The Elskamps' family farm is located in Woodlands, where they grow wheat, canola, corn, oats and black oil sunflowers.

"The fields that we plant have been in the family since the 1950s, and we take great pride in the land we farm, the product we produce, and the customers we serve," the family said.

"In July 2021, we saw an opportunity to continue contributing to local agriculture by taking over ownership of Pick of the Birds, a Manitoba company with over 30 years of experience in the bird food industry."

Local man returns to Manitoba to recover from spinal injury

A man with Riverton roots is now recovering in Manitoba from a spinal cord injury he sustained in B.C. last year.

Mackenzie Callis had been wakeboarding on Vancouver Island in May 2021 when he dove off his board and hit his head on the bottom. He was airlifted to Vancouver General Hospital, where doctors determined he fractured his neck with a C6 injury. He is now in a wheelchair with no movement or improvement in his legs and limited movement in a couple of fingers. However, his hands have improved since the accident and he experiences some sensation in his legs.

At the end of October, 25-year-old Callis and his mom Robin Roche landed back in Manitoba after he was discharged from GF Strong Rehabilitation Centre in Vancouver.

"Mac decided to come home because he needed to be around family for help and adjusting — and maybe because he knew I would do everything to make sure he was taken care of and help adjust to the new way of living. I was with him the whole time and learning about spinal cord injury care and health along with him," Roche said.

"His brother Nicholas and him talked about living together, so I could help with care during the day and Nicholas would always be there with him at night."

Now the two brothers live together in Steinbach while their mom lives a short distance away in Ste. Anne. They also have many family members and friends who continue to live in Riverton, Roche's hometown.

Now that he's back in Manitoba,

Callis continues with the long recovery process.

"Mackenzie just had an appointment recently and his meds were increased because of spasms. He still experiences sensation in the legs but no movement," Roche said.

"Mac is being referred to a specialist for his hands, seeing what options are for fixing the pinkies that are not working because they are now affecting the other fingers that came a long way during recovery. A possible tendon transfer would be an option, but we will wait to see what options become available once seen."

However, the family is still reeling from some hurdles they encountered during the interprovincial move.

"Mackenzie is finally in a better place somewhat from what he had to

endure moving from one province to another," Roche said.

"And if it wasn't for me getting quite involved, he could still be experiencing failure from our provincial disability programs. We both suffered mentally and emotionally for months because of it. I really feel for those

Endangered butterflies released in the Interlake

Staff with files from Assiniboine Park Conservancy

The Assiniboine Park Conservancy set a new record by releasing over 200 endangered butterflies back onto the Manitoba landscape recently.

Over the course of approximately three weeks in July, the Assiniboine Park Conservancy successfully released 191 critically endangered Poweshiek skipperling butterflies back onto the landscape at the Nature Conservancy of Canada's properties located in the Manitoba Tall Grass Prairie Preserve in the RM of Stuartburn in southeastern Manitoba. In addition, for the first time, this year's butterfly conservation program included the release of 16 endangered Dakota skippers at a site in Manitoba's Interlake region, bringing the total number of butterflies released this vear to 207.

"We are thrilled with the results of this year's breeding and release program and excited for what it means for the future of these endangered species," said Ashleigh Westphal, research conservation specialist for Assiniboine Park Conservancy.

"When we started the release program in 2018, experts estimated there were only about 100 Poweshiek skipperling butterflies remaining in all of Canada. We released six butterflies that year. The growth of the program and results so far are very encouraging, but we have a long way to go before this species will be secure in

Collaboration with partners and local landowners is integral to the success of this program and ongoing grassland conservation efforts."

Poweshiek skipperling and Dakota skippers are known as habitat specialists, relying on particular grassland ecosystems to survive and thrive. Regrettably, much of this habitat has been lost through conversion, resulting in the dramatic decline of multiple grassland species. Habitat loss is believed to be one of the contributing factors leading to the near extinction of Poweshiek skipperling. It is also suspected that the increased use of pesticides, effects of climate change and extreme weather events are contributing to ongoing population declines. Butterflies are sensitive to changes in their environment and are often an indicator of the overall health of an ecosystem.

Grasslands are one of the most endangered terrestrial ecosystems on the planet. Conserving and maintaining the integrity of high-quality grasslands that at-risk species like Poweshiek skipperling and Dakota skipper depend on is key for these and other prairie endemic species. The Nature Conservancy of Canada actively manages native prairie in Manitoba. Without active and regular management, these disturbance-driven prairie sites are at risk of becoming overgrown with shrubs and forest, leading to the subsequent loss of important biodiversity and essential habitat.

"In addition to land management, it is important for everyone to work together," said Melissa Grantham, conservation biologist with the Nature

Conservancy of Canada.

