





Hecla is celebrating 25 years of community parade

This year marks 25 years of the Hecla Historical Village's annual town parade.

The scenic lake town hosts a parade each summer to showcase its residents and their funny side dating back to the 20th century. Parade marshal Marvin Benson said people love to dress up — as clowns and other characters that spark smiles — and have fun with the parade, making it an event you simply can't miss.

"We always wanted the parade to be entertaining," he said. "The focus was that — to have something for the community to enjoy."

When the Hecla parade started, it had 12 entries, half riding lawnmowers, and around 25 onlookers cheering them on. With the help and support of the community, the parade has grown to include floats from across the province, some for businesses and others for individuals. Last year, the annual parade saw 46 floats and over 1,000 onlookers.

Benson said the parade has become generational, including entries from the children of past participants. Floats range from bicycles and riding mowers to trucks and trailers with boats. There's something for everyone, said Benson.

The parade will start at 1 p.m. on Sunday, Aug. 4. From 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. that day, the Hecla Island bake sale and silent auction will be held at the Hecla community hall. A barbecue hosted by the Riverton Friendship Centre will offer flame-cooked goods all day. The parade will last around an hour and a half and span about threequarters of a mile. It will go through the village, past the docks, past the community hall and the general store, and continue.

A few years ago, Benson received calls from a Toronto media outlet wanting to do a story on the parade. Someone had called and told them it

was one of the best they'd ever seen is closed off at least 20 minutes prior – and Benson can attest to that.

"It's just a real fun thing," he said.

Anyone can and is encouraged to enter a float in the parade. To do so, call Benson at 204-941-3650, explain your float to him, and he'll give the green or red light. He can't recall ever denying a float for the parade.

Though the parade starts at 1 p.m., Benson recommends getting a spot along the road early as the main strip

to start time.

The Hecla parade continues thanks to the generosity of a local family. Five years ago, a rule was put into effect that said each parade needed to have high liability insurance, which is costly. The local family pays this fee every year, allowing the community parade to continue to bring smiles year after

Winnipeg Beach Food Cupboard closes after less than a year

After not even a year, the Winnipeg Beach Food Cupboard is closed.

The local food cupboard made a considerable splash when opening this past year, growing quickly beyond its capabilities. Initially set up in the recreation centre, the Winnipeg Beach Food Cupboard moved to a new location on Stitt Street and opened a fresh food cart just this June.

The cupboard is closing after a zoning bylaw removed the cupboard organizer's only source of income. Without that, she's had to find other work and no longer has the time to dedicate to the service.

Lisa Teel started the Winnipeg Beach Food Cupboard last year after seeing a need for the service in town. Since then, she's been delivering food, stocking shelves and taking orders nonstop, working full-time as a volunteer. Teel could do that because she had income from an AirBnb guest house on her property in town, but a zoning bylaw quickly changed that.

In Winnipeg Beach, residents can have a guest house on their property for family and friends to stay in. Winnipeg Beach Mayor Pam Jackson said Teel had turned a shed in her backyard into a guest house and was renting the space out on AirBnb, which is not allowed under zoning bylaw section 56.

The bylaw states a guest house can only provide secondary and incidental accommodation for family members and guests of the occupants of the single-family dwelling, among other things. So Teel had to apply for a variance from the town to continue renting out her guest house. Two Winnipeg Beach council members voted for the variance and two voted against it, so the motion became defeated, leaving Teel unable to keep her guest house up on

Teel said she could only run the food cupboard because she didn't work full-time and had income from the guest house. Without that income, she has to find another job, leaving her with little time for the food cupboard.

"The simple fact is I have to work," said Teel. "I just can't

do both. It's not possible."

Jackson said the town was extremely supportive of the food cupboard from the beginning, helping her set up the space in the rec centre and then offering her the space in the location on Stitt Street, renovating it and adding secu-

"We were very excited about being able to do that for her," said Jackson. "We were working closely with her and were impressed with all her work. She did a wonderful job and was providing a really important service for our

Jackson said the council was surprised to hear the food cupboard was closing because of the variance. She stressed the two matters are not related, and the town did not expect the food cupboard to take a hit.

