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Bifrost's Romafa Metal Works sizzles with innovative products

Necessity is the mother of invention, the saying goes, and that's never been truer for the RM of Bifrost-Riverton's metal-working shops, which got their start by taking on something that hadn't been done before to meet a unique community need.

And from that willingness to help solve problems came astonishing success with multi-national companies the world over looking to Bifrost to supply them with high-end specialty parts and products.

Romafa Metal Works is the youngest machine shop on the block — or rather the road (PR 326), which connects them all.

After working for 10 years as head of research and development for Vidir Vertical Storage Solutions, which specializes in automated vertical shelving, Romafa founder Ronald Kornelsen decided to start a home-based steel fabrication business about seven years ago.

Growing up on a dairy and grain farm taught Kornelsen to rely on himself when a piece of equipment broke whether or not he knew how to fix it.

"If the plough broke down, we would come home and my dad would have a way of fixing it. When you have a breakdown, you just fix it. That's

how we grew up," said Kornelsen, who took Reeve Brian Johnson and the *Express* on a tour of his recently expanded operation about 14 kilometres north of Arborg. "And by fixing it, we could see how it could be improved. We could see how something was not property designed and we'd come up with a different idea."

Romafa differentiates itself from the

other machine shops (Vidir, Diemo, Swivel) by making air seeders, hog manure injectors and weed spraying booms out of stainless steel.

The beauty of stainless steel lies in its ability to withstand corrosion, and that's vital for agricultural equipment that dispenses fertilizer and other chemicals or organic material such as manure. Regular steel will corrode with age.

Kornelsen designs and builds the stainless steel air seeders for manufacturing company John Deere.

"We started with that four and a half years ago in the design stage. We didn't know anybody that was doing that and the needs were high," said Kornelsen. "John Deere customers and dealers were right away on our heels and wanted it before we were done. For John Deere to manufacture something out of stainless the way we do, their input and labour costs would become so very high. We can come in with much lower labour hours."

Reeve Johnson said corrosion comes at a high cost to farmers.

"The problem is much of the farm equipment that comes out is made of steel and it corrodes very quickly," he said. "For fertilizer applications, you want stainless steel. And we've got Romafa manufacturing these parts."

Corrosion also affects equipment used in the food processing industry, said Johnson. His crop processing facility — Johnson Seeds — has gone to all-stainless steel.

Romafa designs and measures all of its products using computer-aided design under the precise eye of design head Reynold Reimer. Then it "farms out" the cutting and bending of the steel to bigger shops such as Diemo, which own expensive lasercutting machines.

Romafa's 17 or so employees then weld the parts together. When stainless steel is heated, it loses some of its corrosive ability, so the final stage of Romafa's process is "pickling," which restores welded areas to their corrosive-resistant properties.

"Eighty per cent of our product stays in Canada and western Canada in the farming community, and a good chunk goes to the U.S.," said Kornelsen. "We have a little bit going to Australia and a few of our parts have gone as far as Kazakhstan."

Kornelsen is currently working with a company that's in the manurespreading industry, and his team will be starting on a big project — a stainless steel manure injector — for a customer in the U.S.

Hog barns store waste in lagoons year-round, and in the spring after runoff the injector pumps the organic matter under the surface of the field.

In addition to the injector and air seeder, Kornelsen and his team have created another new product and word of the invention is spreading like a weed.

The Interlake's invasive weed control supervisor Fred Paulson had approached Kornelsen to see if he could design a stainless steel spraying boom that could be affixed to his work vehicle.

Yes, he could.

"It's a complete GPS weed-controlled arm that reaches out into the ditch," said Kornelsen. "The truck

Arborg tractor pull organizer looking forward to this year's competition

Summer crops are planted, school is winding down, and Arborg is preparing for a crowd of antique tractors to roll through its town once again.

The antique tractor pull will happen on Saturday, July 20 and Sunday, July 21, but Darryl Hoeppner has been planning for it since last summer.

