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Gimli Glider pilot to attend 41st Anniversary Dinner

Gimli is home to one of the world's most famous aviation events in history and volunteers are excited to be hosting the 41st Anniversary Dinner for the Gimli Glider on Sunday, July 21.

President Barb Gluck said they look forward to this date every year. The annual fundraising evening in support of the Gimli Glider's operation is usually a sell-out.

"Last year, guests came from nine of our provinces, overseas and the United State, many staying in Gimli for two or three days," she said.

The Gimli Glider exhibit is a volunteer-operated non-profit charity, and this large event provides funding that allows it to continue being a tourist attraction for aviation fans.

"We never know when they come through the door where they are from and what connection they may have to the history," she said.

The Gimli Glider exhibit was contacted last spring by MotoArt Plane

Tags company owner Dave Hall, wanting to make an offer to support the popular exhibit's operations.

For two decades, Hall built MotoArt as the first and only shop handcrafting one-of-a-kind furniture from the salvaged parts of decommissioned aircraft. While their artists continue to create desks, bars, tables and beyond from wings, fuselage, cowlings and more, Hall wanted the opportunity to bring a piece of aviation history to more of those who love the art of flight.

It was a natural choice to create PlaneTags, the first and original aviation memento that is resurrected from the skin of retired aircraft, hand cut, stamped, shaped and individually etched, ready to serve as an ID tag or displayed as a treasured part of your aviation collection.

PlaneTags help to preserve and document aviation history. When you hold a PlaneTag, you're holding an original piece from the plane's exterior.

Each PlaneTag is hand selected, cut, stamped and crafted to be truly one-of-a-kind.

Hall donated a small run of 245 of

the commemorative PlaneTags last year, what he referred to as a limited run manufactured from the famous aircraft's fuselage metal in honour of Air Canada's 767 Gimli Glider's 40th anniversary. The Gimli Glider remains are in a boneyard in Mojave,

The revenue generated from the sale of the tags will support the Gimli Glider exhibit.

The volunteer team at the exhibit was immersed in excess of 100 orders within hours of the PlaneTag being released. There were orders from around the globe for the historical special tags.

"Over the following days responding to the ongoing demands and speaking with Hall, exhibit staff quickly realized that Hall is heavily involved with the aviation market for collectors and business owners wishing to acquire authentic items from historic aircraft parts," said Gluck.

Gluck appreciates Hall's offer of the PlaneTags and the revenue their sale generated. She invited him to speak at the dinner to meet Capt. Pearson.

Hall accepted the invitation and looks forward to speaking to the guests about his experience working within the large aviation community.

Gluck also shared that one lucky dinner guest on July 21 will have the opportunity to win one of the Gimli Glider's 40th Commemorative PlaneTags autographed by Capt. Pearson, along with a signed poster.

This year's dinner will be held at Johnson Hall, on the top floor of the Waterfront Centre providing a beautiful view overlooking Lake Winnipeg on Sunday, July 21. Tickets are \$100 and limited and must be purchased before July 15.

Capt. Bob Pearson and Pearl Dion will attend the dinner, and they will also visit the Gimli Glider exhibit to meet the public for the 41st anniversary on July 23.

Dion was one of more than 60 passengers on the famed "Gimli Glider"
— the nickname given to the Boeing 767 jet that made an emergency

landing near the small community of Gimli on July 23, 1983, after running out of fuel due to a metric conversion error

The Montreal-to-Edmonton Air Canada Flight 143 was piloted by Bob Pearson, whose flying skills allowed him to successfully land the plane on an abandoned runway near the town in Manitoba's Interlake region, saving everyone on board — including Dion, now his partner of 11 years.

The visitation to the exhibit from around the world continues to grow as the years pass.

"It is always an interesting day volunteering and meeting so many who come from outside of our province to learn more about the famous landing," said Gluck.



Days event, which began 18 years ago as a way to showcase the Eriksdale Creamery, has now expanded into a two-day celebration that draws in hundreds of visitors each year.