"We can't ever be in a position where someone comes and asks for a variance and connects it to something else they're doing for the town," she said. "It didn't occur to us that she would just shut down the food cupboard. We can't take that into consideration when looking at variance. We can only look at bylaws and restrictions."

The Winnipeg Beach Food Cupboard had numerous volunteers, but none are continuing the service. Jackson hopes someone will continue it so the service can continue to be offered in Winnipeg Beach.

The food cupboard donated all food on its shelves to Evergreen Basic Needs, over 500 pounds of food. Teel said



they'll also give them any funds the food cupboard has.

Manitoba government enhancing and expanding recreational trails

The Manitoba government along with Trails Manitoba is investing more than \$880,000 to support 33 recreational trails across the province, Environment and Climate Change Minister Tracy Schmidt announced earlier this month.

"Manitobans love to enjoy the outdoors and our province is home to unique networks of trails that support healthy living and offer great social opportunities," said Schmidt. "Adding new trails and ensuring our existing trails are well-maintained helps guarantee Manitobans can continue to enjoy the great outdoors for generations to come."

The 2024 Trails Manitoba grant program will support the development of new and improved trails across the province, with \$697,365 for trails outside Winnipeg and \$190,000 for trails within Winnipeg.

In all, these projects will add 36 kilometres of trails to Manitoba's network while maintaining and upgrading more than 600 kilometres of existing trails, the minister noted.

"The Trails Manitoba grant program is creating pathways to health and quality of life for all Manitobans," said Jeana Manning, board president, Trails Manitoba. "We honour the volunteer trail builders and the construction teams and supporting partners who have brought this funding to life, creating connections to Manitoba's stunning landscapes. We look forward to strengthening our ongoing

partnerships with the Manitoba government, private funders and all our collaborators, supporting exceptional trails for generations to come."

- Stonewall, Quarry Park splash pad and ball diamonds community access trail (\$24,643)
- Roseisle, Pumpkin Creek Cross Country Ski Club (\$12,766)
- Treherne, Boyne Valley Nature Trail Signage (\$1,200)
- Notre Dame de Lourdes, Sentier Communautaire de Lourdes - Enhancement Project PHASE 1 of 2 (\$10,304);
- Grindstone Trail Enhancement, Cottage Owners Assoc. (\$7,920).

"The new bike path trail in Fairgrove Park is a testament to our community's commitment to health, education and outdoor enjoyment," said Coun. Vivian Santos, City of Winnipeg. "Through the partnership between the city, Winnipeg School Division and Trails Manitoba, we're providing a safe and inviting space for children to learn biking skills and offering a wonderful new amenity for all our residents to enjoy."

"This trail isn't just about creating a path; it's about fostering a sense of belonging and empowerment for our students and the community," said Luke Barr, teacher, École Stanley Knowles School. "It will be a safe and exciting place where riders of all ages and abilities can come together to build their skills and connect with the freedom that comes from riding a bicycle."

"I see this new trail like I see our school bike shop, it welcomes any student, if you're new or old, you can be a member," said Ella Quinto, student, École Stanley Knowles School. "I am very excited for the opening of this trail and I hope that those who haven't found the joy of biking can find it here."

The Trails Manitoba grant program annually provides new recreational trail opportunities, improves the quality of existing trails through enhancements and provides necessary funding for continued trail maintenance. Eligible applicants include trail associations, municipalities or other notfor-profit groups with means to provide continued stewardship of trails.



Cross-country event to make a difference for nature

Ready, set, snap! The Nature Conservancy of Canada (NCC) is calling on people across Canada to get outside this August long weekend to document the nature around them, in the name of science.

The non-profit's fourth annual Big Backyard BioBlitz aims to create a snapshot of nature in Canada, by encouraging people of all ages to observe and document the nature around them.

People can participate solo or with a group, and as often as they want, over the first weekend in August. The Big Backyard BioBlitz is a family-friendly activity that's engaging for all ages, no matter a person's level of knowledge about nature. Every observation can help conservation groups and scientists understand the state of local biodiversity, track at-risk species and even tackle invasive ones.

