Gimli residents find 3,500-4,500-year-old arrowhead on Lake Winnipeg beach

A stroll along Lake Winnipeg a few weeks ago resulted in an historic find for residents living in the area near the Gimli Bible Camp, north of Gimli.

Leah Freyer and her son Louw were strolling along the shore when Louw spotted something unusual lying on the beach.

"We go for beach walks all the time and we find glass and lucky stones, but this is the first time we found something of this calibre," said Freyer. "We thought it was so cool. And it turned out to be very, very old. We thought it was just a couple hundred years old but it's thousands of years old."

At first Louw thought the arrowhead was a piece of beach glass, she said, but when they studied it closely, they could see that it was "actually made by someone."

"When we got home, we Googled it and I sent a picture and some details to the Manitoba Museum and then they got back to me with information," said Freyer.

The Manitoba Museum's curator of archaeology Kevin Brownlee told Freyer that what Louw found is a projectile point. He thinks the point would have been attached to a dart used with an atlatl for hunting.

An atlatl is a wooden shaft used by

Indigenous people to propel a spear or a dart several hundred feet.


Brownlee also told her the point appears to be made from a stone called Knife River Flint, a prized stone quarried in western North Dakota along the Knife River. Many tools in Manitoba were made with this stone, which was distributed through trading. And based on the point type, he estimates it is between 3,500 and 4,500 years old.

Freyer said they're going to get a shadow box — a frame with a protec-

tive front used for displaying objects — for the arrowhead. "We keep going for beach walks and haven't found anything like it since," said Freyer. "But our eyes are peeled for it!"

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Manitobans remain Canada's best recyclers

As our world leans closer to a climate crisis that continues to escalate, simple things like recycling is now more important than ever.

Recycle Everywhere recently announced that in 2021, 72 per cent of all eligible beverage containers in the Canadian Beverage Container Recycling Association (CBCRA) program and 80 per cent of all PET plastic beverage containers sold in Manitoba were recovered.

With that said, Manitoba continues to be one of Canada's best recyclers, and in our current state, that is something to be proud of.

Even more, the Interlake has played a significant role when it comes to recycling in our province.

While regional recycling recovery rates are not available, the CBCRA's Interlake program and outreach initiatives have supported an increase in recycling coming from the region. Across all jurisdictions, it's very difficult to track materials by region as there are legislative requirements that all beverage producers follow, and it requires them to report aggregate numbers and not regionally specific ones. Unlike Europe where they use UPC tracking codes, beverage container tracking isn't available in North America, said Sheri Moerkerk, the director of marketing and communications at CBCRA.

CBCRA is a not-for-profit, industryfunded organization that implemented and operates the Recycle Everywhere program. Their membership includes beverage brand owners and distributors. Their goal is to educate Manitobans on the recycling of beverage containers and to ensure the convenience of recycling empty beverage containers no matter where they live, work or play.



The premier and her ministers were interested in "what our chamber of commerce is doing to help our Ukrainian newcomers," said Specula on the chamber's Facebook page. "We toured the dormitory and had some great discussions. Thanks so much for coming."

A spokesperson for agriculture

minister Derek Johnson said the Conservative caucus was in Gimli for meetings, and while in town several MLAs and cabinet ministers visited the dormitory to see how the new Ukrainian residents are doing.

"It was a great opportunity to see first-hand how people who have come from such horrible cir-

Barbecued Whole Turkey with Paprika & Parsley Rub

Manitoba Raised Whole Turkey
 1/4 cup (65 ml) olive oil
 2 Tbsp (30 ml) garlic, chopped
 2 Tbsp (30 ml) smoked paprika
 1/2 cup (125 ml) Italian parsley, chopped
 1/2 tsp (2.5 ml) black pepper
 1/2 tsp (2.5 ml) sea salt
 *Do not stuff a barbecued whole turkey.

Preheat BBQ to 350°F (180°C). Remove neck and giblets from turkey. Pat dry with paper towel. Combine all other ingredients and coat turkey. Place turkey in a shallow pan and grill on gas/propane BBQ over indirect heat. Keep BBQ covered while cooking. A meat thermometer should read 170°F (77°C) inside the inner thigh, away from the bone, when fully cooked.

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IERHA shares year's highlights at AGM

Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority representatives shared highlights of the past year at the RHA's recent annual general meeting, while also taking time to acknowledge the impacts of COVID in the Interlake and beyond.

The virtual meeting took place Monday, Oct. 3 with more than 96 participants from across the region joining online and by phone. Robert Maytwayashing, Interlake-Eastern RHA's Indigenous human resources development officer and an Anishinaabe Knowledge Keeper, opened the meeting with a prayer.

CEO Marion Ellis pointed out a number of unplanned influences on health care that needed to be considered for health-care delivery. These influences include increased staff vacancy rates and staff who needed to miss work after testing positive for COVID.

"Our staff have seen us all through a global pandemic and the conflicting demands it presented personally and professionally. Staff vacancies are additionally challenging for a workforce that is stretched thin," she said.

On the flipside, Ellis acknowledged the staff members whose commitment to their work and their communities have maintained delivery of health-care services through challenging times.

She also said the regional health authority has greatly benefited from community members who value the people in health care and the health services being delivered. Through the global pandemic — as well as other challenges such as flooding, grass fires and snow storms — elected leaders and community members have done all they can to protect the welfare of patients and residents and to ensure health-care providers can continue delivering care.

Glen West, chair of IERHA's board of directors, also shared gratitude for the community's support for staff and physicians, particularly at the start of the pandemic when there were so many unknowns.

