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

old daughter Hailey Dugay, who was shot and killed in 2018 during a night out with her friends in Fraserwood, west of Gimli. The organization's mission is to create a safe and supervised environment for youth, fund youth programs in the Interlake, and encourage growth and positive self-esteem in youth. Having youth members sit on its board provides valuable insight into how to engage kids.

Robak and Smith set up a movie theatre with a huge screen and chairs in one section of the gym and made a dance floor in another area. They also brought in a photo booth with a life-sized cardboard cutout of Swift and a table where merchandise could be purchased. The proceeds covered the costs of staging the event, and any remaining monies will be put towards future events.

"We sold popcorn, food and candy bags and we set up a merchandise table where we sold Taylor Swift tickets, [wash-off] tattoos and heart-shaped sunglasses, which are a big thing with Taylor Swift," said Robak. "And we also sold friendship bracelets. Some were

pre-made and some came in kits with beads and letters that the kids could use to make their own bracelet."

The idea of having a Taylor Swift-themed event for youth was initially broached in September, said Robak, and the board tasked her and Smith to put it all together.

"It took a lot of planning, but we worked together on it. We made a budget for the food and for the activities," said Robak. "It was a really good learning experience and I'm grateful to have this opportunity."

Hailey's Way will be holding future events, she added. Those will be discussed at the next board meeting.

In the meantime, the charity will be holding a 50/50 draw at the upcoming Icelandic Festival in August.

Robak said for their first event, they had a good-sized turnout, but they're hoping in future to engage even more youth.

The charity is currently fundraising for a youth centre in Gimli, which will be called the Gimli Youth Hub.

Fantasy takes flight in Eriksdale with new costume-friendly festival June 7

A whimsical new event is set to bring magic to the Interlake next weekend.

The first annual Shadows and Starlight Fantasy Festival will take place June 7 at the Eriksdale Recreation Centre, offering a full day of enchantment for all ages. Hosted by Shadows and Starlight Fantasy Events, the gathering invites guests to don their favourite fantasy attire and step into a world of imagination — from foam sword battles to a glittering evening ball.

The event came to life through a partnership with the ROGerKimLee Music Festival, after one of its organizers expressed interest in bringing live-action roleplay (LARP) to the Interlake.

"Being someone who is involved a bit with that and with the fantasy realm, we banded together to create a fundraiser for their August festival," said co-owner Erica Lindell. "I grew up in Eriksdale as well and wanted to bring some opportunity for those who love cosplay, or LARP, or the fantastical to be able to spend a day or evening at an event catered for that."

The festivities begin at 10 a.m. with a fantasy market featuring local artisans, tarot readers, authors and a host of costumed characters. LARP groups Frontier Events and Misthaven will bring their stories to life through interactive demonstrations, while Viking re-enactors from the Hands of Lugh will be on hand to share their craft and lore.

Daytime entry is \$5 per adult, with free admission for anyone under 18.

"We wanted to create something that brings people together in a fun, creative way — a place where you can step out of the ordinary and into a magical experience," said Lindell. "Whether you come in costume or just to explore, there's something for everyone."

At 8 p.m., the venue transforms into a magical ballroom for an evening so-



Manitoba Hydro monitoring wildfires, 1,500 without power

Manitoba Hydro says it's closely monitoring wildfire activity and related power outages across the province, as about 1,500 customers remained without electricity as of Friday after-

The outages are primarily affecting communities in northern and eastern Manitoba.

"The safety of our employees and the public remains our top priority," said Allan Danroth, Manitoba Hydro president and CEO. "We are working closely with the Manitoba Wildfire Service, the Office of the Fire Commissioner and RCMP to ensure we're not putting any of our restoration crews or emergency response teams in unsafe situations. We appreciate the support and patience of our customers as we wait to safely access affected areas to assess damage to our infrastructure and begin our restoration work."

Hydro confirmed all employees have left areas under evacuation orders. The Jenpeg Generating Station was evacuated Wednesday. The facility was undergoing maintenance at the time and was not generating electricity, so the evacuation is not expected to impact customers.

In eastern Manitoba, crews have paused restoration work in Nopiming Provincial Park and have left the area until conditions are safe to return.

"I want to acknowledge our staff and customers who live and work in communities affected by fires and evacuations," said Danroth. "Our thoughts are with them, and we are very mindful of the challenges they're facing. I also want to thank the firefighters and other first responders who are doing their best to protect Manitobans at this time of crisis."

Town of Arborg 2025 budget highlights, operational spending increasing by 9.2%

The Town of Arborg plans to increase its total operational spending by 9.2 per cent in 2025, according to its budget released last month.

Council is expecting to bring in total revenues of \$2,698,357 in 2025. The town's actual revenue in 2024 was \$2,473,172, and it spent \$2,470,390, leaving a net operating surplus of \$2,781.