People can use their smartphones, tablets or digital cameras to snap photos or record audio of birds, insects, plants and other species wherever they happen to be, and then upload them to the event's online database

By documenting the wild species in their neighbourhoods, including

plants, birds, insects, mammals, reptiles, amphibians, lichen and fungi, participants help scientists map species and monitor changes over time. Big Backyard BioBlitz participants have recorded over 147,000 observations over the last four events, documenting over 7,700 species, including many that are at-risk or even endangered. In the face of climate change and biodiversity loss, people's observations can help inform solutions.

"The Big Backyard BioBlitz is a great way to connect with the outdoors, while contributing to a national community science project," says Christine Chilton, NCC's community relations manager in Manitoba. "From invasive to endangered species, everyone's observations help protect the nature we love."

People can visit backyardbioblitz. ca to learn more and register. Once registered, they'll receive step-bystep instructions on how to participate, tips for taking great shots, fact sheets about nature near them, and be entered into a draw for a Big Backyard BioBlitz prize pack. Participants can also download learning activities from the website's Kids' Corner, such as scavenger hunt bingo, word

Asham Stompers perform at Levee on the Lawn

After a successful first round of reaching jigging in St. Laurent, Eva Kerbrat has done anything but slow down.

The locally raised dancer is fresh off nine weeks of jigging classes, having taught more than 13 locals how to improve on or start their jigging. Eva said the classes went well, and everyone improved considerably from the first class to the last one. She taught children under 15 in one class and, right after, she taught adults.

Having danced since she was five, Eva is no stranger to busy schedules. Though her dance classes just finished, she hasn't. Eva dances with the Asham Stompers, a well-known jigging group of about a dozen dancers, give or take. Her younger sister, Vanessa Kerbrat, recently developed an interest in jigging, and having learned from one of the best, she too started

dancing more often and more seriously, eventually joining the Asham Stompers as well.

The traditional Red River Métis jigging group was invited to perform for 40 minutes by the King's representative in Manitoba, Lt.-Gov. Anita Neville, on the grounds of Government House on June 22. This was the lieutenant-governor's first-ever Levee on the Lawn, and the Asham Stompers adorned their new costumes for the event. The Kerbrat sisters like the bright new outfits, their dresses shining red, blue and white as they spin.

"It was a really good show," said Eva, adding that eight of them performed that day — four women and four men dancing in pairs.

Before the Levee on the Lawn, though, the Asham Stompers made the trek to Puerto Vallarta, Mexico, to partake in the country's largest folkloric festival, the Festival Vallarta Azteca (FESTVA). The 18th annual festival featured free performances from dance groups worldwide, one of which was the Asham Stompers from Manitoba, Canada. From April 28 to May 5, they danced along the Malecon, Puerto Vallarta's famous boardwalk, amid people, lights, food and décor.

The shows the Asham Stompers performed in Mexico were around 30 minutes each, and they danced more than once. Since the Kerbrats go to Mexico often, the culture wasn't anything new to them, and they fully enjoyed the experience.

"It was more of learning and experiencing the different cultures," said Vanessa.

The Kerbrats don't know what's next, but Eva is hoping to offer more jigging lessons to the community in the fall. She has yet to determine if they'll be in St. Laurent, Stonewall or both, but she knows it will happen.

"Just being with everybody, the energy the people, it's fun," she said. "Everybody's smiling and clapping and us, the dancers, we're smiling and laughing and clapping."

Author with Gimli ties releases debut thriller novel

A local writer has published her debut novel, Lucid, an unconventional way of telling tragedy, death and relationships.

Jenna Boholij spent her summers growing up in Gimli; her family from the town. Though she lived in Northwestern Ontario, Boholij thought often of Gimli, moving there after college. Now, she lives in Winnipeg and has a cottage in Gimli, where she and her family like spending as much time as possible.

When Boholij turned 30 seven years ago, she made a goal for herself: to write a novel. She's always been a writer but said at that time, she'd never written anything that long and she wanted to see if she could do it. Without telling anyone, she began to write a tale of terror and had the entire book done within a year.