Hoeppner is on the Arborg Ag Society board of directors. He's been in charge of the tractor pull for over a decade, and he's been participating in the event for just as long.

When the antique tractor pull first began, only 14 tractors participated, Hoeppner said. In 2018, 88 tractors came to the show.

Participants choose a weight class for their tractor to compete in. The tractor then pulls its selected weight on a skid and tries to travel 300 feet. The minimum weight class is 4,000 pounds and under.

Though the general competition stays the same, Hoeppner said he's always looking for things to improve.

"I'm always trying to please every age in the crowd," he said.

To entertain a younger audience, Hoeppner hired motocross stuntmen to perform in between tractor pulls last year. Keith Sayers FMX Shows will be back again this summer.

Over the years, Hoeppner has bought his own antique tractors. To participate, pullers' tractors must have been made before 1960.

Hoeppner has four tractors now, but when he started in 2007, he borrowed one.

"It stalled and sputtered," Hoeppner said. "I didn't get that far."

That evening, other pullers from the competition tinkered with the tractor and fixed it up for Hoeppner.

"The next day, I made it about threequarters of the way down the track," Hoeppner said.

Hoeppner said it was this camaraderie that got him involved in Arborg's tractor pull. He owns Arborg Livestock Supplies and talks daily with locals. Participants of the tractor pull would come in and talk to him about the event, and they sparked his interest in the competition.

Now that Hoeppner's in charge of the tractor pull, people come into his shop and ask him questions about the event.

"Every day, they talk about it," Hoeppner said.

He said people ask about the rules

and offer to volunteer.

"A big part of the success is the volunteers that make it possible," Hoeppner said.

He has volunteers to cut grass, keep records and ensure everyone's in the right weight class, among other things.

"It's an awesome weekend because everybody just pulls together, works together, makes it all happen," Hoeppner said.

Hoeppner sees volunteers and fellow pullers at the tractor pull — and

he sees his family too. His nieces and nephews come to the event every year. He said he's trying to teach them his hobby.

"I let them drive my tractors," Hoeppner said. "It brings the younger generation to the circle."

People 12 and older can drive in the tractor pull, but if they're under 16, they need a parent or guardian to sign for them.

Arborg's tractor pull weigh-in begins at 9 a.m. on Saturday, July 20.

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Darryl Hoeppner is looking forward to competing in the Arborg Ag Society's tractor pull on July 20 and 21.

Gimli's Canada Day Committee is gearing up for a smashing three-day celebration that includes science and spirits, music and art, food and tours of Lake Winnipeg and a picnic party with the seldom-seen Huldufolk.

Canada Day Committee head Susan Holfeuer, who is also co-chair of the Gimli Ice Festival, took on planning duties this year and she's never been known for organizing small events.

"Go big or go home," said Holfeuer, who stopped to catch her breath between meetings to finalize the myriad of details that go into planning and executing multiple days of public fun.

Celebrations begin Saturday, June 29 with Spirit Fest, organized and hosted by Lenore Chartrand of Heaven Scent Flowers & Gifts. Visitors can immerse themselves in the spirit world from noon to 8 p.m. The event includes mediums, tarot card readers and healers.

Jammin' at the Dock (on the Gimli bandstand) gets underway at 7 p.m. that evening and features a variety

of musical acts. Musicians from the crowd will be invited to jump up on stage and showcase their talent.

On Sunday, June 30, the Gimli Yacht Club is teaming up with the Kiwanis Club of Gimli to host a fish fry and lake talk. Scientists will take to the podium at the club to give the straight goods on the state of Lake Winnipeg. Guest speakers include the Lake Winnipeg Foundation's director Dr. Alexis Kanu and the Lake Winnipeg Research Consortium's Dr. Karen Scott.

The fish fry gets underway at 11 a.m. followed by an afternoon of harbour tours and a chance to head out to open water on LWRC's research vessel, the Namao. Bands will round out the evening's entertainment along with fireworks at dusk (rain date is July 1 at dusk).

drives along the road and sprays weeds we need to get rid of."

