Arborg's haunted hockey arena has organizers on edge

Candy donations welcome to help keep kids calm during Halloween event

There are troubling signs at the Arborg arena that the ghosts of defeated hockey teams past are preparing to throw down their gloves and stage an all-out haunting on Halloween in a bid to avenge their losses at the hands of Arborg's superior puckhandlers and netminders.

Arborg Collegiate's 2025 graduating class and the Arborg-Bifrost Parks & Recreation Commission thought it best to join forces to try to bring a measure of control to the impending pandemonium and keep the public – who will be invited to the spectre spectacle – safe during what will likely be a chilling experience.

ABPRC recreation director Tom Chwaliboga said the demons from defeated hockey teams first got together 35 years ago to bemoan their losses and sign a covenant requiring them to behave in a most shocking and unpleasant manner towards the supporters of Arborg hockey.

"It all started on Oct. 31, 1989. On that day, all the demons from neighbouring communities' hockey teams came out en masse and turned the Arborg & District Arena into a haunted place. And every year since, on Halloween night, these demons come out and try to avenge all the losses they've had at the expense of the Arborg Falcons hockey teams," said

Chwaliboga. "It is this one night that these demons – along with goblins, witches and zombies – walk through the arena in a trance and try to scare everyone. This is the reason why the arena doesn't open on Halloween night."

But this year the arena is throwing open its doors to the public. The grads and recreation staff have decided that the best way to deal with unruly hockey spirits is to make a collective stand against them. Hence the invitation to Arborg and area residents, and anyone else from away, to come out and help scare off the hotheads, said Chwaliboga.

The more people on hand to deal with the apparitions, the better as it's expected the arena will be operating with a skeleton crew; some staff members are so terrified of what could transpire on Halloween that they've refused to work.

"Recreation staff refuse to work on Halloween night because of all the stuff that happens, such as weird sounds, hockey sticks breaking for no reason and pucks flying. We can't see anyone shooting the pucks and we can't figure out who's responsible for the lights flickering on and off and the goal horn going on and off," said Chwaliboga.

Although the event is being billed as a "fun Halloween night," it remains to be seen whether the grads and arena staff will be able to allay public fears once the witching hour (in this case 3:30 p.m.) gets underway and the spectres start to emerge.

Arborg Collegiate's 2025 grad heads, their fundraising committee and other student volunteers are organizing and helping staff the event.

Madison Howell, one of the grad heads, said she and her mom were discussing possible events the

grads could hold to help them raise money for next year's graduation, and a haunted house was broached as one of The Arborg Collegiate graduating class is loooking for candy donations for our Halloween haunted house walk-through on the 31st. the ideas.

Howell then brought the ideas to her fellow grads and everyone liked the haunted house. When Chwaliboga found out the graduating class was planning to organize their own haunted house fundraiser on Halloween, he invited them to help sort out the arena's haunted hockey problem. Students are in the process of being recruited to dress up as Halloween characters to scare away the ghouls.

To tamp down the fear and provide a safe space for parents and their children, the grads have is-

Coalition to Save Lake Winnipeg asks citizens to report environmental breaches

In its September newsletter, the Coalition to Save Lake Winnipeg emphasized ongoing threats to the health of Lake Winnipeg, and it's asking residents to consider where other sources of pollution come from and take action when they suspect breaches of environmental law.

In addition to the City of Winnipeg's raw sewage spills that occur several times a year and its contribution to nutrient loading (phosphorus and nitrogen) from the North End Water Pollution Control Centre (NEWPCC) and other city wastewater plants, the coalition says there may be other sources responsible for the "sewage plumes," which commercial fishers and boaters report.

Given the long distance from Winnipeg's wastewater treatment plants, the time it takes for water to flow northwards through the lake and the time it takes for human feces to degrade, the coalition says local sources of contamination (i.e., wastewater systems around the south basin of the lake) rather than city wastewater plants may be responsible for the plumes and E.coli contamination of beaches.

