A Winnipeg Beach soap company is encouraging Interlake residents to persevere through the last onslaught of inclement weather through the return of their seasonal photo contest.

Retired pilot turns visual landscape into art

Wayne Letkeman picked up oil painting in 2017 and has completed over 400 paintings since then.

He works primarily with oil paints, using different techniques like alla prima (wet on wet), to create a variety of diverse landscapes and scenery. He covers silhouettes, lakes, for-

ests and colourful night skies. His style has a flowing, glossy feel, and he spends a significant amount of time and concentration on the proper blending and mixing of different colours.

Letkeman has sold some of his art, but he doesn't paint for profit. He says that he doesn't view it as a hobby he can necessarily get rich from. He does it for his enjoyment and to keep his mind active.

He often donates paintings from his roster to benefit others.

"I have given donated paintings to art galleries that they can raffle off or sell or auction, and then

they benefit from this one as opposed to me benefiting," he said. He has done different exhibits over

He has done different exhibits over the years. A recent event was in March of this year, a live painting demo organized with the Pembina Hills Art Council.

He was also able to showcase his work at a People's Choice exhibit in Steinbach back in 2020, alongside a large group of Manitoban artists.

After retirement, he's planning on opening a home gallery in Ashern to put his work on display to the public. Inspiration for the paintings often come from his career as a commercial pilot and the imagery he has seen in the air. Almost all of his work is inspired by thoughts or memories.

There's one distinct painting where he said he used a photograph he took as reference, but that's the exception in his collection.

He said that, in the case of that painting, he had been struck with the inspiration when he had first seen the landscape. He had spent the rest of the day planning how he would execute that in paint form later.

"I was flying for the day and I flew all day long, imagining how I'm going to take that in the evening and paint that painting," he said. "And at the end of the day, when thought about it and I

I was home, I thought about it and I painted that picture."

Letkeman mostly uses oil paint on a black canvas to create his work. He said that the black backgrounds help bring out the vibrancy of the colours he uses.

An example he used of where this shines are his paintings of the northern lights. Against a bright sky, the

opaque, white paint. Often his northern lights-themed paintings will be layered. The final piece is only visible after he applies more opaque, white paints to the transparent art that was done first. He sweeps it over, and it pops out the same way a rainbow would.

Letkeman prefers oil paints over acrylics for this reason, among others. He can spend much more time on colourful details and shines to recreate his memories or mental images.

And, he had added, oil paints give you the chance to wipe away what you don't like and start over. It's possible with acrylics, but it doesn't work quite as well.

4 *The Express Weekly News* Thursday, May 5, 2022 **'Shit-bombing' of Lake Winnipeg doesn't go down well after city flushes 60 million litres of waste**

Commercial fishers in Gimli say the City of Winnipeg deliberately sacrificed Lake Winnipeg and the people who live along its shores by sending millions of litres of untreated sewage into the Red River last week.

The city diverted an estimated 59.6 million litres of raw sewage from its combined sewer system into the river — which flows into the lake — during the rain and snow storm that hit Manitoba from April 22 to 24.

"They don't want to be flooded down there so they dump the sewage right into the river," said commercial fisher Robert T. Kristjanson, who has been fighting for decades to get Lake Winnipeg cleaned up. "They're an island unto themselves and there isn't anybody to hold them accountable."

Kristjanson said complaining to city or provincial politicians about the frequent sewage spills — which in addition to feces and urine release phosphorus into the lake and contribute to algal blooms — just falls on deaf ears.

"It doesn't matter who we talk to. They're letting us suffer with this. We mean nothing," said Kristjanson. "Do people in rural Manitoba need to sue the City of Winnipeg? How else do we stop you from doing this to us? Is a lawsuit the only way to stop you from polluting us?"

The city said in media reports that diverting raw waste to the river was a decision it didn't make lightly. It had to try to prevent waste from backing up into dwellings in Winnipeg when its South End wastewater treatment plant exceeded capacity.

