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Narcisse Women's Institute celebrates 100 years

The Narcisse Women's Institute celebrated its 100th anniversary a few weeks ago with live music, food and special guests who paid tribute to the organization and the work it does for the surrounding communities.

NWI past president Charlotte Berg said about 50 people attended the celebration at the Inwood Hall on Sept.

The institute was thrilled to have Manitoba's Lt.-Gov. Anita Neville as a guest.

"I thought it was amazing that our lieutenant governor attended our 100th anniversary," said Berg. "She's an amazing woman. She was so open and friendly. And she was so generous; she said if we had a project that she could possibly help with, we could call her."

In addition to Narcisse, there are women's institutes in Fisher Branch and Grosse Isle in the Interlake region, as well as locals in other parts of the province. Welcoming all women regardless of their background, their mandate is to strengthen women, families and communities through activities such as fundraising and donations to local causes, the provision of social support, educational enhancement and scholarships for students

entering post-secondary education. Local institutes are represented by the Manitoba Women's Institute, which advocates on their behalf with the provincial government.

Before the COVID pandemic, Berg said the NWI held regular fundraising teas to support communities in their local area. It has funded medical

support equipment such as a diabetic pump, made donations to STARS Air Ambulance, prepared care packages for community members who were sick and provided bursaries for Lakeshore School Division students to

help them with the cost of attending university. The NWI also regularly donates to the Teulon and District Food Bank.

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Farmers raise nearly \$125,000 for Canadian Foodgrains Bank

The Arborg & District Growing Project had a tremendous harvest this year despite experiencing some drought conditions and donated close to \$125,000 to the Canadian Foodgrains Bank, which helps mitigate food insecurity in developing countries.

Bifrost-Riverton farmer Sid Dueck said the donation is a record high in the growing project's decades-long history.

"It was an absolutely astounding canola crop. We got 48 bushels to the acre, which resulted in 7,200 bushels," said Dueck, who co-ordinates the project with a small committee. "What's so astounding is that six weeks after seeding, we had barely gotten any rain. I thought for sure we'd have a complete crop failure because it was bone-dry and this was the driest area. This field got one tenth of an inch of rain after only six weeks."

After the canola is sold, Dueck said the donation to the Canadian Foodgrains Bank will be very close to \$125,000.

"This is the largest amount we've sent to the foodgrains bank," he said. "Last year we broke a record with about \$80,000. But this year we smashed that record."

Farmers from the Arborg and Bifrost-Riverton areas brought eight combines and three grain trucks to the project's growing site, north of Arborg, on Sept. 21 to reap the harvest.

"I want to thank all the participants for their great effort and making this come to pass. Without good support, it just wouldn't be the same," said Dueck. "I really appreciate the community support to be able to pull

something like this off."

The Arborg and District Growing Project began in 1989 has grown crops about 26 times over 34 years, he said. It was the first growing project in Manitoba for the foodgrains bank. They typically grow canola and wheat on a rotational basis, and they expect to plant wheat next year.

Gordon Janzen from the Canadian Foodgrains Bank said the proceeds from the Arborg growing project is "amazing" and so important given climate change and severe drought in many countries in the global south.

"This means a lot to us. This represents a huge amount of support for our member agencies that are responding to hunger needs abroad," said Janzen, who attended the Arborg harvest. "And these funds are then multiplied by a matching grant we get from the Canadian government."

The Canadian Foodgrains Bank, which is celebrating it's 40th anniversary this year, is an association of 15 national church agencies in Canada that respond to global hunger needs. It serves as a resource for those agencies, which work in 36 countries, he said. Farmers or groups of farm-

ers pledge a part of their crop to the foodgrains bank. Manitoba has about

"The money we raise is used to help women and children and our communities because if you help women, they in turn want to help their children, and their community as a whole thrives," said Berg.

Eriksdale curling club raising funds for new ice plant

The Eriksdale Curling Club is fundraising for a new geothermal plant.