In addition to the RM of Bifrost-Riverton, the RMs of Armstrong, Pipestone, Wallace-Woodworth (Virden) have the Romafa weed arm, and Selkirk has ordered one.

The odd thing about the area's machine shops is that they don't compete against one another. They specialize in different lines and help make parts for one other, which in turns bolsters their businesses and allows them to create employment.

"Ninety-nine per cent of our product is agricultural-related. Diemo has a lot of agricultural products as well, but we're not competing with them. We're working together. In fact, if it wasn't for the bigger shops, small guys like us would have a very hard time," said Kornelsen.

"It allowed us a much lower start-up cost because we can go to the neighbours and they will cut steel for us and they will bend it for us, and we'll do all the welding assembly and marketing. We don't have to have millions of dollars to get started. As a community we have great benefits working together like that."

Another boon to Kornelsen's business will be the complete re-building and paving of PR 326, which runs right outside Romafa's door. The province has committed to upgrading 19.7 kilometres of highway to help the machine shops and ag producers cope with dust and transportation-related costs.

The highway, which has weight restrictions imposed in the spring, can be hazardous to trucking companies and couriers who pick up and deliver parts and products on a daily basis.

"The upgrading will make a huge difference, and in many ways, it will make this community much more productive," said Kornelsen as he and his wife treated employees and guests to birthday cake and coffee in the company's kitchen.

With his willingness to tackle whatever problem individuals and big companies throw at him, Kornelsen said he's seen his business do exceptionally well. And despite not having spent very much on advertising, word-of-mouth has brought "significant" companies to his door.

"I had the vision to serve the community and be a man that could repair and fix their problems, and that's how we got into this," said Kornelsen. "And I'm confident to say that it is the good Lord that showers [this success] down upon us."

Stats say slow down

It's not uncommon to be driving down the Interlake's highways and see a vehicle growing larger in your rearview mirror at a rapid rate.

So many people drive with excessive speed, and for what? It saves you 10 minutes, maybe? If you're late, you're late. Speeding isn't going to change that.

Last week, just north of Eriksdale on Highway 6, RCMP caught a woman travelling 178 km/h in a 100 km/h construction zone.

The woman was fined \$2,092 and issued a serious driving offence notice, which results in a licence review with Manitoba Public Insurance.

Excessive speeding, distracted driving and driving under the influence are senseless behaviours.

The annual number of fatalities on Manitoba highways total roughly 40, according to MPI spokesperson Brian Smiley. The vast majority of those fatalities are related to speed, distracted driving and/or impaired driving, he said.

More specifically, the number of fatalities and serious injuries on Inter-

lake Highways 6, 7 and 8 may surprise vou.

Keep in mind, Highway 6 runs from the City of Winnipeg's Perimeter all the way to Thompson. Highway 6 has seen six fatalities and 12 serious injuries between 2016 and 2019, according to MPI stats. In addition, RCMP issued 1,730 speeding tickets on Highway 6 over the past two years.

Highway 7, which runs from the Perimeter north to Arborg, has seen three fatalities and two serious injuries over the same three-year span. Speeding has been less of an issue on Highway 7, as RCMP only issued 180 tickets over the past two years.

Lastly, Highway 8, which runs from the Perimeter Highway north to Hecla-Grindstone Provincial Park, has seen two fatalities and six serious injuries over the three-year stretch, according to MPI stats, while the RCMP issued 813 speeding tickets over the last two years.

MPI spokesperson Brian Smiley also stated if a driver is travelling 50 km/h over the posted speed limit, RCMP will immediately issue a serious driving offence notice, with drivers licence suspensions taking affect rather quickly. Smiley said MPI can slap hefty suspensions on licences as early as two weeks into the process. Depending on the driver's history, speed at which they were caught, and so on, suspensions can end up being as long as nine months.