The town's mill rate (municipal tax) in 2025 will be decreasing by 2.094 mills from that of 2024.

As 2025 is a provincial property tax re-assessment year and there was a change in the way school property taxes are calculated, some property owners in Arborg may see an increase in their taxes and others may not. Overall, the provincial assessment trend shows an increase in property

Council expects to spend money from some of its reserves in 2025, including \$45,000 from the Building Reserve, \$25,000 from the Paving Reserve, \$90,000 from the CCBF Reserve and \$8,000 from the Handivan Reserve.

Council will transfer \$10,000 to its Building Reserve and spend \$45,000, leaving a balance of \$52,043. Council will not transfer to or spend any money from its PCH Building Reserve, which stands at \$215,910. The Equipment Replacement Reserve will get a top-up of \$10,000 to bring its closing balance to \$118,326. Council's spending of \$8,000 from the Handivan Reserve will bring its balance down to

Council will transfer \$10,000 to the Recreation & Cultural Reserve to bring its closing balance up to \$65,225. Council will spend \$190,000 from the Canada-Community Building Reserve and transfer in \$71,000, bringing the closing balance to \$62,514. There will be no transfers to or expenditures from the Arborg-Bifrost Fire Shared Reserve which has a balance of \$143,471.

Capital expenditures for 2025 include \$50,000 for sidewalk construction, funded by the Canada - Community Building Reserve Fund, \$40,000 for drainage funded by the Canada - Community Building Reserve Fund, \$20,000 for a seacan container and shelving (use unspecified) funded by the general operating fund, and \$356,600 for handivan upgrades, which will be funded by a MEDIP grant, rural transit solutions fund, the Handivan Reserve and proceeds from a sale (unspecified). The town is receiving a \$185,600 grant from the federal Liberal government and a \$135,000 grant from the provincial NDP government for the handivan upgrade.

The town is embarking on a number of capital projects in 2025, including well mechanization that will be funded by the CCBF Reserve and the Manitoba Water Services Board (\$600,000) and wastewater treatment

plant upgrades that will be funded through borrowing (\$250,000).

The town's five-year capital

plan includes sidewalks in 2027 and 2029 (\$100,000), which will be borne from reserves; the public works shop in 2030 (\$200,000) that will be funded from reserves; the recreation complex in 2026 (\$50,00) borne from operating; a pool liner in 2027 (\$60,000) that will be funded through operating and reserves; the arena ice plant in 2028 (\$250,000) that will be funded through borrowing; and paving projects in 2029 (\$2 million) that will be borne partly through reserves and partly through borrowing; the water treatment plant filtration in 2026 (\$1,148,000) that will be funded through borrowing (\$574,000) and through "other" (\$574,000); a lift station upgrade in 2026 (\$182,000)

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Speaking out for safer intersections

While a recent fatal accident weighs heavy on so many hearts, some people are speaking up about the need to bolster safety at a dangerous intersection.

On May 21, Nicholas Palmer of Stonewall lost his life in a collision at the junction of highways 8 and 67. A few weeks prior, his mom Shirley drove past an accident at the same spot. She recalls that she used to jokingly tell Nicholas to always check 1,000 times before crossing.

"I don't have answers as to why he thought it was clear and drove out," she said. "But what I'm finding out is that others have been advocating for change for years at this intersection and nothing has been done."

As a family, they visited Birds Hill Park countless times, and Shirley shared some observations about the drive.

"Out of all the intersections you cross, I do know that this is the only one where the speed limit is still 100 kilometres per hour — and we all know how much faster people travel than that. Vehicles can come up suddenly. Do they need lights? I'm not sure," she said.

"All I know is that too many accidents are continuing to happen, and I must now join the fight to do what I can to save other people from what happened to my Nicholas. When I'm finished with focusing on my family and preparing for my son's funeral, I will be doing all I can to fight. Whether it be writing letters to elected officials, going around with a petition — I'm not sure how, but I will do all I can."

Stonewall resident Kimberley Glowacki is adding her voice to advocate for change.

"I am a nurse who has travelled down this highway over the past 21 years. I have seen countless accidents at this intersection and feel it's past time to put lights up at the intersection," she said.

"I was driving past the accident when EMS and police were at the scene post Nick's accident, unknowing who was involved. My daughter had the pleasure of growing up with Nick in our small community. I have learned that he was a strong advocate for all mankind. I hope we can now advocate for him in his absence."

For 25-year-old Delta Hannah, news of Nick's accident struck close to her heart.

"This isn't the first tragic accident to directly affect my family with a vehicle and semi truck," said Delta, a lifelong Stonewall resident.