With the climate crisis and environmental issues at the forefront of everyone's minds, Eriskdale Curling Club members hope to upgrade their facilities. Donna Pool of the curling club said their plant is chemical-based so that it could be better for the earth. They hope to change to a geothermal plant for the environment's sake.

"We want to be conscious of the climate and the environment," said Pool.

The last quote the club got on a geothermal plant was \$205,000. She said because of that price, fundraising will take them at least another six months, and she expects the

quote to change by then.

The club is working toward the \$205,000 goal for now, though. So far, they've fundraised \$140,000, \$50,000 of which is their own money. Pool said they've known the plant needs replacing for a while, so they've been fundraising for years, even through COVID-19.

The curling club is selling Co-op gift cards for the new plant. They also have a 50/50 draw coming up. People can donate money outside of specific fundraisers, too, and Pool said that those wanting a tax receipt just have to make the cheque out to the Eriksdale Community Club Inc.

"It's all bits and pieces but at the end of the day it adds up," she said.

40 community projects that include crops, auctions and choir fundraisers.

"I started a beekeepers' growing project this year," said Janzen, who is a hobby beekeeper. "Traditionally, our growing projects have been focused around grain growing on the Prairies, but we have others like a choir and auction sales at a church. I'm inviting beekeepers across Manitoba to do this. I'm committing the proceeds of my hives to this project and inviting others to do the same. Because it's the 40th anniversary of the Canadian Foodgrains Bank, I'm hoping to get the proceeds of 40 hives into this project."

Food security around the world is becoming more of a challenge especially with the effects of global warming, he said. It includes Canada, which has experienced some years of drought. But on continents such as Africa, drought conditions are worsening.

"The Horn of Africa is an example of these severe droughts that have gotten worse recently. We're currently experiencing a period of about five years where there's been virtually no rain in the horn, which includes countries such as Somalia, Ethiopia and Kenya," said Janzen. "This is affecting hundreds of thousands of people and

displacing them from their lands. They've always experienced drought, but it's becoming much more frequent and prolonged."

At the other end of the climate crisis spectrum is severe flooding. Last year Pakistan experienced unusual monsoon rain and 30 million people were displaced because of it, he said.

"The foodgrains bank is responding to increased hunger crises. We are in a hunger crisis right now. Two of the main reasons are conflict and the weather extremes we've been seeing, so we're responding in a lot of places where people have been displaced," said Janzen. "Part of our response is emergency humanitarian relief to address the critical needs of people experiencing food insecurity. But another part is bolstering support for long-term agriculture to help people grow their own food and improve their food security for the long run."

Janzen said the foodgrains bank is grateful to the individuals and community groups that support the organization. As hunger crises increase around the world, the bank has seen increased donor support and "we're thankful for that."

The Interlake Artists Collective are inviting residents to their "One Size, One Price, One Day" show. On Oct. 15, 11 artists committed to authenticity and quality in art are hosting an art show from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the St. Andrews Community Centre.

"The main theme of the show is art that is 16 inches by 20 inches in size. We're using popular square-foot shows as our model. Across Canada, square-foot shows are extremely popular. And that's what they do is they sell a 12-inch by 12-inch canvas and that's all the show is. But, in our area, we know that 16 by 20 is the most frequently sought-after size of art," said Patti Simko, show co-ordinator.

All pieces will be priced at \$250. There will also be smaller art pieces available at consistent pricing.

"The purpose of that is to allow more collectors or first-time collectors to be able to purchase a piece of highquality original art," said Simko.

The 11 artists involved in this show are Joan Ewonchuk, Kathy George-Moore, Gayle Halliwell, Barb Hoffmann, Rosemary Miguez, Michelle Paterson, Katie Simko, Patti Simko, Renay Taylor-Besant, Shayani Turko and Brittany Wurch. They will be presenting mostly acrylic, oil, watercolour and some mixed media pieces.

"[You'll see] basic realism, some abstract, semi-abstract, semi-abstract landscape. It's a really big mix. That's one of the reasons why I pulled together this group was not only because of the talent in this particular group of artists, but their styles are very unique. So when people come to the show, they're going to see everything from muted watercolours to bright, bold pieces. There's going to be pretty much something for everyone," said Simko.