"In the event a raw sewage plume was encountered near Hecla Island, for example, the notion that it could be attributed to Winnipeg, at the NEWPCC or a spill further upstream some 120 km away, fails the math test by a factor of 2-3 times," states the coalition in its newsletter.

The cause of the problem is "likely much closer" and can include sewage releases from local septic systems or municipal wastewater systems such as lagoons.

the fact that the city's north end sewage plant is a point source for phosphorus loading in the lake - phosphorus spurs on the development of algae which depletes oxygen - and that the city "routinely" releases untreated sewage into waterways such as the Red and Assiniboine rivers, whose combined flow heads north into Lake Winnipeg.

"Late spring 2024 visible debris and higher [E.coli] counts in Lake Winnipeg were reported. Weather conditions [heavy precipitation] resulting in the failure of the City of Winnipeg's combined sewage overflow fit the timeline in terms of news events," states CSLW's newsletter.

A 15-day raw sewage discharge by the city between Feb. 7 and Feb. 21 was described as "shocking," "horrific" and "disgusting" by those living in communities along the west shore of the lake's south basin. A city outfall at 3100 Abinojii Mikanah (formerly called Bishop Grandin) had discharged an estimated 228.39 million litres (or megalitres) of untreated

human waste and other hazardous substances into the Red River.

The city's latest raw sewage spill occurred on Oct. 14 and lasted for just over six hours, according to the city's webpage on sewage leaks. It resulted in .009 million litres of sewage flowing into the Seine River, a tributary of the Red River. There were four raw sewage discharges in September.

The coalition is made up of Lake Winnipeg south basin communities, individuals, municipalities and cottage associations on both sides of the lake.

The coalition encourages concerned citizens to "support compliant practices" and "report observed violations" of any wastewater management systems (including septic tanks) in their areas to the provincial Environmental Compliance and Enforcement branch in Winnipeg at (204) 794-1176 or email: OWMS@gov.mb.ca (no attachments). Access Credit Union donates \$50K to Ashern Wellness Centre

Access Credit Union has partnered with the Lakeshore Regional Wellness Commission (LRWC) on Ashern's new wellness centre.

With a \$50,000 donation, Access Credit Union is the newest sponsor for the Ashern Wellness Centre, which opened its top floor earlier this month. As part of the sponsorship, Access gets naming rights to the studio on the centre's upper level, called the Access Credit Union Studio.

After obtaining a temporary use permit for the upper level of the new centre, the Lakeshore Regional Wellness Commission (LRWC) opened the newly renovated top floor on Oct. 3 for the first time.

The new wellness centre is where the Ashern curling rink used to be, renovated and developed into a multifunctional centre for the community. The upstairs has been completely refinished and has a new bathroom, a walking track, and more.

The new wellness centre is also accessible and offers a shuffleboard court upstairs, which was the first thing to be used in the centre when

a local seniors' group came in on Thursday, Oct. 3. LRWC had coffee and snacks available for those who came to the soft opening. LRWC vice president Scott Cameron said the quiet event had a good turnout.

"At least now we can get them in and get using it," he said. "It's just a really good way for them to get moving, get active, be social, be together, and have conversations. It's a really exciting time for them because they have been patiently waiting. We were trying to get them in during construction but couldn't. We've all been looking forward to this."

The Access Credit Union Studio will be used for yoga, dance, meditation, and more. Shuffleboard will also take place in the studio until the field house is ready to open. LRWC Scott Cameron said the partnership will support the group's efforts by providing both funding and support.

"It is a very important partnership for us because it will provide a large amount of the resources needed to get the entire facility operational," said Cameron. "Access Credit Union has

sued the demons a proviso, stating they'll be confined to particular areas of the arena, and that any supporting players they manage to conjure up (e.g., witches, zombies, vampires, mummies and other ghastly characters) must abide by the rules.