"Writing wasn't even the hard part, which was surprising," she said. "Publishing, especially in Canada, is a whole other thing."

Boholij had two children, made it through the pandemic and sat on her book for a few years until she decided she owed it to herself to try and get it published. After researching for hours on end where she could query to, the Icelandic-Ukrainian author reached out to a few publishing houses and heard back from just one: Dreamsphere Books.

Dreamsphere Books eventually offered Boholij a contract. She took it, and her debut novel, Lucid, was soon published.

Full of twists and surprises, Lucid

follows Charlotte Marin, a Winnipegger working for an airline. As she travels for work, the main character kills people to deal with the tragic loss of a loved one when she was young. A chance meeting on a flight opens new doors for Marin and has her fighting through lucid dreams to make one tough decision. In the story, a town called Sunshine is based off of Gimli.

Boholij said the beginnings of the premise just came to her, and she started writing based on the idea but had yet to learn how she would end the story. As happenstance would have it, the ending came to Boholij in a lucid dream as she slept.

"You can't sleep or think about anything else," she said. "The idea comes and it's all-consuming. The story has chosen you to deliver it and it's your responsibility to do that."

As she finished Lucid, more ideas came to Boholij, leading to her second - and now third — book. Her second book is literary fiction, and her third will be another thriller.

Boholij tries to write something every day, no matter how many words. Whether 100 words on a page before bed or 5,000 words in a day, she gets something written down before her head hits the pillow.

"You make time for things that are important to you," she said. "You can get it done, just break it down into manageable pieces."

Lucid was released on May 20 this year. It currently has a 4.7/5 rating on Amazon, with reviews saying it exceeded expectations, was packed with excitement and was hard to put

down once picked up.

"This is a Captivating story and beautifully written. The author really paints a vivid picture that draws you into her world. Incredible!" states one

"Finished this all in one sitting," states another. "I was hooked from the beginning to end. The writing was

Ashern Pioneer Museum holding annual thresherman's reunion Aug. 11

The Ashern Pioneer Museum is gearing up for its annual threshermen's reunion on Sunday, Aug. 11.

The annual two-day event happened every weekend before Labour Day when it started 34 years ago. Still, with the rodeo happening around the same time, it became too much for organizers and attendees. So the reunion went to a one-day event on the same weekend as the local rodeo.

After a few years of doing it like that, the Ashern Pioneer Museum decided to branch out again and hold the threshermen's reunion the weekend before the rodeo. So now, every second weekend in August, the mini thresherman's reunion brings people from all corners of Manitoba to Ash-

At the Ashern Pioneer Museum's

mini threshermen's reunion, people can take in threshing and binding on the same day. Threshing is loosening the edible part of grain from the rest of the plant. Threshing is typically done by rubbing, stripping or beating the plant, which a combine does nowadays during harvest. Binding cuts the grain and binds it into bundles. The binder, invented in 1872, improved upon the reaper, and the original machine used wire to tie the bundles.

For the reunion, the museum board has sheaths from the previous years' harvest to run through the thrasher, and they've tilled up a field at the museum where they grow grain to bind during the reunion.

"People like to reminisce," said Rick Ebbers, chair of the museum board. "It's a thing of the past. It's the years that started and made this town, so

it's a lot of hard work they put in, and it's just great to see people who come out and appreciate it."

Donors with love of Gimli provide art club with \$6,000 for seawall

The Gimli Art Club's seawall gallery committee threw a little party for generous donors who gave them \$6,000 to help maintain the seawall murals and publish another seawall art book.

Merryl-Lee Mercier, who is chair of the seawall committee, said they were left practically speechless by the generosity of Greg and Susan Clark, Robert Repski and Jim Boyko, none of whom live in Gimli but enjoy the seawall murals. The committee had no idea how much the donation was going to be and when they found out, they were so excited.

"We're overwhelmed by the generosity of these people who stepped forward to make such a significant donation to the seawall," said Mercier. "We also want to thank the rural municipality of Gimli for facilitating this donation."

Because the municipality is the owner of the non-profit art club, it accepted the donation on behalf of the club, provided a tax receipt to the donors and transferred the funds to the committee.