The idea for this show came from the shows at the Gwen Fox Gallery. From their exhibitions, Simko realized how important art is to our physical and emotional well-being in creating a space for us to gather and unite as a community. She also knows that because much of our area is rural, artists don't have as many opportunities to show their art as artists in the city might, so this is a way of creating space for art in our area.

This event is more than just the art; however, there will also be live art demonstrations and hourly lectures starting at 11 a.m.

"Some are going to show you different techniques; some people are going to do talks, and these are all artists from in the show," said Simko.

This event is also an opportunity to give back to some community or-

ganizations. There will be two art pieces up for auction. One will have proceeds go to Nova House our local emergency and transitional shelter for those experiencing intimate partner violence or family violence. The other will see proceeds go to future programming at St. Andrews Community Centre.

Admission is free to both the early access evening and the main event.

Simko welcomes anyone wanting to stop by on Oct. 15.

"It's a really good opportunity to have such high quality professional art in one location at an affordable price. If you're even remotely thinking of looking for a piece for your wall, this is a really good chance, a good opportunity, to come to find some really good art," she said.

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RM of Gimli flies Gimli Red River Métis flags

In advance of Canada's third annual National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, the Rural Municipality of Gimli installed Métis flags around town as a tribute to Métis and Indigenous contributions to the area.

Gimli Red River Métis chairperson Donna Austfjord said the RM installed about 75 Métis flags along Seventh Avenue (Highway 9), Centre Street and First Avenue last week, and Mayor Kevin Chudd facilitated the flag-raising.

"This is quite exciting for us," said Austfjord. "We have a predominantly Icelandic culture in the community and we thought this was amazing for us. It helps us feel recognized. This is about truth and reconciliation and about accepting and learning and going forward in a positive manner. We have nothing but praise for the RM for doing this."

The National Day for Truth and Reconciliation on Sept. 30 recognizes the harms done to Indigenous peoples through colonialism and the residential school system, as well as the generational impacts on their families and communities. The day encourages Canadians to reflect and educate themselves on Canada's treatment of its Indigenous peoples. It also coincides with Orange Shirt Day and the Every Child Matters campaign, an Indigenous grassroots movement to raise awareness of Canada's residential schools and how they suppressed Indigenous culture.

The Gimli Red River Métis was established about a year and a half ago and wants to show the community how it can be a positive force through activities such as youth and elder programming and by highlighting Indigenous businesses that are already established in Gimli, said Austfjord, who also works full time with the Manitoba Métis Foundation as its fishing and economic and community development officer for the Interlake.

Those activities can include educational programming in local schools on Truth and Reconciliation's call to action and the '60s Scoop, where social service agencies removed Indig-

enous children from their homes and placed them in foster care to be adopted by white families.

"We do want to bring pride into the community for those who maybe haven't identified themselves as Métis. We've got a few Métis businesses here that people may not be aware of. The business owners may have felt reluctant to say they're a Métis business," said Austfjord. "I think in time we'll show our value in the community."

Austfjord said she's hoping other ethnic cultures in the municipality such as Ukrainians who fled Ukraine in the wake of Russia's invasion can also be highlighted periodically.

"I think this [flag] gesture puts the spotlight on us for a while and that people will maybe take the time to learn and educate themselves on the issues. It's positive all the way around," she said. "For us, having Métis flags put up says this is who we are, that we're part of this community and let's all learn and be a community together. There are a lot of people behind us, wanting to make sure we succeed. I'm hoping this will be taken positively."

In addition to the flags, the Gimli Red River Métis partnered with the RM for a series of events to recognize the National Day for Truth and Rec-

onciliation.

"We'll be volunteering within the events. We're having tea and bannock, fires burning and one of the Métis citizens will be reading Phyllis's story [Phyllis Webstad's Orange Shirt picture book]," she said. "The Gimli Red River Métis have collaborated with all kinds of groups and committees in the Gimli area and we've had success. We want to continue on down that road, be a helping hand and bring our culture into the community and educate people."