Built in 1912, the Eriksdale Creamery was constructed by the Brandon Creamery and Supply Company. The standard wood frame building was expanded several times over the years, increasing in size as it did in capacity. According to the Manitoba Historical Society, the core of the Eriksdale Creamy operation was in the main room where the cream was weighed, graded, and churned day after day. In later years, the creamery became a butter finishing operation, then a butter cutting business until it permanently closed in 1990.

In 1995, a group of local volunteers established to acquire and restore the creamery, preserving it in all its glory and turning it into the museum it is today. Since 1995, the creamery has been a municipally designated histor-

The creamery's transformation into a museum and the launch of Creamery Days both serve to commemorate the Eriksdale staple. One organizer of the upcoming two-day event, Vienna Kinkead, said Creamery Days is important for the town's history.

"We like to do as much as we can to keep awareness of it because it's one of a kind," she said. "It hasn't been many years that it hasn't been operating and that it's been a museum."

Kinkead joined the Creamery Days committee around 10 years ago when she and her family were really active with the Heartland Rodeo. It was then that she brought the idea of bringing the rodeo to Creamery Days, and it's been an event staple ever since.

"We thought it'd be a good way to revamp it and bring new energy and it's been amazing," she said.

Creamery Days kicks off on Saturday, July 6 with a parade at 11 a.m., followed by a BBQ lunch at noon, and the Eriksdale Chamber of Commerce market garden from 10 a.m. – 2 p.m. The Heartland Rodeo and antique tractor pull will start at the rodeo grounds around 3 p.m. and will continue on Sunday. At the rodeo, people can watch saddle bronc riding, team

roping, bull riding, barrel racing, ranch bronc riding, and more.

There will be live entertainment all weekend long at the museum, complete with a home living section full of crafts, preserves, and baking, and a new Manitoba Metis Federation section, where Indigenous people can bring samples of their beading work to be judged.

Creamery Days is a cherished family event that has also become a beloved reunion for many community members, according to Kinkead. She expresses her hope that the event will receive the continued support it has enjoyed in past years, allowing it to continue for another 18 years.



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ESD working on early reading intervention, seeing improvements

The Evergreen School Division (ESD) is actively working on early reading instruction and intervention and they're seeing the fruits of their labours.

When ESD Supt. Scott Hill and his staff started learning more about how children learn best, they delved deep into the research. On the heels of Ontario's Right to Read inquiry, Hill took the report's findings seriously, and ESD started making changes.

"There's a whole body of research informing of the different ways of doing reading instruction," he said.

The Right to Read inquiry highlights that learning to read is not a privilege but a fundamental and essential human right. It includes 157 recommendations to the Ministry of Education and school boards on how to address systemic issues that affect children's right to read and learn. Hill felt compelled to make changes in his school division based on the research evidence that supports teaching reading in a way that pays more attention to phonics.

"We knew Manitoba was going to undertake a similar human rights inquiry," said Hill. "And we decided we wouldn't wait for Manitoba to draw what we expect will be a similar conclusion in Ontario, so we started drawing a plan."

ESD's reading instruction works off of three tiers and a screening system. ESD staff do a reading assessment with each student at least three times a year — at the beginning, middle of the year and end of the year — where the students demonstrate their ability to make letter sounds and sound out words.

"We screen every early years student to basically check in on how their progress with reading instruction is and then we create a multi-

tiered approach to making sure every kid learns to read," said Hill.

All assessment findings go into a diagnostic standardized reading assessment tool, and the data is kept for tracking. These assessments help ESD staff know whether or not their students are where they need to be reading-wise.

Tier 1 instruction is for every student in the classroom and includes ensuring the children know how to sound out words. If, based on the assessments, staff find a student is struggling with something, they'll start giving them Tier 2 instruction, which is essentially more instruction in small groups.

"They're usually struggling to decode words, sounding them out," said Hill. "Some kids need extra time and practice to be taught what letter sounds do. Sometimes they learn in the small groups in the classroom and sometimes they need a more intensive intervention, which is Tier 3."

Tier 3 instruction allows the children who are still struggling to receive more instruction more often. Hill said some children usually need more repetition when sounding out letters and words, and Tier 3 instruction gives them that.

