

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# Arborg's brother and sister duo playing at Dauphin's Countryfest

This summer, an Arborg brother and sister duo will take the big stage at Dauphin's Countryfest following their band's announcement as performers.

On Friday, June 28, the Arborg natives Kendra and Codey Emms will take the stage at Canada's longestrunning country music festival as part of the local rock band, Northern Royals. The five-member group will be performing at the Credit Union Corral Stage.

The sibling duo said they were always interested in music, and the love for playing it was instilled in each of them from a young age. Codey is a Northern Royals drummer. His obsession with the instrument started when he was just one year old, begging his cousin to let him play his set. Soon enough, he got his own drum kit and played the drums on and off through school before setting down the sticks for six years.

Kendra, a Northern Royals bass player, first picked up a guitar when she was 13 after finding one of her dad's downstairs. She took a few lessons, but none of what she learned stuck. So years later, when the Northern Royals began, she picked up a bass instead and hasn't set it down

"I was doing what I enjoyed with rhythm in mind," she said. "Not melodies or leads."

After Kendra and Codey attended a concert in Winnipeg one night, the bug to play drums came back to Codev, and the itch just to play came back to Kendra, so they rented a house they could "be loud in" and started play-

ing together with the hopes of starting a band. Coincidentally, Codey had met their future vocalist. Evan Chandler, through hockey and invited him to join their musical endeavours. Eventually, Chandler ended up living with them as well.

Kyle Matthews and Dale McIntyre, who both play guitar, are also members of Northern Royals. The two men are newer additions to the band, taking over positions that were once a revolving door.

The name "Northern Royals" came after another Canadian band with a similar title flagged the band's initial name (Autopilot). On a car ride home from a gig, two band members were talking and the name sprouted from a normal conversation. The name pays homage to the band's northern roots while sticking in the minds of their fans, so they stuck with it.

Since forming in 2011, Northern Royals have played numerous gigs across the province. Their first one was at Arborg Collegiate's 50th celebration, where they had to play their rock tunes from the arena canteen because the stage was vandalized. They've also played at Monster Truck, Harbour Fest and Rockin' the Fields of Minnedosa, among other festivals. This year, they'll be playing the same music festival country superstars Alabama, the Nitty Gritty Dirty Band and Carolyn Dawn Johnson are playing.

"We've come a long way," said Kendra, noting the band has submitted themselves for every concert and festival they can time and time again, and they're finally seeing the rewards from their hard work.

Northern Royals' third album, Hello

Chaos, will be released on Aug. 23. The vocalist, Chandler, does most of the wordsmithing when writing songs. When they first started, Northern Royals' music was mainly about love, heartbreak and relationships. Now, their songs are broader, telling stories about perseverance, plants and life.

"For us as a band, the music comes first and the lyrics after," said Codey.

Hello Chaos is almost three years in the making. Each song was crafted in the Emms siblings' basement as the band members played and sang tunes and words into songs. The album re-

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## Riverton's Johnny and His Musical Mates earns spot on MFA Wall of Fame

Riverton's legendary band, Johnny and His Musical Mates, was honoured for its outstanding contribution to fiddling music last month by the Manitoba Fiddle Association.

During a celebratory event held on April 28 in Carman, the MFA added the musical mates to its Wall of Fame with family and friends in attendance.

The musical tour de force was composed of Johnny Johannesson, Kris Johannesson, Laugi Johannesson, Dorothy Johnson, Sella Benedictson, Kristine Collins and family friend Harold Bjornson. The spirit of their music has been kept alive through successive generations over seven decades.

Sella Benedictson is the last surviving member of the musical mates, and she accepted a plaque at the ceremony on behalf of her musical family.

Families of the performers said in a joint statement that they're so proud of their forebears being recognized by the association.

"The families of Johnny and his Musical Mates are extremely proud of the recognition from the Manitoba Fiddle Association with the induction to the Wall of Fame. This family orchestra has shared their talent and love of

music with many people of all ages, over seven decades, continuing the legacy for generations to come," said the family. "Music was at the core of all of our gatherings and this sense of community helped to provide all of us with many moments of happiness, joy, hope and great memories. We feel so fortunate that the last remaining member of the musical mates, Sella Benedictson, was able to be a witness to this beautiful event."

In the 1930s, Sturlaugur "Laugi" Johannesson Sr. and his two young sons, Johnny and Kris, played the vio-

lin at house parties. By 1941, Johnny and Kris had become seasoned performers. Between 1941 and 1950, they encouraged their four siblings Dorothy, Sella, Kristine and Laugi, as well as family friend Harold Bjornson, to play with them and the band eventually became known as Johnny and His Musical Mates. The band played an integral role in Riverton's musical history, according to the biography provided on the plaque.

