

Gimli council rejects barrier proposal around den to protect garter snakes from ORVs

A zoologist with ties to Gimli asked municipal council to protect a garter snake den in the municipality and its snakes from being killed by off-road vehicles, but her proposal was turned down.

Roberta Olenick was a delegate at council's Nov. 19 committee of the whole meeting where she gave a presentation on the garter snake den and provided council with a report titled Saving Gimli's garter snakes: a proposal for permanent barricades to protect a vulnerable snake den on RM Gimli land.

Olenick said hundreds of snakes are being killed or maimed by off-road vehicles such as ATVs, dirt bikes and utility vehicles.

The snake den is located on RMowned land north of Gimli. The den is surrounded on all sides by trails that have been carved out by ORV drivers.

Olenick, a zoologist and wildlife photographer who grew up in Winnipeg and Gimli, asked council to let her install — all expenses paid by her — permanent wooden barricades at the den.

"As mayor and council, you have a unique opportunity here to confirm that Gimli truly is a town that values



and protects its wildlife neighbours," said Olenick. "All you have to do is say yes to saving the lives of countless garter snakes with some all-expensespaid permanent barricades on RM land."

Olenick presented council with photographs of dead and maimed, still-living snakes hit by off-road vehicles, as well as photographs of snakes in mating balls, an ORV on the trail, temporary snow fencing and the site layout.

Red-sided garter snakes have a distinctive red-flecked yellow racing stripe along their flank. They are non-venomous reptiles and harmless to





humans. They're vital to the ecosystem, preying on and helping control rodents and insects. They leave their dens (called hibernacula) after mating in the spring but return to the den in the fall when it starts to get cool. Garter snakes are listed under the

Manitoba Wildlife Act. The snakes are impacted by habitat loss that includes wetlands, road/trail mortality from vehicles, pesticides and human persecution (deliberately killing them).

The den on Gimli municipal land is composed of a 20-foot-high earthen slope with a sandy trail running along the top and a narrow rocky portion running along the bottom.

When they form mating balls in the spring, the snakes can slide down the den's slope onto the trails where motorized vehicles drive. They're also vulnerable in the fall when they're returning to the den.

"Given the topography here, offroad vehicle drivers can end up running over snakes before even realizing the snakes are there until it is too late," said Olenick.

She said she spent several weeks at the den in 2022 and spoke with a number of ATV drivers who indicated "very strong support" for closing the area around the den to traffic, she said.

"All the ATVers I met who did not know about the snakes were amazed when I informed them and happily chose a different route," she said. "Only one person, who did know about the den, reluctantly turned back when I intercepted him. It was either that or run me over."

In 2022, Olenick said she was able to get seasonal snow fences installed around the den in the spring and the fall. She had approached then mayor Lynn Greenberg and council who "kindly arranged" to have RM's public works department and the provincial department of conservation work together to protect the site.

While that effort was "much appreciated," the fences haven't been working effectively, said Olenick. They can fall over in the sandy soil, are "far too easy" for people to remove and are

rels to songbirds," she said.


Effective protection for the snakes requires robust, year-round barricades, plus signage, she said. She pro-

GrainFox provides 2026 market outlook and releases Al assistant

GrainFox delivered its annual grain market outlook and announced a new artificial intelligence tool during its Bin to Bank webinar on Nov. 19.

GrainFox chief market analyst Neil Townsend and AgResource Company founder and president Dan Basse outlined the top 10 variables expected to influence grain markets in the year ahead, citing global supply and demand, geopolitics, weather volatility and trade relations as key drivers.

GrainFox's Variable Countdown

10 – Breakout candidates (barley, oats and durum):

Townsend said tightening global supply and increased offshore market activity are creating renewed interest in several crops. Canada's durum crop was described as "representative," making transactions easier, while oats emerged as the strongest breakout candidate due to U.S. market dynamics and trade relationships.

"If I had to pick one of the three in terms of having a bit of an uprise from here, it would be oats," Townsend

said

9 – Black Sea war and export potential:

Basse said worsening conditions in the region continue to threaten export infrastructure, raising concerns similar to those seen in 2021. While wheat remains oversupplied, he expects global availability to gradually decline into next year if disruptions

8 – India's pulse supply:

Townsend said India's domestic supply situation does not currently support higher prices, which could result in stricter import policies. He noted this poses challenges for Canada, adding he does not see conditions that would create a major upswing in pulse prices.

7 – South American weather:

Basse said favourable weather is currently supporting corn and soy-

Gimli council appoints its strategic projects coordinator as new chief administrative officer

Gimli council appointed a new chief administrative officer in mid-December.