"It blew my mind when I heard of the accident, as I had

just driven through the intersection 20 minutes beforehand. It blew my mind again when my mother — Ms. Hannah, who teaches at the elementary in Stonewall told me the next day it was her scheduled substitute teach-

For the past year and a half, Delta has driven up and down Highway 8 every day for work. She always keeps in mind some advice from a Manitoba Public Insurance representative that she heard years ago: "If you're driving 110 kilometres down a highway, that 10-kilometre difference in speed can cost someone's life."

"This is something I will never forget hearing. I began to think about how rare it is for drivers behind me to follow the signage when I'm using the proper lane to turn right, heading back home across 67," she said.

"I firmly believe that some sort of traffic control in this intersection would not only improve the flow of traffic during peak times but save lives."



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Sandy Hook musician's kitchen-table strumming leads to CD

Sandy Hook-based songwriter and musician Iames Brose released a new CD that includes a nod to the Gimli Glider after working on the project for a few years while teaching local students.

Brose, who's originally from Kenora and who has won and been nominated for a number of awards through a U.K. international songwriting contest, said he's ecstatic about the release of his CD titled

The CD features 11 tracks of rock, light rock and adult contemporary songs. It includes the song Fly Me Away, which was written in part for the 40th anniversary of the Gimli Glider, whose story riveted the airline industry and caught Brose's attention at the time of the miraculous landing in 1983, and the pop rock track Let Me In that he co-wrote with George Belanger (lead singer of 1970s and 1980s Winnipeg band Harlequin) when they formed Har-

"It's taken quite a few years to put the entire package together and, during this time, have gone through many personal changes, which of course has a tendency to appear one way or another in some aspects of my writing. COVID certainly impacted my state of mind as with many others. It also impacted the lives of many people I personally knew, so accordingly one tune on the CD is dedicated to the transitions some of us had to endure," said Brose, who plays guitar and bass.

"Most certainly, putting an entire CD of music that came about while strumming the guitar at the kitchen table, bringing it into a professional studio and then putting it out there can be quite the daunt-

ing but incredibly satisfying task."

The idea for the title stems from the number of seasoned musicians on the CD who helped Brose put together tight and engaging songs.

"This idea came about as a result of having so many incredible musicians participating and influencing the direction of my music," said Brose. "This

includes more than 30 professionals, including eight different vocalists and five guitarists, many from the Winnipeg musical community."

The CD cover art features the Gimli Glider on the runway by local artist Manette Vandale, whom Brose commissioned.

Brose, who was classically trained as a child, said he's on the lookout for potential bandmates in the surrounding area so that he can perform live as he did for years in the past, including touring with Harlequin. In the meantime, he'll keep on writing new songs and teaching all genres of music to local

"Despite dedicating a little time to finding some potential musical partners to perform as a band, nothing definite has appeared. As I hope to perform this material on stage some day, finding the perfect band members for such a show is always on the back of my mind," said Brose. "In the meantime, I'll keep up with teaching locally and, of course, working on some new music."

And Friends is available on popular streaming services including YouTube, Spotify and Apple. People can also directly purchase and download the CD and/or songs via the website Bandcamp.com where he's listed as Jamie Brose.

"Despite the masses listening to streaming services, I've had quite a few enquire about the availability of physical CD's so that is something I am now focusing on," he said. "For some, it's always nice to have something physical in your hand, along with the lyrics and musical credits."

Grahamdale moves forward with Faulkner Waste Disposal Grounds expansion

The RM of Grahamdale's Faulkner Waste Disposal Grounds expansion project is moving into the planning stage.

In 2024, the Province of Manitoba approved a \$125,000 grant under the Manitoba Growth, Renewal and Opportunities for Municipalities fund to support the expansion. The Faulkner site services multiple communities within the RM, including Steep Rock.

Devan McCoubrey, assistant chief administrative officer, said the RM has been preparing for the expansion for several years after noticing the current waste cell was reaching capacity — particularly with the anticipated growth in Steep Rock.

The RM has hired JR Cousin Consultants to provide engineering services for the project, including design, tendering and construction administration. McCoubrey said the size of the new waste cell will be determined by JR Cousin Consultants based on the Population and Waste Generation Assessment report, which council accepted at its May 22 meeting.

"JR Cousins uses a lot of different formulas and algorithms to calculate

how much waste is generated per person — whether that person is a full-time resident, a seasonal cottager, a camper or a tourist making a day trip," McCoubrey said. "Council has reviewed the report, which not only takes into account the current population but also projected growth from future residents with the upcoming Steep Rock development."

The design for the expansion is expected to be completed by the end of summer. Construction is slated to begin in 2026, with costs to be included in the RM's 2026 financial plan. The new cell is projected to have a 20-year lifespan.