"Through our collaborative recovery efforts with Canadian and U.S. conservation agencies, experts and partners, we work together to engage in research that informs land management decisions, raise public awareness and work with local producers to sustainably manage key grassland sites, all of which supports the captive rearing and breeding program."

This is the fifth annual release of One of 16 Dakota skippers that were Poweshiek skipperling butterflies and the first for Dakota skippers in Manitoba. The number of adult butterflies released this year is more than

The Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority is continuing to work on bringing physicians to its rural communities and has hired a replacement physician for Arborg and for Eriksdale where hospital emergency rooms are temporarily closed for the majority of each month.

The new hires, however, won't mean an increase in ER availability.

Dr. Charles Penner, the IERHA's chief medical officer and medical services regional lead, said the two new physicians are replacing doctors who are leaving the communities, and ER service won't improve because it takes six physicians to adequately staff an ER on a 24-7 basis.

When the Conservatives came to power in Manitoba, they mandated the closure of ERs when there aren't enough physicians to cover shifts.

Given the crises facing the healthcare system at the moment - insufficient numbers of physicians in rural areas, nurse and paramedic burnout and exodus, acute care bed closures and surgical and diagnostic backlogs that stymie timely access to publicly funded health care — the IERHA has found itself in the invidious position of having to decide what rural ER service to sacrifice.

For now, its priority is to keep one ER open all the time in the Eriksdale-Ashern region and one open in the Gimli-Arborg region.

"Our priority is to keep one emergency department open all the time. That's our goal. And Ashern is the one we need to keep open because it's the most central. The area to the north of Ashern has to be served; there are reserves and other communities up there," said Dr. Penner.

The "same principle" applies to the Arborg-Gimli area: have one emergency department remain open all the time.

There just aren't enough doctors in Eriksdale and in Arborg, he said, to keep their respective ERs open 24-7.

The IERHA posts on its website twoweek schedules showing ER availability. The period Aug. 16-31 shows Arborg's ER closed for 14 of those 16

days and the other two days offering partial coverage (less than 24 hours). Eriksdale's ER is also closed for 14 of those 16 days but shows two days of 24-hour coverage.

The IERHA hired two internationally trained physicians - who also underwent one year of training at the University of Manitoba to meet Canadian medical curriculum standards for Eriksdale and Arborg.

Dr. Nardin Faragalla is working at the Eriksdale Wellness Clinic and Dr. Reshad Nazim is working at the Arborg Primary Health Care Centre. Both have been hired on a four-year service agreement. The province and the region pick up the tab for Canadian medical training as long as the physicians fulfil their contract.

One doctor is departing from Eriksdale at the end of September, said Dr. Penner, and Dr. Faragalla and another physician, who is returning from a leave in October, will be the only two serving the community. A physician in Arborg is nearing the end of his contract and will be departing at the end of August. Dr. Nazim and Dr. Donnelly will be the only two physicians in that community.

To supplement health-care services in Arborg, the IERHA will be having Gimli physicians provide service in Arborg.

"Some of the Gimli physicians are going to be providing primary care at the clinic and hospital care in Arborg," he said. "There'll be a Gimli physician there three or four days a week going forward from September or October. There will a reasonable amount of physician service there."

The Gimli physicians won't, however, be working in the ER. And without sufficient numbers of physicians in Arborg, the future of its ER is being discussed.

"As it stands right now, there will be some availability, but there is some

discussion about what to do about the Arborg emergency department," said Dr. Penner.

and other rural regions are not unique in having to temporarily or permanently close their ERs because of staff shortages. A few weeks ago, a hospital in southwestern Ontario had to close its ER because of staffing shortages. Last week a hospital in Prince Edward Island closed its ER, and in Alberta 30 communities will see health services reduced because of a lack of physician coverage.

Gimli's hospital currently has 11 acute care beds suspended because of nurse shortages. Having Gimli physicians working in Arborg won't affect Gimli's acute care services, said an IERHA spokesperson in response to follow-up questions from the *Express*. Dr. Penner said he met with munici-

pal councils in Eriksdale and Arborg to discuss the health authority's physician recruitment strategies.

Whether doctors are international graduates or Manitoba-born graduates "most would prefer to practise somewhere else than in rural Manitoba," he said. The IERHA does offer contract extensions and would be

"thrilled" if doctors stayed beyond their return-of-service agreements.

'There's no advantage to the region to cycle doctors through. The local people don't like it and the region doesn't like it. We would prefer physicians to come and stay," he said.

The IERHA has a number of programs and outreach initiatives in place to attract "home-grown" physicians to the region. They include the Home for the Summer program, in which medical students are invited to work in the region, Rural Week in which medical students spend a week in a rural area, with a one-month rotation in year three, and the family medicine training program in Selkirk where two physicians are trained each year for Interlake communities. Despite physicians' preferences for urban settings, Dr. Penner said there

1-204-407-6099 **COVID** continues upwards climb; monkeypox surpasses 1,000 cases in Canada

COVID-19 infections and deaths nearly doubled in Manitoba since late July, according to the provincial government's weekly COVID-19 surveillance report.