"Care for the caregivers has always been a hallmark of life in rural Manitoba, and we thank you for continuing to lift the spirits of health-care workers," West said. "You were there cheering us on during a very difficult time in health care."

On behalf of the board, West extended condolences to the region's residents who lost loved ones during the pandemic. At the same time, he also acknowledged the hard work of health-care workers who answered the call to support the pandemic re-

sponse.

"So many of us were unable to memorialize people in traditional ways of mourning given the restrictions in place at the time. Over 2,000 Manitobans have lost their lives to COV-ID-19," he said.

"Each and every individual in health care played a role in getting us through the pandemic. And, to the best of their ability, these healthcare workers continued to deliver the health-care services we needed. Our staff have continued to make care for patients, residents and clients a priority, regardless of the challenges that COVID-19 presented. For that, we will be eternally grateful."

He noted that COVID testing sites wrapped up in Eriksdale and Powerview-Pine Falls in March 2022, followed by the Selkirk testing site in April.

^{*i*}The vaccination sites in Selkirk and Gimli both opened and closed over the past year. Almost 150,000 immunizations were delivered at the Selkirk supersite," he said.

"At peak, the site was delivering 1,400 immunizations daily. The Gimli supersite provided almost 13,000 immunizations with a capacity of up to 400 immunizations a day."

In addition, West noted that IERHA introduced a new strategic plan in

2021 through collaborative efforts with stakeholders and staff. The plan features six strategic goals — integrated and co-ordinated health care, primary and community care transformation, Indigenous and vulnerable populations, mental health and addictions, health human resources, and innovation and technology.

Each goal has its own strategic steering committee made up of board members, IERHA representatives and community members. Anyone interested in participating can fill out a strategic steering committee application form at www.ierha.ca under "Publications & Reports" and "Strategic Plan."

Other opportunities exist for community members to contribute through local health involvement groups, which provide assistance, advice and information to the board. To get involved, visit ierha.ca, click on "Community Involvement" and then "Local Health Involvement Groups."

One of the things that are more challenging when it comes to recycling is the availability of recycling bins for people, in areas that are more sparsely populated like the Interlake and more remote communities in Northern Manitoba, it is harder to place recycling infrastructure.

Moerkerk said they have been working with these communities to ensure that there is recycling infrastructure and also distributing recycling bins to single and multifamily dwelling homes.

Within the next few months, Stonewall and Selkirk will be receiving some of these recycling bins.

The CBCRA has implemented recycling super depots through their collaboration with Manitoba Provincial Parks.

A super depot is a centralized location where there are both waste and recycling bins for communities to deposit their waste and recyclables.

Within the Interlake, they are working on the development of a super depot for Grindstone Provincial Park.

The CBCRA is all working directly with private campgrounds and RV parks to implement recycling programs, which has greatly increased the recovery rates of beverage containers.

An ongoing challenge in the Interlake when it comes to recycling is the contamination of recyclables, which means non-accepted items are being placed in recycling bins, said Moerkerk.

To address this issue, the CBCRA is working closely with municipalities through the development of programs,

awareness and educational signage.

For example, every dwelling bin that is distributed to homes in the community includes educational pieces, such as postcards, and visual images of what is recyclable, what is contamination and what isn't. People are also sent out into communities to audit recycling bins to see what types of items are most problematic.

These initiatives help keep the community clean, said Moerkerk.

Other stakeholders that help keep these initiatives running in conjunction with the CBCRA are Multi-Material Stewardship Manitoba (MMSM) to help with at-home recycling collection and sorting and collection services such as GFL.

"CBCRA takes pride in its hands-on and collaborative initiatives, such as those in the Interlake region, to help achieve the government-mandated target of recovering 75 per cent of beverage containers sold in Manitoba," said Moerkerk.



All in all, they work together with municipalities to make sure that they are tailoring supports and programs that meet the needs of various areas, as all areas have different needs that need to be met when it comes to recycling.

Wastewater surveillance data continue to show an increase in COVID. Data for the city of Winnipeg as of Sept. 15 indicated "ongoing activity" and an "increase in activity level since early September has been observed."

The government used to provide a list of current and historical COVID outbreaks in facilities such as hospitals and personal care homes, but it stopped providing that in Week 37. Other health news:

The Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority's medical officer of health announced Sept. 26 that the COVID outbreak at Stonewall hospital is over.

"Visitation has resumed within existing infection prevention and control protocols," said an IERHA spokesperson.

COVID outbreaks continue at the Ashern Personal Care Home, Tudor House PCH in Selkirk and the Teulon hospital (as of Oct 1).

- Health Canada issued a warning last month about certain hand sanitizers that could pose health risks.

The health agency is asking consumers to stop using the affected products, consult a health-care professional if they've used any of the products

and have health concerns, and report adverse events to Health Canada.

Some sanitizers contain impurities such as benzene or methanol or acetaldehyde at elevated levels, have undeclared ingredients such as benzalkonium chloride, have insufficient quality oversight or lack risk statements.

The latest affected product (Sept. 12) is Zero Tolerance Plus Sanitizer, which contains benzene at elevated levels. The company that makes it, Beauty in Bulk, had its licence suspended by Health Canada, according to the agency's Recalls and Safety Alerts webpage.

Other sanitizers added to the list in July by Health Canada include Davey's Hand Sanitizer, Davey's Sanitizing Hand Wipes and Hand Sanitizing Wipes, all from Up On Me Imports, and Nomad Hand Sanitizer Jasmine, Nomad Hand Sanitizer Lemongrass, Nomad Hand Sanitizer Scent Free, Nomad Hand Sanitizer Summertime and Nomad Hand Sanitizer Winter Cheer, all from Rocky Mountain Soap Company.