"We'll have some ghosts and zombies on the ice and there will be theme rooms for witches and goblins and so forth. I think there's a possibility that we'll have student tour guides to lead groups through the theme rooms, which will be located in the changing rooms, the hallway and the players' box," said Howell. "We're also going to have two rooms dedicated to kids aged 5-10, with the scariness level toned down. This will be appropriate for early years children. And they'll have the option to move forward through the haunted arena if they choose to do so. If not, they can turn around after the second room and get their treat bags."

The students are involved in all facets of the event, including recruiting other students to play Halloween characters, making the decorations and preparing advertising posters. They're also hoping to get candy donations from the community ahead of time so that all kids get to go home with a treat bag.

Although the grads and arena staff would like to make the ghosts pay for their unruly behaviour (sadly, they've failed in the past to pin down the shape-shifting, slippery spectres), the burden of admission will, regrettably, fall on the public.

Students incur significant costs to take part in graduation, which will be even more expensive than usual in a time of high inflation.

Admission is yet to be determined. Visitors are also invited to bring a Tin for the Bin to help out families with the cost of food.



"This is a joint fundraiser between our grad committee and the recreation centre. The rec centre decided to do a Tin for the Bin fundraiser for families who are struggling to afford food. Visitors can bring canned goods or other non-perishable food items if they want; it's totally optional," said Howell. "We want to see as many people as possible come out to our haunted arena. I think it'll be really fun for the community. It will be fun for the kids especially on Halloween. This is something different we're trying, and it helps us raise money for our graduation."

The haunted hockey Halloween event takes place on Thursday, Oct. 31 from 3:30 – 9:00 p.m. at the Arborg & District Arena off Ingolfs Street.

Time to renew your mortgage – or is it?

When someone says the word "scam," a typical scenario comes to mind – a ploy to steal someone's personal or financial information without ever delivering the promised product or service. We often think about our grandparents picking up deceiving phone calls, or opening the spam emails we've received, getting caught up in shady interactions on online marketplaces or being drawn in by glitzy social media ads.

However, an emerging form of fraud reminds us that scams come in all forms – this time, disguised as renewal of your mortgage payments.

The Better Business Bureau has seen a slew of reports regarding mortgage renewal and warranty requests that may not meet the criteria of "scam" in its purest form. But they still dishonestly take money from their targets.

The scam begins when you receive a letter saying your mortgage must be renewed. It looks as though it is from your trusted mortgage provider, raising no red flags. Even if you don't think you're due for renewal, you are concerned enough to call the number at the bottom. But that number will not connect you to your mortgage lender.

From there, the person on the other end of the phone may employ a variety of tactics to get you to fork over your personal or credit card information. They may disguise it as standard policy or procedure, or even a security check. They may try to convince you that you must act now or face forfeiture. Due to the set-up, you may be inclined to get caught up in its web before you even realize what's going on. From your perspective, you received a letter from your provider, called them and are now following through on a necessary transaction.

If you look closely at the letter, though, you may notice, in tiny print at the bottom: "Not all consumers have previous coverage. We are not affiliated with your current mortgage."

This little blurb of honesty makes it different from most scams, which would never admit the truth, but it does not pass the test of honest advertising. You may get a mortgage warranty through this company but

you may not even know that's what you're signing up for. You may not even know the company's name. But you're now giving them \$200 a month for a warranty you don't truly understand

To avoid this scheme, always go to the source. If someone reaches out to you via phone, email or letter, independently verify the information. Call your mortgage provider using a number from previous correspondence or from their verified website to see if what you've received is real. Do not use the number on the letter.

Remember, any high-pressure sales tactics are usually a red flag, as are requests to provide financial information over the phone to someone you don't know. Hang up and do some more research on home warranties at bbb.org to protect yourself and your loved ones.

The Better Business Bureau is warning consumers to pay extra attention to any notifications you may receive regarding mortgage renewal. Be sure to read the fine print of any letters and call your mortage provider to double-check.



