time since the club

was founded that members have organized a show outside Winnipeg. The overwhelming success of their first rural show — in Stonewall in 2023 — saw people from across the Interlake and southern Manitoba drop by, and the club more than doubled its membership numbers from 50 to 109 after they learned what numismatics was all about, said Dalman.

Spending a bit of time with a coin club member at the show or becoming a member of the club could net you some cash or simply inspire you to start sifting through your change or bills. With some of the club's members creeping up in age, the club is hoping to inspire and attract younger adults, youth and kids to hoist the numismatic banner.

And it's important to bear in mind that unlike old and newly issued currency, expired debit and credit cards have no value and aren't on a trajectory to become collectors' items anytime soon.

But older currency such as Canada's so-called devil-faced 1954 paper bills, in which the devil reveals himself hiding in the Queen's hair, and newer currency such as commemorative 10cent coins issued by the Royal Canadian Mint in 2021 for the 100th anniversary of the Blue Nose (there were four versions issued, including a coloured dime and a dime bearing a single date, which is the most valuable), can be worth more than face value, said Dalman. Same for tokens that were issued by butchers, barbers, cigar stores and the Hudson's Bay Company (its so-called beaver pelt coin) back in the days when "everyone had their own tokens."

Tokens issued by various banks before Canada had a national currency and "shinplasters" (small paper notes) that date back to 1870, as well as commemorative gold and silver coins, are either worth a fortune already (depending on how well-preserved they are) or destined to creep up in value over time.

For example, the Mint stopped producing Canada's 50-cent coin as a circulating coin in 2004, said Dalman. Now they're issued only as collector's coins (collectors have to buy them from the Mint). Those 50-cent pieces are going to be worth far more than their face value, depending on condition.

The most important thing to remember, said Dalman, is to not haul your stash of silver coins or older paper notes into a bank because you'll get only their face value in return. And ditto for companies that buy silver currency — you'll only get the current

market price of silver by weight.

A single silver coin or a coin set could be worth far more if in pristine condition or if they have unique characteristics such as a flaw, small production run or other special feature.

Take our new king, for instance. The Royal Canadian Mint issued in 2023 a limited number of circulating coins with the image of Charles III. Should his health take a turn for the worse (he was diagnosed with cancer), all the dies at the Mint will have to be changed in order to start producing an image of our next monarch. Having a limited number of coins out there means they could increase in value. A 50-cent coin with Charles' image is considered "highly collectible."

"We're trying to teach people about changes like this that happen in currency," said Dalman. "As soon as it was announced that the king had medical issues, they [the Mint] probably started preparing and moved to Plan B. And the reason you're likely not seeing Charles on your coins right now is that there are a limited number of these coins in circulation and there are still billons of coins out there with the Queen's image. We're also still waiting for the Bank of Canada to announce if Charles will be on our \$20 bill. We're assuming we'll have a monarch on our \$20s because we've always had one."

Another newly issued coin that's destined to increase in value is the Mint's Year of the Dragon (2024) coin.

"The Mint has done a number of special coins for the Year of the Dragon, but one of the award-winning coins

they just did is in silver or gold and has the dragon's head coming out of the coin on one side and the tail sticking out on the other," said Dalman. "This is a high-end collector coin. The others are flat like most coins."

Staff from the Royal Canadian Mint will be attending the club's Steinbach show and offering the public a coin exchange. For a loonie, people can get a set of 10 coloured Blue Nose dimes.

"This is an award-winning coin and the very first time we've had our dime coloured. We've done toonies and loonies but never the dimes," said Dalman.

Dealers and other specialists looking to nab a table at the upcoming show will receive a discount. At the moment, Dalman said the coin club has had confirmation that Memory Lane Diecast & Collectables, which is one of the largest Hot Wheels dealers in Western Canada, and the Antique Mall from the Forks in Winnipeg will be attending the show.

The show will run from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday, April 20 at the Mennonite Heritage Village in Steinbach. There will be door prizes and raffles. Admission is \$5.