The sewage flowed straight into the river via the combined sewer system for one day, 22 hours and 55 minutes after the city shut down three pumping stations, according to the city's "reports on untreated sewage" webpage. The stations would have normally delivered the waste to the South End plant.

It was worse for a consecutive stretch of days in March (March 15-25) when 80.73 million litres of raw sewage were dumped into rivers (March 15: .09 ML; March 16: 5.7 ML; March 17: 5.79 ML; March 18: 8.24 ML; March 19: 9.34 ML; March 20: 9.7 ML; March 21: 13.05 ML; March 22: 20.20 ML and 2.15 ML; March 23: 1.96 ML; March 24: 4.02 ML; and March 25: .49 ML).

Combined sewers, which carry both untreated sewage and precipitation, are designed to dump straight into rivers when they're overloaded. In 2017 the provincial Conservative government gave the city 27 years to fix its combined sewers.

Despite the city's attempt to protect urban basements during the late April storm, hundreds flooded.

The city states on its reporting webpage that untreated sewage being released from sewers into the environment "helps protect public health" as well as basements.

Raw sewage contains matter such as diluted or solid feces, urine, industrial waste, nutrients such as phosphorus and nitrogen, pathogens such as viruses [including COVID], bacteria and parasites, toxic chemicals such as pesticides and heavy metals, according to the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP). Sewage contaminates coastlines and causes infectious diseases linked to swimming. Algal blooms contain toxins that can be hazardous to humans and wildlife.

"Sewage released into the rivers and oceans can cause a threat to both human health and the environment," says the UNEP.

Front line to finish line – Winnipeg welcomes the world!

The world is coming to Winnipeg in 2023! Next summer, from July 28 to Aug. 3, 2023, the 2023 World Police & Fire Games — a 10-day, multisport event bringing together over 8,500 athletes representing law enforcement and firefighters from more than 50 countries — will get underway in Winnipeg.

Held biannually, the World Police & Fire Games are an Olympic-style competition that will feature athletes competing in traditional sport events but also some specific sport competitions unique to these games, such as the Toughest Competitor Alive, the Ultimate Firefighter and K9 police dog events.

The World Police & Fire Games are the second largest sporting event in the world, after the Summer Olympics. The Games are open to any active or retired police, firefighter or law enforcement officers and are overseen by the international governing body, the World Police and Fire Games Federation.

"These games will be an exciting event for our province to host, celebrating the dedication and service of those competing," said Andrew Smith, Minister of Sport, Culture & Heritage, Government of Manitoba.

"We are eager to welcome police officers and firefighters from all over the world and cheer them on as they display their love of sport and passion for serving the communities they protect."

The Games will use over 40 preexisting sporting venues throughout the city and province with Athletes Village located at The Forks.

These games will have a significant economic impact as it is estimated that \$85 million will be brought into Winnipeg's growing economy. This will be a turning point for Winnipeg post-pandemic in an effort to support local businesses and boost tourism.

"The 2023 World Police & Fire Games will be an exciting community-wide sport and cultural event," said Winnipeg firefighter Chad Swayze, chair of the WPFG 2023 Host Society who has competed at seven Games. The 2023 World Police & Fire Games have developed a 50/50 lottery as an effort to support the games and athletes. All proceeds will go to the planning and delivery of the Games and contribute to the legacy program that will be part of the long term impact left by the Games. Tickets are available for purchase at www.wpfg2023. com.

Additional efforts are underway in the local community to prepare for newcomers arriving from Ukraine.

A large extended family from Ukraine will soon be moving into a five-bedroom farmhouse in Rosser, and the local community has stepped up to ensure that it's move-in ready.

Allison Churchill, who moved to Stonewall four years ago, posted on social media that she was collecting donations to prepare the home and was amazed by the quick response.

"I put the word out and literally within three days we had an amazing amount of donations," said Churchill, whose family is Ukrainian.

"My husband has been awesome at picking up stuff in the neighbourhood and doing runs with me. We ended up renting a trailer and filling it to take everything to the house."