During a special meeting held on Dec. 15, a majority of council appointed DJ Sigmundson as CAO. He had been working as the strategic projects coordinator for the mu-

Mayor Kevin Chudd, Deputy Mayor Kurt Reichert and Coun. Thora Palson voted in favour of appointing Sigmundson. Councillors Andy Damm and Richard Petrowski voted against appointing him.

Valorie Unrau of Way to Go Consulting was serving as the RM's interim CAO after council had put in place acting or interim CAOs to manage the municipality after former CAO Trilby Stirling-Kattler resigned.

When asked why Unrau stepped down, RM spokesperson Christine Payne said council chose Sigmundson's 'proposal" over the one submitted from Way to Go Consulting (Unrau), and that "Valorie will be moving on to new challenges after six months of service."

When asked if Unrau applied for the permanent CAO position, Payne said: "No formal application process occurred. Valorie submitted a proposal through Way To Go Consulting, which was not selected."

Way to Go Consulting is a private company that was founded in 2011 by Ernie Epp and Dale Lyle. It provides senior management and financial services to municipalities, school divisions, associations and other organizations. Valorie Unrau joined the company in 2022 as a di-

rector, using her previous CAO experience to specialize in client services.

Payne said it was "unknown" how many CAO applications council received, but council "reviewed at least two proposals," the one from Sigmundson and the other from Way to Go Consulting. The CAO position "was not posted publicly."

There were no conflicts of interest "reported" regarding council's decision, said Payne.

The RM of Gimli has had a number of changes at the senior management level. Assistant CAO Doreen Steg resigned in 2023, taking the director of finance job before quitting in November or December of 2024 and leaving the RM. Assistant CAO Kristin Strachan resigned in the summer of 2024 and left the RM. CAO Kelly Cosgrove resigned in the summer of 2024 and stepped into the assistant CAO job. CAO Jim Fenske assumed the interim CAO role in July 2024, but he resigned two months later and left the RM. DJ Sigmundson became interim CAO in September 2024 and served until Stirling-Kattler came on board. She quit after only three months on the job. She had been appointed in December 2024.

Sigmundson has a number of years of CAO experience. He previously served as CAO for the RM of St. Clements then as CAO for the RM of St. Andrews.

His new appointment with the RM of Gimli takes effect on Dec. 22, 2025.

The Express asked councillors Damm and Petrowski for comment.

posed a series of permanent wooden posts, about six feet high and two feet apart, be installed around the den, the full cost of which she will cover; there would be no expense to RM ratepayers.

The posts would impact a small portion (1. 5 per cent) of the entire site. The posts would not prevent ORV drivers from accessing the snake den site; they would just divert the vehicles to already existing trails farther from the den.

Olenick had started a petition in October on Change. org in favour of installing permanent barricades and had 386 signatures by Nov. 17. She received signatures from people across the Interlake, including communities such as Arnes, Gimli, Sandy Hook, Fraserwood, Dunnottar, Petersfield, Selkirk, Meleb, Komarno, Inwood, Teulon, Stonewall and the RM of St. Andrews, from those in other towns in Manitoba, and from people in Ontario, Quebec, Saskatchewan, Alberta, British Columbia, the United States, England, France, Germany, South America and South Africa, to name a few.

People in the immediate area told Olenick they tried to prevent the snakes from being run over by stringing a rope across the lower trail and by placing logs across the trail with a sign.

"Lots of other people also want these snakes protected. An online petition I started recently has already garnered hundreds of signatures in support of permanent barricades," said Olenick. "Many are from Gimli or nearby. Some from Winnipeg may have cottages in Gimli. Others come from all around the world. Maybe they have visited Narcisse [in the RM of Armstrong] and appreciate Manitoba's iconic garter snakes. As one signer said: 'Visitors notice when a

town values and protects its wildlife neighbours.""

Wendy Buelow from Dunnottar sent Gimli Mayor Kevin Chudd and council a letter, urging them to agree to Olenick's barricade proposal. Garter snakes are an important part of the Interlake ecosystem and shouldn't be harmed, she wrote, and added that the barricade will be "privately funded" and "professionally built."

RM of Gimli spokesperson Christine Payne said council did not grant Olenick permission to install barricades, but her request is being considered.

"Council has not granted permission for permanent barricades at this time. The request is under consideration, and any decision will take into account environmental impact, public safety and expert recommendations," said Payne. "Our public works team will review the space in coordination with other trail user groups and stakeholders to ensure all perspectives are considered. We welcome Roberta's input and ideas, and safety — for both people and snakes — will be a key factor in any proposed solution."

Gimli RCMP detachment focusing on reducing property crime, enhancing road safety, crime prevention

The Gimli RCMP detachment released its first quarterly report for 2025-26 to the municipalities it serves, showing its main focus is on reducing property crime.

The first quarter report covers the period July 1 to Sept. 30 and was released in November on the RM of Gimli's website.