"They were sought after for their old-time Continued on page 9

# Madeline's Closet: A supportive space for those in need

Sixteen years ago, Shannon Dupont, a social worker for the federal government at the time, witnessed an immense amount of clothing going to waste in her and surrounding com-

"It horrified me the amount of clothing that was going in the landfill," said Dupont. She began working with the district manager at Reitmans to arrange a pickup of clothing that would otherwise be thrown away.

What started as co-operation with one store and Dupont operating out of her vehicle, home and pop-up shops has expanded into networking with 24 stores and the opening of their location that people can access. The volunteers of Madeline's Closet, most of whom have been with the program for many years, repair damaged clothing and household items from these stores, which are then made available to women and children free of charge.

These volunteers even save severely damaged items by making them into patchwork blankets, which are given to families who have lost their homes in fires. At Christmas, children are

welcome to come and find gifts for their mothers free of charge, such as donated jewelry and scarves wrapped for them by volunteers.

As for the charity's namesake, Dupont is of Métis descent and has had a highly influential elder in her life: Madeline Sanderson.

"Madeline always told me that if I stayed true to my roots and believed in myself, I would do good things," shared Dupont.

Madeline's Closet now operates out of Inwood, where Dupont was born and raised. The store is attached to the school, which opened in September 2022. The facility consists of four main rooms: the first is the boutique area where shoppers can sign in and browse; the second is an area for children's and men's clothing; the third is the space where the volunteers organize everything by size and season; and the fourth is a newly installed laundry room, washroom and kitch-

On the first Wednesday of every month from 4:30 to 8 p.m., Madeline's Closet is open to the community and offers three free items per person. On this month's community day, 213

people visited.

As their website states, Madeline's Closet "allows all women to access clothing and household items without guilt that they are taking away from their family."

In the 16 years since Dupont started

this charity, over 600,000 people have accessed this program, which is open to anyone, no matter their financial background. Madeline's Closet sees roughly 1,100 people per month between their Inwood and Winnipeg locations.

Colette Banks, Cindy Little and Kris Kowalski working under the umbrella of the Right Choice brokerage, which has been approved and licenced by the Manitoba Securities Commission. The MSC regulates and registers real estate professionals and protects buyers and sellers, among other functions.

A real estate broker does the same job as a real estate agent (helps clients buy and sell real estate), but a broker has additional education, is licensed to work independently and can employ agents.

Giesbrecht's fellow agents are independent real estate professionals, but they'll all support each other when someone is away or needs assistance.

When the band recorded Hello Chaos, Chandler was sick for both studio sessions. So the Emms siblings switched homes with their parents for five days and the Northern Royals set up camp in Arborg, where they recorded the vocals for each song.

The upcoming release from Northern Royals will include a mini docuseries showcasing the behind-thescenes process of creating their new album. The band plans to share four seven-minute episodes on their social media accounts, with posting dates yet to be announced.

Before the album release party, Northern Royals will be playing at Bankside Music Festival, a few one-off shows across the prairies and their gig at Dauphin's Country-

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# Agriculture is part of the solution

It is not your great-granddaddy's farm anymore. While some may have nostalgia for the old farm with a little red barn that housed a few chickens, a couple of pigs and a dairy cow, it is better for both the environment and the economy that agriculture has modernized. Today's farmers have taken, and are taking, key steps to protect our natural resources while maintaining economic sustainability. Farmers are critical in creating solutions to today's environmental challenges while fostering economic growth and job development.

Being part of the environmental solution includes resolving the algae problem in Lake Winnipeg. People across the country are concerned about the health of the lake. Nutrients are fertilizing algae blooms that consume the oxygen in the water, which in turn harm fish populations and other natural life in the lake. Algae-covered beaches limit everyone's enjoyment of the lake and harm businesses that rely on Manitoba's short tourist season. There have been countless studies and action plans, but solving this complex problem remains elusive.

Some have pointed a finger at Manitoba's farmers as contributing to the problems at Lake Winnipeg. This ignores the significant strides that agriculture has taken to ensure that the right nutrients are put in the right place and at the right time to maximize crop growth and limit nutrient runoff. Gone are the days of the little red barn where manure was spread on the surface without knowing its nutrient content or where fertilizer was applied without knowing what the plants needed.