The report for the period July 31 to Aug. 6 shows 347 new PCR-confirmed cases, up 90 cases from the 257 reported the previous week.

The province restricts PCR testing for COVID, resulting in an undercount of the true number of infections. Rapid antigen test results aren't tracked.

The report also shows 57 new hospital admissions, which include 12 people needing admission to intensive care.

Twelve more Manitobans died from COVID, bringing the death toll to 2,079. The previous week's report showed a total of 2,067 deaths.

There were seven new COVID outbreaks reported for the above period in hospitals and personal care homes, including at the Arborg and District Hospital.

Globally, there have been 6,425,422 deaths from COVID, according to World Health Organization data as of Aug. 12. Over half a billion people have been infected so far.

Other health news:

Monkeypox continues to spread in Canada with total confirmed cases of the virus reaching 1,059, according to Public Health Agency of Canada data as of Aug. 12.

Ontario has confirmed a total of 511 cases; Quebec, 426; B.C., 98; Alberta, 19; Saskatchewan, three; and Yukon,



the virus.

"To date there have been 28 reported hospitalizations including two ICU admissions and no deaths due to monkeypox in Canada," said Canada's chief public health officer Theresa Tam on Aug 12. "In line with international trends, the majority of confirmed cases in Canada with available information on exposure history reported intimate sexual contact with other men."

Women account for less than one per cent of the cases in Canada.

The New Brunswick government issued a new release the same day, confirming one case of the virus there in an individual who had not recently travelled outside the province.

There have been 31,799 confirmed cases in 89 countries and 12 deaths, according to U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention data as of Aug. 12. The United States has the highest number of cases with 9,491 confirmed, followed by Spain with

5,162 and Germany with 2,982.

Next phase of Perimeter Highway safety construction project announced

Construction work is continuing on Provincial Trunk Highway (PTH) 101 and PTH 100, the North and South Perimeter Highways, as part of the Manitoba government's ongoing commitment to improving road safety, Transportation and Infrastructure Minister Doyle Piwniuk announced Monday.

"Since the 2018 safety review of the South Perimeter Highway, our government has worked diligently to implement the measures required to enhance traffic safety, reduce collisions and save lives while also ensuring continued access for businesses and residents in the area," said Piwniuk. "The Perimeter Highway is one of the most important economic corridors in Manitoba. Our ongoing work is critical to ensuring traffic on this route flows safely and efficiently."

The minister noted this next phase of construction work builds on the substantial progress already made to improve safety by upgrading service roads and mitigating high-risk access points, such as median openings and intersections where access is controlled with stop signs.

Work completed, underway and to be tendered on the North and South Perimeter Highways (PTH 100 and PTH 101) in 2022 includes:

- extending the west service road south to PTH 190;

- extending the westbound bypass lane on Provincial Road (PR) 221 to accommodate greater traffic volumes;

- closing the medians and access to PTH 101 at Road 63N once the work listed above has been completed;

- widening PTH 6 to four lanes from PTH 101 to the Prairie Dog Central railway tracks and adding passing lanes further north;

- constructing a roundabout at the intersection of PTH 6 and PR 236;

- upgrading and paving the north service road from PR 236 to Lilyfield Road and from PR 409 to east of Dasmesh School to accommodate heavy commercial loading;

- reconstructing the north service road between King Edward and Ritchie streets to improve drainage and eliminate an existing jog in the road;

- closing an uncontrolled approach near PR 330;

- continued construction of the new interchange at St. Mary's Road;

- resurfacing sections of PTH 100 between PTH 3 and Portage Avenue;

- extending Aimes Road to St. Anne's Road;

- constructing a new right turn lane at PR 330; and

- paving near the Pembina Highway interchange.

Manitoba Transportation and Infrastructure has also begun a functional design study of the North Perimeter, similar to that completed for the South Perimeter in 2020, which will outline a staged approach for major changes to the Perimeter Highway. This will allow for changes that are appropriate for current traffic levels and that can accommodate future upgrades as traffic volumes increase, the minister noted The design study awarded to WSP Canada Ltd. will include public engagement activities to help identify further improvements that are both safe and meet the needs of local stakeholders.

Work on the detailed design for a new diamond interchange at the intersection of PTH 100 and PTH 3 is expected to start in early 2023.

The minister noted that motorists using the Perimeter Highway should expect delays and are advised to exercise caution and patience during construction.