There are 69 murals painted on the Gimli Harbour seawall. They depict the history of Gimli and the Interlake. The murals, painted by members of the art club, take a beating from the elements and have to be periodically repaired.

"It takes the serious dedication of a handful of Gimli Art Club artists to keep these murals in prime condition. The artists fight damage done by weather, waves, algae and time in an attempt to turn a concrete wall into something beautiful to look at while also providing a peek at Gimli history," said Mercier.

Robert Repski lives in Winnipeg and

donated \$2,000 to the seawall.

"I appreciate the art on the Gimli seawall and I decided to make a donation to support that," said Repski.

He said he also appreciated the little celebration the seawall committee held for the donors and enjoyed meeting some of the artists and club members.

"They invited us to come out and we had a nice get-together," he said. "We looked at all the art at the store [Gimli Art Club gallery store] and on the pier and we had lunch."

Gary and Susan Clark, who also live in Winnipeg and donated \$2,000, have been visiting friends in Spruce Sands, north of Gimli, for years and years, and they also love spending time in Gimli.

"I enjoy going out there. We've been going there to see our friends for years and years or we just go out for the day, and I've always enjoyed walking on the Gimli boardwalk and the seawall and going to all the different shops in town and having lunch. It's terrific," said Gary Clark.

Clark said he can see the degradation of the murals from the elements and that he and his wife, along with the two other donors, decided to "chip in some money" to help repair and preserve them.

Jim Boyko, who lives in B.C. and also donated \$2,000, said it was exciting to meet some of the seawall artists and members of the club and hear about their projects.

"Keep up the good work," said Boyko, "and we look forward to seeing the results when they're done."

Mercier said some of the murals on the seawall have had to be replaced and some altered during repairs if the original artist is not available and

his or her "artistic style" cannot be replicated. Murals such as the walking geese mural — which was actually painted to serve as a test for a new sealant — will be moved down the seawall to new spot under the life preserver.

The seawall committee has a sub-committee that votes on what murals can be painted on the wall and Mercier said she handles all complaints regarding the seawall — including people upset by the removal of a mural or "accidents."

"We were trying out new sealants, all these different things to try to keep the murals on the wall. One sealant made everything very shiny and somebody suggested we use a matte finish sealant. We did that and it turned the browns green and other colours. One of our youngest artists, Alec [Baldwin], had his buffalo turn green," said Mercier. "Over the past four or five years, we've tried a number of different sealants. We started with a marine sealant and it made no difference. We think we've now found one; although it's shiny when put on in the fall, by the next year it loses its shine. We're hoping this will work."

This summer Mercier will be painting an Indigenous scene on the seawall, and new Ukrainian and RCMP murals will be painted by other artists.

Mercier said the \$6,000 donation will allow the committee to publish a supplementary copy of the seawall gallery book that was originally published in 2009 and is available at the art club's store.

"Occasionally, someone buys the seawall book and says their favourite mural is not in the book," said Mercier. "This donation will allow us to have a supplementary copy published that contains [the missing] murals and will be available next year. So a huge thank you goes out to these incredible [donors] who love to walk the seawall."

Gimli to celebrate culture at Icelandic Festival

August long weekend marks the 135th Icelandic Festival in Gimli, Manitoba. The Icelandic Festival has a rich history that extends into the late 1800s. The first Icelandic Festival Parade began in Winnipeg on Aug. 2, 1890. The parade was held on Nena St. (now Victor), a dirt road at the time. This was followed by an afternoon of games and sporting events at a park on Rupert St. The festival was moved to Gimli in 1932, and many of the attendees came from Winnipeg via bus provided by the Winnipeg Electric Co. or road to town on the CP

Currently, the Icelandic Festival, or Islendingadagurinn, is said to be the second longest-running festival in Canada and attracts thousands upon thousands of people from all over the world.

Loyal Lundar resident celebrates 104 years of life lived

As a first-generation Icelandic Canadian, Gudrun Helga Julia Sigurdson, more commonly known as Helga, grew up and has lived in the town of Lundar most of her life. This July 7, she celebrated 104 years of life and now shares her story.