Gimli resident Cheryl Buhler said celebrating different cultures can bring people together.

"I think it's fabulous to see the Métis flags around town," she said. "I think it's great to celebrate another's culture and all the good things that can bring to the community."

Mayor Kevin Chudd said the RM was happy to work together with the Gimli Red River Métis and do its part to contribute to the conversation about Canada's colonial history.

"We're proud to work together with our Indigenous partners. The Gimli Red River Métis had approached us to see if they could put up flags and

I thought we can use the flagpoles on the light standards throughout town," said Chudd. "I think it's a nice gesture on everybody's part to join in the spirit of reconciliation."

No meaningful progress on pollution in Lake Winnipeg

Although phosphorus had been recognized as a major polluter of Lake Winnipeg and one that contributes to frequent and extensive algal blooms, there has been little progress on limiting its discharge into the lake.

The nutrient is the main culprit in the degradation of water quality, but the 10th largest freshwater lake in the world is also being imperilled by a slew of other pollutants.

Several presenters spoke about the degradation of the lake at the Coalition to Save Lake Winnipeg's public meeting held Sept. 23 at the Gimli Recreation Centre.

The coalition, a grassroots organization formed in 2019 in Silver Harbour, brought in representatives from the Manitoba Eco-Network, the Lake Winnipeg Foundation, The East Interlake Watershed District, the Canada Water Agency, renowned water scientist Dr. Eva Pip, the City of Selkirk's utilities manager and a commercial fisher to deliver a progress report on the lake and answer residents' questions

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Retired University of Winnipeg professor and researcher Dr. Eva Pip.

"Our lake has suffered a lot of abuse over the years," said Silver Harbour resident and coalition member Fred Veldink. "What we'd like to see happening in future is reliance on traditional knowledge and practices, the experience of fishers and contributions from modern science ... that will lead to a healthier Lake Winnipeg."

Veldink said the coalition encourages residents to take a more active role by lobbying local and higher levels of government to take action on the lake or write letters to newspapers.

Glen Koroluk from the Manitoba Eco-Network said nutrient concentrations in the lake remain elevated. A 2022 report from the province states that between 1994 and 2021 there has been an average of 5,000 tonnes of phosphorus per year entering the lake via four major tributaries.

And part of the solution is to target the known sectors contributing to the pollution, including the agricultural industry.

"Agriculture is Manitoba's largest resource industry and food producing is Manitoba's largest manufacturing sector. It's a huge industry," said Koroluk. "There's a lot of money in that system that we should be drawing on to help us fix some of these problems. The reality is agrifood production is Manitoba's largest polluter of water, largest consumption user of water and the largest polluter of the air through greenhouse gas emissions. ... Agriculture is also the largest

est degrader of land."

In addition to phosphorus from Manitoba's agricultural sector, Koroluk said phosphorus enters the province from other provinces and U.S. states. Targets to limit phosphorus entering Canada at the border were established by the Red River Watershed Board under the International Joint Commission, but as yet there is no signed agreement.

"We need to get some sort of agreement and we need to have an action plan developed," said Koroluk. "We have to reduce our phosphorus by 50 per cent. That has to be somehow enforceable."

Cheryl Bailey from the Lake Winnipeg Foundation said that based on water research carried out in the Experimental Lakes Area in northwestern Ontario, algal blooms can be "effectively controlled by reducing phosphorus inputs" into freshwater lakes

"Researchers showed that reducing nitrogen did not reduce algal blooms as many algae can get the nitrogen they need from the atmosphere," said Bailey. "This is why our efforts and policies should focus on reducing phosphorus."

One of the large contributors to

phosphorous in Lake Winnipeg is Winnipeg's North End Water Pollution Control Centre, she said. The wastewater plant must be brought into compliance with phosphorus limits set by the provincial gov-

ernment.

The maximum limit for phosphorus in the plant's effluent is set at 1.0 mg/L to reduce algal blooms in Lake Winnipeg. But the plant's phosphorus concentrations are "consistently three to four times higher than that limit," said Bailey. "Two provincial deadlines for compliance have been missed over the past two decades and still we've seen no meaningful progress to meeting the phosphorus requirement."