A fine for a serious driving offence cannot be determined until a conviction happens in court, but as we've seen in the last week, they can be expensive (upwards of \$2,000).

MPI does not have location-based data but sees an average of 3,000 convictions related to distracted driving, according to MPI statistics, too.

According to the AAA Foundation, drivers who text are up to eight times more likely than non-distracted drivers to be involved in a collision and drivers talking — either hands-free or using a hand-held device — are up to four times more likely to be involved in a collision.

Nobody is perfect, obviously, but it's important to remind ourselves of how avoidable tragedies can be.

Know the stats, be responsible, and know that while we all seem to think it can't, it can happen to you. Safe travels.

Manitoba's Premier Pallister calls an early election

Manitobans will head to the polls on Sept. 10, Premier Brian Pallister announced.

On Wednesday June 19, the premier of Manitoba — flanked by his team of Progressive Conservative MLAs announced the next provincial election.

"Over three years ago, Manitobans overwhelmingly entrusted us with a clear mandate to fix the finances, repair the services and rebuild the economy," said Pallister.

"We inherited a mess. But together, we have made real progress. The deficit is cut by more than half. Healthcare and education investments are at a record high. And we did so without raising one single tax on Manitoba families."

Manitoba has 57 electoral divisions also known as constituencies or ridings, according to www.manitobaelection.ca. Red River North, Selkirk, Lakeside, Interlake-Gimli and The Pas-Kameesak (Peguis) make up the Interlake region's five divisions.

An elected member of the legislative assembly (MLA) represents each division. The Manitoba Electoral Divisions Boundaries Commission meets every 10 years to review boundaries under the authority of The Electoral Divisions Act, and the 2019 general election will be the first election after re-defining some of Manitoba's divisions.

In the northern Interlake, The Pas-Kameesak is one of the newest ridings, which includes the west side of

Lake Winnipeg, according to Elections Manitoba's website.

Familiar faces

Much of Premier Pallister's incumbent government has announced they will be running again in 2019, including Jeff Wharton (Red River North), Ralph Eichler (Lakeside), Alan Lagimodiere (Selkirk) and Derek Johnson (Interlake-Gimli).

The Red River North division will now include the municipalities of East St. Paul and St. Clements, according to incumbent MLA Jeff Wharton, who at present is running unopposed. The new division will bring his campaign to the complete opposite side of the lake from where he had been previously, he said.

"We've already been in the new area quite a bit, while still supporting constituents of Gimli because I'm currently the MLA until the writ drops, but the campaigning never stops," said Wharton.

"I'm so pleased to have had the opportunity to serve. ... I was a councillor in Winnipeg Beach and my goal was run for provincial office. I want to continue down that path, and meet the people of my new riding."

Similarly, at present, Lakeside's incumbent MLA Ralph Eichler is running unopposed.

"We want to make sure we're listening to Manitobans. ... We've achieved near 90 per cent of our mandate, and we're looking to refresh that. We want to listen to ... the issues that are important to Manitobans," said Eichler.



The Interlake has five electoral regions including the Red River North, Selkirk, Lakeside, Interlake-Gimli and The Pas-Kameesak (Peguis).

"So far, it sounds like returning more money to Manitobans, income, having money in their pockets rather than the governments, that's an important one. That'll be the focus, while building the economy now and in the long-term."

Both incumbent MLAs for Selkirk and Interlake-Gimli, Alan Lagimodiere and Derek Johnson respectively, declined to comment by press time.

However, both have been confirmed as 2019 candidates by Elections Manitoba.

Potential new faces

NDP candidate Mitch Obach will contest Lagimodiere in Selkirk, with no other candidates named so far.

Another NDP candidate, Sarah Pinsent, will contest Derek Johnson for a provincial seat in the Interlake-Gimli division. No other candidates have come forward yet.

In the new riding, Pas-Kameesak which encompasses Chief Peguis First Nation —the NDP's Amanda Lathlin will take on the PC's Ronald Evans, pending any other candidates coming forward.