Helga was born on the family farm just east of Lundar in 1920. She was one of seven children, and when they moved to Lundar, she excelled academically and participated in sports.

Her parents' creative talents inspired her: poetry, woodworking, and painting. She grew up always drawing. Later, she began painting oil, acrylic, and watercolour. She painted birds, which she witnessed in her trees at home and through her mother's work raising and selling canaries on plates. She also painted a portrait of the family's old horse, Jenny.

Helga explained how art allows her to use her imagination and express herself.

She said, "What I created gave people pleasure."

Later, Helga developed an interest in and knack for working in ceramics. Her best-known ceramic works are the two Canada goose statues located in Bessastadir, the home of Iceland's

president.

After adolescence, Helga spent some of her only time away from home working on the Gold Coast in British Columbia. Afterwards, she returned home to begin nurse training at Saint Boniface. Though her training was interrupted when she contracted rheumatic fever, she gained important medical skills during the training that she carried with her throughout her life, using it to help others.

In 1942, Helga married Johann Straumfjord Sigurdson, a fellow first-generation Icelandic Canadian whose family originally emigrated to Hecla Island. The couple travelled by train to Winnipeg to begin their lives together, then settled down in Brekka, where Johann had established his mink ranch. In 1945, they moved back to Lundar and started their family: the war ended, and their first daughter, Linda, was born.

At Lundar, Joe (Johann) could still raise mink, and Silverflash Fur Farm, now known as Sigurdson Fur Farm, became a cornerstone of the community among other mink farms.

Helga and Joe spoke fluent Icelandic at home. They raised, including Linda, two daughters and two sons with their heritage as a central aspect of their childhoods. The kids honoured their community, their Ammas and Afis, and later studied Icelandic Language and Literature at the University of Manitoba.

During Íslendingadagurinn, Helga and Joe would drive out to Gimli for the festival and often stayed into the evening for the sing-a-long portion of the celebrations. Through this tradition, the kids were able to learn many Icelandic songs. In 1985, Linda wrote a skit called 'The Afis and the Ammas,' which she performed with her sister and their children. Laughter ensued, and the Icelandic songs included in the skit were thoroughly enjoyed by the crowd.

At the festival, both Helga and Linda have been honoured as Fjallkonur. Fjallkonur is a tradition at the Icelandic festival that began in 1924, where a woman is selected to represent Iceland. The woman sits on an elevated throne, wears a traditional formal Icelandic costume for the occasion, and has two maids of honour by her side.

For the holidays, Christmas Eve was celebrated in Lundar's Lutheran Church. The Ammas and Afis would then join the family for coffee and gift opening. The family shared Icelandic and Nordic treats and dainties, including vinarterta, ponnukokur, kleinur, rosettes, astrarbollur, brown bread, rollapylsa, and homemade skyr.

Helga and her family have always been highly involved in community activity. In 1947, Helga helped her father construct the wooden structure of the dragon head and tail for the Lundar Diamond Jubilee parade. Forty years later, she again employed her creative side to paint the centennial plate and souvenir pins for Lundar's centennial. She created floats for the Lundar parades, decorated the hall for community showers, and lent a hand wherever needed.

Helga also had a persuasive hand in arranging the arrival of the Prairie Dog Central train in Lundar. Over the years, Helga has been involved in many other community groups and projects, including the Lundar Personal Care Home Guild, 4 H Club, and Lundar Museum.

Not only has Helga been an active and valued member of the community in many ways, but she has also helped write the book on it!

'Wagons to Wings' is a book that accumulates the history of Lundar and surrounding Icelandic communities in Manitoba from 1872 to 1980. It was put together by the

Lundar Historical Society to honour the town's pioneers. Helga designed the book's cover, named it, edited and proofread its contents, and arranged the pages.

Over the years, she has learned that one should always help others and that not everything has to be perfect. She has taken great influence from the

people in her life: her mother influenced her in sewing and embroidering, her ceramic teacher taught her to work with clay items, her father cut out the wood pieces that she drew and painted on, her teacher taught her how to write short stories, her Amma taught her how to knit, and her Afi, who was blind before coming to Canada from Iceland, taught her perseverance.