Funding announced to expand opiate agonist addictions treatment

The Manitoba government is committing \$538,000 to expand opiate agonist treatment (OAT) in the Interlake region with full-time services at the Rapid Access to Addictions Medicine (RAAM) clinic in Selkirk, Mental Health and Community Wellness Minister Sarah Guillemard announced on Aug. 10.

"Increasing accessible, stigma-free, quality and safe services, as part of a comprehensive approach to substance use, addictions and mental health treatment and support, is a priority for our government," said Guillemard. "The creation of the full-time opiate agonist treatment clinic will address a growing demand for these services in the Interlake region while allowing the Selkirk Rapid Access to Addictions Medicine clinic to devote more resources to patients with other substance use disorders."

With the ongoing opioid crisis, the demand for addictions services in general and for OAT specifically has significantly increased at health-care facilities across Manitoba and Canada including at the RAAM clinic in Selkirk.

The creation of the full-time OAT clinic, with a team of nurses, nurse practitioners, administrative staff, addictions counsellors and physicians, will ensure a minimum of 100 additional OAT patients will receive timely, community-based, patient-centred care that meets their needs, the minister said. With the dedicated clinic for OAT patients, the Selkirk RAAM clinic's service-delivery model will also become more efficient and accessible, she added.

"As we grow as a society and health-care system to understand addictions better, we have also learned the most effective health-care service approach is to offer accessible, timely and trusted low-barrier access to care — free from judgment, and full of understanding and compassion," said Marion Ellis, chief executive officer, Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority. "This expansion to the Rapid Access to Addictions Medicine clinic in Selkirk improves people's access to that kind of care."

The minister noted the expanded program responds to the 2018 VIRGO report, which outlined a strategy to improve mental health and addictions services including recommendations to increase access to OAT and to community-based treatment with extended hours of operation. Enhanced access to evidence-based OAT supports the health and well-being of Manitobans with opioid-use disorder and mitigates the societal costs of the disease, the minister added.

Since 2019, the Manitoba government has committed over \$62 million to more than 47 projects and initiatives that have fully or partially addressed 102 of the VIRGO report's recommendations for improving access to and co-ordination of mental health and addictions services.

with disabilities that have no one to be their advocate."

For Roche, the provincial disability programs seem to be disconnected, and she feels there was a lack of communication between the two entities.

"There needs to be a better process. A person should not have to go through proving they are disabled in each province," she said.

"Provincial programs need to talk to one another to stop people from being lost in the system or mak-

They were disheartened to discover that Callis would receive a lesser amount of disability coverage in Manitoba compared to B.C.

"We are all Canadian and, once disabled, there should be no difference in disability coverage," Roche said. "Just because someone needs to move closer to family, they should not be punished by losing most of their coverage."

Since returning to Manitoba, Callis has had to rely on funds previously raised through a GoFundMe page to meet his basic needs.

"Mackenzie is very upset that money he had in a GoFundMe account could still be there as a nest egg or for emergencies or adaptive devices, should he need," Roche added.

A provincial spokesperson explained that the Employment and Income Assistance (EIA) program provides benefits to people with disabilities who are financially and categorically eligible under its persons with disabilities category. Section 5(1)(a) of The Manitoba Assistance Act outlines the eligibility criteria for the persons with disabilities category.

"Eligibility for income support programs varies across provinces. Provincial income assistance, including disability benefits, cannot be automatically transferred from one province to Manitoba. Any person who moves to Manitoba and requires income assistance must submit an application to EIA and have their eligibility reviewed," the spokesperson said.

"Applicants who wish to apply for eligibility under the disability category will also have to have a disability assessment completed by a physician and reviewed by the program. As eligibility varies between provincial income assistance programs, benefits cannot transfer from one program to another. There are some situations where a person's disability eligibility may be granted without the submission of a disability assessment, such as if a person is receiving Canada Pension Plan Disability benefits." Since income assistance programs are under provincial jurisdiction, each province sets its own unique legislation, policy and benefit rates, the spokesperson added.

"Wait times for EIA intake appointments vary

across the province. In the event a person requires immediate financial assistance, an emergency review of their circumstances may be conducted to provide urgent, temporary benefits. An applicant who was receiving income assistance in another province would be subject to the same wait time as other applicants," the spokesperson said.

"The Department of Families recognizes the challenges that individuals may experience if they require income assistance after moving from another province. The department aims to ensure urgent situations are dealt with appropriately and that applications to EIA are reviewed in a reasonable timeframe."

A new disability income support program is currently in the works, with more information available at https://www.gov.mb.ca/fs/eia/disp.html.

"The department is developing a new income support program for persons with severe and prolonged disabilities that will be separate from EIA," the spokesperson said.

"The new program will be tailored to the unique needs of Manitobans with significant disabilities and is anticipated to launch later in 2022."

From Roche's perspective, the community can help in this type of situation by being supportive, caring and understanding.