"We just need to make sure we have the time for every kid to have that success because reading is foundational for what happens in school and life in general," he said.

The children receiving Tier 2 and Tier 3 instruction in ESD have their progress monitored by staff so they can make sure the extra instruction is working.

ESD started doing the reading assessments division-wide last school year. Hill said in the two years the program's been going, they've seen statistically significant improvements across the division's schools, which is

extremely exciting to them.

"We have individual success stories where kids struggle to read, and as they move up grades, their confidence as a learner takes a hit and they'll turn to negative behaviours or other ways of getting attention if they're not experiencing success," said Hill.

"So we have stories of kids that were struggling and now having success, and that's always really gratifying,

Hill said a parent recently gave the school board a presentation about her own child experiencing that success they didn't before. Before ESD implemented the early reading instruction and intervention program, the student had behavioural challenges from "being no good at reading." Once the division provided the intervention, the student changed completely.

"He used to toss birthday cards aside and now when you drive through town, he reads the signs on stores and in traffic," said Hill. "He sees himself as a learner and a reader now. These are the stories that inspire us to keep

ESD won one of the 2024 Dyslexia Canada Educational Excellence Awards for their approach to early reading intervention this May. Hill said they received the award for their proactive approach to reading intervention as it's similar to many of the organization's practices. ESD has visitors from other school divisions inquiring about the program often, and Hill hopes he'll start seeing more of their work across Manitoba.

"It's exciting to feel like we're a bit of a leader in some of the work we're doing," he said.

"I've been in education for more than 25 years and this is the most exciting work I've been a part of."

Ashern's new RC track is expected to be ready for use sometime soon. Watch the community Facebook page for updates.



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

Beyette mentioned Chase Nahuliak being a great conversationalist, eager to talk about anything

in class that was off topic. He dubbed Gabe Vieira the negotiator, talked about Justin Beaudette's perseverance, and laughed when remembering Jared Leochko's dance moves, namely his signature routine.

Beyette looked to Rachel Traa, acknowledging her creative mind and vivid imagination, then to Benson Legary, noting his never-ending enthusiasm. He mentioned quiet Owen Favel, who was always ready for a friendly chat, and Raelyn Daniels, whom he saved for last because of the lasting impact their last conversation had on him — Daniels, doing extremely well on her history exam, said to Beyette he must be proud of her, and he is. He's proud of her and each of her classmates.

Beyette's speech was on the theme "moving on." He said some of the graduates may enter the work force immediately after graduating, others may go into further education or training, and some may take the time to travel.

"Wherever your path leads, remember there will be challenges and solutions, good times and bad times," he said. "And, of course, failure and success. Such is life. 

"It's a dangerous business, Frodo Baggins, going out your door. You step onto the road, and if you don't keep your feet, there's no telling where you might be swept off to.'





Guest speakers Haley Fisher and Scott Stadnek shared fond and humourous memories of teaching the grads over



"Having watched all the Ukrainians who came here, having to learn English and go to school, my heart is so proud of everybody," said Genik. "I just love them like they were like my own children."







Lundar students overcame challenges to graduate

Grzenda went on to say the world can be discouraging, even for the oldest adults, but each graduate will find expertise in certain areas. In their expertise, he said, they'll find their place and feel included.

"Finding your place is the task that now lies ahead of you."

He suggested ways for the grads to

find their place — volunteering be-Mr. Lawrence Grzenda. ing first on the list. He listed the Lundar Fair, Lobsterfest, Bullorama, community groups and more. Grzenda said by volunteering, the grads will gain experience and make connections with people who can help them find their place.

"Finding your place is not something that happens without your engagement in the world," he said. "Getting opportunities and experience requires you to get involved and to do something for society."

Valedictorian Jersi Godfrey started her speech off by reminiscing with her fellow graduates over their years together. She noted classmates who write their own music, ones with distinctive laughs, and touched on the group's most memorable moments.

"As I look back at our last few

Heather Iriks earned the Governor General's

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
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
academic medal for achieving a grade point average of over 96 in








Ashern graduates onto the next phase of learning

In the project of life, 30 Ashern Central School (ACS) students have completed Phase 1.