Viking Park elf village gets a facelift just in time for Islendingadagurinn

Excitement is in the air around Gimli as whispers of magic and whimsy fill the village. The beloved elf houses at Viking Park, once hidden away behind dense shrubs, have returned with a fresh look.

For six weeks, these charming little homes were mysteriously absent while they underwent a delightful transformation. Now, thanks to the creativity and dedication of community members, they stand proud once more — complete with Icelandic names and vibrant mossy roofs. This enchanting story blends folklore with local passion and showcases how a small village can make big changes to preserve its charm.

Back in 2017, the installment of the little village was made part of the park's landscaping, thanks to a creative volunteer. The houses were modelled after houses in Iceland, and after quite a few years of weathering, they needed some keeping up with. The shrubs surrounding them had isolated them, and curious folks were beginning to trample through the shrubs to look for them, frightening the elves.

So we reached out to the original creator and volunteer (who does not want their name mentioned) who made them. As it turned out, she still had the right paint to give them all a new coat. She added new moss to cover each roof and Icelandic names above the doors of each house.



The elves' houses have all received a fresh coat of paint and are back in the

Fitting for Gimli, elves are very prominent in Icelandic folklore. It is said that more than 50 different types of elves live in Iceland, each differing in looks and personality. The creatures appear in many traditions and stories dating back as far as over a thousand years. It is believed that most elves live somewhat similar daily lives to those of humans.

"The elves were happy to learn that their house could be fixed and repainted," said Dawn Harris, Viking Park gardener. "They also hoped that the houses could be relocated so there would be a closer connection among those in the community."

Wildflowers are being re-established around the village. This planting includes lupins, which are in the same plant family as Alaskan lupins. They were introduced to Iceland in the 1940s and now grow wild. Butter-

fly weed, blue-eyed grass and threeflowered avens will also be among the garden's plants.

The houses have now been refurbished and settled back into the park in a more open area. They can be spotted among the rocks behind the statue from a respectful distance to keep the growing wildflowers and the elves

Carlo's Cucina unveils own coffee blend

In partnership with Colosimo Coffee Roasters, Carlo Guzzi, owner of Carlo's Cucina, crafted his own coffee bean. Guzzi is friends with the coffee company's owner, and after pondering the idea of creating his own coffee blend for a few years, he finally decided to do it.

"It's been something that I wanted to do for a long time," he said.

He met with the owner of Colosimo Coffee Roasters, told him what he wanted in the Carlo's Cucina blend, and they made it happen. The result is a rounded and creamy dark roast coffee with notes of chocolate fudge and dark toffee.

The beans come from Guatemala, Colombia, Nicaragua and Peru, each handpicked from a cherry tree and then taken from the pit of the fruit. Colosimo Coffee Roasters' core principle is consistency, meaning the beans are chosen for their "ability to maintain a consistent flavour profile, both as a standalone and in milk." Guzzi said consistency of flavour is the coffee company's No. 1 priority, and he can attest to it.

"It's like when I make a specialty burger," he said. "I'm looking for the right taste, but I don't want something to be overpowered. I want it all to blend together."

And that's exactly what his blend tastes like, he says. The dark chocolatev notes are enriched by the toffee flavour and pulled together with the creaminess of the beans. Guzzi had people flocking to Carlo's Cucina the day his roast came out to get a taste. "It was an explosive response," he said.

Carlo's Cucina coffee blend with Colosimo Coffee Roasters is available to buy at Carlo's Cucina and is now served in-house.

"Am I going to make a second? Yes, I am," said Guzzi. "Let's give the people what they want because they flock to us, and we're grateful. We're beyond grateful for the support we get."

Guzzi said his second blend will be lighter than this one, more suited to coffee drinkers who prefer medium roast. Though the current blend is darker, Guzzi and Colosimo Coffee Roasters say it's not just for espresso fans. The blend's heavy-bodied nature makes it perfect for the French Press or drip pot and an espresso machine. Its versatility makes it perfect for almost any coffee drinker.

It's go time in Abbotsford for Jermaine Loewen.