Fisher Branch under boil water advisory

The community of Fisher Branch is under a boil water advisory due to a failure in the disinfection treatment process.

The province issued the advisory on June 19, which said the failure caused by a broken chlorine pump allowed poorly treated water to enter the distribution system.

"The equipment required some attention, and the Office of Drinking Water advised us to put out an advi-

sory," said Fisher Branch's chief administrative officer Kelly Marykuca. "The public notice is for whoever is

(using) town water."

The boil water advisory will remain in effect until the water supplied by the water system no longer presents a risk to public health, the advisory read, with no definite timelines listed. Though, the advisory did say resi-

dents would be notified when the advisory has been rescinded.

least one minute if using water for drinking or making ice, preparing beverages (including infant formula), preparing food (including washing fruits and vegetables), and brushing teeth, according to the advisory.

However, the advisory said boil water is not required for laundry or washing dishes, and providing a person isn't ingesting the water, it can be used to wash, bathe or shower.

All commercial, public and permit-Residents should boil water for at ted facilities, examples including restaurants, health-care facilities, day cares, personal care homes and other private facilities providing food and water services. must follow water use recommendations from the advisory.

Staff and students at Winnipeg Beach School, along with members of community organizations, unveiled a memorial on Monday in honour of six-year-old Nicolina Ammazzini, who passed away from cancer last July.

With the generosity of community donors, the school installed a sandbox in its playground in Nicolina's memory, and her family donated a beautiful stone-carved bench.

Nicolina developed cancer when she was two years old and battled the disease while she attended junior Kindergarten, Kindergarten and Grade 1.

The sandbox memorial was spearheaded by Nicolina's kindergarten teacher Beverley Braga in remembrance of Nicolina's love for a sand table that was set up in her classroom.

Because the school did not have an outdoor sandbox for the kids to play in, Braga pursued the idea of having one built, thinking it would be a loving tribute to the "vibrant" girl.

"She was full of life and was so well natured. She was a happy, bubbly little girl who brought smiles and laughter everywhere she went," said Braga during the dedication and ribbon-cutting ceremony, which was attended by Nicolina's family, friends, classmates, teachers and members of the community. "She bravely fought cancer for five long years. She was the toughest and bravest little girl you ever met."

Last September, the school organized a Terry Fox Run in Nicolina's honour. They made banners with photos of the young girl and carried them through town and along the boardwalk overlooking the lake. They also unveiled a memorial plaque in her honour and helped gym teacher

and counsellor Posie McDevitt create a "wall of love," which contained photos of Nicolina with her friends and teachers and heartfelt messages to their cherished friend.

Braga said supportive and generous local and area businesses stepped up to help her make the "dream come true," and the Evergreen School Division gave the school permission to have it built on the grounds.

Beware of scammers pretending to be Manitoba Hydro employees

Manitoba Hydro is warning customers to watch for scammers who separate people from their cash by pretending to work for the company.

Scammers contact Manitoba Hydro's customers via phone or email, or by coming to customers' houses. Most of the time, scammers call their targets.

A fake employee says they'll cut off their target's service if that person doesn't pay them in a short period of time. Normally, the scammer asks the customer to pay by prepaid card.

They might ask for customers to pay with a Pay-Pal account, by wiring a cash payment via Western Union or by giving a credit card number.

Scammers may use fake caller IDs and appear to call from Manitoba Hydro's number. Their callback numbers might have a recorded version of the company's greetings.

Manitoba Hydro calls customers who owe the company. They can threaten to stop providing services if the customer does not pay their bill.

However, Manitoba Hydro does not accept payment over the phone. Representatives won't ask customers to buy prepaid cards or wire money.

Some scammers offer Manitoba Hydro's customers devices or services that could save the consumer money or energy. Manitoba Hydro does not cold call its customers to sell products or services.

If you feel uncomfortable giving personal information over the phone, hang up and call the number on your monthly bill, Manitoba Hydro said on its website.