The women from a local Hutterite colony sewed 50 quilts and dropped them off at Churchill's house to provide to families as they arrive.

"It was amazing," she said. "They also dropped off about 10 baby quilts."

One of those baby quilts went to a Ukrainian mom who delivered a baby three days after arriving in Manitoba. Churchill's cousin also put together a care package with a bassinet, diapers, clothing and other baby items, and local optometrist Dawn Dunford met up with the new mom in Ste. Rose du Lac to deliver the package.

"Between the community and friends and family, it's taken a village to literally support a village of people," Churchill said.

"We have a huge Ukrainian community here, and we all know that our ancestors started with nothing. There are going to be more families coming, so if you hear a different accent or someone who looks like they may need some directions, keep an eye out and help them."

West Interlake presents a \$730,000 surplus

In their second year with a unified mill rate, the RM of West Interlake is taking their time to lower it as much as possible for their ratepayers.

The municipality adopted a unified mill rate in 2021, combining Eriksdale and Siglunes's mill rates six years after the communities amalgamated.

Before the province required a unified mill rate, residents of the former RMs of Eriksdale and Siglunes would pay different rates.

In 2021, the RM of West Interlake's mill rate at-large was 15.385 and mill rate of the Ashern L.U.D. was 8.052.

"We are still playing around with our at-large mill rate," said Jodi Thorkelsson, interim chief administrative officer for the RM of West Interlake.

"We're working on bringing it a little bit lower."

The municipality released a draft

of the 2022 financial plan on April 25 and plans to release the updated mill rate late this week.

The financial plan states the municipality ended the fiscal year with a net operating surplus of \$737,002.40, which is six times more than the council expected.

This increase follows the 2020 fiscal year's surplus, which was budgeted to be \$21,983.76 and actually amounted to \$850,750.07.

The municipality spent over \$2 million in 2021, \$700,000 less than in 2020.

For 2022, the municipality has budgeted over \$1,920,000 in capital costs, \$113,000 more than 2021.

The Ashern L.U.D. has committed \$71,000 to revamp Railway Park in 2022. The municipality has also committed \$40,000 to improve accessibility throughout Eriksdale.

In 2022, residents will see the bor-

rowing cost for the Ashern firehall and grader garage on their property tax bills. The municipality borrowed \$900,000 in 2021 to complete the project that totalled \$1,263,308.40.

Other capital budget costs carrying into 2022 are a \$110,000 charge to replace the municipality's trucks and a \$20,000 charge to update the Ashern recycling facility.

Staff costs for 2022 are expected to slightly increase compared to 2021. Last year, the municipality set aside \$329,500 to pay staff. This year, council increased their staff budget by \$27,000, accounting for their new fulltime recreation director position.

In 2021, West Interlake set aside \$12,000 for asset management and spent \$70,000 on an asset management program. The municipality will receive a \$50,000 grant from the Federation of Canadian Municipalities

this year to offset the program's cost. For 2022, the municipality has increased their asset management budget to \$14,000.

The municipality has increased their protection materials and supplies budget by 42 per cent, allocating \$62,550 to update the fire department's equipment like protective gear, radios, AED and power tools.

The transportation services budget has increased by \$74,000 for 2022 to accommodate the cost of snow clearing and maintaining existing roads.

Reeve Arnthor Jonasson did not respond in time for publication to comment on the 2022 financial plan.

A public hearing about the drafted 2022 financial plan is set for May 9 at 7 p.m. at the Ashern Centennial Hall.

"They've been through so much. Some are coming right from the heart of the fighting. It's traumatizing enough to move to another country, never mind leaving your husband behind," Churchill said.

"We were trying to make it as easy for them as possible. It might be lots of little things, but when you add it all up, it's a big community effort."

Churchill has stepped away from collecting donations for now, and Betty-Anne Georgeson has taken up the cause to continue preparing the farmhouse. She's currently seeking donations of two TVs, a stackable washer and dryer, a vacuum, a small freezer, small lamps, window coverings, living room chairs and monetary contributions. She also noted that the newcomers will likely be looking for work, so it would be great to find out about job offers.