Fence required to open additional Ashern Daycare spots

In the past year, Ashern Daycare purchased a second building to add more school-aged childcare spots. The new building is located at 13 Main Street. Upon purchasing it in July 2023, the daycare worked tirelessly to renovate it before moving into it in March 2024.

The second building is used for school-aged children but sits empty during the day. The Ashern Daycare plans to add more preschool spots to its business, which will be added in the second building.

They can't just decide to take on more children, though. To add additional preschool spots, the daycare has to have an on-site fenced vard, which their newest building doesn't have. That means the daycare has to fence the 4,225 sq. ft. area behind the building to open more childcare

Daycare director Carly Emilson said they currently have a very long wait-

list of children — 32 names, to be exact, with most looking at September 2027 for getting into the daycare.

"Our community needs it," said Emilson. "We're the only licensed childcare in Ashern. We just had the hospital renovation so there's lots of newcomers to town that need childcare too."

The next closest licensed daycare to Ashern is in Eriksdale or Fisher Branch. Manitoba has 1,110 licensed childcare facilities, which are inspected regularly to ensure childcare standards are being met. The provincial government says licensed childcare settings give children playbased programs where they learn emotional, physical, and cognitive skills like communication, cooperation, cause and effect, self-regulation, coordination, prediction, and more. Each licensed childcare facility has minimum supervision standards, staff qualifications, space, equipment, health and safety, nutrition, programming, and behaviour management.

According to the Manitoba Child Care Association (MCCA), in June 2018, 16,605 children were on the online childcare registry waitlist. The provincial government retired that system in 2021, replacing it with the Manitoba Child Care Search program for licensed childcare, but even still, MCCA recommends parents register before their child's birth or one or two years in advance of their preferred enrollment date.

The daycare currently has 50 childcare spots for children 12 weeks to 12 years old. The main site has 24 preschool-aged spots, and eight more preschool spots would be added with the fence at their second site.

Emilson said they're still waiting on a couple of quotes for the project, but the fence materials will cost them around \$5,000, making the job close to \$10,000 when all is said and done. The daycare hopes they can get volunteers to build the fence, but they

aren't yet close to that stage of the project.

"Right now, we're just looking for donations and hoping that somebody will feel generous," said Emilson.

Every November, the daycare holds a fresh balsam wreath fundraiser. This year, they'll also have a meat and cheese fundraiser. In addition to those two, they hope to raise private donations from willing volunteers.

"We're hoping they'll support us because we're hoping to get more people to come work in town and to do that, they need to have childcare for their children," said Emilson.



New support group for widows starts in Gimli

Put on by the Interlake Women's Resource Centre (IWRC), counsellor Gloria Thomas will hold bi-weekly meetings for local widows. Thomas became a widow herself in June 2023 and struggled to find people who understood what she was going through.

"I realized that no one actually understand a widow like another widow," she said. "There are certain aspects to it people don't get unless they go through it. Sometimes people need that extra understanding to help get through a hard time."

As the seasons change, daylight becomes less and less, and the holidays loom nearer, Thomas felt now was the time to start the support group.

"It gets to a point where you shut down a little," she said. "And if you're a widow, it gets really easy to shut down. I want to help people not shut down."

According to Statistics Canada, as of 2022, there were around four million widows across Canada. The National Institute of Health found widowed people have a high prevalence of depression and anxiety, and The American Psychology Association found the

first year of widowhood is the most harmful to mental health.

IWRC director Jennifer Campbell said Thomas came to her with the idea of a widow's support group, and together, they were eager to get it going. Campbell said she wanted to allow Thomas to share her experience and resources with the community, so that's what IWRC did.

The support group started on Monday, Oct. 7, and will continue at the Gimli New Horizons Centre (17 Loni Beach Road) every two weeks. It runs from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. and is a safe, inclusive, open circle of sharing and listening.