"More compassion is needed — and more voices are needed for change. One voice won't change things, but if others facing similar situations with our provincial programs and government came together and many voices are now speaking up, then that is where possible change can occur," she said.

"One needs to be prepared when a traumatic event happens in their lives and to someone they love. We should be able to count on the provincial disability programs for helping our disabled, not bringing them down."

Roche believes the process should be smoother if someone receiving disability coverage moves within Canada to be closer to the helping hands of family.

"It is time for the government to reconsider not penalizing them for where they need to relocate but instead make disability programs universal in this country," she said.

"Like I said, we are all Canadian."

The Manitoba Association of Newcomer Serving Organizations (MAN-SO) reached out to Interlakers assisting Ukrainian settlers to help them connect with the resources and services they need.

MANSÓ held a meeting a few weeks ago in Gimli to help different individuals and grassroots groups that are assisting Ukrainian newcomers who fled Russia's invasion of their country and chose to settle in the Interlake.

"We brought people together to build connections between organizations that can help with settlement and the people or groups who need that information or can get that information to the newcomers," said MANSO's Ukraine response co-ordinator Emily Halldorson. "There are a lot of different organizations that support newcomers. They offer services such as English language training, helping people find jobs, helping kids transition into school, interpretation services and so forth. When you come to a new place, you need to a lot of different things all at once."

MANSO is a non-profit organization for immigrant and refugee service providers. It facilitates newcomer integration by providing support to those assisting newcomers. It also acts as the voice of the Manitoba settlement and integration sector.

Halldorson said there are a lot of people or groups doing different things in different Interlake communities that are not too far away from each other but had not "connected."

"We had a range of people who are involved in supporting Ukrainian newcomers in the Interlake. We had businesses, grassroots groups that were formed to help Ukrainian families, formal organizations that provide different social services in the area and people who are hosting a family. It was really a diverse group of people who attended," said Halldorson. "There were people from Stonewall, Ĝimli Arborg, River-

ton and smaller communities like Morweena, which has a resettlement committee."

The first step was to bring the groups together and make them aware that there are others who may be experiencing the same sorts of challenges or who have experience with certain aspects of settlement.

"I think one thing coming out of the meeting will be keeping people in touch with each other so that when is-

sues do arise with the people they're helping, they can support each other or look to this network of other people who are doing the same kind of work in their area of the province and not feel so alone in the work they're doing," said Halldorson.

Some of the challenges addressed included how to provide Ukrainian newcomers with transportation to

> and from jobs that may not be close to a rural centre and how to fill out the paperwork involved in sponsoring Ukrainians.

"Some business owners are starting to figure out that they'll have go the extra mile if they want to attract Ukrainian employees. They'll have to think about helping them purchase a car or provide transportation or carpooling options," said Hall-

options," said Halldorson. "That's a very different concern from what a host family would have. They might be helping with immigrant and settlement issues and might not be experienced with this type of work it they've not had interactions with the federal immigration department or have experience filling out documents for a work visa."

The meeting included presentations from local organizations, such as Steinbach-based Eastman Immi-

grant Services, which has an office in Arborg, that help newcomers settle in the Interlake.

"If there are newcomers in the Interlake who need support, Eastman can help with things like finding housing and employment, looking for English language training, helping with the transition to school for children and youth, getting necessary documentation and communication with immigration," said Halldorson. "Eastman is aware of the services out there and can connect people with special services."

MANSO will be holding a followup meeting on Thursday, Aug. 25 at 3 p.m. via Zoom.



are some doctors who want to work in rural areas. A Manitoba graduate, for instance, is working in Eriksdale, and Gimli will have a Manitoba graduate starting in September.

"We want to provide enough primary care for everybody as close to home as possible," said Dr. Penner. "And then we want to keep an emergency department open in each area 24-7."

Morley Nordal, an Arborg-area resident, business owner and former councillor for the Town of Arborg and for the Municipality of Bifrost-Riverton, said having next-to-no ER service at the Arborg hospital is a blow not only to residents of the town but also to those who live and work in the surrounding central region.

Arborg is a central Interlake hub, providing services to approximately 55,000 people within 45 minutes, he said. To the north of Arborg there's a large manufacturing area that employs hundreds of people, and the town of Riverton lies to the east. He worries about having no access to ER care when someone needs it.

"Someone in my family got hurt and there were no doctors on call in Arborg, so we drove to Stonewall," said Nordal, who runs an automotive and autobody repair centre. "When one of our tow trucks is called to a collision, we want [the victims] to get looked at and treated as fast as possible. It makes sense to increase emergency services in Arborg."

To him, discussions about the future of Arborg's ER mean there's a plan to eliminate it. And the reason Arborg has a rotating door of physicians is that they're prohibited from working under a fee-for-service compensation model.