Retired University of Winnipeg professor and water scientist Dr. Eva Pip, who has published research on water quality in Lake Winnipeg, said most people see the visible problems on the lake such as algal blooms and zebra mussels. But there's a smorgasbord of other human-caused sources of pollution damaging the lake and those have to be addressed along with phosphorus.

They include domestic sewage, which contains "every contaminant that there is," hospital waste, synthetic chemicals, PFOAs (forever chemicals that don't break down in the environment) Teflon, flame retardants, disinfectants, triclosan, phthalates (used in plastics), pharmaceuticals, WD40, Glyphosate, detergents, copper added to pig feed, animal manure and logging operations, all of which can have deleterious impacts on aquatic organisms.

"Agriculture is an important industry here in terms of crops and intensive animal production, and this is a very large contributor of nutrients as well as other chemicals and toxic pesticides, which are formulations of all

Lundar Gymnastics Club offering competitive programming

The Lundar Gymnastics Club has officially gone competitive.

After a few years of getting their bearings and learning the sport, gymnasts in Lundar are now ready to compete. The club started in 2020 when Bella Chubaty, one of two gymnastics coaches, moved to town. Unfortunately, they could only offer recreational courses due to the need for more resources and registrants. However, the sport's popularity has grown, as has participation.

"We were starting to notice there was enough interest," she said. "That the girls wanted to get into competitive gymnastics."

Chubaty's been competing in gymnastics for 16 years. She said getting the sport started in Lundar has been amazing, and she's only hoping to continue to grow the program. For the first few years, Lundar Gymnastics Club offered Kinder Gym, Rec 1 and Rec 2, all development courses for young gymnasts. Last year, they added a pre-competitive

"We weren't big enough yet to offer a full competitive program so pre-competitive was the next best thing," said Chubaty.

After a great turnout for the pre-competitive program, the coach felt she had a core group of gymnasts who wanted to compete — and she was right. After surveying the young gymnasts, Lundar Gymnastics Club decided to go through the competitive program, and one month into it, the classes are a

The competitive gymnasts range in age from seven to 12, with four total in the program. Chubaty said their programs focus on skill level, not age, meaning everyone learns and competes at the same

"As we get into our first couple of competitions, if we realize some girls need to move up a level, we can go from there," said Chubaty.

The Lundar Gymnastics Club's first competition will be in January.

The two coaches know they'll need extra help as the club grows, so they're looking for a third coach for the program. Chubaty said experience in gymnastics is optional but would be helpful. They're looking for someone athletic enough to spot gymnasts and who enjoys working with children. Once they have the candidate, the gymnastics club will pay for them to take training needed to coach gymnastics.

For those interested in the position or wanting to learn more about it, follow Lundar Gymnastics Club on Facebook. People can also use the Facebook page to connect with the club.

"The bigger our club can get, the more registrations we can get, the more potential we'll have for our club to grow," said Chubaty.

Though there are other gymnastics programs in the area, none are competitive, so Chubaty hopes that aspect will draw more gymnasts to the Lundar program. With more gymnasts, they'll have more registration dollars and be able to upgrade their equipment and facility.

Those enrolled in the competitive gymnastics program practise for 2.5 hours/week. All the other programs practise for one hour a week. And though the programs have already started, Chubaty said they're still accepting registrations and would be happy to get more.

sorts of chemicals," said Dr. Pip. "Hog manure lagoons can leach into rivers and streams and ditches and into Lake Winnipeg. It's sprayed on fields in the fall after the crops are taken off and there's no crop to assimilate the manure. In spring it gets flushed off the fields."

