Gimli's well known dog portraitist honoured at prestigious American dog show

A Gimli artist well known for his depictions of dogs was invited to a prestigious American dog show last month at which dog handlers paid tribute to his artistic skill after he had submitted two artworks showing past dog winners of the annual event.

Alec Baldwin, who has autism, was honoured at the Westminster Kennel Club's 148th Annual Dog Show held May 11-14 in New York City. He and his family were invited to the Show Dogs of the Year Awards black-tie dinner that was sponsored by Purina (pet food company) the evening before the dog show and held at Gotham Hall on Broadway.

Alec was invited to join a group of dog handlers on stage where his two artworks were projected on a huge screen and he was lauded for his skill.

"I was so happy and I was focusing on the audience cheering out loud. They thanked [me] that I was here in the Gotham City," said Alec. "I created two different areas of Westminster Dog Show. Seventeen winners in Madison Square Garden and two winners in Lyndhurst Mansion."

Alec created two digital prints last year depicting famous dogs that had won past Westminster titles at well known New York state venues: Madison Square Garden in New York City and the gothic-inspired country house Lyndhurst Mansion in Tarrytown.

The print at Lyndhurst Mansion shows two Westminster winners, a Pekinese from 2021 and a bloodhound from 2022. The group of dogs at Madison Square Garden, where the show is typically held, represent dog winners from 2004 to 2020. The breeds depicted include the German short-haired pointer, wirehaired terrier cross, Sussex spaniel, English springer spaniel, Newfoundland (which looks like a small bear), Scottish deerhound, coloured bull terrier, poodle and pinscher.

"The pinscher is a small toy dog," said Alec. "It's a delightful family pet. It's like human Lego."

The group print also shows a female beagle named Miss P [for Peyton], a Canadian dog that put Canada on the dog show map by winning best in show at the Westminster event in 2015.

Alec submitted his two prints to Scott Smith, managing director at Purina in 2023, as a tribute to the dogs. Smith took it upon himself to have dog handlers from all over America — and Canada — sign his prints. That process took several months.

Alec's mom, Tanis Benson, said the tribute to Alec at the awards show was very touching and described

how his prints were a "passion project" and had "crisscrossed the country" for months so that dog handlers could pen a personal message to Alec. He was also treated to a Hollywood red-carpet moment where he had his photo taken in front of a show banner.

"Purina had framed the prints then sent them back to Alec, which he got after Christmas [2023]," said Benson. "We thought that was the end of it then Scott [Smith] wanted to acknowledge Alec and what he called his 'masterpiece' and we got invited to the black-tie event that Purina puts on the evening before the dog show. Purina paid for our hotel."

After the show Smith emailed Alec and his family, saying it was wonderful to have had the family join them at the awards event. He also singled out two American dog handlers, Heidi Hartman and Phil Booth, for their efforts as they "really did all the work getting all the signatures" on Alec's prints.

The *Express* reached out to Smith and Hartman for comment.

The two digital artworks took several months to complete. Alec loves to learn new artistic techniques and challenge himself so he took an online digital art course with Aaron Blaise, a Disney director and animator. He said he worked on each dog separately, matching colour and texture and creating shadowing and depth. He also created the background then arranged each dog across the canvas.

"I used different colours, shiny coats and various shapes, and the differ-

Gimli philanthropist a finalist in nationwide contest

A Gimli man is one of the top four local leaders in Canada.

Bob Munroe, a retired RCMP officer, has been named a finalist in Timber Mart's Local Leaders Initiative. His victory in the Western division has surpassed all other nominees from Timber Marts located in British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba.

Timber Mart is once again hosting the Local Leaders Initiative, where funds are allocated to community projects through passionate individuals. This year, Lee Sylvester from KC Enterprises Ltd has nominated Munroe for his dedication to the Gimli Youth Hub.

"Bob's been doing a lot of stuff for the community for a lot of years," said Sylvester. "I thought it was a great project they're doing."

Munroe kickstarted the youth hub project with a small group of volunteers. They're trying to raise \$400,000 to build a facility for local youth (people aged 12 to 18) to spend time at.

'If they aren't involved in school activities on a regular basis, there's nothing else for them to do," said Munroe. "We want to provide a facility for them to go to and do whatever they do, whether that's playing video games, forming a band or playing basketball."

Munroe said the youth hub would also allow atrisk youth to have a safe space to spend time at and help them form relationships with like-minded young people.

Munroe and his team of volunteers have raised more than \$300,000 for the Gimli Youth Hub so far, a portion of those funds coming from local council after they approved the project. Currently, Munroe and those working on it are designing the building with architects and getting contractors together. It's set to go up near the arena and Munroe is hoping they can break ground soon.

This project isn't the only way Munroe has contributed to the community, though. He first moved to Gimli years ago after being stationed to the town

with the RCMP. He was transferred away, retired in Calgary, and it was then that he and his wife decided to move back to Gimli, the beach town that stole their hearts.

"I always want to give something back to the community," he said. "It's given so much to us."

Munroe is a founding member of the Westshore Community Foundation, he's spent countless hours volunteering with the Icelandic Festival in various capacities, he's been with the local rotary club, he helped raise money to build the splash park, he worked with the cadets and more.

In his nomination letter, Sylvester wrote "Bob's selfless contributions have left an incredible mark on Gimli, making it a better place for everyone. His dedication to volunteerism exemplifies the spirit of community service." He added the vision of the Gimli Youth Hub is that youth have a "safe place of their own within a healthy and supportive community, free of discrimination, oppression and prejudice, with the aim of building individual and community physical, mental and emotional health and well-being," and the money granted to contest winners would help Munroe and his team to reach their goal of breaking ground this year.