Detachment commander Sgt. Rob Gray wrote that the detachment's three priorities for 2025-26 are to increase police visibility, reduce property crime and enhance road safety.

To increase police visibility, the detachment plans to continue its community patrols, either on foot, by snowmobile or water. Members will also patrol bars.

Over the course of the reporting period, detachment members completed 34 community patrols, 15 foot patrols during the Icelandic Festival, 10 bar walk-throughs and nine school patrols.

"Members are actively patrolling our detachment area from Winnipeg Beach Kernstead Road north towards Matheson Island and west including the RM of Armstrong," wrote Gray.

Detachment members were in attendance at 24 community events including the Gimli Car Show, The Arborg Street Festival, Winnipeg Beach's Boardwalk Days, Canada Day events and a crash-response exercise at the Gimli Airport.

RCMP patrols in and around the Matheson Island area north of Hecla-Grindstone Provincial Park were also completed when the number of onduty members and other operational events permitted. During the report-

ing period, there were calls to Pine Dock and Matheson Island.

The service's focus on property crime entails a number of initiatives.

First, the detachment is undertaking compliance checks to ensure that people released from custody by the court on specific conditions are abiding by them.

This quarter, members have completed 52 compliance checks which resulted in four subjects being remanded into custody and one warrant of arrest," wrote Gray. "With having the local probation officer and the FYRST program [youth and adult crime-prevention program] working conjunctively has been a benefit to all organizations."

Second, the service is partnering with community groups such as COPP [Citizens on Patrol Program] members, who act as extra eyes and ears in their community to detect suspicious activity, as well as with the Youth Community Committee and the FYRST program.

FYRST continues to support about 20 local youth and six adults in its program.

Third, the detachment is analyzing property crime data to reduce crime to 330 occurrences. The current reporting quarter has 216 occurrences whereas last year (same quarter) had 147 occurrences, or a 16 per cent de-

Gimli restaurants, bakery get cooking to support food bank staff, volunteers

Restaurants and the bakery in Gimli got cooking last week to support Evergreen Basic Needs' staff and volunteers as they packed Christmas food hampers for people in need.

EBN executive director Karen Bowman said they're so grateful for the local support as the food bank's volunteers and staff worked flat out last week to pack up the food hampers.

"This was very much appreciated by our staff and our volunteers. Packing the hampers is a big job with lots of heavy lifting," said Bowman. "They didn't have to worry about preparing a lunch. This is a special treat for them."

EBN used to have a café in its building but it had shut down a few years ago, she said, and EBN used to pay for lunches to feed volunteers on hamper days. Having local restaurants and the bakery step in with food and goodies is a wonderful way to support them during hamper week.

"This year we had Chicken Chef, Ship & Plough, Sugar Me Cookie (bakery) and Carlo's Cucina feeding our staff and volunteers," said Bowman. "Last year we had the Ship & Plough make us wonderful soups,

Gimli Chicken Chef owner Melanie Specula said she was happy to step up and provide lunches for EBN.

crease.

The RM and the town of Gimli had the highest reported property crimes this quarter.

The RM of Gimli had 37 property crimes, the town of Gimli had 34, Winnipeg Beach had 15, the RM of Armstrong had 15, the Municipality of Bifrost-Riverton had 14, Arborg had 7, Matheson Island had 1 and Pine Dock had zero.

In terms of calls for police service, the RM of Gimli and the town of Gimli had the highest volume during this quarter. There were 313 calls from the RM and 249 from the town. Bifrost-Riverton had the next highest number of calls for police service at 128 followed by Winnipeg Beach at 109.

The Gimli detachment's third priority, road safety, "proactive enforcement" through the issuance of 81 traffic offences notices, 17 warnings and 17 Criminal Code traffic violations.

bean planting, particularly in Brazil. If conditions hold into early January,-Brazil could plant a 180-million-tonne soybean crop, though weather risks remain a constant concern.

6 – Macroeconomics:

Townsend said inflation pressures following the pandemic have created affordability challenges, though agriculture has performed relatively well compared to other sectors. He cautioned, however, that economic uncertainty continues, with recession fears frequently resurfacing.

5 – U.S. exports and balance sheets:

Basse said U.S. farmers produced a corn crop comparable in size to the combined corn and soybean output of Brazil, Argentina, Uruguay and Paraguay. He expects export demand to remain strong, with end stocks for corn, soybeans and wheat remaining ample.

4 – Demand:

Townsend said demand for Canadian wheat is solid but lacks the growth momentum seen in previous years, particularly with limited expansion in biofuel initiatives.

"It's not that demand's poor; it's just that it doesn't have that built-in dynamic growth that it had for many years," he said.