Maintenance work underway on Highway 6

Maintenance work is underway to shoulders in certain locations along Provincial Trunk Highway 6.

Manitoba Transportation and Infrastructure (MTI) began maintenance on shoulders two weeks ago to eliminate drop-offs. This work is expected to be completed in early October.

An MTI spokesperson said the department's regional office has recently received a couple complaints about the condition of the shoulders on the stretch of highway south of Lundar.

"The department always advises to adjust driving to the existing road conditions," the spokesperson said.

"MTI will also continue to monitor, perform regular maintenance and undertake repairs as needed."

PTH 6 is approximately 732 kilometres in length and extends from Winnipeg at the Perimeter Highway to Thompson, the spokesperson added.

"This route is an important transportation corridor for the movement of people and goods that links northern and southern Manitoba," the spokesperson said.

"MTI is committed to improving road safety on PTH 6 and has invested in active and planned projects that include bituminous rehabilitation."

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

Efficiency Manitoba launches deep energy retrofit offers for homes and businesses

Efficiency Manitoba is now offering two new programs for Manitobans who carry out extensive renovation projects that significantly reduce their energy use. Through Home Energy Retrofits and the Commercial Deep Energy Retrofit Program, homeowners and businesses can receive rebates when they plan and complete multiple energy-saving upgrades that result in substantial electricity and/ or natural gas savings — often called "deep energy retrofits."

Efficiency Manitoba's Home Energy Retrofits offers homeowners a rebate of \$75 to \$150 per gigajoule (GJ) saved as a result of the renovation. Businesses that participate in the Commercial Deep Energy Retrofit Program may be eligible for a rebate of up to \$12,000 for energy modelling as well as an incentive of up to \$6 per square foot for achieved energy savings. While there will be significant variation in projects under these programs, a typical Home Energy Retrofit project could see an incentive between approximately \$10,000 and \$15,000, while a typical Commercial Deep Energy Retrofit project could see an incentive of approximately \$240,000 to \$600,000.

'We are pleased to see Efficiency Manitoba continually launch new programs to support the diverse needs of Manitobans as they relate to energy efficiency," said Minister of Environment, Climate and Parks and Minister responsible for Efficiency Manitoba Jeff Wharton. "The rebates and assistance provided by their deep energy retrofit programs helps make large renovation projects more affordable and accessible to Manitoba homes and businesses, while also stimulating job growth in the energy efficiency industry to provide support services for these types of projects."

Deep energy retrofits often involve major upgrades to building envelope components of an existing home or building. These upgrades include adding insulation, undertaking detailed air sealing measures and installing high-performance windows and doors. Many projects also involve replacing or upgrading heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) systems or adding renewables like solar photovoltaic panels.

Home Energy Retrofits requires participants to have an EnerGuide evaluation performed on their home by a Registered Energy Advisor, who will identify and recommend upgrades to maximize energy savings, home comfort, indoor air quality and resilience. Completing the recommended upgrades can result in energy use reductions between 50 to 100 per cent. Efficiency Manitoba's rebates can also be stacked with the Canada Greener Homes Grant, Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation's Eco Plus program, and other sources of funding and financing to lower the upfront cost of the retrofit project.

With the support of a design professional of their choosing, businesses going through Efficiency Manitoba's Commercial Deep Energy Retrofit Program will have their entire building's energy use analyzed with energy modelling software. Energy efficiency enhancements would then be designed specifically for that building to reduce its overall annual energy use by a minimum of 20 per cent upon completing the whole-building renovation. "Offering programs and rebates for deep energy retrofits is a great way to encourage Manitobans to take a holistic approach and major steps forward on energy efficiency," said Colleen Kuruluk, chief executive officer of Efficiency Manitoba.

"It's estimated that approximately 70 per cent of existing buildings will still be in active use by 2050, so it's vital that we take significant action on existing building stock to contribute to energy use reductions in Manitoba.

"If a homeowner or business owner is looking to significantly reduce their energy use, the technical support and financial incentives we provide ensure they're able to do so at a reduced cost in a single project. We're committed to making energy efficiency upgrades easier and more affordable for all Manitobans, and these two new programs will contribute to this commitment."

Imagine living and working at Disney World, the entertainment resort complex in Florida covering nearly 25,000 acres and operating theme parks, Disney's Animal Kingdom, water parks, Disney's Typhoon Lagoon and 31 themed resort hotels, nine non-Disney hotels, several golf courses, a camping resort and an outdoor shopping centre.

For many, it's only a dream, but for Balmoral's Robyn Thoresby, it was her reality for two months this past summer.

Thoresby has always loved Disney. Ever since she was young, it was always her birthday wish — she always wanted to go, she said.

Her wish finally came true for her 12th birthday, and she got to go with her family. She became curious about how things ran there and how everything worked.

"I've always wanted to work at Disney World. It was always a little kid dream of mine that I never really thought was going to happen, and then when this opportunity came up, I thought, 'Well, I have to at least try and apply and try and go for it or else I'll be mad at myself forever.'... It was a lot of hoping. It was always something I wanted to do. I just never thought I'd get the chance to," said Thoresby.

The Disney Cultural Exchange Program allows post-secondary students and recent graduates to spend their break from school, working at Walt Disney World Resort. Through this program, participants get the chance to experience different cultures worldwide, connect with professionals from the industry, and build rela-

tionships that will last them a lifetime.

Thoresby's cousin had applied for a job at Disney, and that's how she found out it was even an option, for Canadians to work in Disney World. From that point on, she was hooked.