Munroe won \$8,000 for the youth hub from Timber Mart for winning the western division. If he Bob Munroe is one of four finalists in Timber Mart's wins the final voting, he'll get another \$10,000 for Local Leaders Initiative, which has generated him the project. As of last Friday, Munroe had almost 700 votes, putting him in fourth place so far. The current front runner is a woman from a small town

in Ontario with 2,852 votes. Voting for the initiative is open until June 21 and people can vote once a day every day until then. To vote for Munroe, go to https:// timbermart.ca/en/local-leaders/.

ent eyes and the long coats, scruffy, smooth and shaggy," he said with reference to the group of dogs at Madison Square. "I did a lot of background [on Madison Square]. They had tons of restaurants and a television and drink [machines]. This one I took about approximately 10 months. I wanted to improve it with real-life detail."

He and his family were invited to attend the Westminster Dog Show, which was held at the Billie Jean King National Tennis Centre after the Purina-sponsored awards show and supper. During their stay in New York, Alec visited Central Park and its zoo and the Guggenheim Museum.

Alec himself has competed in the past in dog shows with his own dog and has taken a handling class in Ottawa with professional dog handler Will Alexander. He is well known around Gimli for hosting dog parties where everyone can bring their dog to an open field in the Vesturland neighbourhood and take part in games, so-



cialize and build community relations with other dog owners. Alec has also painted murals (e.g., his dog party) on the Gimli seawall art gallery, which is overseen by the Gimli Art Club, and retouches and restores other murals on request for the club.

In addition to his artistic accomplishments, Alec has swept the Special Olympics podium numerous times, bringing home medals, including gold, from summer and winter games. He is currently enrolled in a number of Special Olympics sports.

"I'm training in Special Olympics because I'm doing 800 metres, 400 metres, running long jump, shot put and relay and javelin. I'm getting better [at javelin]. I can throw like the ancients in battle," said Alec.

Gypsumville RCMP lay numerous charges after robbery

Gypsumville RCMP responded to a report of a male having been shot with an airsoft gun on Highway 6, located near Strong Lake, at approximately 8:55 a.m. on May 22.

As the officers were en route, it was reported that some Manitoba Hydro employees had stopped at the scene and provided first aid to the victim, kept him warm and placed numerous traffic cones in order to provide emergency services personnel a clearly marked area to safely work in due to the heavy volume of traffic.

Officers arrived on scene and located a 27-year-old male, from Winnipeg with a non-life-threatening injury that required medical aid. The victim was transported to hospital, where he was treated and released.

Investigators have learned that the 27-year-old male was contacted by a friend of his, an 18-year-old female, whose vehicle needed a boost on Highway 6. The victim, along with another 27-year-old male, attended the scene and assisted in getting the vehicle started.

Once the vehicle was started, two males exited from the vehicle, which had just been boosted. They were both armed with airsoft firearms and demanded money and cell phone from the two victims.

The victims entered their own vehicle and attempted to back away from the scene and while doing so were shot at by both suspects, injuring the one victim. No property had been taken.

The 18-year-old female, along with the two males, en-



tered their vehicle and fled the scene.

Officers from nearby detachments, along with assistance from the emergency response team (ERT), were contacted as the suspect vehicle was reported to be driving south on Highway 6 at a high rate of speed.

The suspect vehicle was subsequently abandoned in a field with the two male suspects fleeing on foot. The 18-year-old female remained near her vehicle and called 911 as she was unaware of the planned robbery.

With the assistance of police service dog Jolt, remotely piloted aircraft systems and ERT, the two male suspects were tracked into a wooded area and arrested without incident.

The two males, a 17-year-old from Selkirk and a 16-yearold from Winnipeg, were remanded into custody on charges including assault causing bodily harm, dangerous operation of a motor vehicle, flight from police, robbery, possession of weapon for dangerous purpose and discharge air gun with intent to wound.

The 18-year-old female was later released without charge.

New IEHF fund focuses on Ashern PCH bed count

The Interlake-Eastern Health Foundation (IEHF) has a new memorial fund dedicated to Ashern's personal care home (PCH).

When Peter Davidson's health required him to transition to living in a PCH, he could not stay in his community of Ashern due to limited availability. He remained in Eriksdale, spending his final years in the PCH there, and his firsthand experiences with end-of-life care fuelled his wish for others to receive that care locally.

"He really wanted to ensure people could be at home in their communities when they need care," said Averill Stephenson, executive director of IEHF.

Davidson and his wife, Anna, never had children of their own but were like the "aunt and uncle" of the community. Stephenson said they knew everyone, and everyone knew them. The couple was extremely well-loved by all and had deep connections with them.

So, upon his death, Davidson left

his entire estate to the Ashern PCH through IEHF.

"His instructions were clear," said Stephenson. "The gift was to be utilized to maintain or increase the number of beds available, ensuring that others in the community could receive the care they needed close to home."

The Peter and Anna Davidson-Ashern PCH Fund (named for Davidson and his late wife) will support projects aligned with Davidson's wish, focusing on maintaining or expanding the Ashern PCH.

The Ashern PCH currently has 20 beds, all of which are full. Juxtaposed to Lakeshore Health Centre, the facility is maintained by the Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority. Davidson had his name on the waiting list for the Ashern PCH, but it was never moved to the top. He celebrated his 102nd birthday in Eriksdale and died in the PCH there.