Modernization of agriculture has revolutionized nutrient management. Take today's hog operations in Manitoba as an example. Before applying manure, farmers are required to file manure management plans with the provincial government. These nutrient management plans are tailored to the specific crop being grown and include soil sampling to help prevent the over-application of nutrients. Over 90 per cent of hog manure in Manitoba is injected below the soil surface or incorporated into the soil immediately after application to prevent runoff and to position this valuable nutrient next to the seed where it is needed. Before application, the manure itself is sampled to give an accurate understanding of its nutrient content.

Advances in technology are making the application of manure more precise. Modern equipment can test the flow as the manure is applied, using near-infrared technology, and vary application rates in real-time. Farmers use global positioning technology, ultrasonic speed sensors and radar to ensure that manure is applied in the right place and at the right rate. The technology that allows farmers to maximize the benefits of this natural fertilizer also helps to minimize nutrient leaching into waterways, including Lake Winnipeg. Similar advances in precision farming are allowing those who use synthetic fertilizers to apply plant nutrition in a way that maximizes its value.

Modern agriculture uses plant nutrition more precisely and efficiently while reducing the potential for negative environmental impacts and producing more food for consumers in Canada and worldwide. This is what being part of the solution means to Manitoba's farmers.

Being part of the solution can also mean taking action beyond the farm. Farmers are prepared to do this and ready to participate in a broad effort to develop solutions to the challenges facing Lake Winnipeg. As a first step we need to bring together expertise from all parts of the Lake Winnipeg basin — call this the Lake Winnipeg

Task Group. The Task Group, which can be called together by the Province of Manitoba, should include representatives from livestock agriculture, representatives from grain and oilseed farmers, representatives from First Nations and representatives from Manitoba municipalities, including the City of Winnipeg. The Task Group should also include thirdparty scientific expertise to steer the discussions.

The Task Group should be mandated to outline science-based measures designed to reduce nutrient flow into the lake. Some of the potential action items have already been discussed, such as rehabilitating marshes that filter incoming water, ensuring untreated sewage does not flow into the Red River and increasing the understanding of the "right source, right place, right rate and right time" principles for nutrient application in agriculture. The Task Group should be charged with presenting ways of breaking down barriers to the adoption of these known solutions as well as new ideas to keep Lake Winnipeg healthy. And, finally, the Task Group should be forward-looking and action-oriented rather than a body that rehashes the finger-pointing that occurred in the past.

# Manitobans urged to be vigilant during tick season

Manitoba Health, Seniors and Long-Term Care urges individuals to remain cautious of ticks, implement measures to avoid bites and understand when treatment may be necessary. Blacklegged ticks, also known as deer ticks, pose a threat to human well-being as they can carry diseases such as Lyme disease, anaplasmosis, babesiosis and Powassan virus disease. These illnesses can have severe consequences, especially for older adults, young children or individuals with weakened immune systems or existing medical issues.

According to public health officials, it is recommended to see a health-care provider within 72 hours of removing a tick in order to receive preventative treatment for Lyme disease if:

- the bite was from a reliably identified black-legged tick; and
- the tick was attached for 36 hours or more, or the tick was engorged (filled with blood).

Blacklegged ticks can be found yearround, with their most active periods occurring in the spring and fall when there is no snow on the ground. As these ticks carry potential health risks, it is essential to know how to differentiate them from the common wood tick. While wood ticks are simply a nuisance, they do not transmit diseases in Manitoba. To tell them apart, black-legged ticks have distinct features such as a red-orange body, black legs and a black spot on their back. These ticks are also smaller than wood ticks; adult females are about the size of a sesame seed. When engorged with blood, black-legged ticks will become larger and change colour to grey and brown. Conversely, wood ticks are bigger in size, have a brownish appearance and white markings on their back. Anyone who finds a tick on animals, humans or in various habitats can submit a picture to have it identified by experts to confirm if the tick belongs to a species capable of transmitting diseases. For more information or to submit a picture of a tick, visit www.etick.ca.

Reduce your risk of tick bites and disease exposure by:

- applying an appropriate tick repellent on exposed skin and clothing, following label directions;
- wearing long pants and longsleeved shirts;
- tucking in clothing to create a bar-
- staying to the centre of walking
- inspecting yourself, children and pets after spending time outdoors;
- removing ticks as soon as possible from people and pets, using tweezers;
- keeping grass and shrubs around homes cut short to create drier environments that are less suitable for tick

Milder winters and shifting weather patterns caused by climate change means ticks are expanding their geographical range to more regions of the

province, although southern Manitoba remains the highest risk area.