3 – U.S.–China relations:

Basse described the relationship as an ongoing economic conflict, particularly around soybeans, and said the global ag trade landscape is becoming increasingly fragmented as countries align with competing power centres.

2 – Canada–China relations:

Townsend said unresolved trade disputes, including restrictions on Canadian canola, continue to slow negotiations. He added that the lack of perceived equality between the two countries complicates efforts to restore full market access.

1 – Donald Trump:

Basse said former U.S. president Donald Trump remains the biggest wildcard in global markets due to uncertainty around tariffs, trade policy and political influence.

"I have not been at an ag conference this year that didn't bring up President Trump as being the big unknown," he

TRACKS IN THE SNOW

I'm cold and lost and have been walking for days. The only life I've encountered is a hare bounding away, in which direction, I wish I knew.

The pines whistle in the freezing winds and to my horror, my vision grows darker. I refuse to give up, I refuse to pass out, but I begin to see the light dim all around me. I am terrified of the end when I suddenly realise, with a sigh I have not the energy to produce, that it is not my eyesight but the night engulfing the sky.

A wolf howls in the distance, but I descend my frozen eyes once more to the tracks that lead me. But with a pang, I see that the man's once mighty tracks are now enormous hoof tracks, and I stop to look around. I could not have walked abroad, I think. But in the dark, it is impossible to see, and so I decide to follow the hoof tracks, keeping my gaze firm on the snow.

My mind begins to wander; I am tired beyond measure and sleep tugs at my frosted eyelids. But I cannot stop now, the hooves continue far ahead, far into the darkness that I pray will soon reveal home.

I halt for but a moment, to close my eyes tight and melt the thin icicles in which have begun to grow from my

After I recover, I open my eyes once more and look down at the tracks. With a horrible sense of confusion, I see that they are no longer hooves, but now resemble those of a wolf's, although bigger and broader all around.

I cannot think clearly in the freezing temperatures, and so I continue to drag myself, following the large pawprints that lead where, I know not. But this time, I step within the tracks, to ensure that they don't escape me.

I follow and I follow, not daring to blink, fearing that my path should be changed yet again. I stare down at them until finally, my boots touch cement and I see that I have trudged onto a road; road with lights either way in the distance, which I assume are automobiles, but my frosted mind cannot comprehend.



The Bunge Men's Provincial Championship will run Feb. 3-8, 2026, at Selkirk Recreation Complex.

The winning team will earn the right to represent Manitoba at the 2026 Montana's Brier, scheduled for Feb. 27 to March 8 in St. John's, N.L.



Ask the Money Lady

Dear Money Lady, I know it's not tax season, but have you got any tips on how to reduce the amount of taxes I pay every year?

Carol

Dear Carol,

Unfortunately, the more money you make the more tax you pay, thanks to the marginal tax rate system in Canada. Many people make financial decisions based on their gross income; however, from a planning perspective, it's not good enough to know how much money you make, but rather to know how much money you keep. Making a dollar today doesn't mean you can count on spending that dollar tomorrow.

We all have two layers of taxation in Canada: federal and provincial. The one thing that is guaranteed with taxation, is that it is progressive. So, over time it continues to go up. Just to give you an example: when RRSPs first came out in 1957, the highest marginal tax rate in Ontario was 11.5 per cent, now it is 53.5 per cent. Knowing your marginal tax rate is one part of understanding your net income; however, there are specific strategies that you can utilize to help minimize the taxes you pay. The three best ways are to Deduct, Defer and Divide. Let's talk about each method.

- 1. Deduct: This would be a deduction or claim to reduce your taxable income. The best way to do this is to have a home-based business, be an independent contractor, or be a selfemployed entrepreneur to write off expenses against your gross taxable income. Look for ways to lower your income through various expenses or income-splitting.
- 2. Defer: Deferring tax means you move the obligation to pay current taxes into your future years. The advantages to deferring taxation works on the premise that it is better to pay the taxation in the future; perhaps when your income is much lower, than to pay it today, when your income is in a higher marginal tax



bracket. This can be done through registered pension plans (RPP + PRPP), registered retirement savings plans (RRSP + RRIF), registered education savings plans (RESP), and registered disability savings plans

3. Divide: Income splitting is the best way to divide your income and lower taxation. Now I know that many of you who are single will say that this is not relevant – and you're right. Dividing income can only be done with your partner (so you will need to have one to do this last taxation step). Here are some of the ways you can split income.

* Spousal RRSPs

* Sharing CPP benefits

* Paying wages to family members through a business

Using trusts

* Using partnerships or corporations to earn business income

Tax planning is easier than you think. Try to utilize a TFSA (tax free savings account) as much as possible. If you were 18 or older as of January 1, 2009 when TFSAs first started you can contribute up to \$102,000 in the cumulated contribution room since inception.