"The impact of this gift is immeasurable, echoing the sentiment of gratitude expressed by the health-care team who cared for Peter," said Stephenson.

The foundation announced the new fund in May, which happens to be "Leave a Legacy Month." A legacy gift is what Stephenson calls a powerful way to contribute to charitable causes, allowing people to "weave [that] generosity into the fabric of their life story."

"The gift doesn't have to be big to have a big impact," she said. "These types of funds allow the foundation to be able to support the projects in the community that don't receive funding through the government or other forces. Small amounts add up and it really allows to have a big impact."

The Peter and Anna Davidson-Ashern PCH Fund currently has around \$470,000. Anyone can donate to the endowment fund, which is just one of many IEHF has.

"The legacy of Peter and Anna Davidson is a shining example of how one couple's commitment to community can create a rippled effect of positive change," said Stephenson.

Fisher Branch RCMP investigating homicide

On June 1, 2024, Fisher Branch RCMP responded to a report of a missing person from the Fisher River Cree Nation.

Sunday morning, various agencies, including RCMP major crime services, D Division search and rescue, and police dog services, arrived in the community to aid in the search.

Later in the afternoon, the deceased body of a 51-year-old man from the Fisher River Cree Nation was found in the RM of Fisher. Authorities are investigating it as a homicide.

The victim appears to have been tar-

geted and there is no indication of any ongoing threat to public safety.

The investigation into the matter is ongoing, with Fisher Branch RCMP working alongside major crime services and forensic identification services.

On Sept. 18, the Teddy Bears' Picnic will take place at Assiniboine Park for the first time since 2019. The free event, organized by the Children's Hospital Foundation of Manitoba, went virtual in 2020 due to the CO-VID-19 pandemic, followed by highvolume pediatric RSV seasons.

"The Teddy Bears' Picnic is one of those institutions in our community. The No. 1 question we've had since 2019 is about when the Teddy Bears' Picnic is coming back," said Stefano Grande, president and CEO of the Children's Hospital Foundation of Manitoba. "COVID just really devastated a lot of events. It's taken time to rebound."

"Our front-line staff were so busy just taking care of kids in our emergency rooms, in our hospital, and our researchers have been busy, but we're refreshed and ready to welcome back the tens of thousands of kids that hopefully will be creating some new memories."

Part of what makes the Teddy Bears' Picnic so special is that it was started by volunteers over 35 years ago and

is still run by hundreds of volunteers. Frontline staff from HSC Children's Hospital volunteer at the Dr. Goodbear Clinic, and researchers volunteer at the I Want to be a Scientist tent put on by the Children's Hospital Research Institute of Manitoba.

bringing kids to the hospital during routine visits or moments of crisis can be scary for them, and it's even scarier if your child doesn't speak English. This event brings our hospital and our research institutes to the front steps of our community. The Dr. Goodbear Clinic demystifies how kids are triaged and gives them a front-row seat into how procedures like X-rays are used. And the I Want to be a Scientist tent shows kids science can be fun and hopefully inspires them to be scientists one day."

New this year: A tent showcasing how philanthropy has led to advances like the Travis Price Children's Heart Centre, diagnostic laboratories, play spaces and accelerated research.

"We have a very special tent, which represents the generosity of our community over the last four and a half to five years, which has led to incredible health improvements," said Grande.

One of this year's volunteers is Shay Edgeworth from East St. Paul. Edgeworth has been volunteering in the playroom at the HSC Children's Hospital since October 2023. She is currently studying sciences at the University of Manitoba and plans to pursue a medical career.

"I wanted the exposure to the hospital setting. ... I love being with kids, and I know that I really care about kids and other people, but you never know how you're going to feel being in the hospital setting. But being a playroom volunteer, I feel very happy to come all the time, and I feel really grateful to have these patient interactions and make their day a little

A new restaurant is in town, and it's serving nothing but homemade goodness.

My Baba is Riverton's newest culinary addition, opened by newcomer Ukrainians. Yurii Linov, one of the owners, moved to the Interlake with his wife almost two years ago after fleeing their home country of wartorn Ukraine. He said upon arriving, they immediately noticed a lack of food options, especially homemade comfort food.

"In each restaurant it's chicken fingers, poutine, burgers, fries, that's it," he said. "Homemade food is healthy. You feel like at home and you feel like your Baba made it."

So, having their dream of someday opening a restaurant, Linov and his wife decided to fill the gap and open one in Riverton. Situated next to Fas Gas, they completely renovat-

The purpose of the Teddy Bears' Picnic is so important to make kids feel more comfortable and safe in the hospital setting and also help them understand the care being provided," said Edgeworth.

Grande said so many of the volunteer stories connect back to children.

"The last event I attended was my first as CEO, and I wanted to learn more about why people were volunteering. And there's a good number of volunteers who were a little bit older. Some have volunteered for over 30 years, "said Grande. "And when you start digging a little bit more about why, there's always a personal story about how their child was saved by

the hospital or how they always enjoy bringing their kids to the picnic. There were stories about children who are no longer with us, and this is the way that their parents are giving

back." Grande said this event is only possible due to the generosity of volunteers and sponsors, such as the presenting sponsor, Humphrey Window and Door Systems.

Whether you accompany a child and their teddy bear or volunteer, the Teddy Bears' Picnic is a day of fun and learning for everyone.