McCoubrey noted the RM is closely monitoring the capacity of its three other waste disposal sites and is encouraging residents to reduce their waste by recycling and using wastereduction tools such as the FoodCy-

IN OTHER GRAHAMDALE NEWS:

Council has selected Jansen Road as the municipality's major road construction project for 2025. This marks the third and final phase of planned upgrades to the stretch.

The scope of work will be announced in June, with completion expected in early fall. Planned improvements include reconstruction to a depth of two feet, resurfacing and shaping the shoulders on both sides of the road.

- Municipal dust control will take place in early June along Jansen Road, Little Birch Lake Road and in the Steep Rock town and cottage area.
- Reeve Craig Howse and Coun. Jason Bittner were appointed as the RM's environmental monitors

in April 2025. They will work with the Province of Manitoba as it decommissions two groundwater wells associated with the Lake Manitoba Outlet Channel Project. The province requested municipal participation in March. The wells were originally installed during the design phase of the project to gather site information but are no longer needed for continuous groundwater monitoring. The province will reimburse the RM for any costs incurred.



Lakeshore deals with fallout from PowerSchool data hack

Student, staff and parent data back to 1992 may be compromised

The Lakeshore School Division continues to deal with the fallout of a cyber attack and data theft that occurred in late 2024 against California-based company PowerSchool, which provides information-management software that LSD and thousands of other school divisions across the world use.

The breach of PowerSchool occurred in December 2024 and the company alerted its clients in Canada, the U.S. and internationally.

Lakeshore has been keeping its

12 Main St. at the Riverton Senior Centre Mondays 7:30 p.m. students, parents and staff updated through letters and website postings, and is currently alerting everyone who was part of the division between 1992 and 2024 to visit LSD's website for details of the data theft as it could impact them.

Donald Nikkel, LSD's superintendent of HR, policy and alternative program director, was unable to provide the *Express* with specific information regarding the data breach, including whether the division will continue to use the software and whether it had received a ransom demand from any threat actor as the Toronto District School Board had in May — after PowerSchool said it had paid the hackers a ransom to have the stolen school-division data deleted.

"The PowerSchool breach has impacted a large number of divisions both in the Province of Manitoba, Canada and beyond. PowerSchool is also a third-party entity and is not owned, operated or controlled by the division, so we are limited in what we can say or comment on their breach," said Nikkel last week. "Since we were first made aware of the situation, we have been as transparent to our communities as possible and we have posted regular updates on our website."

PowerSchool is cloud-based software for managing K-12 school data and is used in 90 countries. The company was founded in 1997 and changed hands a number of times, with Apple once having acquired it. PowerSchool Canada opened in 2015.

Information that LSD had acquired from PowerSchool indicated the hackers gained access to Power-

and acquired personal data between about Dec. 19 and Dec. 28, 2024. PowerSchool said it became aware it "experienced a cybersecurity incident" on Dec. 28.

In a May 6 communique

School's Student Information System

to its community, Lakeshore said the following data about its students were accessed: name, date of birth, gender, address, contact information, doctor's name and phone number, relevant medical information (e.g., allergies), MET number, school ID number, enrolment/registration records and/or relevant alerts (e.g., related to discipline, guardian, custody or other issues) and the student's parent or guardian's name and contact information.

Staff data that were accessed are name, date of birth, gender, phone

number, address, school email address, Professional School Personnel number and/or school ID number. The social insurance numbers of staff could also have been "potentially involved."

The division said no banking or credit card information of students and parents/guardians was stored in its PowerSchool software. As well, there was no banking and credit card information of LSD staff stored.

Personal identification is very valuable to hackers. They'll use it to perpetrate financial fraud or re-sell it on the dark web to other criminals. Pieces of stolen personal data can be combined with other stolen data to build a robust profile of an individual.

Thieves can use stolen data to open fake accounts, make purchases, and file false income tax returns to gain access to funds. They can use SIN numbers, addresses and other personal details to apply for credit-cards, loans,

mortgages, passports and driver licences or open cellphone and utility accounts in the victim's name. They'll also sell personal medical information that can be used to blackmail victims

for money, commit identity theft or purchase prescription medication.

The fear of criminals sharing or selling people's personal data came to the fore on May 7 when the Toronto School Board District said it received a ransom demand connected to the 2024 Power-School hack. That came after Power-School said it had paid the hackers to delete the stolen data. The Calgary Board of Education and the Peel District School Board (Ontario) also received

ransom demands, according to media reports.

PowerSchool is offering victims two years of free identity protection and/or credit monitoring, and reached out to its victims via email with instructions on how they can take up the offer.

In its May 6 communique posted online, Lakeshore told students, parents and educators that PowerSchool is using three different email addresses with information on how to activate the free protection offer. The division said it had contacted PowerSchool and had been "assured" by the company that three email addresses it's using are "legitimate."