Dr. Pip said it's a common practice to illegally dump hog manure (which contains phosphorus and other contaminants) into the environment as there's not enough land to deal with

"There is illegal manure dumping. We have so much shit in Manitoba that there's often not enough land to apply it on. So you'll often find operators dumping it or leaving it here and there," said Dr. Pip, who showed attendees photos of illegal dumping. "In the Rivers area, I observed a truck that just left the lagoon after it filled up with manure and it was driving along a municipal road just dumping it off there. In the Interlake area, [here's] a manure dump into a wildlife refuge area. These barns and manure belong to a prominent politi-

Biodiversity has declined in Lake Winnipeg and a number of freshwater species have already disappeared, said Dr. Pip.

"The government has to recognize and acknowledge the problems in order to address them. We cannot deny these problems and say everything is fine and it will fix itself. No, it won't. Not without our help. We have to admit our blind spots," she said. "We have to talk about taboo topics

which we are reluctant to talk about."

East Interlake Watershed District manager Armand Belanger said the federal government is providing funding over the next few years that will be put towards projects targeted at farmers to help slow down the movement of phosphorus from the land to the lake.

The federal government also created a Canada Water Agency and launched a Freshwater Action Plan that aims to improve freshwater management in Canada and address major pollution issues on the Great Lakes, Lake Winnipeg, Lake of the Woods and the St. Lawrence, Fraser and Mackenzie riv-

"It's increasingly apparent that we have extreme events more frequently

and more intense. They've had an impact on human health, public safety and the environment, and we can't continue on the same track we're on. We need to do something about it," said Ute Holweger, senior advisor with the Canada Water Agency. "That's exacerbated through the effects of climate change."

Lake Winnipeg commercial fisher Robert T. Kristjanson, who is 90

years old and has fished since he was a boy, has been sounding the alarm on algal blooms and the lake's degradation for about 40 years, trying to get more buy-in from people living around the lake in order to compel the provincial government to take action.


"As a fisherman, I was out this morning north of Hecla and I would have liked to have had the mayor of Winnipeg and 10 mayors before him and shoved their heads into the water," said Kristjanson, referring yet another algal bloom in the tourist region. "When are we going to stand up and say enough is enough? We got only a million and a half people in Manitoba but we've managed to pollute the water all the way to the Arctic Circle."

With residential and cottage developments proceeding apace along the lakeshore from Netley to Balaton Beach (in the Municipality of Bifrost-Riverton), Kristjanson said the pollution in the lake will only get worse.

"You walk down to the water and you can't go into it. Everyone of you has children and grandchildren like I have. What have we done to them? Can't we understand what we're doing to ourselves? We are the ones to blame. Now is the time for us to smarten up and do something," he

During the question and answer portion of the meeting, attendees asked why there were no municipal and provincial politicians / representatives in attendance.

The coalition had sent out invitations to local and provincial politicians, said Veldink, but none apart from one Winnipeg Beach council member, Interlake-Gimli MLA candidate Sarah Pinsent-Bardarson and Selkirk-Interlake-Eastman MP James Bezan showed up.

Gimli council renames Colonization roads

Gimli council passed a bylaw last week to remove the name Colonization from four roads in the municipality and further the municipality's commitment to reconciliation with its Indigenous and Métis residents.

Council unanimously passed Bylaw No. 23-007 on Sept. 25. The re-naming of the roads comes after council and previous council embarked on a process to remove the word Colonization, which is considered offensive to

Indigenous and Métis people.

"Our history is built on the strong relationship between the Indigenous and Métis people and our community," said Mayor Kevin Chudd and councillors Thora Palson, Andy Damm, Richard Petrowski and Kurt Reichert in a statement. "It's our responsibility to continuously foster these relationships. Changing these street names is just one step in our ongoing journey of reconciliation, learning and growth."

Colonization Road in Arnes has been renamed Ramsay Road in memory of John and Betsey Ramsay. John Ramsay was a member of the Saulteaux Aboriginal band. He and his wife Betsey and family assisted the first Icelandic settlers to New Iceland, helping them survive the harsh winter of 1875. The family provided food, taught the Icelanders how to build log cabins and taught them how to hunt and fish.

"It's [the renaming] a small act that

will serve as a daily reminder to the story of John and Betsey Ramsay," said council in its statement.