"I feel like I've learned a lot from the other health-care workers I've come in contact with at the hospital, but I've also learned a lot from the kids," said Edgeworth. "It's shocking how resilient these kids can be, and they've honestly shown so much perseverance throughout their care at the hospital."

Two first-year medical students from the Max Rady College of Medicine at the University of Manitoba spent a week in Gimli last month to see how rural medicine works and what the town has to offer.

Demi Andromidas from Winnipeg and Kaitlin Rentz from Dryden, Ont., stayed in Gimli for the college's annual Rural Week (May 27-31) assignment, which is scheduled near the end of the first year of the four-year medical program.

Rural Week provides students with an opportunity to see how physicians in rural and northern communities work, get a better understanding of the diverse clinical needs in smaller centres and discover what rural life is like and some of the benefits it can bring.

Andromidas said she was open to going to any community for Rural Week but was really happy to have ended up in Gimli. She is familiar with the lakeside town as she used to visit with her dad, who loved to fish. She also has friends who live in Gimli.

What stood out for her during the one-week stay were the people she and Rentz got to meet, including their community host, Cheryl Buhler, Gimli council members and hospital staff, as well as a cohesive sense of community.

"I really enjoyed meeting the people. Our co-ordinator planned a community outing with Cheryl and then we also had dinner with the mayor and the deputy mayor. I enjoyed talking with everyone. They've all been super welcoming," said Andromidas. "I think that's what stood out for me, the sense of community here in a smaller town. I've been able to feel that more here than I've been able to feel in Winnipeg."

Rentz, whose amma (grandmother) was from Gimli and who had visited the town as a child, said she specifically asked whether she could spend Rural Week in Gimli so that she could reconnect with a little bit of her past. She also enjoyed meeting the people and having an opportunity to explore the town on their own.

"Everyone we met, from the pilot to our host, Cheryl, to staff at the hospital, has been very kind to us and very welcoming," said Rentz. "And I had a good sense of [their] really loving this town, which was wonderful to see. We were able to appreciate the beauty of that through our experiences. And I really appreciated how Cheryl took us around. We got to see this town through the eyes of someone who actually knows what it's like. She took us to the beach to pick up lucky stones and other fun things like that."

Andromidas said Rural Week is designed to give Med 1 students a variety of different health-care and community experiences. Some students went to communities such as The Pas, Neepawa, Norway House and fly-in communities in Manitoba, as well as Nunavut.

"Our experience here in Gimli is going to be vastly different from someone who went to Norway House, for example, or to Wasagamack First Nation [about 600 kilometres northeast of Winnipeg]," she said.

Med 1 students don't get a lot of hands-on clinical practice during the first year of the program as the curricula focuses on didactic, lecturebased learning, said Andromidas. When students are in year three and four, they'll be assigned to clinics and hospitals. But Rural Week gives firstyear students an opportunity to experience what happens in a medical setting.

"Every morning, we spent a couple of hours at the [Gimli hospital] clinic. On Monday, we were there most of the day and we got to shadow a few of the physicians, as well as a wonderful physician assistant who helped teach us," said Andromidas. "This week has been our first real clinical experience, in addition to being an opportunity to experience a rural community."

It would be an understatement to say that family doctors are muchneeded in Manitoba, especially in rural and northern communities.

A report released in 2023 by the Canadian Institute for Health Information showed a "growing" shortage of physicians in general in Manitoba. The province has the second lowest number of doctors per capita across Canada, with 215 doctors per 100,000 residents. The national average is 247 doctors per 100,000 residents. Doctors across the country have cited feelings of burnout and administrative burdens, among other issues. Manitoba's new provincial government has made health care a top priority with recruitment and retention efforts, along with and staff support and engagement as major focus areas.

The family medicine specialty is crucial to preventing and detecting disease and increasing a population's life expectancy. The Canada-wide healthcare crisis can be traced back to the 1990s when provincial governments erroneously felt there were a "surplus" of family doctors and "overly generous wages" wasting taxpayer

dollars, according to a 2023 study titled "Biopsy of Canada's family physician shortage" in the journal *Family Medicine and Community Health.*

That trend in workforce reduction over subsequent decades and decrease in government investments in health care was laid bare and exacerbated during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Rentz said she plans to be a rural family doctor, working on the front lines of the health-care system.

"I am for sure interested in rural family medicine," said Rentz. "It's more of a question of where I will settle down. That's part of the reason why I've come to a community like Gimli; I am definitely interested in a rural setting."

Andromidas said she's keeping all options open as far as specialty areas, and expects that by year three she'll be able to determine what area really attracts her.

"That said, I wouldn't take rural family medicine off the table," said Andromidas.

The Gimli Chamber of Commerce's Destination Brand Committee chair Cheryl Buhler was asked to act as host for one day of the students' weeklong itinerary. Buhler organized a flight to give the two women a really good measure of Gimli.

"I really enjoyed spending time with Kaitlin and Demi. It was a fabulous experience for me," said Buhler. "Like other medical students, they

represent our hope for rural health care. We'd love to see some medical students choose to practise in a rural setting after they graduate."

Noura Gharib, who owns LS Airways Flight Academy, a Transport Canada designated school at the Gimli Airport, provided the free air tour so that the students could get a good sense of where they were and how beautiful the area is.

"LS Airways Flight Academy decided to give the medical students a free flight so they could see how beautiful Gimli is from the air, "said Gharib. "We also wanted to show them how we as a community are so nice and that we help each other in order to make Gimli the best town in Manitoba. We also wanted to show them we have great opportunities that exist here such as our flying school."