# Long-legged ditch wader

The great blue heron is a large wading bird in the heron family Ardeidae, common near the shores of open water and in wetlands over most of North and Central America. as well as far northwestern South America, the Caribbean and the Galápagos Islands. The heron, with its subtle blue-grey plumage, often stands motionless as it scans for prey or wades belly-deep with long, deliberate steps. They may move slowly, but great blue herons can strike like lightning to grab a fish or snap up a gopher.



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# Riverton Elks Lodge #530 gets commendation from provincial association

The Riverton Elks Lodge #530 received a commendation from its provincial association last week for the dedication of its members and service to the community.

Dean Sherritt, who has been president of the Manitoba Elks Association for the past two years, paid a visit to Riverton on May 8 to review the lodge's state of affairs, share supper with lodge members and recognize the achievements of the club and individual members.

"The amount of work Lodge #530 does in the community and the support it gets from the community is amazing," said Sherritt after a tour of the town with the lodge's secretary Doug Anderson. "Doug gave me a wonderful tour, shared the great history of the area and gave me a list of all the donations they provided in 2023-2024."

Visits to local clubs by the provincial Elks used to take place on a regular basis but that got sidelined during COVID, said Sherritt. The association has been reaching out to Elks lodges to try to get that process back on track.

"Riverton jumped right on the ball when I contacted them," said Sherritt. "During my visits to local lodges, I bring news from the association. I'm here to inspect the health of the lodge and help the lodges thrive through support."

Sherritt said the Elks of Canada started in 1912 and now has over 200 lodges and 7,000-plus members, both men and women. Lodge members have given "countless volunteer hours" to serving their community's needs, and the Elks' vision is to be the best volunteer organization in Canadian communities.

"In the last year, the Riverton Elks put over \$80,000 into their community, along with countless hours of volunteer time," said Sherritt. "The lodge's 48 members are to be commended for the great work they do."

Even though Riverton has a rela-

tively healthy number of volunteers, the club's membership has declined. Sherritt said in addition to Elks clubs, service organizations in other communities are experiencing a decline in volunteer numbers. He encourages people — especially younger adults — to consider joining the Elks and offer whatever skills they have in order to benefit their community.

"Many small communities have volunteer groups whose numbers are dwindling. Maybe there were two or three service groups at one time in their community and are now down to one or maybe none," said Sherritt. "Don't put off joining your local lodge or club until you have more time. People may have skills such as being good at meeting people or they're a social media whiz or they have leadership skills or want to be a leader. Local service organizations have opportunities for you to grow personally while you help your community at the same time. Riverton is a great example of a hard-working lodge that makes the Elks proud to be associated with it."

Service club members are typically made up of older adults who've served for several years and many want to retire. Younger adults, including those with families, may be pressed for time or are too busy getting their kids to hockey games or other sporting events to think about joining a service club like the Elks, said Sherritt. However, it might be beneficial to join and keep the club thriving as it does provide financial support to various community organizations.

There are a number of benefits to being part of the Elks, said Sherritt, including personal satisfaction of helping your community and being involved with like-minded people who like to help their community prosper.

"People make time to go to sports events. If they were to choose to volunteer their time with the Elks, they might be able to make that sporting event less expensive for everybody through the support of the Elks," said Sherritt. "I hate to hear families say that they can't put their kids in sport because it's too expensive. We need to show the younger people the benefits of joining a service club. It's rewarding to say you put \$15,000 into a daycare, like the Riverton Elks have pledged."

Riverton Elks secretary Doug Anderson said the \$15,000 pledge to the daycare for a new building is on hold while the province approves the building. The Elks have also pledged another \$15,000 for a pergola that's just being installed at the Riverton Transportation & Heritage Centre. The Elks also provided \$30,000 last fiscal season for installing air conditioning in the curling rink, as well as funding support for Riverton Minor Hockey. In previous years, the Elks have generously provided funding for sports facilities in Riverton such as the recreation centre.

Although the Riverton Elks have lost some members, the club's reputation and services to the community enable it to maintain member numbers and continue serving year after year.

"One thing we are proud of is our longevity and member service. Our lodge started in 1969 and since then we've been able to find enough new people to join," said Anderson. "Our present exalted ruler, Eric Loewen, is a third-generation exalted ruler. Eric's grandfather was part of the Elks, his father was and now he is. He's just five days into the position, having started on May 3."

The Riverton Elks hold a popular fundraiser each year that sees one lucky winner drive off on a Harley-Davidson motorcycle and a second winner receive a prize worth around \$25,000.

"The motorcycle fundraiser is very popular and that's where we raise most of our money to help our community," said Anderson.