Anyone who would like to help can email her at b_georgeson@yahoo.ca. Georgeson also invites anyone else who is setting up a house for Ukrainian newcomers to reach out to her because she might have additional items to share, and she thanks the community for their help.

collective has banded together in efforts to help.

"I've already helped two families settle in. One is at the Perimeter and Main Street and the other is in the city," she said.

"The family I brought was a mom with her two children and sister-inlaw. The men have stayed behind fighting. My cousin in Winnipeg actually offered them a brand new twobedroom, two-bathroom home for a year, and then we had to fill it with beds and everything else."

Bertone organized a donation drive the week before the family arrived and invited people to drop off items at the home.

"It looked like a parade. People were dropping off bedroom sets and a brand new kitchen table. People were going out and physically buying brand new items to bring," she said.

"They'll be fully clothed for probably the next two years. One family came forward and said they'll buy them milk, bread and necessities for three months. At this point, anything helps."

Since there are a lot of moving parts in the process, Bertone points to a few resources for those who would like to

help. She suggests connecting with the Canadian Ukrainian Congress (Manitoba) at uccmanitoba.ca or 204-342-9348. She also suggests checking out the Facebook page called "CAN-ADA - Host Ukrainians / Hébergeons les Ukrainiens."

In addition, Economic Development Winnipeg and its business development team, YES! Winnipeg, will be working with local companies and partners to support Ukrainian nationals who are considering moving to Manitoba. They've launched a Ukraine talent initiative for Manitoba businesses willing to hire Ukrainian national job-seekers on a temporary or permanent basis. More information is available at winnipegtalenthub.com.

As well, the Winnipeg Airports Authority has partnered with the Ukrainian Canadian Congress (Manitoba) to provide their volunteers a space to set up a welcome desk at the airport to help Ukrainians who are arriving in Manitoba.

The provincial government has also

The Municipality of Gimli has reached out to the Ukrainian Canadian Congress (UCC) and a provincial refugee task force to let them know it has an empty building that can house up to 180 refugees from Ukraine should the need arise.

The 180-bed facility in the Gimli Industrial Park was used by cadets for summer military programs such as glider training.

Gimli Mayor Lynn Greenberg said last week the RM wants to help the

various organizations co-ordinating housing and other supports for refugees coming to Manitoba.

"The RM of Gimli is offering the building to the refugees, and we've been in contact with the UCC. They're welcome to use the building, but we would have to charge for hydro and staff to operate the kitchen and other areas," said the mayor. "That would have to be put into a service agreement with the RM and one of the senior levels of government, whether the province or the feds."

Greenberg said he made a presentation regarding the facility to the provincial task force at a recent meeting of the Association of Manitoba Municipalities in Brandon.

"The task force said they will get a hold of the RM when the time is right," said Greenberg.

The provincial government established a Ukrainian Refugee Task Force in March to prepare for and coordinate the settlement of Ukrainian refugees coming to Manitoba. It falls under the Manitoba Emergency Measures Organization.

"This co-ordination work includes governments, the Ukrainian Canadian Congress and other Ukrainian-Canadian organizations, the settlement

sector, community groups and other non-government organizations," states a March 28 provincial news release.

The federal government will determine how many refugees can come to Canada, and the provincial task force will coordinate and facilitate housing, health and mental health services, education, child care, social assistance and job assistance, according to the release.

Interlake resident Cindy Genik, who has taken part in fundraising efforts for Ukrainian refugees, said she's hoping the Gimli facility will be put to good use, and that the government will step in with funding for food and hydro.

"It's amazing to have the municipality offer beds at the training centre. It's a huge building that has a mess hall and an industrial kitchen. It has beds, it has been cleaned and it's all ready to go. The RM just needs government funding to run the building," said Genik. "Watching what's happening on the news, we're thinking, 'Give these people a safe place to sleep and feed them.' Then we'll get them on their feet. We have to do more."