Gimli's Deputy Mayor Kurt Reichert said he and Mayor Kevin Chudd were happy to spend some time with the two medical students to brief them the things the town has to offer including quality of life and attractions.

"Our meeting with the medical students highlights our commitment to attracting and retaining talented health-care professionals in Gimli," said Reichert. "By engaging with medical students and showcasing the opportunities available in our beautiful community, we aim to encourage them to consider practising medicine

The 40th Annual Evergreen Festival of the Arts celebrated youth talent last month with a Hi-Lites concert and presentation of awards, including the Kiwanis Trophy for outstanding performances.

The annual performing arts festival attracted more participants this year, and many students were encouraged to perform at the provincial arts festival.

Lifeguard shortage may force Lundar Pool to limit hours

Things aren't going as swimmingly as planned for the Lundar Swimming Pool. Unfortunately, the community pool may have to reduce their programming and hours for the upcoming summer if they are unable to hire additional lifeguards for the season.

As summer arrives and school ends, the annual opening of the Lundar Swimming Pool provides a refreshing escape from the heat and an opportunity for exercise. However, maintaining its operation requires a continuous lifeguard presence, which is currently limited due to staffing shortage.

Heidi Sweetland, president for the pool, said right now they have three lifeguards confirmed for the summer. She attributes the lack of lifeguards to the intense training and qualifications they need and worries there's a "lifeguard shortage" all across the province.

As per the Lifesaving Society Manitoba, in order to qualify as a pool lifeguard, one must meet certain criteria. This includes being at least 15 years of age, possessing a Bronze Cross certification and having completed Standard First Aid training through a recognized agency under the Manitoba Public Health Act.

Sweetland knows lifeguard training is costly and time-consuming but she's hoping the pool will at least be able to get a few casual lifeguards if nothing else.

"The certifications are there for a reason and we do have to follow those when hiring," she said. "There's a lot of responsibility that comes with watching a pool full of people."

In an ideal situation, Sweetland expressed the desire to have four lifeguards for the upcoming summer season. However, having five or six would be even better. Unfortunately, once their lifeguards reach the age of 18, they tend to relocate. Since the minimum age requirement for the job is 15 years old, typically the Lundar

tional lifeguards, the Lundar Swim-

Swimming Pool only gets three years of service from their lifeguards.

With at least four lifeguards, the pool could be open for the usual seven days a week. Sweetland said they'd love to be able to continue to offer public swimming for eight hours a day, offer swimming lessons twice a summer and put on pool activities like senior swims, a kids' pool gala and more.

With the new splash pad being operational as well, Sweetland noted that can't be open unless the pool is since they're within the same fence, and the pool can't be open without a lifeguard on duty.

"We're a small community," she said. "It's one of our main attractions. It keeps people physically active people of all ages. It's important."

Without the recruitment of addi-

Despite passing away earlier this year, St. Andrews resident Josko Jagodnik continues to be an inspiration — not just to his family but to the entire community making it to the top of TOPS (Taking off the Pounds Sensibly) in 2023.

Jagodnik didn't just make it to the top of his local TOPS group or even take the top spot in the province, he was awarded first place as the 2023 International winner of TOPS International Division VII.

Jagodnik's daughters Elizabeth Pimentel and Tara Jagodnik, also TOPS members, accepted the award on Jagodnik's behalf at the TOPS Provincial Recognition Day earlier this month.

TOPS is a weight loss support group that doesn't follow any specific diets but encourages participants to use whatever healthy weight loss program works for them. It's also a place where people can come together weekly to learn more about healthy choices and be with a supportive community.

The family's journey to joining the TOPS program started in 2017 with Pimentel, who later encouraged her dad and sister to take part.

"I lost quite a bit of weight with TOPS. I told my dad and my sister for many years to come and join me because I love the support that TOPS provides. Finally, in 2021, during CO-VID, my dad said, 'You know what? You're spending too much time at the hospital. I'm going to join TOPS with you so that I can have my fatherdaughter time,'" said Pimentel.

daughter time," said Pimentel. Once Jagodnik came to his first meetings, he realized he loved the community and also loved spending time with his daughter.

"My dad loved it. He kept coming to TOPS even though he couldn't face the scale," said Pimentel.

As Jagodnik was over a certain weight when he started his journey,



weight loss was hard to measure in the beginning since the group that he joined, which was the group in Winnipeg that his daughter was already a part of, didn't at the time have a scale that was able to register his weight.

Pimentel said that despite not getting feedback from the scale, he was a great supporter of hers, checking in to see if she was making healthy choices and making sure that nothing stopped them going to their weekly TOPS meetings.

Then in November 2022, the group got a new scale and Jagodnik was able to more greatly participate in the program. He started filling his TOPS sash with ribbons and other items that represented his accomplishments.

His daughter Tara Jagodnik joined the group in 2023, and the three developed a friendly competition motivating each other.

She said that part of the motivation to join the group was to spend time with her dad.

Overall, from his first weigh-in in 2023 to his last, Jagodnik lost 87.6 pounds. With this major accomplishment came being recognized as the 2023 International winner of TOPS International Division VII.

Unfortunately, towards the end of the year, Jagodnik became ill and ended up in the hospital. Despite this, he continued to participate in the group

and Pimentel explained that the majority of his weight loss took place before he became ill.

Jagodnik passed away in January of this year, and though his daughters knew that he did well, they didn't expect to learn that he had been the top TOPS participant in his division internationally.