The draw will take place on Aug. 24 at the Marvelous Meadows Golf Course in Arnes. Tickets are available from any Elks member or through the Elks' Facebook and Instagram pages.

danceable feel with a rich, full bodied musical sound," states the biography. "Johnny's strong lead violin along with Kris's smooth harmony were so in sync that often it sounded like just one amazing violin playing."

Sigrid Palsson, the daughter of Dorothy Johnson, commemorated her musical family with a written tribute covering the band's early and later

Palsson said Sturlaugur and his sons Johnny and Kris were the "inspiration" to the other four Johannesson children. In 1941, Dorothy, 13, on piano and Sella, 10, on Hawaiian guitar joined the band. Laugi, 9, on drums joined four years later. In 1950, Kristine, 15, on accordion joined. Harold Bjornson was a "valuable" addition to the band with exceptional guitar playing and singing. The musical mates became exceptionally popular and established themselves throughout the Interlake.

"The decade of the 1950s brought the era of dances at the Geysir and Vidir halls. Everyone who lived in the district knew these places well. Every Saturday night Johnny and His Musical Mates would play in a hall filled to capacity," wrote Palsson in her tribute. "Chores would be finished a little earlier and dress clothes and shoes set out. People anxiously awaited the journey down to the hall where they would be greeted by the shuffle of dancing feet and outstanding music."

Brian Austfjord, owner of the Hnausa General Store, south of Riverton, and who established the Breidavik Nja Island Historic Library & Resource Centre as a tribute to Icelandic heritage, attended the ceremony in Carman to help the family celebrate the honour.

"I personally grew up with their music and was a neighbour. I sure do miss their music," said Austfjord, who shared a photo of the plaque and one of the tributes the band collected over the years. "Third-generation family members played a few sets at the awards to a packed dance floor."

# ESD expanding kindergarten to full days, every day

ESD is excited to announce that for the 2024-2025 school year, the kindergarten program will be expanded to five full days per week. This change will provide the youngest students with more opportunities for learning and growth

ESD's kindergarten model currently requires young students to attend school three full days a week. The program is primarily play-based and focuses on literacy, numeracy and social-emotional development. Each year, ESD has five or six kindergarten classes across its schools, with enrollment remaining stable at approximately 100 students — that hasn't changed.

ESD Supt. Scott Hill said the division is very excited about the programming change, with numerous studies proving the benefits of fulltime kindergarten. When the idea to expand the program in the division first came, the plan was to move it to four full days a week, but parent and staff feedback had the division move to five full days a week instead. Other feedback received fell into several categories.

"Full-time kindergarten will provide an enhanced level of support to our youngest pupils in the domains of social, emotional, physical, cognitive and language development," said Hill. This benefit is especially true for students with complex needs, but all students will benefit from the ability to provide additional support in early reading, basic numeracy and behaviour development.

A 2010 Ontario study found full-day kindergarten had lasting benefits on children's self-regulation, reading, writing and math skills to the end of

Grade 2. The study also found children in the full-day program were significantly more likely to meet provincial expectations for reading in Grade

With the change, some parents raised concerns about the capacity for young children to attend school more than three days a week, but in Manitoba, kindergarten attendance is flexible and at the discretion of the guardians. That means if caregivers feel it would be beneficial for their child to attend for fewer days a week, they can.

The expansion of ESD's kindergarten program also eases childcare concerns for parents, since they will no longer need to secure daycare for two days a week. From an economic point of view, Hill said it's widely accepted that investments made in the early

# Gimli New Horizons 55+ Activity Centre celebrates 50 years

The Gimli New Horizons 55-plus Activity Centre celebrated 50 years of providing older adults in the community with a number of programs and activities to keep them socially connected.

The anniversary celebration was held at new horizons' building on May 8 and included a look back in time, a luncheon and speeches from guests and local politicians.

During the celebration, new horizons board member Graham Watson said president Cindy Stewart acknowledged the centre's founding members, Mary Krulicki, Adeline Pawulski, Helen Krulicki, Nancy Dudar and Connie Harvard, along with 62 supporters, who advocated for the centre in February 1974.

"A dream was born, which has resulted in today's thriving community," said Watson.

Stewart also noted that there have been 21 presidents over the centre's 50-year history providing guidance, and she thanked all the board members and volunteers past and present "who have made this community flourish."

Special thanks went out to Jonie Johnson and Margaret LaRoque, who work in the office, and Pauline Finlay was recognized as a 30-plus-year member.

Gimli New Horizons is made up of people who are 55 and older. The centre encourages its members to stay active and socially connected through recreational and social activities such as dances, fall suppers and other special events, health and wellness programs, educational programs and support groups at its facility on Loni Beach Road in Gimli's north end.

The centre currently has 520 members who participate in over 23 weekly activities and special events.