If Arborg loses its ER and continues to see doctors skip town every four years, the area's abil-

ity to attract newcomers and new business opportunities could be hampered. The town has made a commitment to and invested in healthcare training through its newly expanded Arborg Training Centre. It has already trained health-care aides and will be launching a practical nursing program next month.

"Arborg is growing rural health-care staff through the educational initiatives offered here, so why aren't they being utilized? We're trying to build our town but provincial and IERHA bureaucrats handling our [taxpayer] money aren't getting the best value for our dollar," said Nordal, who is a member of the Central Interlake Chamber of Commerce.

"We have our fair share of older people in Arborg. And what the business community is trying to do is attract young working families here. There are three things that anybody considering coming to the area wants and that's health care — including ambulances — schools and protective services like fire and police. We're trying as an area and as a chamber of commerce to promote our area and we're not getting support from the health authority."

He said he thinks it's "ludicrous" to have medical services concentrated on the edge of Winnipeg while divesting rural areas of service.

"It's almost like they're forgetting about the central Interlake and the geographical position Arborg has in serving this area. We've got career bureaucrats with no common sense about applying principles to real life. Looking at this from a business standpoint, why would you pool your resources on the fringe of Winnipeg and double its capacity? The Seven Oaks Hospital is on the edge of north Winnipeg and Selkirk is only 20 minutes away. Gimli is about 20 minutes from Selkirk. If you had ER service in Arborg, you'd be able to eliminate Gimli's be-

Nordal said it's time residents take matters into their own hands.

"It's about time that we, the population of Arborg and surrounding district, took a more proactive role in health care. If the [province/IERHA] can't use our hospital, maybe we should form our own hospital board again. When that ran, it ran perfectly," he said. "The downfall of Arborg health care happened when the regional health authorities came in. We never had these major health concerns until they were brought in."

Fisher River Cree Nation to construct the Red Turtle Lodge Cultural Centre

For seven years, the Red Turtle Lodge Cultural Centre has only been a vision for the Fisher River Cree Nation community — and it was brought to life last week.

Contributions by Ron Sinclair, Faye Murdock, community members and elders, and Katina Cochrane, with support from the chief and council, will now make the vision a reality.

On Aug. 11, Fisher River Cree Nation and Honourable Marc Miller, minister of Crown-Indigenous Relations, announced a partnership with the Government of Canada to construct the Red Turtle Lodge Cultural Centre.

"Once complete, the new cultural space will offer holistic services and extend cultural programs and opportunities for everyone within our Indigenous community," said Chief David Crate of Fisher River Cree Nation.

The centre will be a gathering place for members of the Fisher River Cree Nation and surrounding communities to learn and share traditional practices, focusing on the needs of everyone: men, women, children and the 2SLGBTQQIA+ community.

Under the Cultural Spaces in In-

digenous Communities Program (CSICP), the Government of Canada is providing \$1.24 million towards the construction of The Red Turtle Lodge Cultural Centre.

"We are pleased with the federal government's contribution to the Red Turtle Lodge as it is another example of their commitment to reconciliation with the Indigenous peoples of Canada. We had many people, community elders and numerous organizations come together in developing this proposal for our community. We've seen the need to create a space within our community that can help connect people to who they are as Indigenous people. The Red Turtle Lodge will help our people enhance and revive their cultural practices and traditional ceremonies that will ultimately bring healing," said Chief Crate.

The government's 2021 budget allocated \$108.8 million over two years for the CSICP. These funds contribute to the Federal Pathway to Address Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women, Girls and 2SLGBTQQIA+ People, the Government of Canada's contribution to the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Girls, Women and 2SLGBTQQIA+ People National Ac-

By partnering with the First Nation Healing Centre, the Red Turtle Lodge Cultural Centre works toward supporting women and children who have experienced family violence and domestic abuse.

Bifrost-Riverton councillor Frode Andersen fondly remembered

Municipality of Bifrost-Riverton councillor Frode Andersen passed away last month and is being fondly remembered by his fellow councillors as a well-respected man who diligently served his community.

Andersen, who was 65 years old, passed away on July 31 at his home in Finns, about 18 kilometres south of Riverton.

Bifrost-Riverton Reeve Brian Johnson and councillors Gordon Klym, Colin Bjarnason, Chad Johnson, David King and Ken Stadnek are extending their sincere condolences to Frode's family and remembering Frode for his efforts to create positive change in the community.

"Frode was a great man and it was a pleasure to work with him. He understood the responsibility that came with his position on council and considered the entire municipality in his decision-making," said council in a statement. "The community has been bettered because of the contribution of his time and wisdom. He will be missed by all."