This year was the first time the program was available since COVID-19, and as soon as Thoresby received the notification it was up and running again, she decided to apply.

Thoresby recently graduated from the University of Manitoba in June with a bachelor of arts degree with a major in sociology and a minor in women's and gender studies.

"It felt like my one shot to try it," said Thoresby.

She said it was a quick and easy process from the moment she applied for the program online on the Disney careers website.

Thoresby applied for the program on the Disney careers website at the beginning of April and went through an information session and an interview. Within less than two weeks, she was accepted into the program.

"I was super nervous to tell anybody I applied because I didn't want to get my hopes up with it," said Thoresby. When Thoresby got an email on Monday morning that she got into the program, she remembers happy

her mom.

From June 20 to Aug. 25, Thoresby embarked on her adventure and dream of a lifetime.

There was a lot to do, from signing lots of paperwork to packing her bags for two months away from home after she accepted the job.

Going to Disney was Thoresby's first time on an airplane and first time travelling alone at all.

"It felt like a really big deal for me," she said.

Though her family had free complimentary tickets, which were included as part of the program, they didn't get a chance to visit, but her family sent care packages with Canadian snacks.

"Everyone on the Disney side of things was super helpful and quick to respond whenever you had questions — they wanted to help you along," she said.

To get the lay of the land before she started working, she arrived a few days before the program start date, on June 17.

She stayed in Flamingo Crossings Villages, which is where housing is provided for all international and college programs, and she shared an apartment with other girls in the program.

Before she went down there, she found out she was going to be in mer-

chandise in Star Wars: Galaxy's Edge, where she would be paid \$15 an hour Canadian and working a minimum of 30 hours a week.

"It was kind of exciting and a little bit nerveracking because I didn't know much about Star Wars," said Thoresby.

The first few days of training took place at Flamingo Crossing Villages, and they were focused on the Disney standards and the five keys of service. Star Wars: Galaxy's Edge was considered a specialized location, so they required special training like learning the history and lore of the land and how it tied in with the existing Star Wars films and characters. There was also lingo they had to learn, like how to say hello and goodbye in that land, and they called guests "travellers" or "off worlders."

Thoresby also took a "Live your story" class where they built backstories for themselves and learned about how to get into their characters. She was also trained to build personalized droids and she sold lightsabres. To get into her character that lived on that planet, she had a special nametag and a costume to match.

Other training included learning the standard merchandising protocols, such as working the cash register and stocking.

When she wasn't working, Thoresby was at the park almost every day, experiencing everything it had to offer for free — another perk of being a part of the program.

Throughout this program, Thoresby experienced a lot of changes, giving her newfound independence and confidence, meeting new people and stepping outside her comfort zone within her workplace.

"It was so fun. There's so much I feel I got out of it — I met so many great people. It was such a good summer. I couldn't recommend it enough to anyone who wants to do it. It was such a good time," said Thoresby.

A majority of Gimli council approved a new rental housing development on Centre Avenue West, which runs west of Highway 9.

A company called 10037208 Manitoba Limited wants to build 30 residential units consisting of three eightplex units and one six-plex unit.

"The units will be designed for long term rental with multi year leases," wrote Joey Werbicki and Chad Palsson in their proposal to council. "The units will all be 1,100 square feet of livable space along with a finished attached garage. All units will be single story."

Seventeen residents who live either on Centre Avenue West or Autumnwood Road provided a joint statement opposing the development.

"As property owners in the RM of Gimli, we know development is inevitable and we welcome well planned and designed development. However, we have serious concerns about the proposal before us," they wrote. "We feel that a development of this density is inconsistent with the neighbourhood and that the development of private homes, one on each of the six 1/2 acre lots, is more in keeping with the esthetics and suggested use of this land."

In addition to concerns about density, the residents said they have concerns with parking, particularly on a street that is "insufficiently wide" and will be too narrow for emergency vehicles, moving vans, delivery trucks, graders, loaders and garbage trucks. The development will also have no sidewalks and no greenspace, and it's unclear whether fencing will be erected. Rental housing could devalue single-family homes.

"Property values — a real estate agent has suggested that rentals may deflate the property values therefore we feel that a development of this density would have a negative impact on the area," the residents wrote.

Mayor Lynn Greenberg and Coun. Peter Holfeuer voted against the development during council's regular meeting on Sept. 28 while councillors Thora Palson, Richard Petrowski and Cody Magnusson voted in favour of it.

Greenberg said he welcomes new development, but the proposal wasn't a good fit for the acreage.

"I want this new housing development, but there are too many units for the size of the lot. I'm all for development, but this proposal would need to be smaller," said Greenberg a day after the meeting.

Previous councils had discussed the issue of having developers build side-

walks wherever new housing is built. A lack of sidewalks in the Vesturland subdivision just north of Centre Street West, for example, was built without sidewalks, forcing residents and children to walk on the road with traffic.

Greenberg said sidewalks weren't discussed with regard to the new multi-family complex.

Other council news:

- Council approved a massage therapy business that will be operated in a residential neighbourhood in Silver Harbour.

Jennifer Desrosiers, who says she has been a licensed and insured member of the Massage Therapy Association of Manitoba for 13 years, asked council for permission to set up a massage therapy business in a structure she proposes to build on her property.

"Considering concerns from neighbours, I propose to construct the new building facility behind our existing detached garage in compliance with all applicable building codes and bylaws," Desrosiers wrote in her proposal to council.

The building would not be visible from the front street and she will provide parking for patrons on her existing driveway.


Treatments will include myofascial and scar release, cupping massage, relaxation and craniosacral therapy, and Desrosiers said she proposes to be open year-round on three weekdays and Saturday, with a maximum of 20 single patient appointments a week.