"You know the expression: It takes a village to raise a child. In this case,

it takes an entire community to keep a senior activity centre running and developing," said Watson. "Horizons is a great place to meet people, and there's always someone you know there."

During the celebration, Watson outlined the history of the current GNH property, which was the Dalman family's dairy farm in 1912, the One Big Union summer camp around 1920 and a property that the Province of Manitoba took over around 1939.

"The location had many uses over the years from a teacher certification facility, to Blue Bomber spring training camps to other learning opportunities," said Watson. "In 1994, GNH

years of schooling "pay significant dividends later on."

"Expanding kindergarten will help us to ensure that our students become proficient readers and will also help us to more quickly identify the children that may need extra support," he said. "The earlier that we can begin providing additional support, the more likely we will be to minimize any learning gaps. In the case of reading, we know that in the long term, strong literacy skills have all kinds of significant benefits ranging from em-

ployability, participation in the community, overall health and even life expectancy."

Hill added that kindergarten is a child's first school experience, and ESD's play-based programming and dedicated staff provide a caring learning environment "full of joy and learning."

"This is a time for us to begin to develop critical skills in the foundations of reading, math and social skills," said Hill.

# Ashern Central School ready for spring performances

Spring is anything but the time to wind down for art students at Ashern Central School (ACS).

Last week, on May 9, the ACS junior dramatics students performed The Brothers Grimm Spectaculathon, a onehour production in which the classic Brothers Grimm fairytales are combined into stories, creating a sort of alternate universe of plays.

Thirteen students participated in the junior dramatics program as an extracurricular and performed the whirlwind play. Most cast members had double roles, meaning they started in one story as one character and ended in another story as someone completely different.

Jennifer Bjornson, arts teacher at ACS, was extremely proud of her students following the production, and she's looking forward to more from the rest of her students before the school year ends. One actress in the junior play had seven roles, with her running around on stage exchanging wigs and accents, impressing everyone in the audience.

This week, the senior dramatics class is going to the Manitoba Youth Drama Festival at the University of Winnipeg. They'll take part in workshops all morning, then watch performances from other schools and perform part of their upcoming play themselves for adjudication.

The high school performance will be on Thursday, May 30. Five students will perform The Greek Mythology Olympiaganza, with each actor having three to five roles throughout the production.

Each fall, Bjornson holds a kind of drama bootcamp where interested students can get a feel for being part of a production. Some students leave, determining plays aren't for them, and others stay and end up in the spring productions ACS puts on. The junior and senior dramatics clubs get



their scripts before Christmas and pick up rehearsals in January after Christmas break, going hard until their performances.

"With all the snow days and long weekends this year, we're working really hard on the days that we're here," said Bjornson.

On June 4, the ACS music classes will have their spring concert, where they'll perform all they've learned this school year. Bjornson hopes to have the concert outside this year if the weather cooperates. This year's concert theme is science, nature and music, and the performance will feature songs from South America, pop music, rock music and country music, among other things. Before the public concert, the music classes will perform for Fisher Branch students on May 31.

Bjornson attended ACS herself as a child, and upon returning to the school to teach, she had no budget for the arts. Today, she has a budget that allows her to do everything she wants, which means ACS students have many creative options.

"Whether or not kids go on to do things in the arts, while they're growing up, these are important things for them to learn," she said. "The arts teach them teamwork, kindness, inclusion. These things carry into life."



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# Solar storm causes colourful aurora displays

The strongest geomagnetic storm in 20 years made the colourful northern lights, or aurora borealis, visible Friday and Saturday night across Manitoba and North America. The NOAA's (National Oceanic And Atmospheric Administration) Space Weather Prediction Center said on Saturday that the sun had continued to produce powerful solar flares. That's on top of previously observed coronal mass ejections (CMEs), or explosions of magnetized plasma, that wouldn't reach Earth until Saturday night. The agency had been monitoring a particularly active sunspot cluster since Wednesday and confirmed on Friday that it had observed G5 conditions — the level designated "extreme" — which haven't been seen since October 2003. In a press release on Friday, Clinton Wallace, director of NOAA's Space Weather Prediction Center, said the current storm is "an unusual and potentially historic event."

Geomagnetic storms happen when outbursts from the sun interact with Earth's magnetosphere. While it all has kind of a scary ring to it, people on the ground don't really have anything to worry about. As NASA explained on X, "Harmful radiation from a flare cannot pass through Earth's atmosphere" to physically affect us. These storms can mess with our technology, though, and have been known to disrupt communications, GPS, satellite operations and even the power

# Seats still available for upcoming ECE program

There's still time to apply for an early childhood education diploma program coming soon to the area.