Genik and Interlake residents Romanna Klymkiw and Allison Magnusson formed a Stand with Ukraine refugee committee, and they've collected clothing and other household items for Ukrainians who have already settled or will be settling in the Interlake. The RM of Gimli lent them a building, just across the road from the training centre, where they've set up a clothing depot.

When they're ready, Ukrainian refugees are free to take whatever they need to help them settle into their new lives in the region.

Genik said she's aware of a government living allowance for Ukrainian refugees that would temporarily house them in hotels, but the Gimli facility would be a cheaper option. And she's aware of jobs available for refugees in the Gimli area as well as in other areas.

"Instead of having them stay in a hotel, bring them to us and we can house them and give them a job in less than six weeks," said Genik. "That will save the government money in the long run."

and Prevention says people who work with sewage may be at increased risk of becoming ill from waterborne diseases, and advises they wear personal protective equipment such as eye goggles and face shields to protect from splashes, liquid-repellent coveralls, waterproof gloves and rubber boots.

Gimli Beach and other beaches along Lake Winnipeg can often register high E. coli levels in the summer that result in warnings posted on beaches. The province contends gulls are responsible for E. coli.

Commercial fisher Bill Buckels called the city's latest release yet another "shit-bombing" of Lake Winnipeg, and may result in something along the lines of the "great shit-bombing of 2018" when he and other fishers working near Hecla Island pulled up feces in their nets day after day and got covered in it head to toe.

"This latest shit-bombing by the city is an act of war. This is an attack by the citizens of Winnipeg and their leaders," said Buckels. "How they even have the authority to poison the lake and the fish is beyond belief. This will affect my livelihood, my neighbours and everyone else who wants to enjoy the lake. Mother Nature demands retribution; to begin with, let's cancel all angling licences held by Winnipeg residents."

Besieged by that huge swirling mass of feces in the fall of 2018, Buckels had collected samples of it and paid to have it analyzed by a city laboratory. The lab identified it as feces. Water scientist and retired university professor Eva Pip, who read the lab report,

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seconded it. The province, however, said it wasn't feces but likely klebsiella. Kleb is a bacterium that's found in stool.

Buckels said it doesn't matter if "turds" from this 60-million-litre spill float into fishers' nets, as they had in 2018 and in succeeding years, because the province — which is responsible for penalizing polluters and has the power to suspend operating licences — will just "cover it up."

Gimli Mayor Lynn Greenberg said city sewage spills happen "too many times" and he plans to discuss it at the next meeting of the [Lake Winnipeg] South Basin Mayors and Reeves, which consists of elected leaders from several communities around the lake.

"The commercial fishers are not impressed. Nobody is impressed by this," said Greenberg on the weekend. "I understand the city has its infrastructure challenges, but we need senior governments to find a solution to this. The city is probably trying their best, but the dollars aren't there to fix all these things."

One thing the city could do to stop polluting waterways is build a large wastewater lagoon to temporarily store waste, he said.

"If the City of Winnipeg built a large sewage lagoon, they could divert sewage to it during emergency situations. They shouldn't be sending it into the river and on to Lake Winnipeg. That's just not right," said Greenberg. "I worked in construction many years ago and I know that lagoon systems are simple and cost-effective ways to handle sewage."

The mayor said a majority of Mani-

Interlake municipalities have been dealing with the fallout from major storm events in April that have resulted in blocked drains, road washouts and overland flooding.

Last week the municipalities of Gimli, Winnipeg Beach, Arborg and Fisher were among a number of municipalities across the province to have declared a state of local emergency — which gives authorities extra powers to prevent or limit loss of life and property damage — after heavy rainfall resulted in flooding.

In the Municipality of Armstrong, Reeve Susan Smerchanski said crews were out with a backhoe to try to clear snow and ice from ditches that are impeding drainage, and some culverts are being steamed. But the RM is facing a "real challenge" with fluctuating temperatures and snow and rain storms that Mother Nature has "dumped on us."