"It's people sharing openly what they're going through and hearing from others going through the same thing," said Thomas. "My experience is that after a while, people think that you're OK and that's not often the case. People want you to be OK and stop talking about it. This group is so you can keep working through your stuff and don't have to burden anyone if you're still hurting."

Campbell said the group is an opportunity for widows not to be alone

and to feel a part of something when they may be feeling the lack of something.

"The loss of a partner changes your entire life, everything that you're used to," said Thomas. "And it's a huge loss because you've lost the life that

you knew, and you need to navigate this new life you didn't want. This can help people find their feet again and heal."

Canadian beef sector speaks out against Bill C-282

The Canadian beef sector is actively speaking out against federal Bill C-282.

The bill, brought forth by the Bloc Quebecois, essentially takes supply management off the negotiating table for future trade agreements. It first came to the House of Commons in 2021 and is now at consideration in committee in the Senate.

On Oct. 10, members of parliament (MPs) from four political parties (Liberal, Bloc Québécois, NDP, and Green parties) attended a rally on Parliament Hill in support of Bill C-282. Among the supporters was current and former federal Minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food, the Honourable Lawrence MacAulay — and the beef sector is speaking out.

In a joint news release on Oct. 11, the beef producer associations across Canada said the rally left many sectors, including theirs, "both surprised and disappointed." Organizations involved include the British Columbia Cattlemen's Association, the Saskatchewan Cattlemen's Association, Beef Farmers of Ontario, Nova Scotia Cattle Producers, Alberta Beef Producers, Manitoba Beef Producers, New Brunswick Cattle Producers, and Prince Edward Island Cattle

Producers. They went on to say it was "particularly disheartening" to see the minister take part in the public support of a bill that "seeks to undermine and threaten the interests of the majority of Canada's agri-food industry, as well as export-dependent sectors that fuel the Canadian economy."

Carson Callum, Manitoba Beef Producers general manager, said Bill C-282 is a huge concern for the beef sector as a "heavily reliant trade industry."

"When you're in those negotiations, it can be give or take," he said. "If we go into these negotiations knowing supply management can't be touched, we could see increased tariffs for cattle, live or beef product. We could see tax implications that can really impede our bottom line as an industry."

Callum said Bill C-282 puts one sector in front of the other, calling it bad trade policy. The bill protects supplymanaged agriculture sectors (like dairy, eggs, chicken, and turkey) from losing any more of their domestic market share to foreign competition, but it doesn't protect the other sectors.

"We understand that there's this major defence of the supply management system, but it shouldn't occur at the expense of trade and other sectors," said Callum.

Andre Steppler has one of the largest purebred Charolais herds in Canada. At the end of May, he and four other Manitoba producers were part of a delegation that went to Ottawa to share their views on the bill as Manitoba Beef Producers to senators and MPs. He said Bill C-282 scares him in the sense that it can tie hands at the negotiation table.

"If it's passed, it just takes away the ability for our trade negotiations to be achieved at their highest level," he said. 'When we go into negotiations and already on the table, this is not something we can open and put on the books, it puts you at a direct disadvantage immediately. You don't want to have cards against you when you're walking up to the table."

In short, if Bill C-282 is passed, it could mean worse trade deals for the sectors not protected by supply management. For beef producers like Steppler, that could mean lower cattle prices and less exports of beef overall.

In a letter from the Canadian Cattle Association in 2024 on Bill C-282, the organization said the average Canadian producer earns an additional \$1,158 per animal because of the ability to sell in international markets. 2022 was the seventh year in record value for beef and cattle exports.

The organization said for the industry to continue to grow and diversify, it needs improved market access through trade negotiations, which Bill C-282 takes away.

Canadian beef producers export approximately 50 percent of their products. In the news release, the beef sector said that though Canada is "uniquely positioned to meet rising global demand for protein," Bill C-282 threatens their export potential and relationships, especially with our critical trading partners like the USA.