The Evergreen School Division does not use PowerSchool software and was unaffected by the breach, said superintendent and CEO Scott Hill.

Interlake artists sharing the secrets of their studios June 7-8

Imagination having run wild will be on display during the upcoming 24th Annual WAVE Interlake Artists' Stu-

Every summer and fall, WAVE member artists in communities such as Matlock, Winnipeg Beach, Gimli and Arborg open their studio doors and art caves to the public and share their innermost artistic thoughts, inspirational ideas and techniques.

Mediums on display include paint, jewelry, sculpture, clay, wood, photography, metal and paper.

Visitors can conduct their own tour of different studios to discover and unique arts and cultural expressions inherent in the region, as well as pur-

One of the artists about to reveal his artistic secrets is Arborg-based Jerry Maryniuk.

Visitors to his Arborg studio can also see the evolution of his work on a new cartoon called The Rusty Years.

"These new cartoons will appear in my next book, which is well on its way to being completed. It's about old people laughing at getting old rather than crying about it," said Maryniuk, who likes to instil humour in much of

Visitors will have a chance to weigh in on future art pieces Maryniuk will

Maryniuk is a co-founder of the Winnipeg Police Service retired members' PTSD peer support group — which in addition to police officers has fire, paramedics, military and corrections personnel and civilian staff in the group — and he'll have art such as worry stones at his studio.

"Worry stones are a tool for people with anxiety and other PTSD-related symptoms. The worry stones were collected by me and my wife on the shores of Lake Winnipeg," he said.

Gimli residents hit the streets to pick up trash, protect the environment

Gimli chamber and Access Credit Union team up for collective cleanup day

Gimli residents descended on the streets and the beach last week to pick up trash and raise awareness of the importance of protecting their environment.

The Gimli Chamber of Commerce and Access Credit Union — which sponsored the event — worked in partnership once again this year to organize the annual cleanup initiative that sees scores of residents and staff from businesses get their gloves on and grab their bags to clear garbage from the streets, the beach and the Lake Winnipeg shoreline.

Cheryl Buhler of the chamber's destination brand committee said they got a healthy volunteer turnout for the scheduled cleanup on Tuesday afternoon, but unspecified numbers of people went out on their own at different times to do their part.

"The weather was perfect. There was a good turnout of 46 people on site," said Buhler, who registered volunteers along with Kim Giesbrecht of Right Choice Realty. "Other people told us they were going to pick up garbage, but they couldn't do it at the time we had scheduled for the cleanup. So, they did that on their own time and let us know."

Staff from the Waterfront Centre, including Tristin Tergesen and Kristin Strachan, looked after the Waterfront area clean-up outside the hours of the collective clean-up, for example, and people at Pelican Beach, just north of Gimli, cleaned that area at a different time.

"People here have a sense of pride in their community and they wanted to participate even though they couldn't come out on cleanup day," said Buhler.

As organizers do each year, they created a large map of Gimli and assigned registered volunteers to specific neighbourhoods and areas, said Buhler. After a specific area was cleaned, the corresponding section of the map was coloured in, giving people a "sense of accomplishment." Most areas of the town were targeted in the cleanup effort.

The Gimli Access Credit Union, which had a lot of staff participating in picking up garbage, provided the volunteers with free hot dogs, chips, freezies and drinks.

Kathy Sauerborn, vice-president of retail banking, said ACU's partnership with the chamber resulted in another successful town cleanup. And she's encouraging all ages and groups to get involved in the annual event because a lot can be achieved with "many more hands" helping out.

"This will be an annual event, and our hope is to drive increased numbers of people cleaning up our town. A clean and beautiful town like Gimli has many benefits including attracting more visitors that boost our local tourism and fostering community spirit and pride," said Sauerborn. "Next year, we will look to start planning early in the year, setting a date in May and challenging all of our businesses and residents to join us in the two-hour event."

She added that ACU is happy to continue sponsoring the food for volunteers during future cleanup events.


This year's program features two documenta-

ries: Camp Morningstar, directed by Kevin Settee, tells the story of a sacred camp established on the east side of Lake Winnipeg in response to a proposed silica sand mine; and Tasiujarjuaq & Weeneebeg – Bays of Life, directed by Brian Newell and presented by National Geographic, follows Inuit and Cree communities collaborating with scientists to protect the ecosystems of Hudson and James Bay.

Following the screenings, a panel of local and provincial experts will take the stage to discuss current threats facing Manitoba's lakes, watersheds and coastal areas, and what community members can do to help protect them.

The event is free and open to all ages.

"Film is a powerful way to connect people to the environment and inspire action," said event organizers in a joint statement. "We hope this screening and conversation helps spark meaningful dialogue around water protection in our province."