A few residents objected to the proposal. They expressed concern with the operation of a standalone clinic in a "quiet residential environment," increased traffic on the street, potentially growing the business to become a multi-practitioner clinic and devaluation of neighbouring properties.

"The zoning for this neighbourhood and this property is residential resort, intended for single family residential use as described in Gimli Zoning By-law (4.2.2.) - not business," wrote one person in a letter to the Eastern Interlake Planning District. "People have chosen to live [in] this neighbourhood with that knowledge and with the expectation that the current zoning rules will be maintained and our quiet residential neighbourhood will continue to be quiet. By-laws are there to protect the environment, the residents and their investment."

Greenberg said he and council were unanimous in their support for the new business.

- Council heard a presentation from Odin Green residents who have concerns about the operation of an Airbnb in the residential subdivision

south of Gimli.

Airbnb is an online accommodation service that charges property owners advertise a property for rent. There a number of issues with Airbnb, including loud partying by guests, neighbouring property devaluation and the reduction of available housing for local people or for those who want to move to a community.

"The Airbnb issue will be carried over. The administration and a lawyer are checking into this. That will get worked on over the winter to get something in place for next spring," said Greenberg. "We're going to have to have some regulations put forward and enforcement."

- Council intends to beef up bylaw enforcement after it passed first reading of Bylaw No. 22-0013 to establish an administrative framework for by-

A pair of medical residents is embracing the opportunity to gain hands-on experience in rural medicine.

Dr. Luis Castro and Dr. Stewart Nadurak have embarked on a two-year residency through Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority's Family Medicine Residency Program.

Through this program, medical residents learn about the needs of rural patients as well as the opportunity to practise in a rural community after their training is complete. Residency is the final training stage for doctors after they graduate from medical school.

It's familiar territory for both Castro and Nadurak, since they both spent time in the region as medical students through the Home for the Summer program. Offered jointly by IERHA and Manitoba Healthcare Providers Network, the Home for the Summer program provides summer work placements for students pursuing a health-care career.

For Castro, he said it was a pleasure to complete his core rotation and Home for the Summer placement in Teulon. In addition, he spent a week in Beausejour and completed an elective in Selkirk. These positive local experiences helped shape his choice to return to the Interlake region for his medical residency.

"I have always felt welcome by the communities across the region, which made a tremendous impact on my decision," he said.

"The need for physicians and the ability to practise a wide scope made it a perfect choice. I am very happy with my decision."

Born in a small town in the Mexican desert, Castro grew up in Guadalajara and moved to Winnipeg in his teens.

"I have always been fascinated by the human body and mind and, as such, studied psychology and physiotherapy before realizing that my calling was in medicine," he said.

"Now, it's the connection with patients that fuels my passion."

When he's not busy pursuing his medical career, Castro enjoys spending time with his young family.

"I am a family man, which takes most of my leisure time," he said. "I like to take my two toddlers to parks and go for hikes with my wife. When there is time, I try to golf."

Looking ahead, Castro is considering his career aspirations for the future.

"I am generalist at heart. I hope to have a mixed practice of clinic and hospital work. My goal is to find a place in the region where I can achieve this and thus fill the needs of the community," he said.

"I am honoured to train in the region and look forward to contributing in any capacity that I can, both as a physician and society member."

For Nadurak, he hit a high note when his career path meandered from music to medicine.

"I grew up in a very musical household, which led me to pursue a bachelor's of music at the University of Manitoba in classical French horn performance. My combined interest in the sciences, with the desire for a career having the potential to make a profound impact on patients' lives while walking with them through some of the most vulnerable stages of life, drew me to pursue pre-med electives to prepare for applying to medicine while completing my music degree," said Nadurak, who grew up in North Kildonan.

"I ended up taking time to backpack around New Zealand for half a year, married my wonderful partner Laura, and also worked as a research co-ordinator at the Chronic Disease Innovation Centre out of Seven Oaks Hospital, working with patients on dialysis. I completed my MD training at the University of Manitoba between 2018 and 2022 and was fortunate to receive the news that I matched to the Interlake-Eastern region to pursue my dream of being a family physician, particularly in the rural setting."

It was a perfect fit for Nadurak, who said he's always been drawn to the Interlake and also enjoyed many summers at family cabins in the Whiteshell. Through the Home for the Summer program, he spent his first two summers of medical school in Pinawa and Beausejour.

"I had a great experience working with the docs in those areas and getting first-hand experience of the breadth of knowledge and variety of practice being a rural family physician entailed, which drew me in," Nadurak said.

"The Home for the Summer program definitely influenced me to apply to complete my residency training in the same region I'd already experienced and loved. Although not from the region, I spend lots of time in the region and have family who live in Selkirk so am familiar with the region and have a passion for spending time hiking and exploring the surrounding provincial parks."

Whenever he has a spare moment, Nadurak pursues a multitude of active hobbies, including hiking in Manitoba and beyond.

"Any chance Laura and I get, we love to travel. We've backpacked, hiked and road-tripped through South America, Spain and many parts of North America together. I have a passion for being outdoors in nature. I do a lot of canoe tripping in Nopiming, northwestern Ontario and the Whiteshell," he said.

"I love to backcountry hike and do multi-day hikes in the Rockies. This has led to a side interest of wilderness medicine and emergency management in low-resource settings. I also play on soccer teams, enjoy trail and long-distance running, and try to keep singing, playing the piano and horn when I can."

The future is bright for Nadurak, who is keeping his options open.