South Colonization Road in Gimli's South Beach neighbourhood has been renamed South Beach Road. North Colonization Road in Gimli's Loni Beach neighbourhood has been renamed Loni Beach Road. And Colonization Close in Loni Beach has been renamed to North 6th Avenue.

Algal blooms, dead fish blight Lake Winnipeg communities

Two communities along the west shore of Lake Winnipeg were blighted by a severe algal bloom and dead fish last week.

Winnipeg Beach was inundated with a thick, foul algal bloom that not only swept up along the beachfront but also entered the marina.

There were also scores of dead fish floating within the algal bloom.

Winnipeg Beach resident Gayle Halliwell said she noticed the bloom over the course of roughly three days, starting Sept. 26. When she went down to the beach, she found green waves and slime coating the shoreline and rocks.

"The beach area is just covered with algae," said Halliwell, who spoke with the Express on Sept. 28. "Everybody out here is talking about it. It looks to be the blue-green algae, which is said to be more toxic than green algae."

On the same day, Halliwell said she was at the Winnipeg Beach marina and found it covered with algae. There were also lots of dead fish floating within the bloom.

"The water in the harbour is low right now and as I was coming across the ramp, I saw all these dead fish. I called my husband and said, 'There's dead fish all over the place," she said. "Most of the fish are small but there are also larger dead fish floating around in the algae."

Halliwell said her husband reported the bloom and dead fish to the provincial government's Environment and Climate department office in Gimli (called Water Stewardship), and he was told there was also a report of algae that had come in a day prior from north of Gimli.

Town of Winnipeg Mayor Pam Jackson said she and council are very concerned about the algal bloom and are actively engaged with various environmental organizations, including the East Interlake Watershed District and the Red River Basin Commission.

"The solutions for Lake Winnipeg far outreach the Town of Winnipeg Beach. The watershed of Lake Winnipeg is an area that expands over

four Canadian provinces, four American states and spans over one million square kilometres. Given this, it is critically important that both the provincial and federal governments make the health of Lake Winnipeg a priority," said Jackson. "I would encourage everyone who is concerned about the algal bloom to contact their federal and provincial leaders and representatives to make their concern known and to pressure our government leaders to take action on this serious issue."

She added that restrictions in place with the upcoming elections precludes the town from scheduling meetings with cabinet ministers on water quality and the health of Lake Winnipeg.

A spokesperson for the provincial department of Environment and Climate said staff visited Winnipeg Beach on Sept. 29 to collect algae samples and gather more information about the fish kill.

"At the time of the inspection on Friday morning, the algae bloom had disappeared and no dead fish were observed. No further action is planned at this time," said the spokesperson.

Fish kills have different causes, he said, including natural mortality, low oxygen, disease and toxicity. Without additional information on the dead fish, the department can't speculate on the cause of this die-off. And the department will not be cleaning up

dead fish.

"Dead fish will not be removed from the shoreline. With wind and wave action, fish will be naturally returned to the lake and can also serve as a food source for natural scavengers," he said.

Warm and calm weather, coupled with relatively high nutrient loads, provide ideal conditions for algal blooms to develop in lakes, the spokesperson added.

"Work continues across Manitoba to reduce excess nutrient loading that contributes to algal blooms," he said.

Information about the province's actions can be found online in its Water Management Strategy.

On Saturday, Sept. 30, Gimli residents were dismayed to find their harbour inundated with algae.

A Gimli resident posted on social media that he could also see dead fish in the harbour. He wrote that it's "very disturbing" and is wondering what the authorities are doing about

Another Gimli resident shared photos with the *Express* showing a "super nasty" and smelly algal bloom carpeting the harbour and engulfing the

Case IH recently released the Case IH 715 Quadtrac. Rated for 715 horsepower with a power boost of 778 horsepower, the new Steiger 715 is the

company's — and Canada's — most powerful tractor yet.

Leo's Sales & Service was able to secure the tractor for a couple weeks starting Sept. 12, and in the time it was here, they got it in the field and had local farmers get behind the wheel.

of 22,250 pounds.

Austin Adair netted Arborg's lone goal in the second period.