Frode was born in Denmark in 1957 and grew up in Hasselager where he developed a passion for agriculture and honed his entrepreneurial spirit. He immigrated to Canada in 1981, eventually buying a farm in Finns where he raised wheat, oilseed, alfalfa and strawberries.

Frode was first elected to council during a Ward 1 byelection in November 2015 and was re-elected in 2018 during the general municipal election.

In addition to his council work and liaising with constituents, Frode had been serving as council representative on the East Interlake Watershed District's Icelandic River-Washow Bay Sub-District Board, the Evergreen Regional Library Board, the Interlake Weed Control District Board, the Riverton-Bifrost Fire Department Committee and the Riverton-Bifrost Parks and Recreation Commission.

most vulnerable life stages.

This is the fifth consecutive annual release of Poweshiek skipperling in Manitoba. Last year, 47 adult butterflies were released. In 2020, 19 adult butterflies were released. In 2019, 13 butterflies were released. In 2018, the inaugural year, six butterflies were released. Last year, the program was expanded to include Dakota skippers.

Through this program, we aim to work with partners and landowners to understand why these butterflies continue to decline and to prevent them from becoming extinct in Canada.

lease thanks to a successful expansion of the breeding program. The ongoing success of the breeding program, combined with results from annual site surveys, will set the stage for future years.

"We have seen encouraging results from our population surveys in locations where we have done releases. This suggests our efforts may be helping to stabilize the population at these specific sites. However, we will need to analyze the new data collected this summer to get a better picture of the trends," said Westphal. "In the future, we hope to work with partners to reintroduce Poweshiek to sites where they have been lost."

About the Poweshiek skipperling

The Poweshiek skipperling is a small grassland butterfly species whose historic range includes southern Manitoba and the Midwestern U.S.A. Today, there are only two small, isolated locations where the butterfly can still be found: the Tall Grass Prairie Preserve in Manitoba and a second site near Flint, Mich. Experts estimate there may be fewer than 500 Poweshiek skipperlings remaining, making it one of the most endangered species in the world.

About the Dakota skipper The Dakota skipper is a northern prairie butterfly species whose historical range included tall grass and mixed-grass prairie habitat in a vast range extending from southern Saskatchewan and Manitoba into the Dakotas, Minnesota and Iowa, and east to the Chicago area. In Manitoba, this endangered species can still be found in small numbers in the Interlake and pockets of southwestern Manitoba.

About the Grassland Butterfly Conservation Program

The Poweshiek skipperling conservation project is a collaborative effort between the Assiniboine Park Conservancy, Nature Conservancy of Canada, Minnesota Zoo, John Ball Zoo, US Fish and Wildlife Service, University of Winnipeg and other partners in Canada and the United States. The Assiniboine Park Zoo is responsible for a head-starting program for the Manitoba population, with the aim to increase the wild population size by raising the skipperlings through their



The Gimli Municipal Heritage Advisory Committee (MHAC) recently published a book on notable people, celebrating and paying tribute to those who shaped the area's character and made it a better — and, in many instances, famous — place.

There are 39 biographies in the book titled *Notable People from Gimli: Post-1945* by Wally Johannson, Andy Blicq and Ed Ledohowski.

The engaging, easy-to-read biographies include a generous number of photographs depicting candid moments and highlights from each subject's life. The biographies cover the notable person's major achievement(s), their roots and family connections, education and other interests.

The project was spearheaded by former MHAC chair Wally Johannson, who has a long track record of preserving the rich cultural and physical heritage of Gimli and other nearby communities and who received the Lieutenant Governor's Award for Historical Preservation and Promotion in 2018.

Johannson said he was inspired to work on the book in order to provide a robust treatment of the people who contributed to Gimli and area, as well as to write about those who hadn't been written about at all.

"The [provincial] historic resources branch had a project for local heritage committees called Notable Persons, and they had a template which most communities followed. But the resulting publications only listed material that had already been written so there really wasn't anything original. We just thought that wasn't adequate treatment of notable people," said Johannson. "There are also a lot of significant people in our community or from our community who had careers after the *Gimli Saga* [1975] was written. We thought we should do original research on each individual."


MHAC is a sub-committee of the Municipality of Gimli's council. It provides advice to councillors on local heritage issues. A sub-committee of MHAC was tasked with reviewing a list of potential candidates for the book and selecting those for inclusion based on a set of guidelines. Johannson then interviewed either the candidate or their descendant(s).

"It was three and a half years of work. This was very much a group effort," said Johannson. "I wrote the rough draft then sent it to the notable person or their descendant for factchecking. Andy [Blicq] did a re-write; he has a very nice writing style. Andy also wrote the intro and acknowledgements. There were four of us proof-reading the final draft. That included Claire Gillis, who is a professional proofreader and editor and a real pro."