Interlake-Gimli MLA Derek Johnson shared a post from the utilities company about the scams.

"The reason for the repost is to make people aware prior to it becoming an epidemic problem," Johnson said.

He said he shared the post on Facebook after seeing it on Twitter. This way, more people online will know about the hoax.

"If they're on social media, they can be aware of it before something takes place and they lose money," Johnson said.

He said so far, nobody from the Interlake has called him saying they lost money to people pretending to be from Manitoba Hydro.

"People that are usually part of a scam feel embarrassed after and don't come forward," Johnson said. People who are worried about their service being disconnected can call Manitoba Hydro's Credit and Recovery Services at 204-480-5901. Customers who want to check if their Manitoba Hydro bill or visit is real can call 204-480-5900 or 1-888-624-9376.

Selkirk RCMP target Interlake drug trafficking networks

Project Deteriorate began in November 2018 and was undertaken by officers of the Selkirk General Investigation Section.

Police discovered a drug trafficking network being operated from within Selkirk and the City of Winnipeg, which was believed to be supplying drugs to the various communities throughout the Interlake region.

On June 19, 2019, officers executed a search warrant at a residence in the City of Winnipeg. As a result of this investigation, officers seized over two kilograms of methamphetamine, a quarter of an ounce of fentanyl/heroin, \$25,000 in Canadian currency, a Chevrolet Trax vehicle and a conducted energy weapon.

"The impact of this investigation is far reaching and has affected the drug supply chain to various Interlake communities," said Insp. Allan Hofland, officer in charge of Selkirk RCMP. "Our communities are seeing the negative impacts that stem from the drug trade such as property crime, assaults, robberies and home invasions."

The investigation is continuing as we anticipate making further arrests and laying additional charges.

Arnes man facing break, enter and theft charges

Winnipeg police have laid charges in connection with more than a dozen break-ins at city businesses over a 2.5year span, saying the police service is putting more resources into combatting property crime.

Police believe \$100,000 in cash was stolen and another \$100,000 in damage was caused to the businesses in a series of break-ins between Jan. 7, 2017, and June 18, 2019.

"So a total loss to people of \$200,000," said Winnipeg Police Service Const. Rob Carver, who said investigators with the major crimes unit were tasked with investigating. "This was a large complex investigation," said Carver. "Lots and lots of business, lots of work that went into it from an investigative standpoint."

Carver described the theft operation as "fairly sophisticated" and well planned, saying the businesses were targeted because it was thought they would have cash on site.

"Substantially more money on site, for various legitimate reasons, than you would have in a cash float or a till."

Police said the investigators went to a break in at a business in the 400 block of Lagimodiere Boulevard at around 1:05 a.m. Wednesday and arrested a suspect. Arnes resident Cary Scott Preston, 42, is facing a list of charges, including multiple counts of break, enter and theft — place and disguise with intent. He is in custody.

A second man, 56, was arrested and charged with two counts of break, enter and commit – place. He was released on a promise to appear in court.

Carver said police are taking a more targeted approach to property crimes, with dedicated investigators.

"We do have a separate section now within major crimes that will specialize in smaller property crimes because we're certainly seeing a spike in those numbers over the last while," he said, explaining what's behind the strategy.

"When you look at the way crimes are committed, it's not an infinite universe," he said. "If you're looking at a rash of break-ins in a particular neighbourhood, we may not know who's doing it, but we can tell you that it's limited to a finite number of people."

Carver said the goal is prevention.

"It's a small number of people, and if we can figure out who's done a couple of them, we can usually, if we can make an arrest, stop a potential for an ongoing series of crime."

Tristin Tergesen, chair of the Westshore Community Foundation, spoke to why the foundation felt it was important to continue supporting Gimli's home care clinic.

"The Westshore Community Foundation is happy to provide a \$2,236 grant towards the purchase of a new clinic chair for the Gimli home care clinic. This contribution to the health of our community is consistent with our mandate of 'Building a Lasting Legacy."