"When I got the call saying Dad, [had won a provincial award I thought,] 'OK, good. He did division. That's what he wanted. His wish came true.' Then when I got the phone call and found out he won international, I kind of joked, 'Oh, Dad, you couldn't just leave with Manitoba recognition; you needed international recognition.' But, yeah, he would have been gloating like crazy," said Pimentel.

Both of Jagodnik's daughters agree

that TOPS is a very supportive community.

Pimentel explained that her dad isn't just an inspiration to his family now but, having started with TOPS at 69 years old, he proves that making healthy changes is possible for everyone.

The local TOPS group welcomes new members. They meet on the lower level of Cloverdale United Church in St. Andrews. They start at 9:30 a.m. with coffee and then the meeting officially begins at 11 a.m. They also have a wide scale that goes up to 750 pounds to accommodate the majority of people. in Gimli after completing their training."

A spokesperson for the Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority said Rural Week has both first- and second-year medical students accompanying physicians on hospital rounds and in clinics and emergency rooms, and it teaches them about programs and services offered in the region. It requires the support of community physicians, staff members and residents who "strive to provide students with exceptional learning and life experiences during their time in the region."

In addition to Gimli, nine other IERHA communities hosted medical students this year: Arborg, Eriksdale, Selkirk, Stonewall and Teulon, and in the eastern half of the region, Beausejour, Lac du Bonnet, Pinawa and Pine Falls.

IERHA chief executive officer Marion Ellis said there were a total of 18 medical students in the region for this year's Rural Week and that the success of the event comes down to liaisons in the community and healthcare staff. "Community visit co-ordinators who network within their communities repeatedly go above and beyond to create meaningful experiences for medical students. These community liaisons create memorable moments for students because they understand and can reflect the uniqueness of the areas where they live. They have proven themselves to be exceptional allies in our mutual efforts to attract more physicians to practise in this region," said Ellis.

She added that IERHA is grateful to their allies for participating in Rural Week and for every community contribution that enhances the medical students' experiences.

"We also express gratitude to physicians and staff who offer up their time and expertise to mentor students. These brief encounters and glimpses of rural practice and rural life can make lasting positive impressions that benefit recruitment," said Ellis. "Since 2013, six physicians who graduated from the University of Manitoba's Rady College of Medicine who chose to work with Interlake-Eastern RHA had exposure to the region during Rural Week. This is a real testament to the value of this program and to the efforts of all those who help to support it."


In addition, Einarsson earned the grand prize of a \$500 one-year term deposit from Sunrise Credit Union.

"I love singing. I've been singing on stage since I was a little kid. It's so much fun and it feels really nice," said Adalynn. "Usually, I'm a little bit nervous beforehand but once I'm up on the stage, I kind of blank out and do it and it's so much fun."

Musical theatre is her favourite type of performance art, she said, but she has also done some operatic musical theatre that she also found enjoyable. Her strong vocal abilities have earned her a spot as a member of the Gimli-based Westshore Singers choir, and she'll be one of the choir's featured guest artists at its upcoming June 9 and 10 concerts.

"I'm going to be singing 'Not for the Life of Me'

from the musical *Thoroughly Modern Millie,"* said Adalynn.

To make some extra money, she plays the keyboard and sings outside Buskers by the Beach ice cream shop in Gimli every weekend.

"I do a lot of busking over the summer," she said. "It's a fun way to make money."

Her mom, Ashley, said she was delighted that Adalynn's took first place in her category at the provincial competition.

"I'm so proud of her. It was amazing to watch because everyone was so talented and amazing, and they came from all the local festivals in Manitoba," she said. "I watched Adalynn perform it and it went really well and felt great. To have her win it makes me feel like crying right now just thinking about it. It was so much fun to watch."

Adalynn was encouraged to compete at the provincial competition after she earned a Best Performance in Contemporary Voice award at this year's Evergreen Festival of the Arts, singing "Cicada Days."

"Manitoba's local festivals are important in that they encourage aspiring artists to keep striving," said Ashley. "The adjudication is amazing; they give the artists such great feedback to help them further their career. It's really cool."

Klymkiw said Adalynn is one of her best students and that she "commits" to whatever character she's singing

"I've taught so many students over my teaching career, and I have to say Adalynn is the student who works the hardest out of all the students I've ever taught. She always comes to lessons prepared," said Klymkiw. "She takes every opportunity [to perform] that's given to her in our community, and she's such a good role model to my younger students."

Klymkiw earned a degree in classical singing at the University of Manitoba and teaches voice, piano and music theory to students that range in age from four years old to 65. Most are from the local Gimli area but she also offers online classes to students from as far away as Churchill.

She and Adalynn are focusing exclusively on voice training because Adalynn wants to do a music degree after high school and have a career in musical theatre.

"Adalynn recently did her Royal Conservatory of Music Level 5 theory exam and she got 95 per cent, which is first class honours with distinction," said Klymkiw. "She'll be doing

her Level 5 voice exam in a couple of weeks. A university wants you to be at Level 7 and she's well on her way. I'm very proud of her."

As well as Adalynn's first-place finish at provincials in her category, two other youngsters from Gimli earned second-place awards at the provincial competition and Klymkiw said they should be recognized for their achievements [they're not her students].

Nate Borkowsky earned second under the primary piano category and was awarded with a Pembina Valley Music Festival Scholarship. He also earned second in the primary popular and contemporary category and was awarded an Associated Manitoba Arts Festivals (AMAF) scholarship. Lucia Borkowsky earned a second under the primary TV/Movie Musical and was awarded an AMAF scholarship.