"While nothing is set in stone at this point, I hope to follow the pursuits of my teachers and mentors and be the classic rural generalist physician one who has a family clinic practice to follow patients long-term along with hospital and emergency department work," he said.

"I do hope to potentially continue work in the Interlake-Eastern region post-residency training, but we'll see where life takes me and opportunities arise."

To start their residency experience, both Nadurak and Castro will primarily be based out of Selkirk. In addition, they're looking forward to completing their family medicine rotation in a smaller community within the IERHA during their second year.

While Nadurak and Castro are embarking on the early stages of their residency experience, the Interlake-Eastern Family Medicine Residency Program also has two residents who are currently in their second year of the program.

Dr. Matthew Genung and Dr. Anita

Gray are the second-year family medicine residents in the Interlake-Eastern program, and they have already completed a number of rotations in Selkirk. They will both be spending time this year in Lac du Bonnet and at the Pinawa Hospital with Dr. Bruneau and his team.

"We are incredibly thankful to Dr. Bruneau in Lac du Bonnet for his commitment to helping train wellrounded rural family physicians. The input of Dr. Bruneau and his team has been invaluable in providing a strong residency experience for our learners. We know that this more rural experience has been a draw to those learners who are considering the Interlake-Eastern training program," said Dr. Ian Alexander, site lead for the residency program.

"We have also had a resident spend time in Gimli with Dr. Jonah Fulmore and look forward to engaging other communities in this important piece of our learners' training."

To date, the Interlake-Eastern Family Medicine Residency Program has trained and graduated four residents since the program launched in the region in 2019.

"We are excited to say that all of our graduates have been successful in completing their training and passing all their examinations. Three of our four graduates are working in the IERHA at this time — one in Selkirk, two in Oakbank," Alexander said.

"We also feel that the program is successful because we are a popular choice for graduating medical students from the University of Manitoba. This means that they want to spend time in the region and train in this area — and that's a good thing for providers, patients and communities."

After battling poor weather and the challenges posed by a broken driver on just the third hole, Nickie Cool was more than ready to call it a day and head back to the clubhouse at Teulon Golf & Country Club. Assured by her husband that the weather would soon improve, Nickie carried on, a decision that would prove vital in later efforts to save a fellow golfer's life. As Cool and her husband ap-

As Cool and her husband approached the sixth hole, they saw a commotion with a group of golfers at the thirteenth.

"It was difficult to see from so far away, but once we turned off the music playing on our portable speaker, we could hear someone yelling," said Cool, the nurse transition co-ordinator for the Manitoba Renal Program.

"I turned to my husband and said, 'Drive there now!'"

As their cart pulled up to the 13th hole, Cool could see a man laying down on the cart path. He had blue lips, and another man was blowing into his mouth. Cool recognized that her training and experience as a nurse were needed, and she quickly took charge.

"They weren't performing CPR, so I immediately checked for a pulse and then initiated CPR," said Cool. "I yelled at his friends to call 911 and told them to call the clubhouse to see if there was an automated external defibrillator (AED) available."

In Cool's day-to-day role with the Manitoba Renal Program, she coordinates patient movement, education and capacity for kidney disease patients across the province. To keep up her clinical skills and because she enjoys bedside nursing, Cool also maintains a casual nursing position at Seven Oaks General Hospital.

"I tried not to panic. In 20 years of nursing, I had never had to give compressions to a patient, but fortunately I had just completed a Code Blue refresher training in May."

Cool's quick thinking paid off.

There was an AED on site at the Teulon Golf & Country Club, but it had never needed to be used before the incident on July 10. Cool and her husband followed the instructions of the 911 operator, performing CPR while a golf course employee picked up the AED from the club and drove it out to the group.

Anyone can safely use an AED without training, according to guidance posted by the Province of Manitoba, as long as the user can read the AED's text and follow its voice-prompt instructions.

On that July day, the club employee closely followed the AED's instructions, lifting the man's shirt, placing the leads on his chest and waiting for

the machine to deliver an electrical shock to his heart.

"The AED got him back into rhythm and somewhat stabilized until the ambulance arrived," said Cool. "It was the shock of the AED that definitely saved him as we were having a heck of a time keeping him with just compressions."

Cool's golf course "patient" is a 57-year-old Filipino man (who has

asked to remain anonymous). He was participating in a casual golf tournament with his friends from the Filipino Golf Association. This was his third golf tournament of the year, and he expressed surprise that he was affected by cardiac arrest.

"My wife and I lead active lives," he said. "We've gone camping nine

law enforcement and a designated officer position to enforce municipal bylaws, the Municipal Act and permits, approvals, orders and agreements made or issued under the Municipal Act or the bylaws.

The RM already employs a bylaw officer.

"It's a bylaw to bring more authority to the bylaw officer," said Greenberg. "The administration is working on this. The next council will deal with it."

-Council gave first reading to Bylaw No. 22-0012 to establish an administrative penalty scheme for the enforcement of parking and other bylaw contraventions, and an adjudication scheme to review screening officer decisions.

Council would have to appoint by resolution one or more screening officers.

Parking infractions include angle parking, parking in a lane or at an entrance to a lane, parking on a sidewalk or boulevard, parking on the street for more than seven consecutive days, parking within 10 feet of an intersection, fire hydrant or crosswalk, parking in [others'] designated parking spots, parking a truck or truck trailer or semitrailer detached from the truck tractor on a road or street or public parking lot, and parking on private property.

- The Gimli Community Development Corporation (CDC) lost its new economic development officer Jennifer Rutkair, who had been hired earlier this year, after she took a position as accounts payable/payroll clerk with the municipality.

The CDC's mission is to promote and enhance economic development in the RM of Gimli.