Gimli welcomes riders for a cause during annual Motorcycle Ride for Dad

The sound of hundreds of motorcycles echoed through Gimli on Saturday as the Manitoba Motorcycle Ride for Dad rolled through town, part of the annual provincewide fundraiser to fight prostate cancer.

The May 31 ride attracted more than 1,200 registered riders who departed from Winnipeg's Polo Park and travelled through several Manitoba communities, including Selkirk and Gimli, before returning to the city. Now in its 17th year, the event raised over \$600,000 — bringing the ride's total fundraising impact to \$5.7 million since its inception.

"It's a good cause and a reason for a bunch of people to get together," said Scott Mullen, who made the trek with his 12-year-old son Jake. The father-son duo enjoyed a free burger after arriving in Gimli, part of a lunch served to the first 500 riders courtesy of Lakeview Hotels, a major event sponsor.

"As a tourism partner, it's important for Lakeview to support the Ride for Dad along with other events including the Icelandic Festival, the Gimli Film Festival, MS Biking to the Viking and the Ice Festival to promote the town as a destination," said Lakeview's vice-president of operations Chris Miller. "We have been involved with the Ride for Dad since the beginning. It's a great cause and always an exciting day for the community, supported by our great local volunteers that make these events possible."

The annual ride is part of a six-week campaign to raise awareness about prostate cancer, which the Canadian

Cancer Society says is the most common cancer affecting Canadian men. One in eight men will be diagnosed with the disease, and one in 30 will die from it.

Gimli residents lined the streets to show their support as the parade of riders rolled through. Volunteers also helped make the day possible, including former Gimli mayor Randy Woroniuk, who was spotted helping with traffic direction. While similar events take place across the country, funds raised in Manitoba stay in Manitoba, supporting local research and education. Organizers praised the hospitality shown in each community along the route — with Gimli once again serving as a memorable stop for many riders and supporters alike.

Peguis First Nation volunteers to shelter up to 300 wildfire evacuees

Fisher River Cree Nation, Gimli's Evergreen Basic Needs providing backup support

With out-of-control wildfires in Manitoba having forced about 17,000 people from their homes last week - with even more evacuated on the weekend — and burned thousands of hectares of land, First Nations and other communities in the Interlake are stepping up to help support people fleeing the disaster.

As wildfires intensified last week, Peguis First Nation proactively offered to house up to 300 evacuees. By last Friday afternoon, the First Nation community had about 65 evacuees staying in its arena.

Peguis' northern neighbour, Fisher River Cree Nation, and Gimli's Evergreen Basic Needs also stepped up to provide assistance to the evacuees who've been offered safe harbour in

Peguis Emergency Operations Centre's (PEOC) emergency management coordinator Marjorie Nielsen said she reached out last week to her counterparts at the provincial Emergency Measures Organization with an offer from Peguis to help shelter evacuees from the north.

"We volunteered to take people in. I phoned and asked if they needed a place for people to come," said Nielsen last Friday afternoon by phone as she and other staff were busy coordinating the humanitarian relief effort and organizing the shelter at the Peguis Multiplex Centre. "The maximum number of people I said we could take was 300. Right now, we have 65 evacuees, but there's supposed to be more coming today. I don't know where the people are coming from, but it could either be Flin Flon, Cross Lake, Norway House or Pukatawagan. We were

asked if we wanted to shelter people from a specific area, but it doesn't matter to us where the people come from."

The PEOC coordinates responses to natural disasters and other emergencies to prevent or minimize the loss of life and property, prevent damage to the environment and the restoration of essential services.

The province declared a state of emergency last week. There were 22 active wildfires burning across the province as of last Thursday. Premier Wab Kinew said he expects more people from northern Manitoba to be evacuated and sent to communities around the province, with the majority coming to Winnipeg.

On Saturday, a mandatory evacuation was underway for about 430 people in Cranberry Portage after fire destroyed power lines overnight, caused deteriorating air quality and closed part of Highway 10, according to media reports.

Nielsen said some of the evacuees that arrived in Peguis said they're homesick while others are glad to be away as they didn't sleep while fires were threatening their communities.

"People are really lonesome for home; some are saying they want to go home. And others are saying they never slept for two days," she said.

Peguis' humanitarian assistance is being supported by Fisher River Cree Nation, which has offered a number of free services to help the evacuees with practical matters such as laundry, as well as recreational activities.

"Fisher River is offering free laundromat service to our evacuees because they'll have bedding that will eventually need to be washed, plus

towels and their clothing," said Nielsen. "Fisher River's coordinator is also offering free recreation services for evacuees.'

Those recreational services include a bowling alley, pool tables, darts, inflatables, indoor basketball nets, outdoor rink, baseball diamond, Netflix, television and a couch area, a play park, beach volleyball, golf, a skate park and horseshoe pits. Evacuees arriving by vehicle can also get a free car wash in Fisher River.