"Ultimately, the unwavering defence of the supply management system, which is the root of Bill C-282, should not occur at the expense of all other trade and export dependent sectors of the Canadian economy," the news release said. "Other policy tools are available to mitigate future potential threats to the supply management system, without legislating the system's protection through a bill like C-282. Amending the Department of Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development Act would be an internationally unprecedented protectionist move. Future governments can and should keep all options on the table to support the most meaningful and robust trade agreements possible."

Given the importance of peat bogs to storing carbon, which when released contributes to the climate crisis, the coalition says residents and cottage owners in the Washow Bay area of Lake Winnipeg have reached out to the coalition with concerns about peat mining in their region and one peat mining operator's plan to establish a new peat mine at Sugar Creek, in the middle of a wildlife management area.

Washow Bay is on the west side of Lake Winnipeg, just north of Hecla Island, and encompasses Pine Dock, Little Deer, Beaver Creek and other small communities.

"Sungro is submitting environmental act proposals to establish new peat mines, one of which falls within a wildlife management area. Applications for these mines were approved by the provincial government with stricter license conditions, although the conditions have proven to be inadequate to counter the harm to the area currently being experienced," states the coalition in its newsletter. "We know that peat mines are a major source of carbon capture. The mines have caused huge buildups of peat along the shores of Lake Winnipeg and pollutants are entering the lake, which is no longer captured by the peat bogs."

the first phase of construction. The basement is being finished and should be open to the public soon. The completely renovated area includes the meeting room, change rooms, bathrooms, showers, and lockers. A boiler system is also being installed in the basement, which will be used to run in-floor heating for the field house level.

After that, Cameron said LRWC would turn their attention to the field house and prepare that space for public use. Currently, they're working on an accessible entry for that level and are completing the construction of a bathroom there.

Cameron said they anticipate the facility to be fully operational no later than the spring of 2025, but they expect the basement level to be open much sooner. The upstairs of the facility will remain open from now on.

"Once we are fully operational, the LRWC will continue the efforts in creating a state-ofthe-art wellness facility," he said. "There will be many upgrades and improvements necessary going forward, so we are always looking for additional partnerships with those that are able to

West Interlake encourages food waste reduction with FoodCycler pilot program

The rural municipality (RM) of West Interlake is looking at new ways to reduce local food waste.

Through the FoodCycler pilot program, the RM actively encourages residents to reduce food waste. The FoodCycler is a ""clean and convenient food

waste solution."" The indoor household food waste recycler is a cleaner, hassle-free alternative to composting. The countertop food recycler reduces food waste by up to 90 percent, reduces greenhouse gases by up to 95 percent, and reduces odours, leaving behind a dry, lightweight soil amendment to be used in numerous ways:

- Garden fertilizer
- Addition to compost
- Donate it
- Throw it away

There are three FoodCycler options, and the RM of West Interlake is pursuing two models: the ECO 3 (3.5-litre capacity) and the ECO 5 (five-litre capacity). The by-product it creates can be stored in a sealed container before being used. Mould indicates the by-product has begun to break down in the soil, which FoodCycle Science says is a good sign.

Clayton Gibson, Economic Development Officer with the RM of West Interlake, said they were ""amazed"" at the FoodCycler technology's technology's superiority to traditional outdoor composting devices.

""A major benefit of this program will be to help eliminate food waste from going into garbage bags and ending up in the landfill so we are hopeful that this program will help both residents and commercial restaurants to reduce food waste from going to

the landfill,"" said Gibson.

According to FoodCycle Science, there are a few main barriers to composting:

- Lack of know-how
- Lack of space
- Cost of supplies
- Physical demand
- Lack of time
- Worry about odours
 - Worry about pests

Around 150 municipalities across North America are utilizing the FoodCycler. That's a total of 15,000 households, with an average of 2.86 people per household. The average household runs their FoodCycler 3.5 times a week, recycling about 350 kg of food waste a year.