The CDC, on which Greenberg and Councillor Richard Petrowski sit as vice-chair and chair respectively, also added Samantha Hampton as a board member at some point this summer.

Typically, recommendations to appoint members to boards — as well as the resignations of board members — come before council for approval.

The RM's chief administrative officer Kelly Cosgrove said the appointment has not been before council.

"To date, the appointment of the board member has not come before council," said Cosgrove.

Once the ambulance arrived, the patient's journey to recovery began, with a stop at the Stonewall and District Health Centre before being transferred to St. Boniface Hospital. Once stabilized, he received a triple cardiac bypass surgery and had an implantable cardioverter defibrillator (ICD) inserted. He is recovering and is grateful to all those involved in his care.

"I told Nickie, 'You're one of my guardian angels.' I am very blessed that she was there, and I am grateful that the golf course had an AED. After this experience, I think any business where you do a lot of physical activity should have one," he said.

Shawn Coe, director of golf at the Teulon Golf & Country Club, agrees. He is grateful the club purchased their AED in 2016, and after this experience, they have purchased a

"We had our AED in the clubhouse, and after this incident we saw that timing is everything and felt it would be better if we had an AED on the beverage cart, which drives around the golf course all day long," said Coe. While Coe hopes they never

have to use either AED again, he is comforted knowing they are available. Since the incident in July, many staff at the golf club have expressed an interest in learning CPR, so Coe is researching opportunities to have an annual CPR training day. If you or some-

one you know is interested in learning the life-saving skill of CPR, courses are offered by a variety of organizations including the Canadian Red Cross, St. John Ambulance and the Lifesaving Society Manitoba. Non-profit organizations in the community are benefitting from the provincial government's new Arts, Culture and Sport in the Community fund (ACSC).

These outlets are essential in the community, but sometimes the funds are unavailable to bring them to life.


This fund ensures that non-profit community organizations can thrive and provide creative, cultural and active spaces for everyone.

Pat Eyolfson, the co-chair of the Arborg and District Multicultural Heritage Village since its inception 23 years ago, stayed on the board to see the village she helped start come to fruition — and opportunities like these are exactly what she's stayed for.

"We were very excited to have this opportunity because for the last almost three years, we haven't been able to do any large fundraisers so we've had a lot of projects on the back burner, so this would be a huge help if we are successful," she said.

The fund will be distributed over three years, with up to \$100 million in funding supporting two overarching categories: small capital projects and special initiatives and community celebrations.

The first tier of the fund can receive requests for up to \$300,000. Projects can receive between 50 and 100 per cent of the eligible expenses, depending on the project's overall cost. This stream supports initiatives such as organizational development opportunities, training, technology, volunteer and



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equipment development, and others to enhance the organization's ability to increase participation and engagement within arts, culture or sports programs. The deadline to apply for this tier was Sept. 26, 2022.

The other funding category is community celebrations, which review requests up to \$5,000. This includes events, festivals and celebrations, both recurring and one-time events, that aim to promote cultural exchanges rooted in inclusion and belonging. This category has quarterly deadlines every three months, on the 15th of that month. The next deadline will be Dec. 15.

"It creates a feeling of excitement because there's this possibility that you can receive this funding and get these things accomplished that you maybe wouldn't have been able to get accomplished for several more years until you would fundraise enough money to complete that project. This encourages the community to act on things that they've wanted to do for years but they didn't have the funding," said Eyolfson.

Even though it's only the first year since the fund has been available, and they haven't been approved for it yet, Eyolfson knows it will make a difference if they receive it.

"It will enhance the community and make it a stronger community. And a lot of things that communities would like to do are larger in money so if you're able to get a portion of that money, then it's not as daunting a task to do something like that. I think it will create more tourism. Sports is also included in there, so a lot of



"I've got my fingers crossed for Nov. 11," she said. If the heritage village receives the funding, there are many things they'd like to do that the funding would make possible and would help them do in a shorter period.





What to do if a fire breaks out

It's impossible to predict when a fire will break out. Here are a few steps to take if you ever find yourself in a fire.

• Head for the exit. Get away from the fire immediately. If you're at home, follow your evacuation plan. If you're in a public place, go to the nearest emergency exit and move away from the building. If it's safe to do so, activate the alarm system.

• Don't stop. Fires spread very quickly and can burn through an entire room in less than three minutes. Don't attempt to retrieve your belongings, and don't linger.

• Correct your route. If the room is full of smoke, get low to the ground and crawl under it. Inspect any doors before opening them. Start by checking to see if the door or door handle is hot. If it is, find another way in. If not, open the door slowly and ensure the space is safe before going inside. Never use the elevator.

• Think about your safety. If you can't reach an exit, stay where you are and close the doors. If possible, place a damp towel at the base of the door to block out smoke. Contact the fire department and announce your presence by waving a light or brightly co-loured cloth through a window.

Fire prevention tools like smoke alarms, portable fire extinguishers and evacuation plans can minimize the danger when a fire breaks out. Make sure to follow the recommendations of your local fire department.

Is there a beep or a chirp coming out of your smoke or carbon monoxide alarm? What does it all mean? Knowing the difference can save you, your home, and your family! Make sure everyone in the home understands the sounds of the smoke and carbon monoxide alarms and knows how to respond. Learn the sounds of your smoke and carbon monoxide alarms by checking the user guide or search the brand and model online.

What is your alarm telling you?

SMOKE ALARMS

- A continued set of three loud beeps—beep, beep, beep—means smoke or fire. Get out, call **9-1-1**, and stay out.
- A single "chirp" every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be changed.
- All smoke alarms must be replaced after 10 years.
- Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.