And Peguis itself will be providing a number of additional services to evacuees to keep their minds off the fires.

"Our recreational staff person on Peguis is pretty darn awesome," she said. "He's set up a big-screen TV for movies for the kids and is working on transportation to get them to the

beach. Plus we have an arcade, Xbox and Nintendo, pool tables, rollerblade floor hockey and basketball nets. Our recreational department is also offering to take people on outings. We have our own baseball field and volleyball courts here too."

The Evergreen Basic Needs food bank and second-hand store in Gimli sprang into action when it heard Peguis had offered to take in up to 300 evacuees and needed items such as bedding and towels.

EBN executive director Karen Bowman said she rounded up the items, and local restaurant Carlo's Cucina offered to get it up to Peguis, which is about 124 kilometres north of Gimli.

Lundar celebrates grand opening of new baseball park

The crack of the bat and cheers from the dugouts signalled more than just another ball game in Lundar this past Saturday.

After more than two decades of hope, planning and perseverance, the community of Lundar officially opened its new baseball park — a milestone moment for local sports and a testament to grassroots determination.

The new facility replaces Drew's Field, which had kept baseball alive in the community for nearly 25 years thanks to the generosity of Brad and Diana who allowed their private field to be used by local teams.

"Without them, baseball would have died here," said Blaine Fortin, who helped lead the charge on the new development. "Now, we have four fields — two full shale fields, one grass and one with grass infield and shale paths where the kids can play. We can host tournaments, run practices and play multiple games all at once."

The new ballpark features, large dugouts outfitted with seats salvaged from Canad Inns Stadium and a central building with a canteen, two washrooms and a storage room. Outfield fencing is the next major addition, expected to be installed in the near future.

Fortin said the dream of a permanent baseball facility in Lundar dates back more than 20 years. The initial groundwork was done by David Sigfusson, while Hope Sigfusson helped secure early grant funding. The project was put on hold for years, but Fortin revived it several years ago with fresh determination.

"I had no experience building a baseball facility," he said. "But once I put a basic plan together, I had help from people with more experience. Sandra Johnson, with her engineering background, was huge. Ross Tycoles also helped a lot with measurements and design. I learned so much from him."

Among the biggest early challenges was clearing the field areas — especially picking stones, which Fortin said felt endless. Once the land was

cleared, volunteers installed backstops and began shaping the diamonds.

Funding came from a wide range of sources. Nearly \$125,000 in grants were secured, \$150,000 from the province and the Jays Care Foundation contributed \$75,000 to help build dugouts and install fencing on three of the four diamonds. The RM of Coldwell provided additional support, and the project received donations from local businesses, families and community groups including the MMF Local and the All Canada Goose Shoot. Ongoing fundraising efforts led by players and their families have also been a major success. J & M Industries out of Brandon installed the backstops and dugouts. Volunteers built the seating inside the dugouts with the stadium

"We were extremely blessed by the level of support," said Fortin. "This really is a community-built park."

With help from J5 Enterprises, who provided essential field maintenance equipment, the diamonds are now ready for full use. The park will serve Lundar Minor Ball, Rally Cap, a newly formed slo-pitch league, and the high school baseball team.

The grand opening event featured games between Lundar's minor teams — two teams in each division from 9U to 15U — plus a Rally Cap practice and a light-hearted match between the 12U girls and their moms.

"This isn't just about baseball. It's about creating opportunities, bringing people together, and building something lasting," said Fortin.

The fields were already tested last summer when Lundar hosted the Merv Farmer Regionals, welcoming 17 teams from across the region. All four diamonds were in play at the same time — something Fortin said hadn't been seen in the community before.

"I remember Erin and I driving up

and seeing the parking lot full, kids on ev-

ery diamond. It was emotional," he said. "We had people tell us they've lived here for 50 years and never seen anything like it. That's what makes all the time and work worth it."

Fortin said countless volunteers made the grand opening possible, with many hands helping out in the final week to prepare the site.

"I'm probably forgetting a few names," he said. "But I just want to thank everyone who's helped — from the early stages to the finishing touches. This park belongs to all of us."









Local author publishes fourth novel in Hope trilogy

Author and screenwriter Ryan Souter continues to thrive in the creative arts community with the release of his fourth novel, Hope Unites, published in November 2024.

Souter, who grew up in Selkirk, has long had a passion for creative writ-

"When I am storytelling, I am in my bloom," he said.

Hope Unites is the second installment of the Hope trilogy and follows the events of Hope Rises. Souter said he wanted to create a series centred on a strong female lead. The trilogy, recommended for mature readers, is a dystopian thriller that follows Hope's charismatic journey as she battles obstacles in a shifting world.

He originally intended to write a standalone novel about Hope but soon realized one book wasn't enough to fully explore the character.