Klymkiw said two of her students, Malakai Pelletier and Liubov Smyrnova - who won awards for musical theatre and vocal performance, respectively, at the local Evergreen Festival of the Arts competition last month — will be featured along with Adalynn as soloists at the Westshore Singers concert.

Smyrnova, who is from Ukraine,

earned a scholarship to attend the International Music Camp, a summer camp for young people at the Peace Garden along the Manitoba-North Dakota border.

Klymkiw in conjunction with Arborg-Riverton band teacher Stephanie Marks will be offering a nine-day musical theatre summer camp that will run from July 8 to 12 and 15 to 18 at the Gimli Park Pavilion.

"Last summer we did a one-week

musical theatre day camp and we had 19 enrolments, which was probably the biggest summer camp through the Gimli Recreation Centre," said Klymkiw. "It was really successful and all the kids want to come back."

"People use universal energy to speak to past loved ones or to inter and extraterrestrial beings," added Goodman.



Teulon Game and Fish's annual Family Fishing Day is June 8

Get ready to reel in some fun and create lasting memories with your family at Teulon Game and Fish's annual Family Fishing Day.

For two decades, Teulon Game and Fish has been the heart of Family Fishing Day, a beloved tradition uniting families in the Interlake community amidst the serene beauty of Norris Lake. What began with a modest turnout at Lake St. George has blossomed into an event that draws adults and children seeking outdoor adventures.

Debbie Coverdale, chair of the committee alongside her husband, Doug, is highly enthusiastic about the day.

"We have this little gem here at our backdoor. It's a beautiful little lake," said Debbie.

Committee members recently participated in a cleanup drive around the lake, instilling values of environmental stewardship in young participants who eagerly joined in tidying up their natural playground. The goal is to nurture fishing skills and a deepseated love for nature among attendees.

Teulon Game and Fish is all about promoting hunting, fishing and outdoor activities for the community, while preserving Norris Lake's ecosystem. Helping get youth outside is important.

The Coverdales really want to see the day grow for families. In the past, it was mostly adults, and about 10 to 20 people came. When the location changed, Teulon Game and Fish aimed to get more kids out for the day and bring people in from the Teulon area.

Over the last three years, they have almost doubled the number of children that have attended each year. Last year, there were 26 kids.

Coverdale and the rest of the committee works hard to manage the well-being of the environment surrounding Norris Lake and the lake itself. They keep a lake aeration system, which ensures that the lake does not freeze to the bottom in winter, protecting the fish. They also bring in new sand for the beach, trying to beautify it. They recently applied for a government grant that would make it possible to put new docks in around the lake, perfect for loading a small boat or sitting at the end of and casting off into the lake.

Coverdale is also currently in correspondence with the government to see if they will provide more picnic tables and fire pits for people to enjoy while visiting the lake.

The committee puts the same kind of care into this fishing day, working to foster a genuine love for fishing and the nature in which it takes place. Last year, over 100 fish were caught and every one of them was released back into the lake.

"The intention is to get these guys out there. We catch and release, teaching them proper fishing. And it's a fun day," said Coverdale. "It's just so great. It's means so much to see the smiles on some of these little kids' faces.

Coverdale shared a story from last year's event, when they had bought 30 fishing rods and were giving one away to every child who registered to participate that day: a little girl took her rod, had a ton of fun fishing and learning, then tried to return it, thanking Coverdale. The young girl was elated when Coverdale told her that it was hers to keep. "She was just so impressed."

This year's Family Fishing Day will be held on Saturday, June 8 at Norris Lake Beach. Registration will begin at 10 in the morning and last until 11. The derby will start at 10 and last until 3 in the afternoon. The cost is \$10 for members, \$20 for non-members and \$5 for youth. Memberships will be available to anyone interested in purchasing one. Hot dogs will be given away to the kids, and every child that registered will get to pick out a piece of prize equipment: "We've got tackle boxes and different hooks, floatation devices and things. There will also be some fishing rods left over from the ones we gave away last year."

Last week, students and staff from Sigurbjorg Stefansson Early School (SSES) took to the streets to both raise funds and spread awareness for Type 1 diabetes.

At the tender age of only one, Asher Johnson received a diagnosis of Type 1 diabetes. Upon experiencing symptoms of vomiting and lethargy throughout the night, his mother, Melanie Johnson, promptly took him to see their family doctor who then referred them to the Children's Hospital in Winnipeg.

"Not realizing what it was, I went into his room to get him in the morning, and it smelled like nail polish remover," she said, now knowing that meant his head had high levels of ketones in his blood.

Asher remained in intensive care for the initial night, followed by four additional days at the hospital. The Johnsons, who were alone with him for the first time since his diagnosis, stayed at the Ronald McDonald House. It was during this first night that Asher had his first low. Because he wasn't even one, he had never had juice or many sugary things, so Melanie said they ended up giving him maple syrup with a syringe — that was Asher's "low" treatment for years.

Melanie recalled the first night in the hospital when everything changed, describing it as a terrifying experience. She shared that Asher remains optimistic about the possibility of finding a cure during his lifetime.

The now almost nine-year-old, Asher has become a strong advocate for individuals with Type 1 diabetes, including himself. His Dexcom G7 CGM keeps his parents informed through their phones. This allows Asher to lead a regular lifestyle, and once every 12 months, he and his schoolmates, instructors and friends gather in Gimli to raise awareness and funds for the cause..

Dimes for Diabetes is a campaign that raises funds for juvenile diabetes research. The school has participated in the walk four times, beginning in 2021 to commemorate the 100th anniversary of insulin's invention.