FoodCycle Science says more than 56 percent of

people sent their food waste to the landfill before using the FoodCycler. The company found that the product reduces food waste and, increases food waste awareness and "facilitates positive behav-

The RM of West Interlake is asking residents interested in the program to sign up for one. The RM is subsidizing \$100 of the cost of each unit for residents and the West Interlake Watershed District (WIWD) is subsidizing another \$50 for every unit. That means the 3.5-litre FoodCycler unit will cost \$150, and the five-litre unit will cost \$200.

Once approved, which is set to be later this month, the FoodCycler pilot program will have the RM purchase the units from FoodCycle Science. The RM needs to order a minimum of 100 units for the pilot program. Gibson said the council would approve the project if they get close to that number, but she's hopeful they'll get more than 100 unit orders. As of Oct. 15, 44 people were registered for the pilot program.

After the pilot program, each participant in the RM will get to keep their unit and continue to use

"Hopefully, we will be able to prove substantial volume savings in our landfill using these devices," said Gibson. "Which may prompt further involvement from the municipality to order additional units on our own that can be purchased by residents or to help residents purchase a unit on their own in the future."

Wages rise for health-care support workers, union says province on track to fix health-care

Health-care support workers will be receiving a wage increase and improvements in working conditions after their respective unions negotiated a new collective agreement with the province last Friday.

The Canadian Union of Public Employees issued a news release Oct. 18, saying the deal will help solve the difficulties around recruiting and retaining health-care support workers.

The agreement affects about 19,000 health-care support workers such as home-care staff, health-care aides, laundry aides, housekeeping aides, dietary aides, ward clerks and recreation coordinators at hospitals, health care centres and personal care homes.

"Our members stuck together to get a really good deal that will help solve the healthcare staffing crises" said CUPE 4270 president Holly Chaperon in the news release. "We have built an agreement that helps recruit new members and retain the ones we have."

The agreement includes an average wage increase of 27

per cent over four years that will bring Manitoba from the "worst paid support staff in the country to middle of the pack or better," and an increase in starting wages for "high vacancy positions," states the news release.

"This shows that this government respects healthcare support staff" said CUPE Manitoba president Gina McKay in the news release. "This is a government that is fulfilling its election commitment to fix healthcare in Manitoba.'

In Manitoba CUPE represents about 37,000 members that are employed in health-care facilities, personal care homes, home care, school divisions, municipal services, social services, child care centres, public utilities, libraries and family emergency services.

The Manitoba Government and General Employees' Union (MGEU), which also represents health-care support workers, issued a news release Oct. 18 saying its members accepted a new four-year collective agreement (effective April 1, 2024 to March 31, 2028).

"The new agreement includes significant wage increases for health care support workers in Prairie Mountain and Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority, with an average increase of 27% over the life of the agreement," states MGEU's release. "It includes improvements to sick leave, and the addition of two wellness days. In the case of home care workers and mental health proctors, there are also significant improvements to scheduling practices and mileage rates."

MGEU's bargaining committee asked the province to prioritize the processing of retroactive payments for its members to April 1. The collective agreement has yet to be signed by the province.

A spokesperson for Shared Health, which oversees provincial health-care delivery, told the Express support staff are valued and the organization is pleased an agreement has been reached.

"Shared Health and other health system employers welcome the ratification of a new collective agreement for community and facility support workers represented by CUPE and MGEU," said the spokesperson. "The work of our community and facility support staff is both important and valued and we are very pleased that a resolution has been reached for the benefit of these nearly 25,000 members of our health-care teams."

Armstrong council hires former Conservative MLA to oversee operations

The Rural Municipality of Armstrong council hired a former Conservative MLA as its new chief administrative officer to help guide the municipality forward after a period of instability.

Colleen Mayer was MLA for the St. Vital riding from 2016 to 2019 under the Brian Pallister government, and she has handled a number of high profile appointments.

Mayer started her position on Oct. 1. She replaces former interim CAO Nancy Howell, who has taken on the role of assistant CAO with the municipality.