"It was feeling sluggish. I needed to find a way to develop Hope's persona and keep the story moving," he said.

The trilogy now captures the beginning, middle and end of Hope's life.

Before turning to novels, Souter began his writing career with screenplays. He said his early scripts were heavily influenced by the cities he lived in, which restricted his creative freedom. Writing novels, he said, has allowed him to expand his settings and imagination.

"I can create entire worlds on a page — there is no limit to the imagination.

You can go with the flow and turn a story into something so much more," he said.


Souter credits a high school production of Frankenstein for igniting his love of storytelling. Playing the monster inspired him to begin creating compelling characters of his own.

"I loved the depth the character had," he said. "It opened a new world for me."

Though he isn't entirely sure what inspired him to become a novelist, Souter said the hobby quickly became a passion. He began writing novels alongside his film work and said the two forms have similar structure, though novels require more effort.

"It is a juggling act between the film and book work ... but if you like to write, you are always going to make time for it," he said. "When writing is in your blood, you have to put yourself out there and make it work."

Souter said it took nearly three years to complete his first novel, but he enjoyed the process. He embraces all stages of writing — from planning to editing — and aims to connect deeply with his audience.

"You don't just write for yourself," he said. "You hope to entertain your readers and create a story they resonate with. It is about the emotions faced by my characters and readers that carry my writing. When you have story depth, it makes the stories much more interesting."

Now struck by what he calls a "writing bug," Souter is taking a break from the Hope series to work on a new novel. He believes stepping away between books helps bring fresh ideas

to a project. He encourages aspiring writers to be patient and persistent.

"If you quit, you will never know what you could have created," he said. "Find your passion and don't let self-doubt take control. We all have to start somewhere, and that start begins with you."

Souter's books, including Hope Unites, are available at the Gaynor Family Regional Library, the Cozy Fox and on Amazon.

"We're going to be taking some boxes over to Carlo's, who's arranging to transport it to Peguis," said Bowman last Friday.

When asked what EBN could provide to the RM of Gimli should it offer to house evacuees in the municipality, Bowman said she was trying to determine what its needs are.

"We know the Red Cross is involved and other organizations such as emergency measures and they will coordinate responses. But I don't know what they cover," she said. "At this point, EBN is saying [to the municipality] to let us know what you need, and if we can help you we will. If we're asked to help with food on a short-term basis, we'd be available to do that,"

She said she was able to speak with Gimli Coun. Andy Damm to see whether the RM could use back-up support.

"I let [Coun. Damm] know that the RM can keep EBN in mind if there's anything we can do to help," said Bowman. "We're ready and willing to help with whatever the RM might need; we will do our part."

The Express reached out to the RM of Gimli, asking whether the municipality is planning to offer space to wildfire evacuees, but didn't receive

The paper reached Coun. Andy Damm, who was attending the Federation of Canadian Municipalities' conference in Ottawa last week. He said he and his three fellow councillors want to do what they can in the face of this quickly evolving humanitarian crisis.

"Gimli is acutely aware of the rapidly spreading fires and the devastating effect they're having on our fellow Manitobans. Gimli has an airport and road links, and we could possibly source accommodations through local establishments and use the dormitory [an RM-owned facility with bedrooms, kitchen etc.] if given the go-ahead," said Damm. "My three fellow councillors have indicated they are on board with whatever Gimli can offer, and I'm proud to be associated with them and [appreciate their willingness] to try to help Manitobans in need during these difficult times."

The provincial government told the Express it's in the process of exploring housing options for evacuees.

"The province is exploring all kinds of scenarios for housing evacuees. Evacuees are all over the province. Many have chosen to stay with friends and family; others are in hotels around the province (Dauphin, Brandon, Winnipeg, etc)," said a spokesperson.

Nielsen said some of the evacuees that arrived in Peguis have healthcare needs that require a little bit more attention.

A child with autism was evacuated with his grandmother, and she's afraid to sleep at night in the arena because he might wander off. Nielsen might be able to set them up inside a dressing room as it has a door. They've also had some babies arrive on Thursday night who were ill, one throwing up and another with diarrhea that required diapers of a certain size they didn't have.

The band's SunLodge Village, which offers space for traditional Indigenous teachings, celebrations and other events, is housing some elderly evacuees in its bunkhouse cabins. One man had required nursing attention because the cot in the arena was too hard for him.

Nielsen said they needed strollers and playpens on Friday morning and a call was put out. Now she's looking for donations of small tents and/or room dividers or privacy screens.

"I have people situated in the middle of the rink and our arena lights don't fully dim. A lot of the evacuees were saying it's too bright so I'm thinking we need small tents they can set up inside the arena so they'll have some shade and can sleep better. That would also give them some privacy. We have no wall dividers," she said.