Lundar netminder Kennedy Kerr made 26 saves for the win.

The win over Souris was a convincing one.



Local horse crowned grand champion at national show

Theresa Barylski and her star horse Gator (Only Shy Rad) were recently crowned the Grand Champion at the Canadian National Quarter Horse Show in Red Deer, Alta.

Barylski grew up on a horse ranch near Eriksdale. She moved to Carman in 2010 and has been in town ever since. Her parents, Kelly and Ruby Stuart, own and operate K & R Stuart Quarter Horses.

"Our farm specializes in purebred registered American Quarter Horses or AQHA (American Quarter Horse Association) horses," said Barylski. "This is the horse breed you see on most farms, in the movies and on shows like *Yellowstone*. AQHA head-quarters is based out of Amarillo, Texas. My parents have been on the AQHA leading breeders list of Performance and Halter horses five times and have been the AQHA high point Canadian Breeder three times."

Gator "Only Shy Rad" is a six-yearold horse that shows and competes at AQHA-sanctioned shows. This means the breed sanctions the judges, and the achievements or points earned at these shows go on Gator's permanent pedigree or registration record.

Gator is his stable name, and Only Shy Rad is his registered name. If anyone wanted to look up his pedigree or show record, they would have to use Only Shy Rad.

"The name is chosen from his bloodline," said Barylski. "We try and use names of accomplished bloodlines in his name."

Barylski is considered an amateur or non-pro as she doesn't train outside horses. She rides her own horses that come from her parent's operation.

Barylski has both a coach and trainer that help her and Gator perform at the highest level. Until this show season,

the pair were under the guidance of Dale Barkman of Alidale Farms in Steinbach. Currently, they are under the guidance of Deserie Rieu Bitz of Bentley, Alta.

At the end of August, Barylski and Gator recently competed at the Canadian National Quarter Horse Show in Red Deer, Alta. It was a five-day show with five judges from the United States.

Gator was entered in the Open (pro) performance event, and he was the unanimous first-place choice from all five judges. He was then brought back for the Grand and Reserve event, and again, he was the unanimous Grand Champion under all five judges.

When it was all said and done, Gator won Grand Champion of the show under all five judges.

But it wasn't over yet. At the show's end, they called her back into the ring because any horse that went Grand Champion under any of the judges can compete for the Canadian Na-

tional Quarter Horse Superior Halter champion.

Gator "Only Shy Rad" was eventually crowned the champion of the entire show.

"I still cry when I think about it, as it was an amazing moment," said Barylski. "It's a moment you dream of. What was even better was my parents drove to Red Deer for the day, and they were there to see it all. I was so happy for them. They work hard, and I'm so proud of them, so I'm unbelievably happy to have shared that day with them."

Gator was also named the Canadian National Show High Point Canadian Bred Horse.

"It's a testament to my parents' equine program. It was an unbelievable five days. Gator won every class he entered that day. I don't know if that happens very often at the National Show, but I know I'll never for-

get it."

Barylski and Gator have travelled all over Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta for shows this season. Gator has also qualified for the World AQHA Show in November, which is to be held in Oklahoma City, Okla.

The 2024 show season will start in March, with the first show in Scottsdale, Ariz., called the Sun Circuit. After that, they will participate in the Level 1 Championship in Las Vegas, Nev., in May.

Barylski is proud to represent and bring attention to the AQHA industry within Manitoba and nationally.

"We have great horses in Canada. You don't have to go far to find them," said Barylski. "It really takes a village to get a horse to this level. And I couldn't have done any of this without my support group and loved ones."



 ii) If the purchase price is greater than \$10,000, the purchaser must provide a non-refundable deposit in the amount of \$10,000 and the balance of the purchase price must be paid within 20 days of the sale; AND
 - iii) A fee in the amount \$498.75 (\$475 + GST) for preparation of the transfer of title documents. The purchaser will be responsible for registering the transfer of title documer in the land titles office, including the registration costs
- The risk for the property lies with the purchaser immediately following the auction
- The purchaser is responsible for obtaining vacant possession