"The first event was right after CO-VID and everybody was totally on board because there hadn't been any events for a while," said Melanie. "The kids are excited every year."

Each year, SSES classes make posters for Type 1 diabetes awareness and

put them around the school. They raise money for the cause too and the school educates students on symptoms of the disease and how to recognize someone experiencing a high or low. Each year, Asher kicks off the walk with a small speech, and his classmates each say something too, so he isn't the only one up in front of the school.

The five-kilometre walk is a popular event for SSES staff and students. The route leads down Centre Street to the boardwalk, then loops back up past the daycare and middle school. Along the way, participating students eagerly await donations of dimes. The majority of the school joins in on the walk, with only a handful of staff remaining behind due to their duties at the school.

Last year, the SSES walk generated \$2,600. Final numbers aren't in for this year yet, but the school almost doubled their goal with online donations reaching \$1,800.

Asher and his family will join the 2024 Winnipeg Walk for the Cause on June 15, which has raised nearly \$29,000 in donations towards its \$100,000 goal.

Gimli residents and volunteers from away armed with trash bags, gloves and trash pickers came out in droves to tidy up the town last Wednesday during the Gimli Chamber of Commerce's 2nd Annual Beautification Day.

The Gimli Chamber of Commerce's Destination Brand Committee chair Cheryl Buhler, who helped organize the event, said they saw over 200 people, including students, pitching in to make the town sparkle.

"This was such a great effort by everyone. We were able to get all the streets covered," said Buhler. "Kim [Giesbrecht of Right Choice Realty and the Beautification Day mastermind] had a giant map of the town and assigned people streets to clean. When the volunteers finished their area, they marked off what they had cleaned. It was satisfying to watch that six-foot map get coloured in."

They did the next best thing: they wrote letters to different levels of government, registering their concerns about the state of Lake Winnipeg [pollution].

Buhler said the RM of Gimli supplied garbage bags and gloves to the volunteers. And organizers also received a monetary donation from a community member (who doesn't wish to be identified) who wanted to show appreciation for the effort. Gimli Pharmasave posted on social media that it was a "wonderful afternoon with community members participating" in the annual event. The pharmacy thanked the Gimli Chamber of Commerce for organizing the event.

The bus loop kind of simulates a track, it's something like 180 meters so almost indoor track size. We make do with what we got, and the kids are into it to. There's never any negativity. It's kind of like a game."

Short said working together to make things run has helped the team bond closely this season. In practices athletes can be seen helping each other mark distances and time each other's runs.

At track meets, the students gather alongside the track to cheer on their teammates up close.

Shortt said he's been honoured to coach such a tight group.

"It's a lot of fun. They are great

Dear Money Lady Readers,

Today's column came from a conversation with one of my ATML Partners, Ana Cruz in Burlington, Ontario. Ana is a mortgage agent in Halton and shared a story about a good friend of hers who was able to reduce her mortgage and shed years off her amortization. Something we should all consider doing, especially due to the higher lending rates.

Here's what Ana said: "In 2019, I reworked a mortgage for a friend who was buying out her partner with a new mortgage of \$380,000. Let's call this friend, Karen (not her real name and she did give me permission to share this story). In order to qualify, Karen would have to take a 30-year mortgage with monthly payments at \$1,597. For the first year of Karen's five-year mortgage term, she didn't do very much other than move to accelerate biweekly payments. Now, you may think accelerated biweekly payments are a small change, but let me explain, this small move from \$1,597 monthly to \$798 biweekly means Karen could shave off 3 years of her mortgage and saved close to \$9,000. The next year Karen increased her payments by 15%, (\$120 bi-weekly) and made lumps sum payments of \$3,000 every quarter towards her mortgage. After 5 years, upon her mortgage renewal, Karen's mortgage balance was \$312,575 with an amortization of 11.8 years. If she had only made her monthly payments on her original 30-year mortgage, she would have had a renewal balance of \$337,668, and her amortization would be 25 years. Instead, by making a few simple changes and extra lump sum payments she had saved thousands of dollars in interest and reduced her overall amortization by 13 years."

This is a great success story and one we can all do so simply. Often times we stick with the payment structure our banker or broker give us when we sign a new mortgage. We fit this payment into our lifestyle and don't think about it anymore. Of course, this is to the benefit of the lender, not the borrower. Canadian mortgages are calculated "semi-annually, not in advance," which means they are broken into two interest calculations with all banks working on a calendar year. So as of January 1, your interest

is calculated based on the payment selection you chose, and interest is laid down over the first 6 months. On July 1, the mortgage balance is reviewed again, and interest is calculated on the remaining balance, based on your payment selection, until December 31. This is a basic analogy but demonstrates how Canadian banks calculate interest semiannually. Obviously, the best payment selection to reduce the amount of overall mortgage interest would be accelerated weekly, and the best time to do your lump sum payments would be in November-December or May-June. Most banks provide online mortgage calculators for you to work out different payment options. At the very least, try to line up your amortization on your mortgage with the year you plan to retire since you want to make sure you are debt-free at retirement. For example, if you are 45 years old and want to retire at 60, then your mortgage amortization should be no more than 15 years. If you are able to manage the payments with an amortization to match your retirement, then push it a little more and go with accelerated weekly payments. After a while this payment should fit into your new monthly budget but be careful not to stretch your cashflow too much. Paying off debt, especially a big mortgage, is a tremendous accomplishment, one that we should all strive for sooner rather than later.