A 16-month accelerated early childhood education (ECE) diploma program will soon be offered in Stonewall, thanks to a collaborative effort among the RM of Rockwood, Town of Stonewall and Red River College Polytechnic.

Georgette Rochon, manager of business development for RRC Polytech, said there are only 30 seats available in this special offering.

"Applicants need to have been working in a licensed childcare facility for at least six months prior to the start of the program. People that register for this program have generally been already working in the sector as a substitute or a childcare assistant. By taking the ECE Workplace program, they are able to upgrade their certification that is required to be eligible as and ECE 2," she said.

"By becoming the ECE 2, they will be equipped with knowledge and skills to create curriculum, learning experiences and environments that nurture and develop children in their care. A benefit of becoming an ECE 2 is that learners will be able to gain the next designation for the sector, which equates to higher pay and opportunities for advancement."

# Veteran Horse Camp teaches discipline, humility and self-ownership

The Sept. 11 attacks, commonly known as 9/11, were four co-ordinated Islamist suicide terrorist attacks carried out by al-Qaeda against the United States on Sept. 11, 2001. That morning, 19 terrorists hijacked four commercial airliners scheduled to travel from the East Coast to California.

Robert Wuskynyk watched the second plane hit the Twin Towers and felt the call to do something bigger to help. In that moment, his life purpose became clear.

"We didn't know where the world was going to go at that time. ... So I joined the Canadian Armed Forces. And now I'm at a stage in my life where I'm in the twilight of my career and still have that desire to serve."

Wuskynyk's commitment to serving others drove him to create Red Rose Ranch Veteran Horse Camp (R3VHC), a not-for-profit organization that offers free horsemanship training (based on the Equestrian Canada program) and ranch life experiences facilitated by, and intended for, military, first responders and veterans. With a focus on connecting to the surrounding First Nations communities, the program uses a land-based approach and includes time around a fire with an Indigenous knowledge keeper.



While it's not a substitute for therapy, the equestrian lifestyle has many benefits: It can help build confidence, teach problem-solving skills provide a community to belong to.

R3VHC is all about introducing veterans to the equestrian lifestyle so they can join the community and reconnect with their sense of purpose. R3VHC isn't equine therapy — it's equine-assisted learning. Wuskynyk describes it as a "drug-free, medication-free, digital-free way of enhancing mental and physical health."

'As a kid, you can take things like swimming lessons to learn new skills, but as an adult, you become less

likely to put yourself out there," said Wuskynyk. "We teach them how to take care of the equipment and what you should look for. ... If you do purchase a horse and you want to take it to a facility, how should that facility look? Do they have an emergency action plan? Do they have farms? Do they have safety gear? Do they have first aid kits? And so we created the ranch as a model stable. ... It's a foundation that they that they can use to measure all their other experiences again."

Wuskynyk said, "The reason we are successful is that each one of our participants commits to continuing on with horse lessons afterward. One of them even went out and researched where to buy horses. For us, that's mission accomplished."

Nestled between Peguis First Nation and Fisher River Cree Nation, R3VHC operates out of Red Rose Ranch, a homestead that is surrounded by wildlife and far from the sounds of traffic. It's so quiet that one participant said, "All I can hear is the tinnitus in my ears." The homestead has been in Wuskynyk's family since they immigrated here from Ukraine in 1919. He bought two surrounding sections of land in 2005 and 2014 with no idea what he wanted to do with them.

"While I was posted in Ottawa, I was really overworked after doing a couple of tours, and I needed an outlet so I ended up getting into horses again," said Wuskynyk.

He got posted in Manitoba, and met a bunch of other veterans doing team cattle penning. He told them about his idea to provide horsemanship training to veterans after he re-

tired, and they encouraged him to do it sooner rather than later. Wuskynyk decided to do it sooner and made Red Rose Ranch into an equestrian centre in 2020.

Since Red Rose Ranch is on a conservancy, the land can't be developed past its current point. As a result, participants live in outdoor facilities for the entire week of the program, where they live communally, care for the horses, use outhouses, cook outside and use pump water.

"I funded the first camp myself and made it for Afghan vets, by Afghan vets," said Wuskynyk. "I had a participant who didn't really say a lot, so I worked with them hands-on. On the last day we were leaving our breakfast site, they said, 'This camp didn't make me a cowboy, but I underestimated how powerful it is to be in the wilderness with like-minded people who walked on the same ground as me.'"