On June 22, the Grade 12s made the transition from high school to real life, and principal Tracey Kinkead chalked their accomplishments up to their own hard work, dedication and perseverance. Starting with the principal's address, the graduation ceremony went from 2 p.m. on, with the service followed by a sit-down supper for the grads and their families.

Kinkead kicked the afternoon off by congratulating the now-adults before her. She said the last four years were an introduction to the various directions their learning could now go in, calling the end of high school "the ending of one phase of learning."

"The one that was assigned and required of you without choice," she added. "And now with the accomplishment of this diploma, you move on to the next phase of learning which is fully yours to choose. Whether it's a job, career training, post-secondary education, travelling or moving to a new place, there'll be so much more to learn about yourself and life."

Kinkead recalled her own past and making her own decisions when she was younger — what she thought was right and wrong, what she thought she knew to be true.

"Now, after many more years of learning, the world doesn't seem so simple, and my answers don't flow with such certainty," she said. "Feeling sure is easy and comfortable. Feeling uncertain is not, but what's important about allowing uncertainty is it means you're open to seeing things in a different way, open to learning when life offers it to you."

She called it the spark that ignites the desire to question, to explore and to understand. These qualities, the

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principal said, are what she hopes the graduates will carry forward from their years at ACS.

Kinkead went on to acknowledge the grads will likely forget the periodic table of elements or how to balance an equation, but what stays with them is the important part — curiosity in learning. Learning, she said, requires the confidence to be wrong and the strength to continue trying.

"While you're no longer a student of [ACS], I wish for you to always be a curious student of life," she said. "Each of you have such amazing natural gifts and talents. On this stage there are musicians, actors, athletes, scientists, writers, builders, fixers, and you're only just beginning to realize those strengths and talents you

She read the Nelson Mandela quote: "Our worst fear is not that we are inadequate. Our deepest fear is that we are powerful beyond measure. It is our light, not our darkness, that most frightens us," saying she understands it to mean it's easier and safer to stay within limitations we put on ourselves. We convince ourselves that these self-imposed restrictions are true, and we aren't good enough to do what we really want to, forever recalculating when we might be able to achieve them.

"Being human means acknowledging that we are bound to make mistakes along the way, and I've learned much more in life from what I've done wrong than what I've done right," said Kinkead, then adding the Nelson Mandela quote: "I never lose. I either win or learn."

She told the students to offer them-

selves the same forgiveness they give to others and that their graduation day was the "someday" they've been waiting for. No matter the path, Kinkead said, the journey will be fascinating.

Guest speaker Teresa Johnson, Lakeshore School Division board trustee, talked about moving from Portugal decades ago due to her father's belief in learning. Having only completed Grade 3 in Portugal, Johnson's father wanted his children to have a better future, and Canada had the education system they would need for that.

"When I look around today, I see young adults, the future," she said. "I know that they have worked hard to

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

get to this place. The education that they have taken part in is truly world class and the envy of many countries globally."

Johnson told the graduates to hold on to their values as they embark on the next chapter of life, to keep their work ethics and their humanity. She told them to dream high and be happy with who they are, and those qualities will guide them to the future.

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

Interlake ball clubs compete in 2024 Mervin Farmer Memorial

Due to rain, the 15U final was moved to Monday night, but for the most part, the teams played through the weather as they concluded yet another Mervin Farmer Memorial Championship.

"It gives me a lot of pride to be part of an event like that where there is so many kids participating and having fun, learning how to compete and showing good sportsmanship," said Murray."

With the tournament now over, clubs are shifting their attention to the fast-approaching provincials.

The 11U provincials will take place July 5-7 with Tier 1 in Mitchell, Tier 2 in Reston and Tier 3 in Boissevain.

The 13U Provincials are set for July 12-14 with Tier 1 in Morden, Tier 2 in Wawanesa and Tier 3 in Carberry.

The 15U Provincials will run from July 12 to 14 with Tier 1 in Altona and Tier 2 in Stonewall and Warren jointly. Murray said spectators should feel

free to come out and enjoy some great baseball and support the local youth in pursuing a championship.