"It has been warm and cold and warm and cold. With those thawing and freezing cycles, the ice levels on our drainage ditches are getting built up; they're thick and as hard as concrete and stop the water from flowing," said Smerchanski last week. "With the snow we had in April, the ditches got filled in again. The snow

insulates the ice at the bottom so we're only getting a trickle of water, not like the normal runoff in the spring."

Water from Armstrong flows east towards Lake Winnipeg. If it can't flow in the ditches or through culverts that are blocked with ice, it will spill onto

fields and roads.

"You try to keep the water within the banks [of the ditches], but in some areas it's creeping up over the roads and flowing into fields," she said. "It's going everywhere because of the amount of water we're getting and the amount of snow we've had."

In addition to the RM monitoring its drains, Smerchanski said the province is looking at its own drains.

"We have provincial drains running through Armstrong, and Manitoba Infrastructure staff have been monitoring everything in different areas to see what's going on," said Smerchanski. "MI said the ice is a barrier and the drains are really hard to deal with. This is going to take some time."

She said water has damaged roads across the Interlake, forcing a number of municipalities to close them.

"The roads get soft when they're soaking wet. You can't drive on them. You can't put trucks and semitrailers on them," she said. "A lot of people think you can bring out some gravel to fix them, but it won't last; it will just get washed away."

Any roads that are closed because of washouts have to be reported to 911, she said, so that EMS personnel know not to travel on them when they get a call.

RM of Gimli Mayor Lynn Greenberg said this spring has been the "worst I've ever seen" and the RM can't keep up with the freezing and thawing cycles and heavy precipitation.

The municipality had two backhoes and steamers working flat out to clear ditches and culverts and get the water running, he said last week. They were focusing on clearing channels to the lake to help with water flow from the west, as well as working on the "worst spots" to try to prevent flooding in low-lying areas and property damage.

"We had a backhoe on the Arnes line yesterday (last Wednesday) and one the day before. They were also working on the Boundary line and Camp Morton. Right now, they're on Willow Creek west of Highway 8 because there's a problem there," said Greenberg. "They're going steady all the time. We also have contractor that had a go out west to get the water moving. They had a lot opened up and then it all got blocked in again with these crazy snowstorms."

Some properties that were built in the 1940s and 1950s along certain drains in the RM may be especially vulnerable to flooding because the properties weren't raised, he said.

By last weekend, when the province was hit by another heavy rain event, Greenberg said in an update that most of the ditches had been cleaned out and the water was flowing. But the rain was compounding the situation and the RM declared a state of local emergency.

The municipality posted a notice on its website for those who've already experienced property damage as a result of flooding. People are advised to contact their insurance provider to see what damages are covered as disaster financial assistance (DFA) "does not pay for perils that can be insured and does not top-up insurance," states the April 28 notice.

People without insurance can complete a DFA application on the provincial government's EMO webpage although a DFA program has not been established by the government.

The Town of Winnipeg Beach declared a state of local emergency on the weekend to deal with flooding. It tore out culverts on Boundary Creek to improve water flow to the lake and to bring water levels down in order to protect properties from further flooding. It also instructed residents to divert their sump pits to ditches because the town's sewer system had reached capacity.

"Due to high water our sewer system is at capacity," states a notice on its website. "Please make sure that all sump pits are directed to the ditches and not into your septic tank or the sewer."









Pysanky classes reconnect Ukrainians to tradition

The tradition of decorating eggs spans thousands of years and several cultures. Eggs can symbolize new life, spring and, in Ukrainian culture, the sun.

"A lot of the roots of decorating eggs and the symbols that are made on them come from pagan history," said Janet Palin, who has decorated eggs for decades.

Palin learned how to traditionally decorate eggs at the Ukrainian Cultural Centre in Winnipeg when she was around six years old.

"I like the precision. I like the detail, the lines," she said.

"It makes me feel connected to my heritage."

Pysanky, derived from the "to write," is the Ukrainian practice of "writing" on eggs.

Traditional designs depict the sun, triangles and lines, which symbolize blessings, good fortune and a fruitful season.