The 26-year-old from Arborg recently finished his first season with the American Hockey League's Abbotsford Canucks where had two assists in 26

Now, ahead of his second season with the club, Loewen is doing everything he can to jump into a full-time lineup spot.

"It's been great; I've made a lot of jumps physically and mentally. It's been a good summer," said Loewen last Monday in Abbotsford, where he is spending the entire off-season on training.

He and his wife recently had their first child during the 2023-24 season so staying in Abbotsford during this off-season was a priority to help them settle into their new home.

This hockey season, Loewen enters his sixth year playing in the AHL after spending his first five seasons with the Chicago Wolves, Henderson Silver Knights and the Canucks.


Since his AHL career began back in 2019-20, Loewen has been known as a player who isn't afraid to mix it up physically.

In 174 career games, Loewen has posted 306 penalty minutes while not steering shy of dropping the gloves when needed.

He wants to do more in 2024-25 to find the back of the net, which he did well in junior with the Kamloops Blazers and in his minor hockey days with the AAA Interlake Lightning.

His best offensive season in the AHL came in 2021-22 with Henderson when he had six goals and eight assists in 44 games.

Going goalless last season was the first time he'd done so since his sophomore season when he

played only 22 games.

Now having settled into his new home in Abbotsford, and fatherhood, he feels he's ready to take the next step with the Canucks.

"I feel really good," said Loewen. "I feel I'm making a lot of strides. There's a different energy heading into this season than last year it felt like a bit of a low time for me. This time there is an excitement of what can come this year for me if I keep focused

This off-season, Loewen can be found in the gym every day, working on his lower body to help him improve his speed and acceleration. He often trains alongside teammates John Stevens and Tristen Nielsen who were key contributors to the Canucks offence last year.

This is also a contract year for Loewen as his twoyear deal with the Canucks is set to expire at the end of the season.

He said it's not something he worries about as his focus is strictly on improving his game and helping the Canucks achieve their goals after finishing fifth in the AHL's Pacific Division last season.

"I hope I can build off of this summer and see where it takes me," said Loewen. "Being close to home has some advantages, and it's been great for my family, and being a dad, it's nice to be close to home to get the help and support needed."

As the former 199th overall by the Dallas Stars in the 2018 NHL Entry Draft and the first-ever Jamaican-born draft pick, the NHL dream isn't out of the realm of possibility for Loewen yet.

Though he has yet to play a game in the NHL, a breakout season for the Canucks could possibly see him get back on the radar of NHL clubs once again.

Training camp for the 2024-25 begins in late September, where Loewen will look to showcase the work he's put in throughout the off-season.

The Winnipeg/Altona squad — consisting of Karlee Burgess, Emily Zacharias and Lauren Lenentine — has secured back-to-back silver medals at the national championships, leading them to claim the top spot on the CTRS with an impressive 316.125 points. Throughout the season, they also achieved success with a victory at one Grand Slam of Curling event, the Tour Challenge Tier 1, and a semifinal appearance at the WFG Masters. In total, their record for the season stands at 44 wins and 29 losses.

In 2024, Team Kerri Einarson's winning streak at the Scotties Tournament of Hearts came to an end. However, the Gimli, team had a commendable season with a record of 34-23 and accumulated 251.250 CTRS points, securing them the second CTRS spot. With members Val Sweeting, Shannon Birchard and Briane Harris, they achieved two semifinal appearances on the GSoC tour and made it to the playoffs at the Scotties in 2024. They

were also runners-up at the PointsBet Invitational in 2023.

Winnipeg's Team Kaitlyn Lawes (39-31) earned 207.375 CTRS points for the third CTRS berth. Team Lawes qualified for the playoffs at the Scotties Tournament of Hearts and one GSoC event, along with playoff qualification at tour events in Dundas, Ont., and Red Deer, Alta.

Those three teams join the 2024 Scotties Tournament of Hearts champions, Team Rachel Homan (67-7) of Ottawa, which will compete as Team Canada in Thunder Bay. Team Homan's season included winning the BKT Tires World Women's Curling Championship, the PointsBet Invitational, Co-op Canadian Open,