R3VHC covers all expenses, including travel, lodging, food and everything related to the horses for participants. So far, the not-for-profit has successfully run three camps and is fundraising to run two more in late

"Myself and all my staff are convinced of the benefits of an equine lifestyle for our mental and physical well-being, and we want to share them with our brothers and sisters. Just showing them there's a better way than taking meds and sitting on your couch ... it's not impossible.

In a testimonial, one participant said, "I've had psychologists, I've had psychiatrists, I've had OSI groups. ... I've had everything the medical team can throw at you. I think time with these animals is the most beneficial and therapeutic experience that I've ever been able to come across."


Each R3VHC is assigned a horse and their tack and they are taught to put the horse's needs before their own.



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# Treble's Beach Bar and Grill holds bike rack design contest

A Winnipeg Beach business is adding bike racks to town while encouraging community spirit with artistic flair in a bike rack design contest.

Treble's Beach Bar and Grill recently held a bike rack design contest, where community members could send in their ideas for more bike racks to be added around town. Owner Kim Baryluk's initiative stemmed from the bustling summer vibes that led to




"There were so many good ones," said Baryluk.



## Arborg Heritage Village hosting a grand opening for the portable stage

It's official — the Arborg & District Multicultural Heritage Village is holding a grand opening for the new portable stage.

The local heritage village has been fundraising for a portable stage for a while. Still, grants from the federal government's Canada Community Revitalization Fund and the provincial government's Building Sustainable Communities Program helped them reach their goal much quicker than they initially thought. Each fund granted the Arborg & District Multicultural Heritage Village \$50,000 — that, with a \$5,000 grant from Community Futures East Interlake and other fundraising efforts, paid for the \$155,000 stage.

The heritage village is constantly fundraising. Because the organization

is a non-profit, it has to pay for everything and anything with fundraising dollars and grants, save for half of its summer student salary.

Pat Eyolfson, head of the Arborg & District Multicultural Heritage Village, said they've wanted to have an amphitheatre by the river for a long time, but because of spring flooding, a permanent structure just wasn't an option for the area. So they decided to get a portable stage for the space, and that's exactly what they did.

The portable stage is fully functional, with lights, sound equipment and everything needed for a good show. Its hydraulics fold the stage up into a complete package that can be hauled on the road, then fold it back down to 24 feet wide by 34 feet long, all at the push of a button.

"We wanted to do something that

would help the community at large," said Eyolfson.

On June 1, the Arborg & District Multicultural Heritage Village is hosting a grand opening for the stage, where it'll sit nestled by the river at the bottom of the hill with an afternoon of activities to enjoy. Starting at 12 p.m., there'll be free bannock for everyone, baked in a Ukrainian clay oven, with lots of food and beverage options. The ribbon-cutting ceremony will be at 1 p.m., followed by entertainment from Interlake bands, dancers, singers and musicians. Eyolfson described the event as "an old-fashioned hootenanny."

People are encouraged to bring lawn chairs or blankets to sit on for the grand opening. Shuttles will transport those with limited abilities from the top to the bottom of the hill. Eyolfson said the local Handi-Van will also be available to transport people to and from the event.

"It's a wonderful time to come and hear some local entertainment and just to sit and enjoy the afternoon out in the heritage village," she said.

The Arborg & District Multicultural Heritage Village will be hosting free mini-tours during the grand opening from noon to 1 p.m. and 4 to 5 p.m. when the event is set to end.

The village has 25 buildings on site, one brand new this February. The newest building is an old Unitarian church that was set to be torn down. Once they re-shingle its roof, the steeple will go back up on the building and it will once again be complete.

# Injuries halt Thunder's varsity girls home opener

I talked to our coaches and girls and said that's fine, we'll forfeit and told them we would be walking off."

Both players are now back with

the team; the second, however, will not play in Thursday night's game against the Falcons Football Club.

McDonald is proud of how his players have handled injuries this season.

"We'll go with what we got," said McDonald. "That's becoming our rally cry. They step up. We had girls play both ways who were eager to step up and that's what a football player is. We are proud of that and we're going to get back at it."

The Thunder are also receiving medical help from Kelsey Moeller Brown, the team's new medic, who comes to practices once a week to treat and diagnose the players.

McDonald said the time she's set aside to help is much appreciated.

The Thunder are now back practising in preparation for the Falcons. They will also have a chance at a rematch on home turf with the Mustangs on Thursday, May 23.

He said that game will be the perfect opportunity to see how his team is developing.

"We'll use our game against the Mustangs to measure ourselves and see where we've improved against the same opposition," said McDonald. "We can do that against the Falcons, too, but going into the Mustangs, we have something to compare it to. We'll see our progress and de-