"Once Christianity was introduced ... symbols like triangles, which were a symbol of earth, fire and water became the Father, Son and Holy Ghost," said Palin.

Artists use a stylus, called a kistka, dipped in wax to sketch shapes across the delicate shell.

The egg is then dipped into a dye that coats the surface, except for the spaces lined with wax. The wax-resist technique is known as batik and can be described as colouring in reverse.

The maker repeats the wax and dip dye process until they are satisfied with the pattern.

Carefully positioning the egg near a candle, the wax is melted and rubbed off the surface of the shell, leaving a smooth, colourful creation.

Decorating eggs is most popular around the Easter season, but Palin practises the art year-round. Palin takes care to section her egg and sketch designs using a pencil before she starts adding wax, which can take her up to four hours.

"I'm pushing myself to do everything I used to

always shy away from," she said.

"I'm always trying to improve." Selecting colours and dyeing the egg then takes several hours, depending on the complexity of her design.

Friends reach out to Palin to learn the pysanky technique, which she will also teach at the Green Acres Art Centre in Teulon.

"(Pysanky) has been a passion of mine for most of my life, and now I get to share it with other people," she said.

"It makes me very happy that people want to learn how to do this art."

Palin's classes at GAAC will teach simple patterns for beginners to start learning the technique.

"I just hope I can pass along a love of the art."

This is the first year GAAC has offered pysanky classes, and president Lana Knor hopes the tradition will continue.

"I have always wanted to host these classes," said Knor.

GAAC will keep offering the pysanky classes as long as the community is interested.

Pysanky classes will be held on May 9 from 1:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. and 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. at GAAC. A class costs \$30 per participant. Tools and supplies will be provided.

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Medical procedures backlog grows to over 169,000

EMS wait times highest in Interlake

Manitoba's surgical and diagnostic procedures backlog continues to increase, according to the latest data from Doctors Manitoba, but the rate at which it's increasing has somewhat slowed.

The physician advocacy organization, which has been tracking the pandemic-induced backlog of procedures for Manitobans for almost a year, updated its public dashboard last Friday.

It now estimates there are 169,198 procedures in the queue, an increase of 1,311 procedures since March. There are delays in accessing health-care services such cardiac surgeries, hip/knee replacements, lung function tests, MRIs, ultrasound scans, endoscopies and allergy tests.

The "biggest barrier" to clearing the backlog, said Doctors Manitoba, is a shortage of nurses and other healthcare staff.

"While it's disappointing to see the estimated backlog grow again, the rate of growth has started to slow down," said Doctors Manitoba president Dr. Kristjan Thompson in an April 29 statement. "This reflects what we are seeing on the front line, with more and more staff returning to operating rooms and other areas, helping the system get closer to its pre-pandemic baseline volumes. That said, physicians are looking for a concrete plan from the province on addressing the shortage of nurses, technologists and other professionals needed to catch up and keep up with testing and surgeries."

The organization said it has had discussions with the government about its backlog data, but "provincial health officials have not yet shared any additional data to help with refining the backlog estimates."

Doctors Manitoba said it has filed a freedom-of-information request to acquire that data.

Other health-care news:

- The spread of COVID in Manitoba continues, with an increase in cases detected by PCR testing. In its weekly surveillance report for April 17-23, the government reported 1,436 lab-confirmed COVID cases, 200 new hospital admissions, of which 12 cases required admission to intensive care, and 13 more deaths.

In the week previous (April 10-16), there were 1,190 lab-confirmed CO-

VID infections, 206 new hospital admissions, of which 22 required intensive care, and 12 more deaths from the virus.

The *Express* asked the province's Shared Health organization for the total number of people in hospital with COVID as of April 28 or April 29. Shared Health was unable to provide that data as it is "owned by the Provincial Information Management and Analytics team." Shared Health forwarded the request to the province. The province responded but didn't provide the data. Shared Health, however, was able to provide ICU data.

"As of midnight [April 28], there were 97 patients in intensive care. This includes both patients receiving COVID and non-COVID care," said the spokesperson.