CARBON MONOXIDE (CO) ALARMS

- A continuous set of four loud beeps—beep, beep, beep, beep, beep—means carbon monoxide is present in your home. Go outside, call **9-1-1** and stay out.
- A single chirp every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be replaced.
- CO alarms also have "end of life" sounds that vary by manufacturer. This means it's time to get a new CO alarm.
- Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.

Select Canadians received a Queen Elizabeth II Platinum Jubilee Medal and certificate to honour their service and contributions to their communities.

Among the Manitoban recipients was Gimli resident Tammy Axelsson, who was recognized last week for her service to the Icelandic community and the consular corps.

Axelsson, who is an honorary consul for Iceland, received the medal from Lt.-Gov. Janice Filmon and Manitoba Premier Heather Stefanson on Sept. 26 during a special presentation at Government House, the residence of Manitoba's lieutenant governors.

"It's very humbling to receive this medal and I'm very honoured. It makes me very proud. I do love my community and always have," said Axelsson by phone. "But there are so many others who make our community what it is, and I always appreciate working with them. You can't do things without working with great people, and Gimli has a whole lot of great people who make things happen here."

Axelsson said her medal came in recognition of her service to and involvement with the Icelandic community and for work with the consular corps.

Corps members act as a point of contact for foreign countries and familiarize their diplomats with local or regional social, cultural and economic matters.

The jubilee medal marks the 70th anniversary (in February) of Queen Elizabeth II on the throne. Recipients received a circular medal suspended from a ribbon and a certificate, according to the jubilee medal website. Criteria include people who have made a contribution to society either in Manitoba or Canada or to a particular region or community and demonstrated strong community-mindedness, service and reconciliation.

heat olive oil. Cook onions 1-2 minutes until translucent. Add mushrooms and ground beef. Cook about 5 minutes, or until beef is no longer pink. Stir in taco seasoning. Cook 2-3 minutes. Set aside.

Lay one large flour tortilla on flat surface. Spread 2 tablespoons mushroommeat mixture on center of tortilla.

Drizzle dollop of nacho cheese over mushroom-meat mixture. Top meat with one tostada shell then spread thin layer of sour cream over tostada shell.

Top with shredded lettuce, diced tomatoes and shredded Mexican cheese then one small tortilla. Make sure not to overstuff so wrap doesn't break apart while cooking.

Fold edges of large tortilla toward center until completely covered.

In hot skillet, generously spray with nonstick cooking spray. Carefully place wrap seam side down on skillet. Cook 2-3 minutes until golden brown.

Flip and cook other side until golden brown. Repeat with remaining mushroom-meat mixture, tortillas and toppings.

Cut wraps half and serve.

The mother-in-law question

Mothers in law are often maligned. Most of these women are genuinely concerned about their children and are really well-meaning. When children marry, it can be an awkward time for parents as they try to redefine their role in their children's lives. They often get mixed messages: children may, on the one hand project that they want help (e.g., financial, or with babysitting or fixing things), but other times be offended by help freely given (i.e., advice). Parents may often feel like they are walking on eggshells, wanting to be seen as neither as intrusive, nor neglectful.

No matter how you look at it though, a mother who as spent 18+ years raising a child, wants to be important in his/her life. But the child has his/her own home now and doesn't need parents in the same way. The young couple want to create their own lives, to make their own decisions, and may have two mothers and two fathers (or more if parents have remarried) coaching from the sidelines, all with different advice.

If parents are critical of a child's spouse, the spouse will pick up on that energy, and it may trigger memories of battles with parents during the teenage years. This in turn may bring out the rebellious side of the young person, setting the stage for more disharmony.

The key to healthy relationships with in-laws is to understand that once children are married, they don't need mothering. A mother

can be a friend, a coach, a bringer of support, but adult children do not want to be treated like children.

Recognize, in most cases, the good intent of the mother-in-law. You can let her advice float by if you don't need it. If she continues to push it, or to criticize, tell her gently that you want her friendship, but these behaviors may spoil that.

If you are the mother-in-law, ask the children to tell you honestly what kind of role they would like you to play in their adult lives. Do not expect to be treated in any certain way, for that would be getting into co-dependency and using guilt on them. If you expect that they will be with you every Christmas, or always take you to dinner on Mother's Day, and act hurt if they don't, you make them feel like it's a duty. This serves only to take the fun out of celebrations. Prepare to be flexible and not compete with your child's in-laws.

Count your blessings (they've left home!), let them know they have your love and support, be pleasant to be around, and don't take things too seriously or personally. If you are the child, try to see your in-laws through compassionate eyes, and treat them the way you will surely, one day, want to be treated. What goes around does, persistently, come around.

11/2 cups thawed mixed vegetables, drained

Season chicken with 1/8 teaspoon black pepper, garlic powder and onion powder. Cover and chill 2 hours, or overnight.

In saucepan over medium-high heat, heat oil. Add onion and celery; saute 2 minutes, or until tender-crisp. Add garlic and saute 30 seconds.

Add chicken and saute until browned. Stir in broth, potatoes, tomatoes, tomato paste, vinegar, jalapeno pepper, lemon juice, ginger, 1 teaspoon salt, thyme and bay leaf; heat to boil. Reduce heat. Cover and simmer 1 hour, or until potatoes are tender.

Stir in mixed vegetables and simmer 10 minutes. Remove and discard bay leaf. Season with additional salt and pepper, to taste.

Tips: Serve souse with griddled corn cakes and saltine crackers. Make vegetarian by replacing chicken with canned drained and rinsed black-eyed peas or red or white beans.