Reeve Gary Wasylowski and council issued a news release to welcome Mayer into the job, saying they're confident she can make a significant contribution to ongoing projects and newly established council goals given her wealth of experience and knowl-

"Hiring a CAO was one of our top priorities, once we got ourselves established as a new council. Having a strong administrative support team around you is critical to ensuring we are meeting the needs of our residents, and we believe Colleen will help us navigate through the important work

we have in front of us," said Wasylowski in the Oct. 1 news release.

The majority of the former Armstrong council - elected in 2022 - had resigned in April of this year, about half way through their four-year term of service. That led to a loss of quorum with the remaining council members unable to exercise their duties. The

province stepped in to appoint an administrator to govern the day-to-day matters of the municipality. No council meetings were held between April 23 to July 23 inclusive. A byelection was held on July 31, electing Wasylowski as reeve and David Tyndale, Guy Rohne, Paul Humeny, Glenn Barkman and Allen Evanchyshin as councillors.

Under the direction of the new Armstrong council, Mayer said her goal for the year ahead is to oversee the overall management of the operations of the municipality including administration, supervision of staff, policies and planning, and financial manage-

"While there will be challenges, the opportunities that lie before council and administration are exciting, and I'm optimistic about what's on the horizon," said Mayer in the news re-

In addition to serving as a Conservative MLA, Mayer was appointed government whip, served on the government's treasury board, served as acting deputy speaker, and was appointed minister of crown services responsible for Manitoba Hydro, Manitoba Public Insurance, Manitoba

nial Centre Corporation, and Efficiency Manitoba, according to the news release. She was formerly the director of donor relations and development for STARS air ambulance. Currently, Mayer is the vice chair of the Winnipeg Police Board.

Prior to entering provincial politics, Mayer served as trustee for the Louis Riel School Division in 2010 and was re-elected in 2014. She served as a special advisor to the city councillor for St. Vital from 2006-2011. And as executive director of the Old St. Vital Business Improvement Zone, Mayer "built solid relationships with many city and provincial departments, businesses, and the community-at-large," states the news release.

Manitoba Ag Days gives back deadline approaching

"Community grant and scholarship applications are open now! Applications are being accepted November 1, 2024 and winners will be announced at the 2025 show in January.

Manitoba Ag Days has a strong tradition of investing in rural communities and agriculture education through the Ag Days Gives Back program. At the 2024 show \$51,000 in funds were awarded, in the form of seventeen community grants, four post-secondary scholarships and support for Ag in the Classroom - Manitoba. Since the program's inception in 2013 Manitoba Ag Days Gives Back

has committed \$485,377.50 to building the agriculture community.

Not-for-profit organizations are eligible to apply for the \$2,000 community grants, which can cover various project components such as infrastructure, supplies, equipment, volunteers, or training. However, the total project budget cannot exceed \$50,000. To promote inclusivity and diversity, priority will be given to communities or projects that have not been previously funded within the past three years.

Post-secondary scholarships \$2,000 each are open to students in their final year of high school or to

post secondary students. All agricultural related education and training is eligible, including degree diploma, certificate and trade programs. To apply, candidates must submit a completed form and include a written or video biography that highlights their community involvement and volunteer work, career goals, and how they envision contributing to the agriculture industry.

One-hundred percent of the funds raised through the Manitoba Ag Days 50/50 are used to support K-12 ag education, post secondary ag education and community organizations throughout Manitoba and Saskatch-

"On behalf of the board and our committee, we want to thank the public for their support. The allows us to pool our resources and make a significant impact in communities across the province, and on the lives of students through ag education. There really is a ripple effect through this program," said Nicole Maguet, chair of the Ag Days Gives Back committee.

He will play a major role in the Thunder's success in the championship as he plays both receiver on offence and kick return on special teams.


The date and time for the championship have yet to be determined but the game will take place at St. Vital Mustangs Field in Winnipeg.