Although 79.2 per cent of Manitobans are fully vaccinated (data provided in the weekly surveillance report), researchers have shown that the omicron variant and its subvariants are able to evade vaccine-induced and natural immunity. The variants can also reinfect people who've already been previously infected.

The provincial government lifted all basic public health measures such as masking and social distancing in March, saying it expected an uptick in the number of people who would get infected and require care. It also closed a number of PCR testing centres across the province. Three remain open in Winnipeg for "only eligible people" such as pre-op patients or "eligible symptomatic people." The results of rapid antigen tests are not tracked by the province.

- A COVID outbreak was declared April 27 on the maple south unit of the Tudor House personal care home in Selkirk by the medical officer of

health for the Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority (IERHA).

- EMS wait times in the Interlake have seen the "highest" jump among provincial health regions, according to ambulance ground data shared by the Manitoba NDP last week. The lengthy waits come down to a paramedic staffing crisis.

The NDP tabled documents in the legislature showing rural ambulances being out of service for over 19,000 hours in December 2021. In the Interlake, response times have climbed 35 per cent since 2018.

"When you call 911, you need an ambulance to hit the road right away, but that's just not the case in rural Manitoba under the PCs," said NDP health care critic Uzoma Asagwara in a news release. "The PC government has known about the rural paramedic staffing crisis for over a year, but instead of coming up with solutions they are letting wait times get longer and longer while families and frontline health care workers pay the price. Rural families deserve a government that fixes the staffing problem and ensures they can get care when they need it."

In order to help recruit and retain paramedics in rural Manitoba, NDP leader Wab Kinew said the government needs to pay them "fair and competitive" wages.

- Rural residents with their own automated external defibrillators (AEDs) and/or first aid training cannot be utilized by the province in an emergency situation. Resident names are not compiled on a back-up list of people who could help a neighbour or someone else in their community in the event that EMS is delayed.

A spokesperson for Shared Health said such lists aren't kept because the individuals with first aid are not licensed to provide care to "the standards expected of emergency responders" and could not be relied upon to respond "at a moment's notice."

"Contingency planning is in place to respond to [health-care system] staffing challenges that may arise, including asking other staff to work more hours or pick up extra shifts," said the spokesperson. "Paramedics throughout the province are also strategically positioned throughout the province that utilizes computer modelling and predictive deployment, allowing for adjustments to minimize any shortterm challenges."

For low acuity patients that need transporting to a facility, the province is using alternative transportation alternatives in order to free up more staff, said the spokesperson.

"Finally, efforts are ongoing to recruit more staff to increase paramedic coverage and reduce Manitoba's reliance on overtime or on-call staffing," he added.

- Dr. David Matear, who served as the IERHA's chief executive officer, was appointed provincial executive director of the Diagnostic and Surgical Recovery Task Force. The IERHA said in an April 26 statement that it had "benefitted greatly" from his management. Marion Ellis was appointed CEO.

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New coverage area

Unused space in the RM of Coldwell is getting a facelift to create a community gathering space.

Debbie Valiquette approached the RM of Coldwell about updating the derelict Lundar petting zoo in late 2021.

Valiquette did not respond in time for publication to comment on the project.

"The petting zoo has been there forever," said Breanna Rae, recreation director for the RM of Coldwell.

The Lundar Agricultural Society annually used the structure during the Lundar Fair.

After transitioning a part of the space into a multi-sport cement pad and the Lundar Skateboard Park in 2021, the Ag Society agreed to also allow the redevelopment of the petting zoo space, said Mike Kostyshyn, president of the Ag Society.

This year's fair on June 10 and 11 will also have a petting zoo area but will use an old horse barn closer to the festival grounds instead.

After the fair, the Ag Society will reconvene to decide if they need a better location for the petting zoo.

"We want to revamp it so that it's not just an empty building," said Rae. The community plans to replace the

concrete pad, build storage and create a space for people to barbecue.

"We've noticed that a lot of people driving through town will stop at the

park, so we thought this could be like a tourist rest stop," said Rae.