Many people will instantly recognize names such as Guy Maddin (filmmaker), Kerri Einarson (top female curler in the world), Norma Bailey (film producer and director), Janis

Johnson (founder of the Gimli International Film Festival) and David Arnason (writer), all of whom put Gimli on the international map.

But "lesser known" notable people are also celebrated. They include Dr. Sunil Patel, a doctor dedicated to his patients' well-being for almost five decades and who advanced medical care in the area, Michael Ewanchuk, who enriched local history by publishing books on Ukrainian settlement in the Gimli area, and Irene Howard (Miller), an "indomitable" paraplegic athlete who competed in Olympic and Canadian national games, winning several medals.

Johannson said some of the notable people of days gone by were "found" in the 1975 book *Gimli Saga: The History of Gimli* and added to the list of candidates for consideration.

"Irene Miller, who is mentioned in *Gimli Saga*, was extraordinary and won huge numbers of medals in Canadian competitions as a paraplegic athlete," said Johannson. "And she also participated in two Olympic

competitions and won medals."

In addition to artists, writers, medical professionals and athletes, the book includes biographies of political figures such as Dr. George Johnson (who also founded a medical clinic), Peter Bjornson (also a former Gimli High School teacher), William Barlow (municipal mayor) and agriculturalists such as Baldur Kristjanson (who helped disadvantaged areas in the Interlake). Significant fishers from the area were excluded because they've already been profiled in MHAC's book on the Gimli fishery.

In addition to the interviews he conducted, Johannson said notable people or their descendants provided him with textual materials and photographs (information on source ma-

terial is listed at the back of the book). Other information was obtained online. In some cases, he had so much material at hand that he was forced to make difficult decisions about what to include and what to leave out.

"Because we were doing almost 40 biographies, we had to condense the material and limit the length of the book," he said.

As he no longer sits on MHAC, Johannson said he's unsure whether a notable persons part two may be in the works.

Other books published by MHAC include Fresh Air Unlimited: The Freshair Camps of Lake Winnipeg, Landmarks: Gimli's Significant Heritage Buildings and Gimli Harbour & Fishery: An Illustrated History.

Ask the Money Lady

Dear Money Lady Readers: Are the rising rates keeping you up at night? Are you wondering if you can ever afford to buy a home? Hang-in there, the change is coming!

The Canadian housing market is in a definite pullback as July marks the fourth straight month of a decline. New buyers have felt the pressure of interest rate hikes since March 2022, and it is anticipated they will go even higher. Today the posted rates currently match the Canada Mortgage and Housing Corp., (CMHC) qualifying rate of 5.25%, something we haven't seen in over a decade. A five-year fixed mortgage rate now hovers between 4.79% and 5.04%. For many Canadian homeowners, this is the first time they have seen rates this high, many believing they were paying too much, when they were haggling for a mortgage rate at 2.50% only two and three years ago. When your mortgage come up for renewal, will you be able to afford the increased rates?

The expected reversal of the massive pandemic-era gains on house prices is upon us and all lenders are now mandating a full appraisal on every purchase or refinance to confirm property values and ensure they are not inflated. Home buyers are on the defensive in the wake of current rate hikes and there is no longer a sense of urgency to buy. Nor is there the appetite or willingness for the bidding wars of earlier in the year. My belief is that we will see a market shift as buyers re-gain pricing power and homeowners realize they either paid too much or now need to come to terms with the fact that their home isn't worth what they thought it was. Economists predict that the Bank of Canada will raise rates an additional 1% which will further challenge the already intense affordability stress. Honestly, if today's buyers do not receive more price concessions from homeowners, we may see an increase in the less expensive options such as condos and townhome sales.

The hardest hit areas are Toronto and Vancouver. Montreal, Edmonton, and Calgary seem to still be doing quite well, sustaining a very

modest downward trend. This is not surprising, since Alberta's economy is currently one of the best in Canada, thanks in part to a tremendous turnaround in the energy sector. Calgary is now at the top of the list in comparison to other large Canadian cities for affordability and a solid demand for housing.

However, even with Calgary as our anomaly, it is anticipated that the rest of Canada's property values will slip a further 12% by the end of year - good news to new buyers who have been waiting for a correction. Let's face it, the interest rates have been "too low for too long." I know it hurts to say that out loud - but it's true. House prices have soared on the backs of rock-bottom lending rates and people have used their homes as ATM machines to keep refinancing their debt into a higher mortgage to bail them out yet again. You knew it had to stop someday, didn't you? The two decade long "low-rate lending party" has now ended and the banks are thrilled. It's time to buckle up and create that finance budget you have been putting off doing for the last ten years. Inflation today is at 7.50% and in 1983 it was 6.83%. Think about that for a moment. For those of us that were homeowners in the 80's and 90's you know that the rate hikes are coming. Good Luck & Best Wishes,




